For furnishing and delivering gas and limes for the Bureau of Lectures and botanical and zoological supplies for the high schools of The City of New York for the year ending December 31, 1904, be awarded as per list attached; but no payments to be made on account of said contracts until the Committee on Supplies shall have filed the contracts to be entered into by it, for and on behalf of the Board of Education, with the contractors mentioned; said contracts to be drawn and approved in the usual manner, in compliance with law and the rules of the Board of Education applicable thereto.

Reports and resolutions were adopted as follows:

Requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer the sum of one hundred and eighty-five dollars (\$185) from the "Special Fund" for the year 1901, and from the item contained therein entitled "Incidental Expenses," Borough of Richmond, which item is in excess of its requirements, to the item also contained within the "Special School Fund" for the same year entitled "Furniture and Repairs of," Borough of Richmond, which item is insufficient for its purposes.

Appropriating the sum of three million five hundred thousand dollars (\$3,500,000) represented by an issue of Corporate Stock approved on March 4, 1904, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and setting the same aside solely for the erection of public school buildings and the fitting up and furnishing of the same.

Requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize a renewal of the lease of the southwest room and ante-room on the first floor and the use of the basement in the building known as the

as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessment, is \$11,500.

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the easterly line of Osborn street with the southerly line of the lands of Public School 66, which point is distant one hundred and seventy-five (175) feet southerly from the southerly line of Sutter avenue, and running thence southerly along the easterly line of Osborn street seventy-five (75) feet; thence easterly and parallel with Sutter avenue two hundred (200) feet to the westerly line of Watkins street; thence northerly along the westerly line of Watkins street seventy-five (75) feet to the southerly line of the lands of Public School 66; thence westerly along the southerly line of the lands of Public School 66 two hundred (200) feet to the easterly line of Osborn street, the point or place of beginning.

Rescinding the report and resolution adopted October 28, 1903 (see Journal, page 2970), selecting and determining as a site for school purposes a strip of land 50 feet by 200 feet on Powell and Sackman streets, adjoining Public School 109, Borough of Brooklyn, selecting and determining the following site for school purposes and requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to take such action as may be necessary and proper for the acquisition of the said lands and premises:

The following-described lands and premises on Powell and Sackman streets, adjoining Public School 109, in Local School Board District No. 39, Borough of Brooklyn, the assessed valuation of which, as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, is \$3,400.

Premises on Belmont avenue, Powell and Junius streets, in Local School Board District No. 39, Borough of Brooklyn, the assessed valuation of which, as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, is \$10,400.

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the westerly line of Junius street with the southerly line of Belmont avenue, and running thence westerly along the southerly line of Belmont avenue two hundred (200) feet to the easterly line of Powell street; thence southerly along the easterly line of Powell street two hundred (200) feet; thence easterly and parallel with Belmont avenue two hundred (200) feet to the westerly line of Junius street; thence northerly along the westerly line of Junius street (200) feet to the southerly line of Belmont avenue, the point or place of beginning.

Selecting and determining as a site for school purposes the following described lands and premises on Andrews and Burnside avenues, adjoining Public School 26, in Local School Board District No. 25, Borough of The Bronx, the assessed valuation of which, as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, is \$4,600:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the northerly line of the lands of Public School 26 with the easterly line of Andrews avenue, and running thence northerly along the easterly line of Andrews avenue fifty (50) feet; thence easterly and parallel with the said northerly line of the lands of Public School 26 to the westerly line of Burnside avenue; thence southerly along the westerly line of Burnside avenue to the northerly line of lands of Public School 26; thence westerly along the said northerly line of the lands of Public School 26 to the easterly line of Andrews avenue, to the point or place of beginning,

and requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to take such action as may be necessary and proper for the acquisition of the lands and premises above described.

Appointing Emma L. Johnson as Principal of the Brooklyn Training School for Teachers, subject to her obtaining the necessary license, said appointment to take effect April 1, 1904.

Appointing John A. Clark an Assistant Teacher of Physics in the Commercial High School, Brooklyn, said appointment to take effect April 1, 1904.

Appointing Montague Gammon an Assistant Teacher of Physical Training in the Jamaica High School Department of Public School 47, Queens, said appointment to take effect April 1, 1904.

Approving the following rules for the promotion of students in the high schools:

1—Terms I. and II.

No student shall be promoted from the first term to the second, or from the second term to the third, whose conditions aggregate ten (10) hours (periods) in subjects requiring preparation.

2—Terms III., IV. and V.

No student shall be promoted from the third term to the fourth, or from the fourth term to the fifth, or from the fifth term to the sixth, whose conditions aggregate nine (9) hours, or if he be conditioned in three subjects requiring preparation.

