#### No. 3.

AN ORDINANCE to change grade in Nichols avenue, Borough of Brooklyn.  
Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:  
That, in pursuance of section 436 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the first day of August, 1900, be and the same hereby is approved, viz.:

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grade in Nichols avenue, from Etna street to Jamaica avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, so as to change the grade in the aforesaid avenue as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of Nichols avenue and Etna street, the elevation to be 38.56 feet above mean high-water datum as heretofore;

1st. Thence northerly to the intersection of Nichols avenue and Wood street, the elevation to be 41.4 feet above mean high-water datum;

2d. Thence northerly to the intersection of Nichols avenue and Condit street, the elevation to be 43 feet above mean high-water datum;

3d. Thence northerly to the intersection of Nichols avenue and Jamaica avenue, the elevation to be 52.55 feet above mean high-water datum as heretofore.

All elevations are referred to the mean high-water datum as established by the Department of Highways, Borough of Brooklyn.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Textile Publishing Company to erect, keep and maintain a post surmounted by a clock on the sidewalk near the curb in front of their premises, Nos. 100 1/2 to 209 Greene street, in the Borough of Manhattan, provided the dimensions of said post shall not exceed eighteen inches square at the base and the clock shall not be used for advertising purposes; the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Municipal Assembly.

AN ORDINANCE to pave Jackson avenue, Borough of The Bronx.  
Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:  
That, in pursuance of sections 413 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the following

resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the 14th day of June, 1899, be and the same hereby is approved, and the public work or improvement therein provided for is hereby authorized, and it is hereby determined that the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid as therein provided; namely:

Resolved, by the Board of Public Improvements, That, in pursuance of sections 413 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the paving of the roadway of Jackson avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-fifth and One Hundred and Sixty-sixth streets, Borough of The Bronx, with asphalt on a concrete foundation, with a five years' guarantee of maintenance from the contractor, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways, be and the same hereby is authorized and approved, there having been presented to said Board an estimate in writing, in such detail as the said Board has directed, of the cost of the proposed work or improvement, and a statement of the assessed value, according to the last preceding tax-roll, of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment, the estimated cost of said work being four thousand five hundred dollars. The said assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is one hundred and forty-three thousand five hundred dollars.

And the said Board does hereby determine that no portion of the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but the whole of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby.

That, in pursuance of sections 413 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the 11th day of October, 1899, be and the same hereby is approved, and the public work or improvement therein provided for is hereby authorized, and it is hereby determined that the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid as therein provided; namely:

Resolved, by the Board of Public Improvements, That, in pursuance of sections 413 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the regulating and grading of Summit avenue, from East One Hundred and Sixty-first street to East One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street, in the Borough of The Bronx, and the paving of the roadway with teloid macadam, setting of curbstones, flagging of sidewalks a space four feet wide, laying of crosswalks where necessary, building of fences where required, and the planting of trees on the sidewalks, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways, be and the same hereby is authorized and approved, there having been presented to said Board an estimate in writing, in such detail as said Board has directed, of the cost of the proposed work or improvement, and a statement of the assessed value, according to the last preceding tax-roll, of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment, the estimated cost of said work being twenty-two thousand five hundred dollars. The said assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is two hundred and eight thousand nine hundred dollars.

And the said Board does hereby determine that no portion of the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but the whole of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby.

That, in pursuance of sections 413 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the 4th day of April, 1900, be and the same hereby is approved, and the public work or improvement therein provided for is hereby authorized, and it is hereby determined that the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid as therein provided; namely:

Resolved, by the Board of Public Improvements, That, in pursuance of sections 413 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the regulating and grading of Park avenue, from Pelham avenue to Tremont avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, setting of curbstones, flagging of sidewalks a space four feet wide, laying of crosswalks, setting of fences where necessary, and the planting of trees on the sidewalks, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways, be and the same hereby is authorized and approved, there having been presented to said Board an estimate in writing, in such detail as the said Board has directed, of the cost of the proposed work or improvement, and a statement of the assessed value, according to the last preceding tax-roll, of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment, the estimated cost of said work being seventy-two thousand dollars. The said assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is seven hundred and forty-seven thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars.

