Dear Sir—I respectfully transmit herewith a quarterly report of work done by paid and unpaid labor, together with a statement showing the disposition of prisoners for the quarter ending December 31, 1905, to wit:

Carpenter's Work.

At Third District Prison (unpaid labor)—Glazing, 6 panes of glass, 15 inches by 16 inches, put in in windows in kitchen and Keeper's dining room; overhauled 6 benches, 1 kitchen table; repaired 7 wooden seats in female prison; repaired wooden door to office, 4 hinges, 1 dozen screws; new sash cord supplied to 2 windows in Matron's room.

At Fourth District Prison—Glazing, 1 pane of glass, 24 inches by 51 inches, put in door of storm house; 1 pane of glass, 11 inches by 44 inches, put in on roof of storm house; 5 new windows put in cells on first and second tiers.

At Fifth District Prison—Glazing, 6 panes of glass, 15 inches by 16 inches, put in windows of female prison, 3 pounds putty, 1 box wire tacks.

At Seventh District Prison (by paid labor)—Taking off of lock on ten-day house gate, same repaired and replaced.

At Eighth District Prison—Putting up 2 new shades and fixtures on windows of prison.

Plumbing and Tinsmithing.

At Second District Prison—Repairs to "Duparquet" range, 6 feet; put in 1 set of rings and covers and 1 new grate.

At Fourth District Prison (by paid labor)—Construction of a new metal ceiling in office and hall; by unpaid labor: put in two 3/8-inch water faucets to sink in kitchen; put in two 1/2-inch water faucets in cells on second tier.

At Fifth District Prison (by paid labor)—Put in 2 new faucets to sink in kitchen, 1 new gas bracket on male tier; material used, 1 heavy gas bracket, cup, burners and plate; one 3/4-inch compression sink cock, one 3/4-inch compression cock with hose attachment, lamp wick, red lead, 1 candle; time of labor, 3/4 day. Repairs to leak on water pipe in cells Nos. 3 and 4, male prison, and furnished and put 2 nickel plated self-closing water faucets, 1 on male and 1 in ten-day house sink; material used, 2 No. 2 nickel plated self-closing basin cocks, two 1/2-inch plated connections, 2 pounds putty, 2 pounds solder, 2 rubber top washers, gasoline, two 1 1/2-inch brass screws, 2 sets of compression washers, one 1 1/2-inch coupling washers, red lead; labor, 1 1/2 day's time. Repairs to Mott's Defiance range No. 9; material used, 2 short crosses, 1 long cross and 2 front grates.

Wheelwright's Work.

At Fifth District Prison (by paid labor)—Repairs to van No. 4, setting 1 hind tire, countersunk 8 holes and 8 bolts, fastening up gear and four bolts, new brass whip socket; van No. 6, fitting box to axle, boxing 1 wheel and fastening front gear and two bolts.

Painters and Kalsomining.

At Third District Prison (by prison labor)—Painting and renovating interior of prison, to wit: Painted 8 toilets and boiler in cells on second tier, painted 9 cells and borders in cells on third tier painted 9 toilets and borders in cells on female tier, painted 3 wooden benches, office, dining room and kitchen; painted roofs and ten-day house; material used, 100 pounds white lead, 5 gallons raw oil, 1 gallon dryers, 5 gallons turpentine, 3 pounds chrome green, 1 flat wall brush, 1 sash tool, 5 gallons asphaltum varnish and 1 pound putty.

At Fourth District Prison—Painting and renovating the interior and exterior of prison; material used, 500 pounds white lead, 20 gallons turpentine, 10 gallons raw oil, 15 pounds chrome green, 15 pounds indian red, 1 pound chrome yellow, 5 pounds burnt sienna, 1 pound raw sienna, 1 pound prussian blue, 1 pound lamp black, 2 gallons dryers, 4 gallons white enamel, 3 flat wall brushes, 2 sash brushes, 1 round pound brush, 1 barrel finishing lime, 5 pounds ultra marine blue and 4 whitewash brushes.

