MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

City of New York—Office of the Mayor,

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Gentlemen—I return herewith without my approval the resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on April 1, 1902, requesting the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to permit Charles J. Coulson to place and keep a watering trough on the sidewalk in front of No. 279 West Broadway, Borough of Manhattan.

My objection to this resolution is that, under the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Aldermen has the power to regulate the use of the streets for horse-troughs, which must be done by a general ordinance to apply throughout the whole City, or throughout specific portions thereof. A permit, such as called for by this resolution, should be granted by virtue of a general ordinance and not by request to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in a specific instance.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the Department of Bridges:

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I beg to acknowledge the receipt, on the 4th inst., of a copy of your resolution of March 18, 1902, which reads as follows:

"Resolved, That the Commissioner of Bridges be and he is hereby respectfully requested to provide for opening the various bridges along Gowanus Canal at night."

In response to such request, I beg to say that there are five bridges over the Gowanus Canal which for a number of years have been opened during the hours from 4 o'clock in the morning to 8 o'clock in the evening, of every day except Sundays and holidays, on which they are open from 8 o'clock in the morning until noon.

The records of the Department show that 99 per cent. of all the vessels using the canal pass these bridges between the hours of 7.30 in the morning and 5.30 in the afternoon. To provide for opening the bridges at night would require the services of ten more men, Bridge Tenders, who receive \$839.50 per annum each, an increase in the payroll of \$8,395. If the hours for opening could be reduced to from 7.30 in the morning to 5.30 in the afternoon, the services of one shift of Bridge Tenders could be dispensed with, and \$7,500 per year would be saved in the cost of opening. Only 1 per cent. of the canal traffic would be affected by such change.

The tabulation given below shows how few openings are made before 7.30 a. m., and after 5.30 p. m., and also what it costs the city to make such openings:

REPORTS:

That, having examined the subject, he recommends that the said resolution be adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Dealers' Hygiene Ice Company to lay and maintain a 10-inch suction pipe, as shown upon the accompanying diagram, for the purpose of conducting salt water from the Hudson river underneath and across Twelfth avenue, between Forty-ninth and Fiftieth streets, to its property on the easterly side of Twelfth avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, provided that the said Dealers' Hygiene Ice Company obtain from the Commissioner of Docks, in The City of New York, his license or consent upon such terms as to the said Commissioner of Docks may seem meet and proper; and provided further, that said Dealers' Hygiene Ice Company shall pay to The City of New York, as compensation for the privilege, such amount as may be determined as an equivalent by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; and provided further, that the said Dealers' Hygiene Ice Company shall stipulate with the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Docks in The City of New York to save The City of New York harmless from any loss or damage that may be occasioned during the progress or subsequent to the completion of the work of laying said pipe, the work to be done and materials supplied at the expense of said Dealers' Hygiene Ice Company, under the direction of the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Docks, respectively, as jurisdiction may apply; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen.

Report of Committee on Railroads—

No. 214.

The Railroad Committee of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, to which was referred the application of the West Tenth Street Connecting Railway Company for the grant of a franchise or right to use a certain street of said city, do respectfully

REPORT:

That it has heard the parties in favor of and against the petitioner's application, and herewith submit a proposed specific grant, in the form of an ordinance, granting the petitioner's application, and the annexed resolution for adoption:

It is resolved—

(1) That the said proposed grant be approved and have its first reading.

(2) That such ordinance be referred to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the purpose of making inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right proposed to be granted, and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor, in accordance with the provisions of section 74 of the Charter.

AN ORDINANCE granting to the West Tenth Street Connecting Railway Company the right or franchise to construct and operate a street surface railroad in, upon, over and along West Tenth street, in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Whereas, The West Tenth Street Connecting Railway Company has duly presented to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York its application, in writing, for a grant of the franchise or right to use the street and highway in The City of New York hereinafter mentioned for the construction, maintenance and operation of a single track street surface railroad in or upon the surface of the same; and,

Whereas, The said Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, by resolution adopted on the 25th day of February, 1902, and approved by his Honor the Mayor of The City of New York on the 7th day of March, 1902, gave public notice of such application, and that at the Chamber of the Board of Aldermen, in the City Hall, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on Thursday, the 27th day of March, 1902, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, such application of said railway company would be first considered and a public hearing had thereon, which notice was published daily for more than fourteen days successively prior to the hearing in two daily newspapers published in The City of New York, viz., in "The Sun" and in the "New York Press," which papers were first designated in writing by his Honor the Mayor of said City on the 7th day of March, 1902; and,

Whereas, After public notice given as aforesaid and at a public hearing duly held, in pursuance of said notice, whereat all persons so desiring were given an opportunity to be heard and were heard, such application was first considered by the Railroad Committee of the said Board of Aldermen of The City of New York.