3—Terms VI. and VII.

No student shall be promoted from the sixth term to the seventh who has not completed satisfactorily 2,200 hours of work requiring preparation; nor shall a student be promoted from the seventh term to the eighth unless he shall have completed satisfactorily 2,600 hours of such work.

4—Term VIII.

No student shall be admitted to the examinations for graduation who has not completed satisfactorily 3,000 hours of work requiring preparation, and who has not removed all conditions imposed during the progress of such work.

A student whose rating in scholarship is C, or less than sixty per cent, in any subject requiring preparation and counted as a component part of the 3,000 periods required for graduation, shall be regarded as conditioned in that subject.

In September, in January, and in April of the school year, conditioned students shall be given an opportunity to remove their conditions by examination.

All ratings and records shall be made at least twice a term. The ratings in each subject shall be determined by combining the teacher's estimate of the pupil's proficiency, based upon frequent memoranda, with the results of written tests given under the direction of the principal during regular recitation periods and without previous announcement.

The final mark for the term in any subject shall be the average of the teacher's estimates and the ratings obtained in examinations. The student's record shall be made in figures, but reports to parents may be expressed in figures or letters at the option of the principal.

Equivalent ratings shall be:

A	= 90 to 100
B +	= 75 to 89
B	= 60 to 74
C	= 40 to 59
D	= 0 to 39

C, or any percentage below 60, indicates failure.

Nothing in these rules shall operate to prevent a principal from promoting students in accordance with their proficiency in each subject of study; from arranging a special programme for a pupil who, with the written approval of his parent, is extending the time for the completion of his course beyond the four-year limit; or, in exceptional cases, from modifying a student's programme of studies whenever his interests seem to require it.

Determining that a medical examination of each child in the 1A grade, as requested by the Association of Women Principals, is unnecessary, and that the number of such pupils who are defective, mentally or physically, can be ascertained in the manner already adopted by the women principals, whereupon each pupil suspected of abnormal development may be examined by the physician of the Department of Physical Training assigned to this duty.

Approving and ratifying as the opinion of the Board of Education the following basis upon which the transfer of teachers in excess is to be made:

That, in case of an excess of teachers in any grade or schedule in which it is necessary to transfer such teacher or teachers in excess to another school, the teacher last admitted to the grade or schedule shall be the teacher to be first transferred.

The Committee on By-Laws and Legislation reported that such a course is in entire harmony with the plan adopted in reference to heads of departments, as set forth in subdivision 10 of section 50 of the by-laws.

Relieving the Committee on Elementary Schools from further consideration of the matter of the suspension of Edwin Bebout, a Teacher in Public School 100, Brooklyn, his license not having been renewed by the City Superintendent of Schools.

Approving and ratifying as the act of the Board of Education the suspension of Elizabeth Rooney, a Teacher in Public School 38, Manhattan, and approving the suspension of said Elizabeth Rooney as made by District Superintendent Haaren on March 2, 1904, and dismissing her from the public school system of The City of New York.

Relative to opening Public School 9, District No. 42, Borough of Queens, as an elementary school for boys and girls.

Retiring, in accordance with the provisions of section 1092 of the Charter, the following named Teacher, said retirement to take effect April 1, 1904, the annuity to be one-half of the salary at the date of retirement:

The following report of the Committee on Sites was also adopted:

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Sites, to which was referred the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on January 29, 1904:

"Resolved, That all applications for the acquisition of land for any and all public purposes shall be accompanied by a detailed statement of the reasons which make the acquisition of the land necessary, and also the date when the Department, Commission, bureau or officer making the application can actually use the same for the purposes for which the land is to be acquired."

—respectfully reports that it has given very careful consideration to the matter of sites heretofore selected on sundry dates and now pending before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Of these sites seven are in the Borough of Manhattan, four in the Borough of The Bronx, eleven in the Borough of Brooklyn, eight in the Borough of Queens and five in the Borough of Richmond.

Owing to the uncertainty as to the probable dates of acquisition of these sites, it is impossible for the Board of Education to comply literally with the requirement set forth in the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment above quoted, that we give the date when this Department "can actually use the same for the purposes for which the land is to be acquired." It is obvious that the work of preparing

plans for a new building cannot be taken in hand until title to the site is vested in the City or until positive information is forthcoming that the site will actually be acquired. Furthermore, the erection of new school buildings is contingent upon the authorization of the necessary bond issue by the financial authorities of the City. Regarding the sites mentioned in this report, it may be stated that all of them will be improved by the erection of buildings or otherwise, as the case may be, immediately after the acquisition of the same, or as soon thereafter as the plans, etc., can be prepared, provided that the necessary funds are granted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

Eldridge and Forsyth Streets, South of Hester Street, District No. 2.