At Fifth District Prison—Painting dormitory and stairways; material used, 200 pounds white lead, 5 pounds chrome green, 5 gallons raw oil, 5 gallons turpentine, 2 gallons dryers, 1 gallon asphaltum varnish, 5 pounds indian red, 3 pounds chrome yellow, 1 pound prussian blue, 2 flat wall brushes and 1 sash tool.

The prisons were cleansed of roaches, waterbugs, etc., by the services rendered by the P. M. Frank Disinfectant Company.

The usual amount of cooking, laundrying, cleansing and other general work done in all prisons by unpaid prison help.

Hon. FRANCIS J. LANTRY, Commissioner of Correction:

Sir—I most respectfully forward the quarterly report, statistical tables, etc., of the above institution for the three months ending December 31, 1905, and will briefly describe the principal improvement work on which the prisoners have been employed, irrespective of that going on under contract on the island.

A road of broken stone has been constructed extending about 1,200 feet around Pavilion No. 5 in which the branch workhouse inmates are housed.

A wall of sand, cement and brick has been built from the boiler house to the new subway for the steampipe.

Pavilion No. 3, intended for use as an industrial shop by the inmates of the New York City Reformatory for Misdemeanants, has been thoroughly overhauled and adapted for factory and shop purposes.

The necessary work has included the repainting of the interior throughout, the laying of new floor and the rebuilding of the foundation walls for the entire length and breadth.

For the transfer of the female prisoners to the north end of the island a portion of the barracks existing there has been readapted, making comfortable and suitable quarters, including dining room and kitchen, for the inmates, and also for the Matron and her subordinates. The work performed has been of a very thorough character, the kitchen, mess hall and storeroom having received three coats of paint; the chimney has also been rebuilt, adding 8 feet to its height.

Attention has been given daily to repairs to the steampipe service.

In the City Cemetery the usual work of burying has gone on, besides which 7 new trenches have been dug for the reception of the dead during the winter months.

About 15 cubic yards of stone has been broken daily by the prisoners in the stone shed.

The male prisoners have also been employed in unloading ice, coal, building material, etc., and have done the customary work demanded by the general requirements of the island.

The reformatory boys have been engaged principally in agricultural work and hauling material to and from the dock.

The female prisoners have been employed in the regular cleaning of buildings, employees' wash, and latterly in the general laundry work for the prisoners.

The President announced that Alderman Higgins had been excused from attendance.

The Clerk proceeded to read the minutes of the stated meeting of March 6, 1906. On motion of Alderman Dowling, further reading was dispensed with, and the minutes were approved as printed.

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

No. 349.
City of New York—Office of the Mayor, }
March 12, 1906. }

To the Honorable, the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I herewith return, with my disapproval, resolution entitled: "Resolved, That Frank & Harris be and they are hereby granted permission to erect and maintain a showcase fifteen feet long within the stoop line, in front of their premises on the southwest corner of One Hundred and Forty-third street and Eighth avenue, Borough of Manhattan."

"The work to be done at their own expense under the supervision of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, and permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen."

Section 199 of the revised ordinances provides "that showcases may be placed in areas or on the sidewalk within the stoop line in front of any building, by or with the consent of the occupant of the ground floor thereof. * * * And provided also that no such showcase shall be more than five feet in height, three feet in length and two feet in width, nor shall be so placed as to interfere with the free access to the adjoining premises, and that such showcase shall be freely movable."

Section 50 of the Charter provides "that the Board of Aldermen shall not pass any special ordinance in relation to any of the matters mentioned in this section. An ordinance in relation thereto shall be a general ordinance which may apply throughout the whole City or throughout specified portions thereof."

In view of these provisions of the law, I fail to see how I can approve of a special ordinance of this nature. Unless there is some exceptional reason to the contrary the provisions of the general ordinance should control.

In this resolution the applicant seeks permission to erect and maintain a showcase fifteen feet long, whereas the general ordinance provides that no showcase shall be erected which shall be more than three feet in length.