Section 1. The said Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby grants to the West Tenth Street Connecting Railway Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and franchise to use the streets, avenues, parkways and highways of the said city, and to construct, maintain and operate a single-track street surface railroad in and upon the following streets, avenues, parkways and highways, viz.: Commencing at the intersection of Sixth avenue and West Tenth street in The City of New York, running southwesterly with single track through, upon and along West Tenth street to the intersection of said West Tenth street with Greenwich avenue, all in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York.

Sec. 2. The grant of said franchise or right to use said streets, avenues, parkways and highways, is made subject to the following conditions:

First—That the said right, privilege and franchise to construct and operate its said railway shall be held and enjoyed by said railway company, its lessee or successors, for the term of twenty-five years with the privilege of a renewal of said grant for the further period of twenty-five years upon a fair revaluation of the right, such revaluation to be of the right, privilege and franchise to maintain and operate said railroad by itself, and not to include any value derived from the ownership, control or operation of any other railroad, line or tracks by the grantee, its successors or assigns; provided, however, that the consent of the owners of one-half in value of the property bounded on such streets, avenues, parkways and highways shall be first obtained, or in lieu thereof the favorable determination of three Commissioners, approved by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, that such railroad should be constructed and operated.

Second—Upon the termination of the said franchise or right, whether original or renewed, there shall be a fair valuation of the plant and property of the grantee in the streets, avenues, parkways and highways aforesaid, with its appurtenances; and the said plant and property shall be and become the property of the city on the termination of the grant on paying the grantee such valuation. Such payment shall be at a fair valuation of the said plant and property as property, excluding any value derived from the franchise.

Third—The mode of determining the valuations and revaluations herein provided for shall be as follows: One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the railroad company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder; the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the valuations and revaluations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least sixty days prior to the expiration of the grant, or of the renewal thereof, and their report shall be filed with the Comptroller of the city not more than thirty days thereafter. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators; they may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigation without the presence of either party; they shall have the right to examine the books of the railroad company. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined, shall be conclusive upon both parties.

Fourth—The said West Tenth Street Connecting Railway Company shall, for and during the first five years after the commencement of the operation of any portion of its railroad, annually, on November 1, pay into the treasury of the city, to the credit of the Sinking Fund thereof, three per cent. of its gross receipts for and during the year ending September 30 next preceding; and after the expiration of such five years make a like annual payment into the treasury of the city, to the credit of the same fund, of five per cent. of its gross receipts, as required by section 95 of the Railroad Law.

That but one fare shall be exacted for passage over the railroad constructed under this grant and over the lines of any railroad system or systems operated in connection therewith, and that the gross receipts from joint business shall be divided in the proportion that the length of said railroad operated hereunder shall bear to the entire length of the railroad system or systems which shall be operated in connection therewith, and of the railroad to be constructed hereunder.

Fifth—The said railroad may be operated by underground electrical power substantially similar to the system of underground electrical traction now in use on the railroads in Second, Sixth, Eighth, Lenox and Madison avenue in this city and by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power, which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners and consented to by the owners of property, in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law.

Sixth—The said railroad shall be constructed and maintained subject to the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Highways in The City of New York, in all matters with respect to which said Commissioner is invested with the power of regulation and control by the Charter of said city; and the consent of the City, as owner of property bounded on West Tenth street, is hereby given to the operation of the railroad to be hereafter constructed on said street by the forms of motive power provided in section fifth.

Sec. 3. The said grant is also under the further condition; namely:

First—The said railroad shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railway construction, and the railroad and property of said company shall be maintained in good condition throughout the full term of this grant.

Second—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railroad shall be five cents; and said company shall not charge any passenger more than said sum for one continuous ride from any point on its road, or any road, line or branch operated by it or under its control, to any point thereon or any connecting branch thereof within the limits of The City of New York. The cars on said railroad shall be run as often as the public convenience may require.

Third—The said railroad company shall apply to each car a proper fender and wheel-guard conformably to such laws and ordinances as may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or city authorities.

Fourth—All cars of said railroad company shall be heated during cold weather conformably to such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or city authorities, and each car shall be well lighted, either by the Pintsch gas system or by electricity, or by some system of lighting equally efficient.

Fifth—In case of any violation or breach of or failure to comply with any of the provisions of this section this grant may be forfeited by suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the said railroad company.

Sec. 4. This grant is also upon the further and expressed condition that the provisions of article IV. of the Railroad law applicable thereto be complied with.

Sec. 5. The said company shall at all times keep the street between its tracks and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails upon either side thereof free and clear from ice and snow.

Sec. 6. The said railroad company, so long as it shall continue to use any of its tracks upon said streets, avenues or public places, shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of such streets, avenues and public places between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe.

Sec. 7. This grant shall not become operative unless, within twenty days after the approval thereof by the Mayor of said city, or the final passage thereof succeeding the return with the disapproval thereof, or subsequent to the taking effect of said grant by reason of the failure of said officer to return the same with his disapproval, the said railroad company shall file in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York an instrument in writing, executed under its corporate seal, wherein said company shall promise, covenant and agree on its part and behalf to pay the compensation and to conform to, abide by and perform all the conditions and requirements in this ordinance fixed and contained.