And the said Board does hereby determine that no portion of the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but the whole of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby.

Resolved, by the Board of Public Improvements, That, in pursuance of sections 413 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the paving with granite-block pavement of the carriageway of One Hundred and Twenty-third street, from Amsterdam avenue to the Boulevard, Borough of Manhattan, the laying of crosswalks where required, setting or resetting of curbstones and the flagging and reflagging of sidewalks where necessary, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways, be and the same hereby is authorized and approved, there having been presented to said Board an estimate in writing, in such detail as the said Board has directed, of the cost of the proposed work or improvement, and a statement of the assessed value, according to the last preceding tax-roll, of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment, the estimated cost of said work being nine thousand eight hundred dollars. The said assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is two hundred and sixty-five thousand dollars.

And the said Board does hereby determine that no portion of the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but the whole of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby.

## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Friday, November 16, 1900, at 2 o'clock P. M. Present—The full Board.

The Board proceeded to open estimates on Contract No. 696, a representative of the Comptroller being present.

Five estimates were received, as follows:

On motion, the Secretary was directed to transmit to the Comptroller the security deposits submitted by said bidders, and the following resolution was adopted:



Resolved, That the contract, opened this day, for furnishing and delivering manila rope, under Contract No. 696, be and hereby is awarded to Travers Brothers Company, said company being the lowest bidder, subject to the approval of the sureties. The City Trust, Safe Deposit and Surety Company of Philadelphia and The United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, by the Comptroller.

The Board then took a recess and reconvened at 2.15 P. M.

The minutes of the meeting held November 9, 1900, were approved.

The application of the Consolidated Gas Company of New York for permission to lay a 6-inch salt water suction pipe through the bulkhead at the foot of West Forty-fourth street for a distance of 10 feet under the deck of the pier thereof, was taken from the table, placed on file, and

On motion of Commissioner Meyer, permission was granted to run said suction pipe, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, and all pavement necessary to be disturbed to be taken up and relaid by the force of this Department at the cost and expense of said company; the pipe to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board, and the compensation for the privilege to be fixed by the Treasurer.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 20932, stating that the work of constructing an extension to Pier, new 47, North river, was completed October 20, 1900, was placed on file, and

On motion, the Treasurer was authorized to collect rental for said extension at the rate of five per cent. per annum on the cost thereof from November 1, 1900.

The application of the Quebec Steamship Company for a renewal lease of Pier, new 47, North river, as extended, for a term of ten years from May 1, 1901, was taken from the table and referred to the Treasurer.

The application of the Anchor Line for a renewal lease of Pier, new 54, North river, was also referred to the Treasurer.

In the matter of the application of the New Haven Steamboat Company for an extension of its existing lease of wharf property in the vicinity of Peck Slip, East river, from May 1, 1901, the President submitted a report that there is no objection to granting an extension of the lease, provided said company agrees that any such extension shall cease whenever the title to the property owned by private parties and leased by the company thereto vests in the City. Commissioner Meyer suggested that the report be amended by inserting therein a provision that no claim be made by the company for any improvements it may make between the time of granting the renewal lease and the taking of the property by the City; which amendment was accepted by the President. Joseph Koch, attorney for the New Haven Steamboat Company, was present and stated that his clients would be perfectly willing to accept and agree to such provision being inserted in the extension of the lease.

On motion, by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Cram and Murphy, Commissioner Meyer voting in the negative, the report of the President as amended was approved, and the matter of fixing the compensation and other conditions of the proposed lease referred to the Treasurer.

The communication from A. C. Gildersleeve, declining to pay bill for wharfage on scows berthed at Ninety-eighth street, North river, was referred to the Corporation Counsel for advice as to the jurisdiction of this Department at said locality.