To the Hon. Board of Aldermen and Finance Committee of The City of New York:

Esteemed Gentlemen—In view of the inclosed article in a recent morning paper, showing that the police don't want to parade this year, and the Patrolmen petitioned your honored Boards to do away with that function, and gave the reasons, as such parades cost the City about \$15,000 each time, and say they think the money could be used to better advantage, I now most respectfully petition your honored Boards of Aldermen and the Finance Committee of The City of New York to appropriate that money, these \$15,000, to my Patriotic Soldiers' Society for the support of needy war veterans, and towards helping me establishing a home for them. There are many aged, infirm and needy war veterans in this city who would be made happy to provide a place for them. Many are in want, with families, for whose support the City at no time has done anything. They have not even a little place they could call their own. I have a very suitable building with grounds in view for such a home, but need \$50,000 to start it, and purchase the place, and am sure none of your honored members will object to my patriotic request, and the police force on duty, who saw fit to do away with the parade, and citizens will approve it. There is a pressing need for such a place to give our old veterans a home when in need.

For several years back, I have been trying very hard to get Jumel Mansion for a soldiers' home, well known in Albany and in City administrations when the fights for its possession were up in Albany and here, but for some reasons, or political influences were so great and so changeable that I was powerless to interest the different Boards and Departments of this City to make me the custodian of Jumel Mansion, and I gave my historic reasons why I am entitled to it more than these women who call themselves D. A. R.'s, or Washington's Headquarters Association; who got together and organized for that purpose, and called their society such, to get possession of Jumel Mansion, to which they have no right, but in spite, now hold meetings in it, while I was denied the same privilege after Pallas died.

That building should, under no condition, be used as a museum, but strictly be kept for military purposes, for which General Washington has used it, and should be turned into a military home for our aged and needy war veterans. There is no place in New York where our destitute heroes can lay their head, unless they go and sleep under the same roof in lodging houses, where tramps, vagabonds and undesirable people mingle; who surely desire a better treatment after having fought for their country, but were sadly neglected in their declining years, for the City has never provided a little home for them they could call their own, when in need of shelter. For that reason the Morris Building should be converted to their use. If Washington were in your midst now he would say: "By all means, give the old and faithful, brave and needy soldiers this, my headquarters, who have made themselves useful in war times,

who are worn out and were long enough neglected, and give them, in care of Mrs. Morehouse, the \$15,000, who will provide for their support far better than to spend that money for a police parade, for others, or useless things."

As this Jumel Mansion question cannot be settled now at this moment, I now petition you in behalf of our many destitute, dear old war veterans to consider this, my urgent patriotic appeal to you. Have pity on them, and appropriate these \$15,000, or less if you see fit. It would help me so much at this time towards opening my soldiers' home, that I may accommodate quickly several hundred of such unfortunates I have on my list, anxiously waiting to come to such an institution, where their cares of life will be lessened; to relieve their anxiety and pauperized condition, which is far better, I assure you, gentlemen, to use that money to feed and clothe and shelter them, for soon the last survivor of the Civil War will have passed away. Whereas, Land with numerous buildings thereon has been acquired by The City of New York at Otisville, Orange County, N. Y., for the purpose of establishing thereon a sanatorium and other buildings and structures for the care and treatment of persons afflicted with tuberculosis, to be under the jurisdiction of the Board of Health of the Department of Health of The City of New York; and

Whereas, It is of imperative necessity that certain improvements shall be made immediately so that persons afflicted with tuberculosis may be sent from The City of New York for treatment with all convenient speed; and

Whereas, A sum not exceeding \$20,000 is required for the purpose of preparing the sanatorium for the occupancy by patients by June 1, 1906, and in making repairs and alterations in the present buildings on the site so acquired and in the erection of tents and portable houses, a storehouse and dining hall, a laundry, in building roadways and providing drainage and water supplies, and in the acquisition of furniture and furnishings for the said sanatorium and buildings and in making such other necessary temporary arrangements for fitting the premises for immediate occupancy; now therefore be it

To the Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Dear Sir—We, the Board of Coroners, Borough of Queens, beg to submit to you that the appropriation for the year 1906 is inadequate.