Sec. 8. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

No. 335.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to whom was referred on March 18, 1902 (Minutes, page 1594) the annexed ordinance in favor of the proper numbering of houses, respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed ordinance to be necessary.

They therefore recommend that the said ordinance be adopted.

Be it Ordained as follows:

Section 1. The owner, agent, lessee or other person in charge of each and every building in The City of New York shall cause to be placed or affixed thereon the proper street number or numbers of said building, and shall have said number or numbers kept and retained or renewed thereon; and such number or numbers shall not be less than two inches in height, and they shall be upon a plate at least two and one-half inches in width and of sufficient length to accommodate the numbers upon the same, with a longitudinal margin on said plate of at least one inch before and after the numbers thereon; and such plate shall be fixed to the outside of the building near the entrance thereto, and so that the same shall be plainly legible from the sidewalk in front thereof, and where practicable said plate and numbers shall be at the right of the entrance to the building; and said plate shall be not less than four feet nor more than six feet above the floor of the stoop or entrance of said building. When for any reason it is impracticable to place said plate as above provided, the President of the Borough, upon application to him, shall designate the proper position for the same.

Sec. 2. If the owner, lessee, agent or other person in charge of any building in The City of New York shall fail to provide, place and keep such number or numbers upon such building, the President of the Borough shall send by mail to such person a copy of this ordinance, and if the same is not complied with within thirty days after said notice has been mailed to such owner, lessee, agent or other person in charge of the building, the said President of the Borough shall cause the proper number or numbers of said building to be provided, affixed or placed upon said building in the manner prescribed by this ordinance, the plate upon which the numbers are placed to be of blue or black porcelain, or similar material, and the numbers thereon to be of white enamel, or other material.

Sec. 3. Every owner, lessee, agent or other person in charge of any building in The City of New York, who shall fail or neglect to comply with the provisions of this ordinance within thirty days after the notice above provided for has been mailed to such person, shall be fined twenty-five dollars (\$25), which shall be duly sued for and collected.

Sec. 4. The President of the Borough is authorized to determine what the proper number or numbers of each building are.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE in relation to car transfers in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. That no surface road or street railway company owning, operating, managing, running or controlling street cars in the streets or highways of The City of Greater New York shall, directly or indirectly, through its officers, agents or servants, transfer any passenger from a car leaving the company's car depot to any other car on its single branch, or leased branches, until it shall have reached the termination of its route, and for every violation of the ordinance there shall be recoverable against the company offending a penalty of fifty dollars, to be sued for in the name of each and every passenger so transferred.

Sec. 2. Amend—This ordinance shall not apply to transfers on any other road going in another direction, nor in case of accident.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

(Original.)

AN ORDINANCE in relation to car transfers in The City of New York.

Resolved, By the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Section 1. That it shall be a penalty of fifty dollars for each individual offense to be recovered by the Corporation Counsel, for any surface road operating or run-

ning street cars in the streets or highways of The City of New York, to transfer any passengers from the car which leaves the company's car depot to any other car on its single branch until it shall reach the termination of its route.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall not apply to transfers to any other road.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

That no surface road or street railway company owning, operating, managing, running or controlling street cars in the streets or highways of The City of New York shall, directly or indirectly, through its officers, agents or servants, transfer any passenger from a car leaving the company's car depot or any other car on its single branch, or leased branches, until it shall have reached the termination of its route, and for every violation of the ordinance there shall be recoverable against the company offending a penalty of fifty dollars, to be sued for in the name of each and every passenger so transferred.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall not be deemed to affect, prohibit, or apply to transfers to any other line or leased line going in another direction, nor in case of accident.

The Committee on Railroads, to whom was referred on March 18, 1902 (Minutes, page 1571), the annexed resolution in favor of approving extension of rapid transit system on Lenox avenue, Borough of Manhattan, respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed extension to be necessary.

They therefore recommend that the said resolution be adopted.

Preamble and resolutions recommended to be adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February, 1902:

Whereas, The Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, constituted pursuant to the provisions of chapter 4 of the Laws of 1894, and the acts amendatory thereof, has duly determined that the routes and general plans adopted by said Board on the fourteenth day of January, 1897, and the fourth day of February, 1897, should be modified by adding to the said routes or extending the same from a point under Lenox avenue, near One Hundred and Forty-second street, northerly to One Hundred and Fiftieth street; and thereafter did transmit to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York a copy of said plans and conclusions as adopted, which plans and conclusions thus adopted were received by said Board of Aldermen on the thirtieth day of January, 1902, at 2 o'clock p. m., at a meeting of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, duly convened on such day at such hour; and