Selected by the Board of Education November 25, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment November 27, 1903. This site is needed for a large building to replace Public School 144, which should have been abandoned long ago, owing to its unfitness for school purposes, and also to replace Public School 136, which is in the line of the projected Manhattan bridge; also to relieve Public Schools 7 and 42, with a large part-time registration, and to protect Public School 177 from excessive pressure in the near future.

MADISON AND JACKSON STREETS, ADJOINING PUBLIC SCHOOL 12, DISTRICT NO. 4.

Selected by the Board of Education October 28, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment November 2, 1903. This site is needed immediately for a large building to replace Public School 12 with a modern structure. Such a building will go far toward relieving the very serious congestion in this district. It will aid, in addition, Public Schools 31 and 147. The southern portion of this district depends for relief upon a new building located in this vicinity.

RIVINGTON AND PITT STREETS, ADJOINING PUBLIC SCHOOL 4, DISTRICT NO. 5.

Selected by the Board of Education October 28, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 30, 1903. This property is needed for a large building to replace Public School 4, which is old and out of date, and also to do away with part-time classes in that school. It will make possible, also, the transfer of the boys' department of Public School 22 to this building, and this would help to relieve the pressure in District No. 4.

EAST FORTY-FIRST AND FORTY-SECOND STREETS, ADJOINING PUBLIC SCHOOL 27, DISTRICT NO. 12.

Selected by the Board of Education June 24, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment June 25, 1903. (The premises Nos. 209-213 East Forty-first street, included in the site selected, were acquired by purchase on October 15, 1903.) This site is required for a new building to take the place of the present school, which is old, dilapidated and in an unsanitary condition, and about which many complaints have been made.

238-242 EAST FIFTY-SEVENTH STREET, ADJOINING PUBLIC SCHOOL 59, DISTRICT NO. 12.

Selected by the Board of Education October 28, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, October 30, 1903. This site is needed for an addition to Public School 59, which will relieve the part-time classes in that building, and also aid Public School 135, which has a number of pupils not on full time. An addition at this point would go far toward ridding this district of part-time classes. The acquisition of this property and the erection of a building adapted to school purposes would also improve the light and air for the rooms in the existing building, which now are impaired by reason of a large tenement east of the school.

EAST EIGHTY-NINTH STREET, EAST OF AVENUE A, DISTRICT NO. 16.

Selected by the Board of Education October 28, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 30, 1903. This site is needed for a large school building central to Public Schools 77, 30, 151 and 150, which are crowded. All of these schools except one have large numbers of children on part time, and it is only a question of months when the fourth school will be as crowded as the others. This neighborhood is being built up rapidly and promises to show a large increase in population in the next few months. Before this building can be completed even serious congestion is threatened.

ONE HUNDRED AND NINETEENTH AND ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTIETH STREETS, WEST OF SEVENTH AVENUE, DISTRICT NO. 19.

Selected by the Board of Education October 28, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 30, 1903. This site is needed for a large building which will be central to Public Schools 10, 157, 170 and 184, all of which are crowded and most of which are seriously congested with pupils on part time. This section of the City is growing very rapidly and large tenements are being erected on every available piece of property. There is every reason to suppose that within the next few months the congestion will be very serious at this point.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

ONE HUNDRED AND FORTIETH AND ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY-FIRST STREETS, EAST OF ALEXANDER AVENUE, DISTRICT NO. 23.

Selected by the Board of Education November 25, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment November 27, 1903. This site is required for a new building to take the place of Public School 22, which occupies a leased building on said site. Said school has 116 children on part time.

BROWN PLACE, ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-FIFTH AND ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-SIXTH STREETS, DISTRICT NO. 23.

Selected by the Board of Education November 25, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment November 27, 1903. This site is needed for a new building to relieve Public Schools 9 and 30, both of which have on their registers a large number of children on part-time instruction. This building also will do away with a number of rented annexes.

KELLY AND BECK STREETS, NEAR LONGWOOD AVENUE, DISTRICT NO. 24.

Selected by the Board of Education November 25, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment December 3, 1903. This is an addition to a site acquired some time ago. Owing to the rapid increase of population in this neighborhood it has been necessary to begin the erection of a building larger than was originally contemplated. It is probable, also, that this building in the near future may have to be increased in size. This piece of property will complete the site now owned and make possible future building operations. It will also prevent these lots from falling into the hands of speculators and being used in such a way as to interfere seriously with this school building.