The sum of nineteen thousand dollars (\$19,000) has been appropriated to be used as follows:

Salaries of two Coroners.....	\$8,000 00
Salaries of three Coroners' Physicians.....	4,500 00
Salary of Chief Clerk.....	3,000 00
Salary of Stenographer.....	1,500 00
Salary of Night Clerk.....	1,000 00
Contingent expenses	1,000 00

Total..... \$19,000 00

We ask an additional sum of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500) to be used as follows:

Telephones.....	\$800 00
Interpreters' fees	200 00
Furniture	500 00
Coroners' Physicians expenses.....	1,000 00
Coroners' expenses	1,000 00

Total..... \$3,500 00

In explanation of the above we would state that telephones must be maintained in the Coroners' Office, Town Hall, Jamaica, in each Coroner's house, in each Coroner's Physician's home and in the Chief Clerk's Home. The total of these bills will be approximately eight hundred dollars.

Interpreters' Fees.

There is no interpreter attached to the office and we are dependent on the services of private citizens who are unwilling to devote their time without remuneration. In nearly all cases foreign witnesses have to be examined, and as sittings are held at least once a week and sometimes oftener, we think two hundred dollars (\$200) will probably cover the expense.

New Furniture.

Our office is in such bad condition at present as to be a disgrace to the City and will require not less than five hundred dollars (\$500) expenditure for floor covering, chairs and desks. The Board of Health and County Clerk both refuse to receive our records and a filing cabinet is absolutely needed.

Coroners' Physicians Expenses.

In visiting cases the Physicians must travel long distances, not accessible by trolley, sometimes not by steam railroads, and the hire of conveyances becomes necessary in order that the work may be promptly and properly attended to. We ask one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for this purpose, giving three hundred and thirty-three dollars (\$333) per annum to each.

Coroners' Expenses.

The same condition prevails as in the case for Coroners' Physicians in the matter of traveling expenses, in addition to which we must order removal of bodies, and as no morgue is sustained in the borough, we are dependent on private undertakers, and a fee of ten dollars (\$10) is customary for removal, icing and care of body until claimed by relatives. Other incidental expenses such as postage, messengers, etc., make one thousand dollars (\$1,000) a very conservative estimate of amount needed.

Sir—Referring to the resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February 28, 1906, asking information as to the fencing off of the pier foot of Fifty-seventh street, North river, and the adjoining bulkhead, the dock in question is used as the Department's repair shop and for the storage of material, floating plant, etc.

The North river yard of the Department for the storage of material and supplies was originally established at the foot of Gansevoort street, North river. On November 21, 1883, the then Board of Docks unanimously adopted a resolution establishing a new yard under a new plan for the improvement of the water front at the pier foot of Fifty-seventh street, North river; the then Corporation Counsel stated that there was no objection to the establishment of the yard at that point, and in September, 1887, the new yard was finished.

Pursuant to resolutions adopted in December, 1888, and February, 1889, the old pier at the foot of West Fifty-seventh street was removed and a new pier and the bulkhead wall were constructed, the Department yard embracing this new pier and the bulkhead between Fifty-sixth and Fifty-eighth streets, North river.

The Department has at various times at this yard, plant to the value of \$500,000, and it is absolutely necessary that the premises be fenced off in order that the material belonging to the City may be properly safeguarded.

Sir—In reply to letter of John D. Beals, President of the Washington Heights Taxpayers' Association, under date of January 25, 1906, relative to the laying out into streets and avenues the unimproved portion of the Twelfth Ward, north of Dyckman street, and also the setting of monuments locating the streets and avenues north of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street.