Whereas, The said Board of Aldermen did, by resolution duly adopted at said meeting, fix a day not less than one week nor more than ten days after the receipt of such plans and conclusions, for the consideration thereof, to wit, this sixth day of February, 1902, at 2 o'clock p. m.; and

Whereas, The said Board of Aldermen on this sixth day of February, 1902, has proceeded with the consideration of such plans and conclusions; and

Whereas, The plans and conclusions and modifications are duly set forth in the resolutions of the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, as follows:

"Resolved, That, subject to the consents and approvals to be first obtained as in these resolutions hereinafter mentioned, the said routes and general plan heretofore adopted by this Board be and they hereby are modified by adding to the said routes the following, to wit:

"And also extending from a point under Lenox avenue, near One Hundred and Forty-second street, northerly, under Lenox avenue to a point at or near its intersection with the street known as "Exterior street," including connections by necessary and suitable switches and tracks or otherwise, with abutting properties used as terminal or storage grounds.

"The general plan of construction of the portion of the route hereby added shall be by tunnel in the same manner as provided in the routes and general plan for the construction of the rapid transit railroad under the portion of Lenox avenue, between One Hundred and Tenth street and One Hundred and Forty-second street. There shall be at least two parallel tracks, with the right at any time to add a third track, in the discretion of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners.

"A station and station approaches may also be built at the intersection of one of the streets intersecting Lenox avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-second and Exterior streets, as the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners may decide."

"In all other respects the provisions of the said general plan of construction adopted January 14 and February 4, 1897, shall be applicable to the portion of the route hereby substituted; and it is further

"Resolved, That, whereas, this Board has duly made the inquiries and investigation necessary or proper in the premises, and has determined that the modification aforesaid of the said routes and general plan are necessary for the interests of the public and of The City of New York, and should be established as herein provided, this Board does hereby determine and establish the said routes and general plan as hereby modified, subject to the consents and approvals to be first obtained as hereinafter mentioned; and it is further

"Resolved, That the said modifications of routes and general plans shall take effect only upon and after the following consents and approvals thereto shall be duly had, to wit:

"1. The consent of the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York.

"2. The consent of the Mayor of The City of New York.

"3. The consent of the owners of a majority in value of the property along streets or such portions of streets as are included in the portion of routes by these resolutions proposed to be substituted as aforesaid; or if such consent cannot be obtained, then in lieu thereof the determination of three Commissioners to be appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, duly confirmed by the said Appellate Division.

"4. The consent of the said John B. McDonald, contractor, and of his sureties, as follows: Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company; The United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company; The City Trust Safe Deposit and Surety Company of Philadelphia; American Surety Company of New York; National Surety Company, and Terry Belmont.

"It is further

"Resolved, That this Board hereby adopts the drawing now produced and numbered 'one' as showing the modifications or extension hereby adopted."

Now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby does, by a majority vote of all its members, approve such plans and conclusion and modification, and does consent to the construction of a railway or railways, in accordance therewith; and that The City of New York does hereby approve of all such plans and conclusions and modification and consents to such construction.

REPORT:

That they recommend that the resolution that was introduced be placed on file and that the substitute hereto annexed be adopted in its stead.

The substitute sets forth specifically the claims on file in the Department of Finance for decorating public buildings and offices during the time of the obsequies of the late President McKinley. Your committee have been informed by the Comptroller's Office that the vouchers for these claims are all in proper shape and that the claims should be paid. Your committee offer the substitute resolution for the reason that they do not consider that the resolution as introduced, which was suggested by the Comptroller's Office, complies with the intent of section 39 of the Charter. Your committee believe that instead of a general resolution the Board of Aldermen should pass specifically upon each claim. They therefore recommend that the substitute resolution be adopted.

Whereas, On the occasion of the recent calamity that befel the nation through the assassination of the late President McKinley it became necessary to drape with mourning the public buildings and offices in the City of New York; and

Whereas, The bills for performing this work can be paid only by and with the approval and consent of the Board of Aldermen, as provided in section 39 of the Greater New York Charter; now be it

Resolved, That the Comptroller of the City of New York is hereby authorized and empowered to pay all claims incurred for draping public buildings and offices on the occasion of the obsequies of the late President McKinley, provided, however, that the vouchers are properly approved by the head of the department incurring the expense.

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred on January 22, 1902 (Minutes, page 137), the annexed resolution in favor of authorizing the Comptroller to pay the bills of the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company for telephone service in the office of the Deputy City Clerk in the Borough of Queens, amounting to \$99.50, for services in the year 1900, and \$18.70 for services in the year 1901, respectfully

REPORT:

The resolution proposes that these sums shall be paid out of the appropriations for the respective years, entitled "City Contingencies," in which there are unexpended balances; the appropriations for those years, entitled "City Clerk's Contingencies," have already been exhausted. Your Committee are informed that the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies originally bore telephone expenses in the various departments until its appropriation proved insufficient, and that then the charge fell, as in this case, upon the offices using the telephone. The New York and New Jersey Telephone Company has submitted to your Committee the original contract, and a memorandum, the first item of which is a general charge for fifteen months' telephone service, from January 1, 1900, to April 1, 1901, at \$65 a year. The other items in the telephone bill are calls to New York, to Tremont, to Melrose, to Flushing, to Jamaica, and to New Rochelle.

