## REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

No. 821.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

The Committee on Finance of the Board of Aldermen, to whom was referred the assessment rolls of the estates, real and personal, of The City of New York, for the year 1906, together with a communication from the Comptroller of The City of New York, dated May 28, 1906, transmitting the Budget for the year 1906, accompanied by his certificate of the amounts authorized by law to be raised by tax in and for the year 1906, and an estimate of the revenues of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation during the current year, respectfully submits the following

### REPORT:

The total Budget for the year 1906 is one hundred and sixteen million eight hundred and five thousand four hundred and ninety dollars and thirty-seven cents (\$116,805,490.37), which includes county charges and expenses for the four counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, aggregating four million one hundred and fifty-one thousand three hundred and sixty dollars and fifty cents (\$4,151,360.50), leaving one hundred and twelve million six hundred and fifty-four thousand one hundred and twenty-nine dollars and eighty-seven cents (\$112,654,129.87), as the amount of the Budget which affects the general tax rates of The City of New York.

In addition to the amount of four million one hundred and fifty-one thousand three hundred and sixty dollars and fifty cents (\$4,151,360.50), included in the Budget for County Charges and Expenses, the following amounts disbursed during the year 1905 from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds for Judgments and Claims for county charges or liabilities, are to be raised by tax in the year 1906, in the respective counties, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the revised Greater New York Charter, viz.:

Section 902 of the Charter, referred to in the Comptroller's communication, directs that the amounts required for the payment of all county charges and expenses shall be levied and collected from the taxable property within each of said counties respectively, to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred for county as distinguished from City purposes. Compliance with the provision of law will, of course, forever prevent an uniform tax rate from prevailing in The City of New York.

### AMOUNT TO BE RAISED FOR CITY AND STATE PURPOSES BY GENERAL RATES.

The following statement shows, therefore, the proportion of the Budget which is to be raised by taxation at uniform rates throughout the whole City:

### PERCENTAGE TO BE ADDED FOR DEFICIENCIES IN COLLECTION.

Section 248 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"Section 248. It shall be the duty of the Board of Aldermen to include, in any and every ordinance or resolution passed by them imposing and levying taxes for any purpose or purposes authorized by law, such sum, in addition to the aggregate amount required for such purposes as they shall deem necessary, not exceeding three per centum of said aggregate amount to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount imposed and levied therefor."

Your Committee has conferred with the Department of Finance in regard to the amount that will be required to provide for and meet such deficiencies as may occur in the actual product of the taxes to be imposed and levied in and for the year 1906, and have concluded to recommend that two per centum (2 per cent.) of the amounts to be collected by taxation for State, City and county budgetary purposes be added to and included in the tax levy for this purpose, this being the same percentage adopted annually since consolidation and almost exactly the figure which has prevailed in The City of New York prior to consolidation for over twenty years. Further provision for meeting deficiencies in the collection of taxes levied upon personal property has been made by the enactment of chapter 639 of the Laws of 1905.

### THE ASSESSED VALUATIONS.

Certain corporations which pay taxes directly to the State are exempt by law from local taxation for State purposes, so far as their assessment affects personal property. It is provided by section 202 of chapter 908 of the Laws of 1896, as follows:

"Section 202. The personal property of every corporation, company, association or partnership, taxable under this article, other than for an organization tax, shall be exempt from assessment and taxation upon its personal property for State purposes, and the personal property of every corporation taxable under section one hundred and eighty-seven a of this article, other than for an organization tax and as provided in chapter 37 of the General Laws, shall be exempt from assessment and taxation for all other purposes, if all taxes due and payable under this article have been paid thereby."

This provision of law requires, therefore, a special rate of tax to be imposed upon the personal estates of corporations which are exempt from local taxation for State purposes, differing from and less than the general rate for State, city and county purposes.

The assessment rolls for the current year, transmitted to the Board of Aldermen July 2, 1906, show the following valuations by counties:

The county lines correspond with the borough lines in all the boroughs except Manhattan and The Bronx, which, together, constitute New York county, and, as the rate of taxation in these two boroughs happens to be the same, it will be convenient in dealing with the assessed valuations to use the county classification.