I would state that for the past three years in making up the annual appropriation to carry on the work of this Bureau, I have stated the necessity of an increase in the field force so as to enable me to set the monuments at the street corners and preserve the lines of the streets then laid out and mapped before the stakes would decay and be lost, which would force me to make new surveys before the monuments could be set; added to this the many improvements, such as regulating, grading, sewers, water and gas pipes which have more or less disturbed the original points before we notified so that they could be preserved for future use. On July 24, 1905, I sent a report of the necessity of an additional force in the field as follows:

The increase in the field party is for the laying out and mapping into streets, avenues, etc., all that part of the Twelfth Ward, between Dyckman street, Broadway, Spuyten Duyvil creek, and Hudson river. This portion of the City has never been laid out or developed. There are no streets, avenues, roads or lanes, except private ones; no grades have been established; no access to the property has been given, hence no development.

The duty of this office is to monument new work and readjust old monuments disturbed from whatever cause. The new work laid out and mapped the present year north of West One Hundred and Eighty-first street will require about 165 monuments. There is now on hand about 125 which I am desirous of having put into the ground as permanent points for the development of the new streets. Nearly five miles of new streets have been laid out during the past year, many are now being legally opened, regulated, graded, sewerd, etc., within the lines of the new streets before the legal title has been acquired by the City. It is absolutely necessary that the proper lines of the streets should be determined at an early date.

REPORT:

That Commissioner Herrman appeared before your Committee and urged the adoption of this resolution. The Budget allowance was \$360,907.90 less than was requested, and the Commissioner states that this \$200,000 is the least that will do in order to maintain the Manhattan and Richmond parks, in any proper condition, and has, at the request of the Committee, submitted the annexed detailed statement showing the items of the maintenance account.

Upon such statements your Committee feel compelled, in the interests of our park service, to report favorably upon this application, but at the same time they question very much the advisability and economy of the alleged action of the last Board of Estimate and Apportionment in cutting from the Budget amounts which Commissioner Herrman states to be absolutely necessary for maintenance, and thereby necessitating an issue of Revenue Bonds with its incidental high interest and expenses.

Your Committee favor the adoption of this resolution.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I beg to request that your Honorable Board will, pursuant to section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000), the proceeds to be applied to meet the deficiency between the sum actually required for the maintenance of the parks, parkways, playgrounds, etc., in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, and the amount allowed for that purpose in the Budget for the current year.

While this sum is considerably less than the deficit as shown in detail by the departmental estimate for the year 1906 (which was based on actual requirements of labor and materials calculated from existing conditions and rate of expenditure), I have in mind the fact that the demands upon this source of revenue and the finances of the City make necessary the best economy and distribution of the funds at your disposal under this section of the Charter.

Among the various and numerous items over which it will be necessary to distribute this amount to meet the needs of park maintenance work, I have included the item of renovating the Central Park, or such portion thereof as may be reasonable to undertake during the coming season, by means of the application of top soil or mould with manure and new planting. In the opinion of the experts who have made a careful study of this subject, the treatment proposed is very necessary to preserve and maintain the park at its present and past standard.

This work is deemed to be more properly construed as maintenance, rather than work of the character ordinarily provided for by the issue of Corporate Stock.

With the sum herein asked for, and with a careful regulation of expenses and the elimination of such items of intended work as it may be possible to dispense with, or otherwise adjust for the present year, I am of opinion that a fairly creditable degree of maintenance may be attained.

REPORT:

That Commissioner Walgrove appeared before your committee and urged the adoption of the resolution, and while the sum of \$433,200 had been asked for in last year's estimate, only \$246,450 had been allowed for maintenance. This sum is only \$1,500 more than in 1900, in spite of the increase in the Department in those six years. As set forth in the accompanying letter, and from the Commissioner's statement, the increase in the Bronx Park system, of which the entire city is justly proud, seems to warrant a large increase. The Department was allowed \$70,000 additional last year in Revenue Bonds, and the Commissioner states that this was not enough for six months, and that upon this basis, and taking into consideration the many improvements contemplated, including the restoration of the park which his predecessor used for laying out a horse race track, etc., he believes that the sum of \$200,000 is necessary.