Your Committee are at a loss to know what public business could require the calls to Tremont, Melrose, Flushing, Jamaica and, especially, New Rochelle. The city should certainly not be called upon to pay for telephone messages of private persons, which seems to have been the case. But the fault, if any there was, lay with the city's officials. For the reason that the telephone company could recover against the city, if compelled to sue, your Committee recommend the payment and so the saving of the costs of suit.

They therefore recommend the adoption of the resolution.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he hereby is authorized, requested and empowered to pay the bills of the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company for telephone service in the office of the Deputy City Clerk, in the Borough of Queens, amounting to one hundred and eighteen dollars and twenty cents (\$118.20), viz.: Ninety-nine dollars and fifty cents (\$99.50) for service in the year 1900, and eighteen dollars and seventy cents (\$18.70) for service in the year 1901, and charge the same to the appropriations for the respective years, entitled "City Contingencies."

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the appropriation a proper one. The former Municipal Assembly requested copies of these maps. A resolution appropriating \$800 to purchase them pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Charter, passed the Board of Aldermen and the Council late in the year 1901, and became law on the last day of the previous administration, neither approved nor disapproved by the Mayor. These maps will be of great use to the members and the heads of Departments, as any member can easily understand. Members of the Board are called upon to be encyclopedias about the political divisions and the representatives of the various districts, and these will enable them to effectively perform those functions. They therefore recommend that the annexed resolution be adopted.

The great mass of the citizens, residents and property owners in the section affected by the proposed application are averse to any such change.

Resolved, By the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, that the necessary steps be taken to bring about a change in the route of the Rapid Transit Line, so that the line will be from the intersection of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Third avenue and Melrose avenue, easterly through One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, to and crossing under Bergen avenue, and thence by curves through the block to the intersection of Brook avenue and Westchester avenue, instead of the line as proposed by the Rapid Transit Commission, which runs from One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Third avenue, through Third avenue to Westchester avenue, along Westchester avenue to Brook avenue, etc.

In every car of each train, except the said smoking car, shall be displayed a sign or placard reading "Spitting is allowed in the smoking car only."

Sec. 2. Any person who shall spit upon the floor of any elevated railroad car, except in the smoking car as designated aforesaid, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in a sum not exceeding \$100, or imprisoned for a term not exceeding six months in the Penitentiary, or punished by both fine and imprisonment. All fines collected for the violation of this ordinance shall be paid over to the Comptroller of The City of New York.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of each and every corporation operating elevated railroads in The City of New York to provide in each car designated in section 1 of this ordinance as a smoking car a sufficient number of cuspidors, attached to the floor of each of said smoking cars, and at least one for every seat therein.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the Department of Health to assign as many inspectors as in its judgment shall be necessary to regularly inspect the said smoking cars and enforce such sanitary measures as the said Department of Health may adapt to the use of these cars for the public health.

Sec. 5. All ordinances of the former municipal and public corporations consolidated into The City of New York inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Your consent must be submitted with a similar consent by the Board of Supervisors of Nassau County, for which application has been made, and also subject to the approval of the War Department of the United States Government, for which application has also been made.

Sec. 47. The Board of Aldermen shall have power to provide by ordinance for the acquisition, construction or establishment of markets; for the acquisition and construction of parks, parkways, boulevards and driveways; for the building of bridges over, and of tunnels under, any stream or waterway within or adjoining the limits of the city; for the building of docks, wharves or piers, and for acquiring land by purchase or condemnation for said purposes; for acquiring or constructing public buildings, including school-houses and sites therefor, for the use of the city; for the repaving of streets; and for any of the foregoing purposes may create loans and authorize the issue of bonds, or other evidences of indebtedness, to pay for the same, payable at such times, and in such manner, and at such rates of interest, as it may by ordinance prescribe; but no bonds or other evidences of indebtedness shall be issued under the authority of this section, unless the proposition for creating such debt shall first be approved by a majority vote of the whole Board of Estimate and Apportionment, entered on the minutes of record of such Board.

REPORT OF THE CITY PRISON FOR THE QUARTER ENDING MARCH 31, 1902.

Work Done by Paid and Unpaid Help at the City Prison During January, February and March, 1902.

CARPENTER'S REPORT.

