Hon. FRANCIS J. LANTRY, Commissioner, Department of Correction:

Dear Sir—I respectfully transmit herewith a quarterly report of work done by paid and unpaid labor, together with a statement showing the disposition of prisoners during the three months ended March 31, 1904, to wit:

Carpenters' Work.

At Fourth District Prison, by prison labor—Put in 3 new windows in cells on first and second tiers, put on new knob on door of office, put in 2 panes of glass 6-inch by 12-inch in windows in cells on second tier, put in 1 pane of glass 8-inch by 16-inch in Female Prison; material used—1/2 dozen hinges, 3 dozen 1-inch screws and 1 pound putty.

At Third District Prison, by prison labor—Put in 3 panes of glass 12-inch by 16-inch in main prison, 1 pound putty, repairing wooden seats in toilets in cells Nos. 1, 5, 8, 13 and 15.

At Fifth District Prison, by paid labor—Repairing lock on office desk, 1 new cylinder and putting on lock on desk drawer.

Plumbers' Work.

At Second District Prison, by paid labor—Repairing and overhauling steam apparatus; material used—7 one and one-fourth-inch close nipples, 3 pieces 1 1/2-inch long pipe, 2 pieces 11-inch long pipe, 1 piece 3 feet long 1 1/4-inch pipe, 1 1/4 pounds of 1/8-inch rubber.

At Third District Prison, by paid labor—Putting on 33 galvanized-iron guards on windows of female side of prison; by prison labor, repaired 3 faucets, prison kitchen, put on new washers on faucets in cells Nos. 9, 12, 15, 17 and 19.

At Fourth District Prison, by paid labor—Clearing and repairing waste-pipe on wash trays, also putting in new trap-screw thereat; material used—1 one and one-half inch trap-screw, 1 three-inch pipe-band, 1 pound putty and 1 pound solder; by prison labor, put on 2 five-eighth-inch brass faucets on sink in prison kitchen, put on 1 one-half-inch brass faucet in cell on second tier.

At Fifth District Prison, by paid labor—Repairing toilets in ten-day house and corridors, repairing flush-pipe, valves, putting on washers in faucet of prison kitchen, repairing and furnishing new ball-cocks for toilet tanks, ten-day house, calking up soil-pipe and ventilation lines Keeper's toilet-room; material used—2 ball-cocks, balls and rods, 3 small leather washers, 2 three-eighths-inch brass couplings, copper wire and 4 bolts and nuts, repairing and putting in good order 8 Mott's pneumatic flush tanks in Male and Female Prison, supplying same with new circular rubber washers, putting on new gas bracket on first floor stairway, repairing water-closet in ten-day house, removing obstruction from waste-pipe in 3 cells of Female Prison, packing pneumatic flush tank and repairing 1 stair-plate to basement.

At Seventh District Prison, by paid labor—Repairing and clearing supply-pipe to tanks, thawing Croton supply pipe, clearing house tank, repairing faucets and cutting off new bars at gateway; material used—1 square foot sheet rubber, 8 sets of compression washers, 8 pounds lead pipe, 4 pounds solder, 1 three-fourths-inch by six-inch brass nipple and a supply of charcoal.

Tinsmiths' Work.

At Third District Prison, work done by staff—The roofs of dining-room, office and prison kitchen were repaired and given same a coat of paint; material used—25 sheets 14-inch by 20-inch roofing tin, 15 pounds solder, 3 pounds tinned roofing nails, 15 pounds roof paint, 2 pounds rosin, 1 bag charcoal and 15 pounds roof cement.

Painters' Work.

At Second District Prison, by prison labor—Retouching all the necessary parts of Prison; material used—100 pounds white lead, 1 gallon liquid dryers, 2 pound paint brushes, 1 sash brush, 10 pounds indian red, 10 pounds chrome green, 10 gallons raw oil and 5 gallons turpentine.

At Third District Prison, by prison labor—Painting coping over 52 cells, also numbering doors of same, painting 50 toilets of Male and Female Prison, varnishing wooden ceiling in prison kitchen, also 3 stationary dish closets thereat, painting iron railings on both male and female side of prison, varnishing and renewing 2 desks in prison office; material used—25 white lead, 5 gallons turpentine, 5 pounds chrome green, 3 gallons raw oil, 5 pounds yellow ochre, 3 gallons asphaltum and 3 gallons inside varnish.