The assessed valuation of the personal estate of corporations, joint stock companies or associations which have been found to be exempt under section 202 of chapter 908 of the Laws of 1896 from taxation for State purposes in the year 1906, as



appears by a detailed statement thereof on file in the Department of Finance, is as follows:

#### THE CITY TAX RATES: THE TOTAL TAX RATES.

As shown in the beginning of this report, the amount to be raised by uniform rates throughout the entire City for general City and State purposes is \$87,719,435 54

Adding 2 per cent. for deficiencies in collection..... 1,754,388 71

Amount to be levied..... \$89,473,824 25

It is to be noted that the quota of State taxes due from each of the respective counties is included in the Budget for City purposes and in the above stated amount of tax to be raised by general rates throughout the City. In 1901 the quota of State taxes due from the several counties was included in the county charges and expenses, levied and raised in the several counties. The amount of State taxes due from The City of New York is this year imposed and levied with the tax to be raised by general rates throughout the City, pursuant to an opinion of the Corporation Counsel, expressed in a communication to the Comptroller under date of October 25, 1901.

Separating the amount to be levied, so as to show the proportion thereof for State and local City purposes respectively, produces the following result:

Your Committee recommends that in fixing the actual tax rates in the tax levy ordinance the decimal fractions of such rates be not carried beyond five figures, i. e., hundred thousandths of one per cent., as any smaller fraction would have no practical effect on individual assessments, while increasing enormously and unnecessarily the difficulties of extending the tax rolls and preparing tax bills. The total loss by omission of such remote decimals will be only \$597.59 in the whole tax levy of \$94,098,147.42.

As there is nothing to be gained by separate extensions on the tax rolls of the City, State and County rates, your Committee recommends that the aggregate thereof, or, in other words, the total tax rates in each borough, as the case may be, be fixed in the ordinance levying the taxes for the year 1906. Such an ordinance has been prepared and is submitted herewith for approval and adoption by the Board of Aldermen.

#### SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS IN THE BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN, TO BE COLLECTED WITH THE ANNUAL TAXES.

The Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments have added to the assessment rolls of the Borough of Brooklyn:

First—The amounts required by law to be raised with the annual taxes for the payment of principal and interest on bonds issued pursuant to chapter 311 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 335 of the Laws of 1886, for flagging, curbing, guttering and paving certain streets in the Twenty-sixth Ward of said borough (late Town of New Lots).

Second—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for sewerage improvements in the Twenty-ninth Ward of said borough (late the Town of Flatbush), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889 and amendments thereto.

Third—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for street improvements in the Thirty-first Ward of said borough (late the Town of Gravesend), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892, as amended.

Fourth—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for the improvement of Flatbush avenue, in the Twenty-ninth Ward of said borough (late the Town of Flatbush), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889, as amended by chapter 356 of the Laws of 1894.

The amount to be raised for the payment of the principal and interest on the New Lots bonds is sixty thousand two hundred and fifty-nine dollars and forty-three cents (\$60,259.43); the amount of the Flatbush sewer installment is eight thousand seven hundred and seventy-two dollars and ninety-one cents (\$8,772.91); the amount of the Thirty-first Ward improvement installment is fifty thousand seven hundred and eighty-six dollars and seventy-one cents (\$50,786.71); the amount of the Flatbush avenue improvement installment is thirty-seven thousand four hundred and fifty-two dollars and sixty-seven cents (\$37,452.67).

The law requires that these assessments and installments be included in the tax levy ordinance to be levied and collected with the annual taxes.

AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of The City of New York, and the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and for the payment of the quota of the State taxes due from said counties, and for other purposes, and to levy taxes on the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation in The City of New York, pursuant to law, in and for the year 1906.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, the sum of eighty-seven million seven hundred and nineteen thousand four hundred and thirty-five dollars and fifty-four cents (\$87,719,435.54), to pay the expenses included in the Budget for the year 1906, for conducting the public business of The City of New York in each department and branch thereof, including principal and interest of the City debt, and the quota of State taxes due from the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, which sum so imposed and levied by this section is that portion of the Budget for the year 1906, amounting in the aggregate to one hundred and sixteen million eight hundred and five thousand four hundred and ninety dollars and thirty-seven cents (\$16,805,490.37), remaining after deducting therefrom the sum of four million one hundred and fifty-one thousand three hundred and sixty dollars and fifty cents (\$4,151,360.50), being



the aggregate of the county charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, included therein, which sum is hereinafter levied and imposed upon said counties in the manner provided by section 902 of the Greater New York Charter; and after also deducting the sum of twenty-four million nine hundred and thirty-four thousand six hundred and ninety-four dollars and thirty-three cents (\$24,934,694.33), supplied by the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, as stated by the Comptroller of The City of New York, in a communication dated May 28, 1906, transmitting his certificate of the amount of the appropriations made in the Budget for the year 1906, copies of which communication and certificate and of the said Budget were received in the Board of Aldermen and referred to the Committee on Finance of said Board on May 29, 1906 (vide CITY RECORD, June 1, 1906, pages 5180 to 5210); the said Budget for 1906 was adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 31, 1905, received in the Board of Aldermen November 14, 1905, and referred to the Committee on Finance; by said Committee on Finance reported to the Board of Aldermen on November 17, 1905, and, on the same day, by resolution formally adopted by the said Board of Aldermen (vide CITY RECORD, November 18, 1905, pages 9717 to 9746); transmitted to his Honor the Mayor November 18, 1905, and by his Honor the Mayor formally approved on November 24, 1905.

Sec. 2. In addition to the sum of eighty-seven million seven hundred and nineteen thousand four hundred and thirty-five dollars and fifty-four cents (\$87,719,435.54) imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within The City of New York, in and by the first section of this ordinance, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon said estates, to be raised, collected and paid according to law, 2 per cent. of said sum, or one million seven hundred and fifty-four thousand three hundred and eighty-eight dollars and seventy-one cents (\$1,754,388.71), the said amount being necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by the first section of this ordinance, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter.

Sec. 3. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of New York, the sum of two million five hundred and ninety-two thousand one hundred and eighty-nine dollars (\$2,592,189), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1906, included in the Budget, and the further sum of two hundred and ninety-nine thousand nine hundred and twenty-two dollars and twelve cents (\$299,922.12) paid during the year 1905, from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of two million eight hundred and ninety-two thousand one hundred and eleven dollars and twelve cents (\$2,892,111.12), and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates within said county 2 per cent. of said last-mentioned sum, or fifty-seven thousand eight hundred and forty-two dollars and twenty-two cents (\$57,842.22), which last-stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, and making the total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of New York, two million nine hundred and forty-nine thousand nine hundred and fifty-three dollars and thirty-four cents (\$2,949,953.34).

Sec. 4. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Kings, the sum of one million three hundred and five thousand four hundred and ninety-two dollars and fifty cents (\$1,305,492.50), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1906, included in the Budget, and the further sum of forty-three thousand seven hundred and eighty-eight dollars and ninety-four cents (\$43,788.94), paid during the year 1905, from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of one million three hundred and forty-nine thousand two hundred and eighty-one dollars and forty-four cents (\$1,349,281.44), and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates within said county 2 per cent. of said last-mentioned sum or twenty-six thousand nine hundred and eighty-five dollars and sixty-three cents (\$26,985.63), which last-stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, and making a total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Kings, of one million three hundred and seventy-six thousand two hundred and sixty-seven dollars and seven cents (\$1,376,267.07).

Sec. 5. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Queens, the sum of one hundred and eighty-seven thousand one hundred and forty-four dollars (\$187,144), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1906, included in the Budget, and the further sum of thirty-eight thousand and seventy-three dollars and fifty-eight cents (\$38,073.58), paid during the year 1905, from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of two hundred and twenty-five thousand two hundred and seven dollars and fifty-eight cents (\$225,217.58), and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates within said county 2 per cent. of said last-mentioned sum or four thousand five hundred and four dollars and thirty-five cents (\$4,504.35), which last-stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, and making a total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Queens, of two hundred and twenty-nine thousand seven hundred and twenty-one dollars and ninety-three cents (\$229,721.93).