Old Prison—90 panes of glass put in, 13 feet of pine wood used for cover of bath tub, 18 feet of 7/8 inch used for 7 ventilators, 3 chairs repaired, repaired handle on scraper window sashes, placed 1 board on bed using 6 feet of 1 1/8-inch pine, 2 boards for ventilators requiring 1 1/2-inch pine, 118 feet of 1 1/2-inch pine for plank walks on roof, 5 feet 1 1/2-inch pine for hospital table, 2 ventilator boards made, 45 feet of yellow pine for repairing scaffold, 16 feet of white pine and 5 pounds of nails used for the same purpose. Also 3 chairs, 3 benches, 2 duster poles repaired.

New Prison—93 panes of glass inserted, 1 platform 4 feet of 7/8-inch pine, 2 chairs, 8 window sashes, 1 chair, 1 window, 4 pairs of window sashes, door on "cooler cell."

Dear Sir—I herewith respectfully transmit a quarterly report of work done by paid and unpaid labor during the quarter ending March 31, 1902, to wit:

CARPENTER'S WORK.

At Fourth District Prison, by unpaid labor, putting in 7 lights of glass in office windows and prison kitchen, size 15 inches by 14 inches; put in 2 new windows in cells on second tier and 1 new window in cell on first tier, material used; 3 new window frames, 6 hinges, 1 1/2 dozen inch screws and 4 pounds putty.

At Third District Prison, adjusting and putting up 1 new bread closet, 1 kitchen table, 1 folding table for prison help, 2 corner shelves in kitchen and 1 clothes closet for keepers.

At Fifth District Prison, putting up a partition in coal bin; material used: 22 feet 2 by 4-inch spruce, 7 pieces 1 1/2 by 8 1/2 by 13-inch spruce flooring; glazing: male prison, 3 lights, 16 by 15-inch, in ten-day house; 2 lights, 16 by 15-inch, in reception room; 2 lights, 16 by 15-inch; material used: 4 pounds putty, 2 pounds wrought iron nails.

At Seventh District Prison, glazing: 20 lights of glass put in windows of male prison; material: 5 pounds putty.

PLUMBING AND TINSMITHING.

At Second District Prison, by paid labor, repairing pump; material used: 1 3-inch "Kennedy gate valve," 2 hours labor, fitter and helper.

At Third District Prison, by paid labor, repairing water-closet valve, cell No. 5; material used: 2 valve washers; putting on brass top piece on water-closet valve, cell No. 10, 1/2 day labor plumber and helper, connecting over floor from tank in prison with new trap and waste to sink in cellar, putting faucet in same, repairing faucet in cell No. 1 and placing new seat on same, repairing faucet in cell No. 11, repairing closet valve in cell No. 18, also 1 in prison kitchen; material used: 1 2-inch "S" extra heavy lead trap, 1 2-inch brass ferrule, 6 pounds 2-inch lead waste pipe, 1 sink-strainer

and bolts, 5 feet 3/4-inch galvanized iron pipe, 4 feet 1-inch galvanized iron pipe, 6 feet 3/4-inch galvanized iron pipe and fittings, 4 pounds solder, 1 set of washers and spring for "Mott's" valve, 1 "Mott's" closet seat, 3 sets of faucet washers, 1 pail of charcoal, 1 1/2 days labor plumber and helper.

Putting new lead trap and connection, also new strainer to sink in washroom, putting new faucet in washtub of kitchen, putting new faucets in cells Nos. 4 and 19, repairing faucet in cell No. 23, repairing valve in water closet cell No. 27.

Cleaning obstructions from waste pipe line of sink and washtub in basement, taking up and replacing flooring, material used, 1 2-inch full "S" heavy lead trap, 1 2-inch brass ferrule, 2 pounds solder, 2 sink strainers and 8 bolts, two 3/4-inch finished copper faucets for iron pipe, one 3/8-inch finished comp. wash tray flange faucets, washers for closets, valves and faucets, Portland and Rosedale cement, calking, lead, coal, calcium.

Repairing roof of main prison, cleaning gutters, leader pipes and roof of office and Keeper's dining-room, repairing roof of prison kitchen, putting up new conductor pipes and repairing roof of Matron's house, painting roof of office, prison kitchen, Matron's house and Keeper's dining-room, material used, 34 pounds solder, 31 sheets of tin, 2 bags coal, 6 pounds roofing nails, 4 pounds slate, 23 pounds roof cement, 51 pounds galvanized iron, 25 pounds metallic paint and oil, 135 wall hooks, 34 feet of 4-inch galvanized leader, 1 taper joint, 4 by 5-inch, 6 4-inch hooks, painting in all 1,805 square feet, repairing kitchen boiler to stove; material used: 3 joints 7-inch galvanized pipe, 1 taper joint, 1 7-inch elbow and 1 7-inch damper.

At Fourth District Prison, by paid labor, put in new galvanized iron pipe to wash trays in prison kitchen, sink and Keeper's kitchen and bathtub in Keeper's apartment, resetting boiler, prison kitchen, putting in new cesspool in easterly end of hall in male prison, put on new belltrap in cesspool in female prison, put on new gas bracket in hall of male prison, installing new water closet and new connection to same in Keeper's apartment; also a new hardwood copper-lined cistern connected to closet in Keeper's toilet, resetting urinal basin.