WASHINGTON AND WENDOVER AVENUES, DISTRICT NO. 25.

Selected by the Board of Education October 28, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 30, 1903. This site is required for a new building which will relieve Public Schools 2 and 4, in which there are children on part-time instruction, and also make it possible to do away with the old unsuitable building on the grounds of Public School 4, which should be abandoned. This old building interferes seriously with the light and air of the regular school. In spite of its unsuitability it is now occupied by pupils in Public School 4.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

CONOVER, SULLIVAN AND WOLCOTT STREETS, ADJOINING PUBLIC SCHOOL 30, DISTRICT NO. 28.

Selected by the Board of Education October 28, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 30, 1903. This site is required for a new building for Public School 30 and to relieve Public School 27. Said schools have an aggregate of 1,097 children on part time.

WARREN AND BALTIC STREETS, ADJOINING PUBLIC SCHOOL 6, DISTRICT NO. 28.

Selected by the Board of Education October 28, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 30, 1903. This property is required for a new building to replace Public School 6, an old building which should not be used for school purposes any longer; also to relieve Public Schools 29, 32 and 78, which have on register a large number of pupils on part-time instruction.

ST. MARK'S AND CLASSEN AVENUES, ADJOINING PUBLIC SCHOOL 42, DISTRICT NO. 29.

Selected by the Board of Education October 28, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 30, 1903. This property is needed for a building to relieve Public School 42, which is seriously overcrowded, and also Public School 3, which has a large number of pupils on part-time tuition.

Lafayette Avenue and Kosciusko Street, East of Nostrand Avenue, District No. 29. Selected by the Board of Education October 28, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 30, 1903. This site is needed for a building to relieve Public Schools 45, 54 and 79, all of which have part-time classes.

Reid Avenue, Adjoining Public School 57, District No. 32.

Selected by the Board of Education January 14, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment January 16, 1903. This site is absolutely necessary to insure proper light and air space, and to provide an entrance for girls on a street on which there is no trolley line.

Suydam Street, Adjoining Public School 123, District No. 35.

Selected by the Board of Education January 28, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment January 29, 1903. This site consists of a plot 50 feet by 100 feet, required for playground purposes. One lot 25 feet by 100 feet, included in said plot, was acquired by purchase on August 29, 1903.

Knickerbocker Avenue, Halsey and Weirfield Streets, District No. 36.

Selected by the Board of Education October 28, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 30, 1903. This site is required for a new building to relieve the congested condition of Public Schools 106, 113 and 116, in which there are 726 children on part time.

Sixth Avenue, Fifty-fifth and Fifty-sixth Streets, District No. 37.

Selected by the Board of Education October 28, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 30, 1903. This property is required for a building to relieve Public Schools 2, 118, 136 and 140, all of which have a large register of part-time pupils or are threatened with congestion in the near future.

Robinson Street, Adjoining Public School 92, District No. 38.

Selected by the Board of Education December 23, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment January 9, 1904. This property is required for an addition to relieve Public School 92, which has a large proportion of its children on part-time instruction. It will also do away with a rented annex to Public School 90.

Schenectady Avenue, Bergen and Dean Streets, Adjoining Public School 83, District No. 39.

Selected by the Board of Education October 28, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 30, 1903. This property is needed at once for a building to relieve Public Schools 83 and 28, both of which are seriously congested, as is shown by the register of part-time classes.

Remsen and Bay View Avenues, Adjoining Public School 114, District No. 39.

Selected by the Board of Education November 25, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment November 27, 1903. This site is required for a new building to take the place of Public School 114, which has a large number of pupils on part time, and also to relieve Public School 115, which reports a register of such pupils.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

Van Alst Avenue, Adjoining Public School 1, District No. 41.

Selected by the Board of Education October 28, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 30, 1903. The acquisition of this property will make possible the erection of a large addition. Such a building will make it feasible to vacate the assembly room and to remove temporary partitions from classrooms on the south side. It will also do away with a rented annex.

Union and Old Flushing Avenues and Milton Street, District No. 41.

Selected by the Board of Education October 28, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment November 2, 1903. This property, which is in the former town of Newtown, is midway between the communities known as Maspeth and Metropolitan, and is required for a building to provide for these neighborhoods. Such a building would aid Public Schools 72, 74 and 75, all of which are greatly overcrowded. It would provide also for the future in the neighborhood, which is growing very rapidly.

De Bevoise Avenue, Near Woolsey Avenue, District No. 42.