Your committee make the same observation in this as in the Manhattan application with reference to compelling the issuance of Revenue Bonds to necessarily maintain City Departments, but as this sum seems to be necessary, your committee report favorably upon the application.

On March 21, 1905, a communication was sent to the Board of Aldermen, in which their attention was called to the amount of the appropriation for maintenance and construction for the year 1905, with the statement that the amount allowed was insufficient, and requesting that an additional appropriation be made by the issue of Revenue Bonds for the use of this Department for the year 1905. In pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Aldermen, by resolution adopted on April 11 of that year, requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$200,000.

On a careful and complete examination by a representative of the Comptroller's office, the sum of \$70,000 was appropriated, under date of June 16, 1905, this amount being deemed sufficient for the six months ending December 31. This \$70,000, added to the amount appropriated on account of maintenance and construction, 1905 (\$246,450), shows a total of \$316,450 appropriated for maintenance, labor and supplies for the year 1905. As \$70,000 was allowed for six months (and even this was found insufficient), the amount necessary for the year 1906, on this basis, would be \$140,000.

With each recurring year, the area of park territory devoted to public purposes has very largely increased; lands have been opened and developed, lawns have been made and new paths and roads have been constructed. During the past year, at least ten miles of roads and paths have been completed, necessitating the planting of trees

and shrubs, the grading and seeding of grounds, so that the public who make use of these roads and paths could have proper use of the park grounds adjoining same. While the area of park territory has been increased by only a few hundred acres, the area opened for public use, as referred to above, has been more than doubled in the past six years. Our parks are used not only by the residents of our own borough, but by the people of the whole City.

The nine-hole golf course in Pelham Bay Park has been extended to eighteen holes; and a new eighteen-hole golf course at Van Cortlandt Park is nearing completion.

Eight new comfort stations or toilet houses have either been constructed or are in course of construction, and as many more are necessary for the comfort of the great number of residents and non-residents who daily visit the parks under the jurisdiction of this Department.

At least three hundred new bath houses, which it will be necessary to maintain, have been erected during the past season; and the beaches adjacent to them must be kept clean and free from obstructions and, where possible, increased, to meet the demand for facilities for salt water bathing.

A new greenhouse has been erected, in addition to the one situated at Bronx Park, which necessarily means increased cost of maintenance.

The athletic field opened last year in Macomb's Dam Park, which is crowded to congestion on fine days, requires constant care to keep it in perfect condition and prevent the possibility of accidents. The same also applies to the fine athletic field, which has been in use for several years, in Pelham Bay Park.

When new roads are completed, the cost of sprinkling them is an important item. This work must be given close attention, to prevent the dust from becoming a source of annoyance to the public, and to keep the surface from blowing away and thus necessitating resurfacing, which is necessarily expensive.

The development of park territory throughout the Borough of The Bronx has greatly increased the demand for and the sale of property, and I firmly believe has been an important factor in the real estate "boom" of our borough; and it has added materially to the increased valuation of real estate.

Notwithstanding this large increase of developed territory, no increase has been made in the appropriation for its care. When due consideration and thought are given to the fact that the total area of parks in the Borough of The Bronx is at least 3,864½ acres, and of parkways 211½ acres, making a total of 4,076 acres, it will be readily understood that it is absolutely necessary that an additional appropriation be made by the issue of Revenue Bonds for the use of this Department for the current year; and I would respectfully request an authorization of \$200,000, as granted by your Honorable Board last year, for the purpose here stated and hereinbefore mentioned:

In many cases we find that so-called contractors in the past carry their office in their hat, and employees hired by them have neither voice or vote at the annual polls. We have appointed a committee of 22, comprising members of the main industries in the building line, to follow this up and report thereon to this body.