By unpaid labor, put on second tier, male prison, 3 new 1/2-inch brass water faucets, put on stationary washtub in prison kitchen 1 new 1/2-inch water faucet, in prison office one gas bracket; material used: 4 1/2-inch brass water faucets, 1 gas bracket.

At Fifth District Prison, by paid labor, furnishing and put in centre of each of the two ten-day houses, gaslights, same supplied with two lights, plain iron pendants, repairing of cistern of toilet in reception room, furnishing and put on new cock and ball in same; furnishing and putting on new chain and pulls to cistern in ten-day houses and also repairing cistern of same, cleaning basin waste in ten-day house, furnishing and putting on new swing gas bracket in storeroom, repairing faucet in cell 20 female prison, repairing the hot and cold water supply pipes in Matrons' room, and furnishing all the necessary pipe in order to supply basin with hot and cold water, furnishing and putting on 28 hardwood closet seats, repairing steampipe and putting in gas bracket in laundry, repairing faucet at sink in kitchen; material used: 1 1/2-inch globe valve, 1 short gas bracket, 1 set of faucet washers, 1 1/2-inch brass union, 6 feet 1/2-inch steampipe.

Changing and extending speaking-tube from dormitory to corridor of male prison, material used: 50 feet speaking-tube, 13 1-inch elbows, 1 china mouthpiece, 6 1 1/2-inch straps, solder, etc.

Supplied the institution with 1 new No. 92 prison key.

Clearing waste pipe, cell No. 6, female department; clearing waste pipe from bathtub, repairing and resetting radiator in ten-day house, putting in new gas bracket in basement, bread-room; clearing water-closet in ten-day house, repairing faucets in cells No. 4, 8, 22 and 23, in male prison; clearing waste pipe of wash basin in Matrons' room.

At Seventh District Prison, by paid labor, clearing waste from floor drain, kitchen, and furnishing and putting on new belltrap with screw cover, repairing and re-setting belltrap in ten day house, repairing closet in Keepers' toilet, repairing radiator in Keepers' toilet, putting in new air valves to radiator in toilet room and repair the radiator valve, repairing radiator in ten day house, repairing faucets in laundry, furnishing and putting in new trap in laundry sink, furnishing and putting in new faucet to sink in ten day house, repairing leak of check-valve on upper floor of male prison, clearing out and repairing toilet and valve at bath in female department, also furnishing new stopper for bathtub; repairing the faucets throughout the cells of Institution, furnishing necessary parts and put on new ones, where necessary, repairing leak at sink in cell No. 2 male prison, furnishing and putting on two first-class automatic prison closets with cisterns, flush pipes, coupling, etc., cementing around the cesspool in kitchen and ten day house, connecting cesspool in kitchen with sewer by a 3-inch cast iron pipe as to discharge pipe, clearing and repairing waste of cesspool in laundry, repairing speaking tube in Matron's room, material: 1 pound plaster; clearing waste from cell No. 12, female prison; clearing waste from cell No. 6, female prison, repairing hot and cold water valves in bath-room male prison, material: 1 pound red lead putty; putting on faucet at sink in kitchen; material: 1 3/8-inch "F. & T." compound faucet, putting on new seat for toilet in laundry and repairing valve, material: 1 new seat, repairing cooking boilers for kitchen use, material: 1/2 pound solder; clearing closet in cell No. 14, male prison, material: 1 1/2-inch plug; repairing pipe behind wash trays and putting on new faucet in laundry, material: 3 1/2 pounds leadpipe, 4 pounds solder, 1 wash tray cock, 1 pail coal, repairing large cistern in male prison material: 1 valve washer; repairing trap and faucet in Matron's room; clearing waste in cell No. 3 and No. 6 male prison, clearing waste in cell No. 8 male prison; repairing pipe at basin and cleaning waste in cell No. 16, female prison, material: 1 galvanized fitting and pipe, 1 1/2-inch brass basin-coupling for iron pipe; repairing main valve in female prison; clearing waste in cell No. 10 male prison, changing speaking tubes from hall to office, material: 300 feet of 1 1/4-inch tube, 25 1 1/4-inch elbows, 6 bronze mouthpieces and 5 name plates, 3 sheets galvanized iron, 3 pounds solder.

At Fourth District Prison, prison help, the male prison, including 27 cells, the female prison, prison kitchen, including ceiling, office and hall given each two coats of paint; the ceiling of cells given two coats of whitewash, material used, 400 pounds white lead, 20 gallons raw oil, 20 gallons turpentine, 10 pounds of chrome green, 5 pounds of Indian red, 5 pounds burnt umber, 5 pounds burnt sienna, 1 1/2 gallons dryers, 5 pounds yellow ochre and 2 pounds prussian blue, 1/2 barrel W. W. lime.