The communication from the Canarsie Taxpayers' Association, stating that the Pier at the foot of Ninety-second street, Borough of Brooklyn, has been fenced off from public use by private parties, was referred to the Corporation Counsel for advice as to the ownership of said pier.

The communication from John J. O'Hare, requesting permission to place and maintain two derricks on the bulkhead between Houston and East Third streets, East river, was referred to the Dock Superintendent to examine and report.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief and to be kept within existing lines:

Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, to repair Piers, old 8, 12, 13, 14 and 15, North river, when necessary, to June 30, 1901, twenty-four hours' notice to be given the Engineer-in-Chief before the commencement of any such work.

John Morton & Sons & Co., to repair their bulkhead at the foot of Carroll street, Gowanus canal, Borough of Brooklyn.

The following permits were granted, in exercise during the pleasure of the Board:

New Jersey Steamboat Company, to berth one of its steamers on the south side of the Pier foot of West Thirty-ninth street, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

Brooklyn Sanitary Company, to use and occupy the bulkhead at the foot of Sixth street, Gowanus canal, Borough of Brooklyn, for the dumping of garbage therefrom.

Brooklyn Dock and Terminal Company, to load and unload on scows at the Pier foot of Twenty-fifth street, Borough of Brooklyn, the consent of the Health Department having been obtained.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, the privileges to continue only during the pleasure of the Board:

Yorkville Independent Hygiene Ice Company, to construct a dry rubble wall at the foot of East Eighty-second street, and to fill in behind same, said wall not to project beyond the high-water mark.

Willson, Adams & Co., to construct a pile platform on the easterly side of the Harlem river, about 200 feet south of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, the work to be done in accordance with plans and specifications submitted.

American Sugar Refining Company, to erect an iron tower for supporting ash elevator on the bulkhead at the foot of South Second street, Borough of Brooklyn, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted.

Mary E. Jones, to extend the crib bulkheads on her property at Fort Richmond, Staten Island, a distance of about 70 feet, the work to be done in accordance with plans to be submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief, the original structures and said extension to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund—Transmitting copy of resolution adopted by said Commissioners November 14, 1900, approving the plan for the improvement of the water-front between Wall street and Catharine slip, East river.

From the Comptroller—Requesting information in relation to the cost of the property acquired by this Department. Action of the President in furnishing same approved.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Approving item of Contract No. 696, for furnishing manila rope.

2d. In relation to the proposed ferry foot of East Forty-second street.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be requested to advise this Board whether the Brooklyn Ferry Company of New York has a franchise to operate the ferry between Forty-second street, East river, and the foot of Broadway, Brooklyn, and has fulfilled all legal requirements which should be fulfilled before such ferry can be operated.

From the Department of Highways—Advising that repairs will be made to the box sewer at the foot of Douglass street, Gowanus canal, Borough of Brooklyn.

From the Board of Municipal Statistics—Requesting information in relation to the improvements made by this Department during the year 1899. Action of the Secretary in furnishing the information approved.

From the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company—Accepting the terms and conditions of the permit to use and occupy, during the pleasure of the Board, the westerly half of Pier, old 15, East river, together with the shed thereon, at an annual rental of \$10,000.

From the Consolidated Ice Company—Requesting credit for \$625 overpaid rental on Pier 2, Wallabout basin, Brooklyn.

On motion, the action of the Board of March 30, 1900, directing the Chief Clerk to credit said amount on the rental of Pier, new 1, Wallabout basin, was rescinded, the lease of said pier to the Consolidated Ice Company having been canceled, and the Chief Clerk was authorized to credit the sum of \$625 on the rental due for the use of the Pier foot of West Forty-sixth street, for the quarter commencing November 1, 1900.

From the Central Brewing Company—Requesting that the necessary piles be driven by this Department at the foot of Sixty-eighth street, East river, and agreeing to pay the cost thereof. Engineer-in-Chief directed to drive the piles and to report the cost of the work for collection from said company.