Selected by the Board of Education October 28, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment November 5, 1903. This site is needed for a building to relieve the Astoria schools. Public School 7, nearby, is greatly crowded and occupies a rented annex, which this building would supplant. The operations of the gas company in this neighborhood probably will result in the development of this part of the city in the next year or two and many families doubtless will settle in this vicinity. Schools must be provided for this population.

Maurice Avenue, Adjoining Public School 78, District No. 42.

Selected by the Board of Education November 25, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment November 27, 1903. This building is placed in an unprotected position because of the fact that the two corner lots are not owned by the City. The acquisition of these lots would guard against the erection of nuisances and also make provision for the future.

Vera Avenue, Adjoining Public School 35, District No. 43.

Selected by the Board of Education October 28, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment November 13, 1903. This property is absolutely required to protect the school property from nuisances.

Sherman Street, Adjoining Public School 54, District No. 44.

Selected by the Board of Education November 25, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment November 27, 1903. This property is needed for an addition to Public School 54, three-quarters of the pupils of which are on part time.

Bergen Avenue and Henry Street, Adjoining Public School 68, District No. 44.

Selected by the Board of Education December 23, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment December 24, 1903. This property is needed for an addition to this building, which already reports a large number of part-time pupils. This neighborhood is growing in population very rapidly. Public School 68 is a square, wooden, barnlike structure which should be replaced by a modern building.

Webster Avenue, Adjoining Public School 67, District No. 44.

Selected by the Board of Education December 23, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment December 24, 1903. This property is absolutely necessary to insure proper light and air space, and should be acquired at the earliest possible moment.

BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

Madison and Monroe Avenues, Adjoining Public School 16, District No. 45.

Selected by the Board of Education October 28, 1903; sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 30, 1903. The said bonds and stock are free and exempt from all taxation in the State of New York, except taxation for State purposes, pursuant to the provisions of section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended. The principal of and interest on said bonds and stock are payable in gold coin of the United States of America, of the present standard of weight and fineness, pursuant to resolutions of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted June 9, 1898, and April 18, 1904.

CONDITIONS OF SALE.

As provided for by the Greater New York Charter.

1. Proposals containing conditions other than those herein set forth will not be received or considered.
2. No proposal for stock shall be accepted for less than the par value of the same.
3. Every bidder, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of his proposal, shall deposit with the Comptroller in money, or by a certified check drawn to the order of said Comptroller upon a solvent banking corporation, two per cent. of the par value of the stocks or bonds bid for in said proposal.
- No proposal will be received or considered which is not accompanied by such deposit.
- All such deposits shall be returned by the Comptroller to the persons making the same within three days after the decision has been rendered as to who is or are the highest bidder or bidders, except the deposit made by the highest bidder or bidders.
- If said highest bidder or bidders shall refuse or neglect, within five days after service of written notice of the award to him or them, to pay to the City Chamberlain the amount of the stocks or bonds awarded to him or them at their par value, together with the premium thereon, less the amount deposited by him or them, the amount or amounts of deposit thus made shall be forfeited to and retained by said City as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal, and shall thereafter be paid into the Sinking Fund of The City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt.
- Upon the payment into the City Treasury by the persons whose bids are accepted of the amounts due for the stock or bonds awarded to them, respectively, certificates thereof shall be issued to them in such denominations provided for by the Charter as they may desire.
- It is required by the Charter of the City that "every bidder may be required to accept a portion of the whole amount of stock bid for by him at the same rate or proportional price as may be specified in his bid; and any bid which conflicts with this condition shall be rejected, provided, however, that any bidder offering to purchase all or any part of the bonds offered for sale at a price at par or higher may also offer to purchase all or none of said bonds at a different price, and if the Comptroller deems it to be in the interests of the City so to do, he may award the bonds to the bidder offering the highest price for all or none of said bonds; provided, however, that if the Comptroller deems it to be in the interests of the City so to do, he may reject all bids." Under this provision, the condition that the bidder will accept only the whole amount of bonds or stock bid for by him, and not any part thereof, cannot be inserted in any bids, except those for "all or none" offered by bidders who have also bid for "all or any part" of the stock or bonds offered for sale.
- It is also provided by the Charter that these bonds, if issued in registered form, may be issued in denominations of ten dollars or any multiple thereof; and that "preference shall, so far as practicable, and without pecuniary disadvantage to the City, be given to applicants for the smallest amounts and smallest denominations of said bonds in issuing the same."
- The proposals, together with the security deposits, should be inclosed in a sealed envelope, indorsed "Proposals for Bonds of The City of New York," and said envelope inclosed in another sealed envelope, addressed to the Comptroller of The City of New York.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 42 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