At Fifth District Prison, prison help, painting and renovating the entire prison, including tiers, bars of 45 cells, staircases, office room, dormitory, kitchen, laundry and bases of bread room, material used, 700 pounds white lead, 15 gallons boiled oil, 15 gallons turpentine, 2 gallons of Valentine's inside varnish, 2 pounds lamp black, 2 pounds drop black, 5 pounds yellow ochre, 4 pounds prussian blue, 2 gallons liquid dryers, 2 gallons asphaltum, 4 5-inch flat brushes, 2 1-pound brushes, 6 sash tools, 245 days' labor.

At Sixth District Prison, six cell doors painted, 6 closet bowls, 6 water tanks and pipe leading to closet and one large iron gate and railing received a coat of paint, material used, 12 pounds asphaltum, 1/2 gallon turpentine and dryers.

At Seventh District Prison, prison help, painting and renovating the entire interior of prison, including gate bars, window sashes, etc., material used, 1,750 pounds white lead, 30 gallons turpentine, 10 gallons boiled oil, 20 gallons raw oil, 10 gallons liquid dryers, 100 pounds princess metallic, 35 pounds chrome green, 20 pounds drop black, 5 pounds burnt umber, 5 pounds raw umber, 5 pounds burnt sienna, 5 pounds raw sienna, 5 gallons asphaltum, 6 1-pound brushes, 5 No. 2 sash tools, 5 pounds yellow ochre, 5 pounds glue 2 1/2-inch flat varnish brushes, 15 pounds Indian red and 3 pounds of chrome yellow; repairing flooring in kitchen, 1/2 barrel of cement, whitewashing kitchen, 1/4 barrel finishing lime and 3 pounds U. M. blue.

The prisons were cleansed of roaches, waterbugs, etc., by the services rendered by the P. M. Frank Disinfectant Company.

The usual amount of cleaning, cooking, laundrying and other general work done in all prisons by unpaid prison help.

CHANGE OF GRADE OF APPROACHES TO WILLIAMSBURG BRIDGE.

The following communication was received from the Department of Bridges.

DEPARTMENT OF BRIDGES, CITY OF NEW YORK,

NEW YORK CITY, NEW YORK, April 3, 1902.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—May I ask you to take up and pass, at the earliest possible date, a resolution providing for the change in grade of certain streets in Manhattan and Brooklyn, made necessary by the plans for the Williamsburg Bridge approaches?

By reason of the failure to act upon this resolution, the contractor for the Brooklyn approach has done little work since November 1, 1901, and has been greatly hampered and delayed in his work on the Manhattan approach. Under the last sentence of section 442 of the Revised Greater New York Charter, it would seem that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has full jurisdiction in the matter, and as I understand that the proposed changes have been favorably reported by the Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment I would urge that immediate action be taken thereon.

Herewith I transmit letters from O. F. Nichols, Engineer in charge of construction of the Williamsburg Bridge to the Chief Engineer of this Department, dated the 2d inst.; from the United Engineering and Contracting Co., sub-contractor of the Pennsylvania Steel Co., contractor for grading the approaches, dated the 31st ult. and from Stephen W. Baldwin, New York agent of the Pennsylvania Steel Co., to Mr. Nichols, dated the 1st inst., relative to this matter.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment;

SIR—I return herewith the resolution of the Local Board of the Bushwick District, Borough of Brooklyn, initiating proceedings to build a sewer in Hart street, from Irving avenue to Wyckoff avenue, attached to which are a copy of the petition, a copy of the report from the Superintendent of Sewers, and copies of affidavits from property-owners showing that the street is a public highway.

I find upon inspection that a number of buildings are under way on this block, some of them just about completed, while the owners will be unable to rent or sell them until a sewer has been built.

Estimated cost of the proposed sewer is \$1,750, and there seems every reason why the action of the Local Board should be approved and a contract authorized for the work.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The accompanying resolution of the Local Board of the Washington Heights District, passed on March 3, 1902, recommends that the grade of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, from Broadway to the Riverside drive extension, be changed, as indicated by the plan accompanying said resolution.

I find upon inspection that the grade of West One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street originally ran in a straight line from Broadway to Twelfth avenue at the rate of nearly ten per cent.; that when the Riverside drive extension was laid out the grade of West One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street was changed to conform with that of the new street, although a crown was introduced at a point about two hundred feet west of Broadway. The street, however, has been graded without regard to this crown on a straight grade from Broadway to the Riverside drive extension, and there seems no reason for denying this change, as the straight grade would be preferable.

I would recommend that the changes asked for be made, transmitting the plan accompanying the resolution entitled "Plan and Profile of Grades Fixed and Established for West One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street, from Broadway to the Riverside drive extension, in the Twelfth Ward, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York," together with a resolution and a technical description for a public hearing.