From H. E. Nesmith—Requesting a lease of Pier 12, East river, together with the bulkhead westerly, and half of the bulkhead easterly thereof, at an annual rental of \$5,000. Application denied, and the Secretary directed to state that it is the intention of the Board to keep said pier open for general wharfage.

From John C. Rodgers—Stating that he does not desire to avail himself of the permit to maintain a derrick at the foot of Seventh avenue, Harlem river. Permit revoked.

From Naughton & Co.—Requesting an extension of time on Contract No. 689.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the first delivery of one thousand piles, under Contract No. 689, Naughton & Co., contractors, be and hereby is extended to and including December 1, 1900, and the time for the completion of the entire contract be and hereby is extended to and including December 31, 1900, provided the written consent of the sureties on said contract is filed in this Department.

From the John P. Kane Company—Requesting an extension of time on Contract No. 691.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the first delivery of 2,500 barrels of cement, under Contract No. 691, John P. Kane Company, contractors, be and hereby is extended to and including October 29, 1900, provided the written consent of the sureties on said contract is filed in this Department.

From the Dock Superintendent—

1st. Report for the week ending November 10, 1900.

2d. Reporting that the steamer "Wyckoff," of the Matewan Propeller Company, and the steamer "Holmdel," of the Citizens' Steamboat Company, discontinued landing at the Pier foot of Canal street, North river, on October 30, 1900; that the steamer "St. Michael," of the Citizens' Steamboat Company, discontinued landing at the Battery Wharf on October 28, 1900, and that the steamer "H. A. Huber," of the Norton Point Land Company, discontinued landing at the Battery Wharf on October 31, 1900, and recommending that the permits be revoked as of the dates named. Recommendation adopted.

From the Treasurer—

1st. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the Pennsylvania Railroad Company for the use of the abandoned ferry premises, consisting of the south side of the Pier foot of West Thirteenth street, the north side of the Pier foot of Little West Twelfth street, and the land under water in the slip between said piers, be fixed at the rate of \$500 per annum, payable quarterly at the end of each quarter, to the Treasurer, commencing November 1, 1900. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Recommending that the permit granted Joseph W. Goly to maintain an engine and derrick on the bulkhead between Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, North river, be revoked, he having failed to take advantage of the said privilege. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that the compensation to be charged John J. Reilly for the privilege of maintaining an ice bridge, etc., on the north side of the Pier foot of West Fifty-fourth street, be fixed at the rate of \$1,500 per annum, payable monthly, in advance, to the Treasurer, commencing from the time said structures are erected thereat. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Recommending that permission be granted the Manhattan Ice Company to use and occupy, during the pleasure of the Board, the bulkhead at the foot of Cochrans street, East river, with the privilege of erecting and maintaining an ice bridge thereat, compensation therefor to be hereafter determined by the Treasurer. Recommendation adopted, Commissioner Meyer voting in the negative.

5th. Recommending that permission be granted the People's Co-operative Ice Company to use and occupy, during the pleasure of the Board, 150 feet of the southerly side of the Pier foot of East Sixty-first street, and 150 feet of the north side of the Pier foot of West Thirty-ninth street, with the privilege of erecting and maintaining an ice bridge thereat, compensation therefor to be hereafter determined by the Treasurer.

On motion, by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Cram and Murphy, Commissioner Meyer voting in the negative, the recommendation of the Treasurer was adopted, and the report of the Dock Superintendent, stating that the bulkhead between Piers, old 48 1/2 and 50, North river, is not available for the berthing of boats, it being now used by the Department of Highways, was placed on file, and the Secretary directed to so notify said company.

6th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the Erie Railroad Company for the use and occupancy of the easterly half of Pier, new 7, East river, together with the shed thereon, be fixed at the rate of \$8,500 per annum, payable quarterly at the end of each quarter to the Treasurer. Recommendation adopted.