REPORT:

That it has given very careful consideration to this matter, and in order to obtain thorough knowledge of the facts held one advertised public hearing and two or three regular hearings. The public hearing was well attended, but nobody opposed this appropriation. Among those who have attended and advocated and explained the application were Commissioner Ellison, Deputy Commissioners Crozie and Goodwin and Engineers de Verona and Birdsall of the Water Department. They explained that this appropriation was requested to generally improve the water system in Manhattan, The Bronx, Brooklyn and Queens, the items of which are specifically set forth in the accompanying letter.

It was further explained that the water piping in The Bronx was to be now systematized, something it now lacked.

The Commissioner urged this appropriation very greatly, and stated that water supply progress would be at a complete standstill unless it were granted soon. Complaints have been received from the Morrisania Local Board, and also from residents and taxpayers, as to the necessity of water supply improvements.

Your Committee believe that this appropriation, though large, is necessary for the proper development and maintenance of the City's water supply, and therefore recommend the adoption of this ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of five million six hundred and forty thousand dollars (\$5,640,000), to provide means for the improvement of the water supply system of The City of New York, as set forth in section 178 of the Charter.

Dear Sir—As Richmond Borough Hall nears completion, the subject of furniture and furnishings comes up for attention. Of the \$90,000 recently secured for the Borough Hall, a portion thereof is to be used for such furniture and furnishings, which will include desks, tables, chairs, office stools, window screens, water coolers, carpets, mats, window shades, wardrobes, telephone booths, railings, wire screens, mirrors and various other miscellaneous furnishings and fittings.

In furnishing fittings for each of the offices of the building, the requirements of the head of each office will govern the style required to meet the necessities of each particular office or department. As can be imagined, the necessities of each office will vary the kind and style of furnishings and fittings to be used.

It will be seen, therefore, owing to the diversity of the articles needed, how absolutely difficult it will be to draw specifications that will aptly describe the supplies needed. In this connection, too, the drawing of such specifications and their approval through the various channels of the City will consume at least two or three months. This time, together with the time necessary for the advertising of bids, execution of contracts, registration of contracts, manufacture of the goods and probable delays in their delivery, would mean a further delay of at least six months, making in all at least eight or nine months. We expect now to get into the building about the 1st of April, and it is absolutely necessary, of course, that the offices be furnished and fitted up ready for use at that time. Such occupancy and use at that time will be absolutely impossible if I am obliged to advertise for the furnishings and fittings.

Owing to the nature of the articles to be purchased, they can be best bought without advertising, because it is impossible, as stated above, to specify most of them satisfactorily, and therefore any competition of prices would to a great extent eliminate the comparison of quality. This would be true, for instance, of all the floor coverings and much of the furniture. It would be to the advantage of the City, both as to quality and cost, if we can shop for these goods and buy them as the result of personal inspection and personal selection; beside personal selection will make it easier to fill the requirements of the various offices to be fitted.

It is very difficult to state the probable cost of the furnishings and fittings, but it will beyond any doubt exceed the sum of \$1,000. I therefore beg to respectfully ask that I be authorized and empowered to purchase without public letting the necessary furnishings and fittings of Richmond Borough Hall at an amount which will exceed \$1,000, but not exceeding the sum of \$30,000.

Sir—I am advised by the various heads of Bureaus within my jurisdiction that, owing to the large area included within the Borough of Queens, it is impossible to make their tours of inspection as thoroughly as necessary.

The Borough of Queens embraces about 80,000 acres, and there are about 720 miles of roadway, including asphalt, wood block, brick, stone and macadam pavements, all of which require inspection from time to time by the heads of the Bureaus affected. Sec. 2. So far as the provisions of the foregoing section apply, the Commissioner of Bridges is authorized to carry them into effect.

Sec. 3. Each and every company, firm, corporation, individual, person or persons owning, controlling or operating any theatre, elevated railway station, subway station or railroad terminal, for each failure to comply with the provisions of section 1 of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof before a City Magistrate, be punished by a fine of fifty dollars (\$50).

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 430 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