Sec. 6. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Richmond, the sum of sixty-six thousand five hundred and thirty-five dollars (\$66,535), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1906, included in the Budget, and the further sum of five hundred and five dollars and three cents (\$505.03), paid during the year 1905, from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of sixty-seven thousand and forty dollars and three cents (\$67,040.03), and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates within said county 2 per cent. of said last-mentioned sum or one thousand three hundred and forty dollars and eighty cents (\$1,340.80), which last-stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, and making a total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Richmond, of sixty-eight thousand three hundred and eighty dollars and eighty-three cents (\$68,380.83).

Sec. 7. The assessment rolls of the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, for the year 1906, are hereby ratified, approved and confirmed and the aggregate amount of the assessed valuations of said estates for such year is hereby fixed at the sum of six billion three hundred and five million seven hundred and ninety-four thousand one hundred and eighty-five dollars (\$6,305,794,185), in accordance with the returns of the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments for said year submitted to the Board of Aldermen on the 2d day of July, 1906.

Sec. 8. The rates of tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, and the several counties and boroughs included within said City are for the purpose of carrying out and making effective the foregoing sections of this ordinance, hereby fixed for the year 1906, as follows:

I. In the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx (being also the County of New York), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 1.46741 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 1.47890 per centum.

II. In the Borough of Brooklyn (being also the County of Kings), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 1.52620 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 1.53769 per centum.

III. In the Borough of Queens (being also the County of Queens), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 1.54335 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 1.55484 per centum.

IV. In the Borough of Richmond (being also the County of Richmond), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 1.54273 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 1.55422 per centum.

Sec. 9. In addition to the sums mentioned in the preceding sections of this ordinance, to be levied and imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within The City of New York, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-sixth Ward (late Town of New Lots) of the Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward, improved by flagging, guttering, curbing and paving under authority of chapter 311 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 335 of the Laws of 1886, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on bonds issued for the above purposes, the sum of sixty thousand two hundred and fifty-nine dollars and forty-three cents (\$60,259.43), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land, in the proportion of benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Commission charged with making said improvements; there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-ninth Ward (late Town of Flatbush) in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by the construction of sewers authorized by chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889 and the amendments thereto, the sum of eight thousand seven hundred and seventy-two dollars and ninety-one cents (\$8,772.91), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to the benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Board of Street and Sewer Commissioners of said town and its successor; and there shall be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Thirty-first Ward (late Town of Gravesend) in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by local improvements for which the unpaid assessments heretofore levied in said town exceeding the sum of one hundred dollars are, under the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892, and the amendments thereto, to be levied in forty annual installments, the sum of fifty thousand seven hundred and eighty-six dollars and seventy-one cents (\$50,786.71), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to the benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined; and there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-ninth Ward (late Town of Flatbush) in said Borough of Brooklyn, situated within the district of assessment fixed and determined by the Board of Assessors of The City of New York, for the improvement of Flatbush avenue, under authority of chapter 356 of the Laws of 1894, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on the bonds issued for said improvement, the sum of thirty-seven thousand four hundred and fifty-two dollars and sixty-seven cents (\$37,452.67), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by said Board of Assessors on each lot, piece or parcel of land lying within the boundary lines of said assessment districts.

On motion of Alderman Meyers the report was given immediate consideration.

The President pro tem. put the question whether the Board would agree to accept said report and adopt said ordinance.

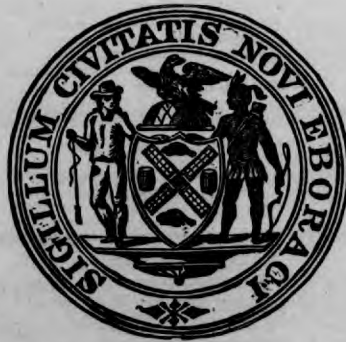

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