7th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the occupants of the bulkhead between Eighteenth and Twentieth streets, East river, be fixed at the rate of \$10 per running foot per annum, payable quarterly, at the end of each quarter, to the Treasurer.

On motion, the recommendation of the Treasurer was adopted, the records in accordance with said report to be as follows:

Carroll Box and Lumber Company, 240 feet, \$2,400 per annum; Electric Fireproofing Company, 132 1/2 feet, \$1,325 per annum; H. L. Herbert & Co., 132 1/2 feet, \$1,325 per annum.

8th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged H. W. DeForest for the additional land under water covered by the extension and alterations to the dock at the foot of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, Harlem river, be fixed at the rate of \$75 per annum, payable quarterly, in advance, to the Treasurer. Recommendation adopted.

9th. Recommending that the application of the First Bohemian Boat Club, for permission to construct a boat-house at the foot of One Hundred and Fiftieth street, Harlem river, be denied. Recommendation adopted.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Report for the week ending November 10, 1900.

2d. Reporting the completion of the work of building an extension to Pier, new 44, North river, November 15, 1900.

3d. Reporting the completion of the delivery of piles, under Contract No. 674, August 6, 1900; the completion of the work of building Pier, new 4, East river, under Contract No. 686, October 20, 1900, and the commencement of the delivery of cement, under Contract No. 691, October 17, 1900.

4th. Recommending that the Department of Highways be requested to make certain connections with the new pier at the foot of Main street, City Island. Recommendation adopted.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to request the Department of Bridges to consent to the placing of a small house, 16 by 12 feet, to be used as a Dockmaster's office, on the bridge property on the easterly side of Gowanus canal, Brooklyn, immediately north of the Third Street Draw-bridge.

On motion, by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Cram and Murphy, Commissioner Meyer voting in the negative, the order of November 2, 1900, directing the Engineer-in-Chief to prepare plans, specifications and form of contract for the construction of a shed on Pier, new 34, East river, was amended so as to provide for the placing of said shed on Pier, new 33, East river.

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to proceed with the construction of sufficient concrete base-blocks for the bulkhead or river wall and to proceed with the construction of said bulkhead wall from the northerly side of One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, running northerly a distance of about 600 feet, as shown on the plan for the improvement of the water-front between One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirty-fourth streets, determined by the Board of Docks November 3, 1899, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund March 21, 1900, in accordance with the provisions of section 819 of the New Charter, and to proceed with the construction of the bulkhead or river wall and other improvements of the water-front thereat, and the preparation of plans, specifications and form of contract for the construction of the new piers, as shown on said plan, and that all the work hereby ordered, except the construction of the new piers, be performed otherwise than by contract, as provided by section 821 of the New Charter, and that it be done by the force of the Department, by day's work, except so much of the labor and materials as is now or may hereafter be contracted for, and that all the materials, tools and dredging necessary for the above-mentioned work not heretofore contracted for, or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

A representative of the New Jersey and Hudson River Railway and Ferry Company was present and requested information as to what disposition would be made of the ferry during the progress of the improvement of the water-front in the vicinity of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, North river. He was informed that every possible facility with reference to the shifting of the ferry slips will be afforded the company by the Engineer-in-Chief during the progress of the improvements to be made by this Department, and the Secretary was directed to so notify the Engineer-in-Chief.

Commissioner Meyer then moved that the application of the New Jersey and Hudson River Railway and Ferry Company of July 2, 1900, to improve the ferry premises between One Hundred and Thirtieth and One Hundred and Thirty-first streets, North river, be granted. The motion was lost by the negative votes of the President and Treasurer, Commissioner Meyer voting in the affirmative.

The Secretary reported that the pay-roll for the week ending November 9, 1900, amounting to \$13,618.47, had been approved, audited and transmitted to the Department of Finance for payment.

The Board went into executive session at 3 P. M.