At Fourth District Prison, by prison labor—The ceiling of 30 cells given two coats of whitewash, stationary tubs in laundry given two coats of paint, prison kitchen given two coats of paint, the doors on 14 cells first and second tiers given one coat of paint; material used—50 pounds finishing lime, 100 pounds white lead, 3 gallons turpentine, 2 gallons raw oil, 1/2-gallon dryers, 10 pounds chrome green, 2 pounds ultramarine blue and 3 pounds kalsomine glue.

At Seventh District Prison, by prison labor—Retouching all the necessary parts of Male and Female Prison; material used—50 pounds white lead, 5 pounds chrome green, 3 gallons raw oil, 2 gallons turpentine and 1/2-gallon liquid dryers.

The usual amount of cooking, laundrying, cleaning and other general work done in all prisons by prison help.

Branch Workhouse, Hart's Island, March 31, 1904.

Hon. FRANCIS J. LANTRY, Commissioner of Correction:

Sir—I herewith most respectfully submit the Quarterly Report for the months January, February and March, as follows:

During the past three months the principal work performed by the prisoners has been as follows:

100 feet of sewer pipe has been laid from the Boy's Reformatory to an outlet at the river.

A new metal ceiling has been placed in the Laundry and the City Cemetery barracks.

In the Branch Workhouse Annex a yellow pine floor has been placed in the toilet. The prisoners in the stone shed have broken, during the past quarter, about 2,600 cubic yards of stone, which the Reformatory boys have been principally engaged in carting to the different points on the island where the roads are being repaired.

One of the round houses at the north end of the island has been removed to the middle dock to be used as a guard house. A new ice box has been built at the south end of the island to provide more commodious storage for the supplies of meat, etc., received for the inmates.

A new house, covered with tin roof, has been built for the protection of the Fire Department hook and ladder, and the water system of the Branch Workhouse has undergone a complete change for the purpose of giving more pressure at the new bath and toilet rooms.

Eight side walls and ceilings have been replastered in the female prison, and the two buildings at the north end of the island have been torn down and the materials used for necessary repairs.

The launch "Vim" has been repainted and is being made ready for the summer season.

400 tons of manure have been unloaded, and the usual extent of ground is being made ready for farming, with an additional acre added to the area of the island, at the neck, by filling in with ashes.

Two new roads are being made, branching from Central avenue to the middle of Charity dock.

Besides the above work the prisoners have been employed in burying, unloading coal, and the usual necessary operations around the island.

The female prisoners have been engaged in mending clothing, and the general cleaning of the various buildings, while those detailed to the laundry have turned out 54,783 pieces.

TRANSACTIONS OF THE

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES DURING THE WEEK ENDING APRIL 14, 1904.

Actions Taken April 14, 1904, Unless Otherwise Noted.

The following permits were granted:

April 8. Ocean Steamship Company of Savannah—To place an extra horizontal chock along the outer end of Pier, new 35, North river, and to place bevel chocks thereunder for a distance of 116 feet, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

April 8. J. & J. W. Ellsworth Company—To place an awning 30 feet in length in front of their oyster barges Nos. 5 and 8, between Gansevoort and Bloomfield streets, North river, the awning to remain only during the pleasure of the Commissioner, and to be placed thereat under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

April 8. The Hartford and New York Transportation Company—To cut two gangways in Pier, new 19, East river, upon condition that the pier be restored to its original condition whenever so ordered by the Commissioner of Docks, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

Gordon" on alternate days at Pier, old 54, East river; compensation to be at the rate of \$5 per day for the steamer "Mary E. Gordon" and \$2 per day for the steamer "Hattie Palmer," payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master, the privilege to terminate at the close of the season of 1904, unless sooner revoked.

April 9. President of the Borough of Brooklyn—To berth a public bath during the season of 1904 at the foot of Noble street, Borough of Brooklyn, the bath to be placed thereat under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, who was directed to make arrangements for the reception of the bath at the berth.

To land the steamer "Chrystenah" at the outer end of the Pier foot of West Twenty-second street, North river, to commence April 11 and to continue until May 14, 1904, inclusive, unless sooner revoked; compensation to be at the rate of \$5 per day for the privilege, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master.

April 9. New York Yacht Club—

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
