Army and Navy Union—Request for Authority to Draw on Comptroller for Moneys on Account of Memorial Day Observances.

Headquarters, Department of the State of New York, Army and Navy Union of the United States of America.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen, New York City:

Dear Sir—By unanimous request of the Memorial and Executive Committee of the Garrisons of the Army and Navy Union located in Greater New York, I have the honor to petition the Board of Aldermen, through your Committee, for authorization of the appropriation by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the amount of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750) to cover the expenses of a worthy observance of Memorial Sunday and Decoration Day, 1918, by said Garrisons, in accordance with their custom. In connection with the foregoing communication, Alderman Kenney offered the following resolution, which, on his motion, was made a General Order for the day.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, with the concurrence of the Board of Aldermen, has provided in the Budget for 1918 (Code No. 3067), the sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750) for Memorial Day observances by the Army and Navy Union.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to pay to the Treasurer of the said Army and Navy Union, upon his requisition, countersigned by the President and Secretary of said association, the sum of money provided for in said Budget for 1918; provided, further, that a record of all expenditures made from this appropriation shall be kept in a form prescribed by the Comptroller and that such record of expenditures shall be subject to audit by him.

Dear Sir—A hearing before the State Board of Health will be held on Saturday, April 20th, at 10 A. M., at which time testimony will be taken with regard to the nuisance caused by the acid fumes from the various corporations on the New Jersey side of the Hudson River which are detrimental to the health and property of the people of the city and which nuisance causes damage to the taxable values of the entire city.

As a large number of property owners of the city will attend the hearing and as the accommodations of the State Board of Health, No. 25 West 45th Street, are inadequate for the purpose of such a large hearing, the use of the Aldermanic Chamber on Saturday, April 20th, for the hearing at 10 A. M. is requested.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Commissioner of Jurors, Kings County:

No. 423.

Annual Report of the Commissioner of Jurors, Kings County, 1917.

Office of the Commissioner of Jurors, 381-387 Fulton St., Borough of Brooklyn, N. Y., April 4th, 1918.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—In compliance with the Laws of the State of New York (article 2, title 4, chapter 10), chapter 48, I have the honor to submit a statement of the business of this department from August 31st, 1916, to August 31st, 1917.

The Department of Taxes and Assessments of the City of New York, under chapter 30 of the Consolidated Laws, Judiciary Laws, section 691, whose duty it is to furnish names of persons for jury duty residing within the county limits, provided 459 names of persons to be examined.

According to chapter 690 of the Consolidated Laws, Judiciary Laws of the State of New York, I selected 59,613 persons, all of whom, in conjunction with those provided by the Department of Taxes and Assessments, were examined.

After examination and correction as to their qualification, etc., 16,627 were exempt or disqualified by reason of military service, over age, physical incapacity, illiteracy, no property, volunteer firemen, election officials, physicians, Government and City employees, newspaper men, engineers, etc.; 4,697 could not be found; 7,415 whose time was extended to the following year; 223 were out of city and county; 792 were duplicated; 1,952 were non-residents; 542 deceased; 1,232 did not answer; 67 selected as Special Jurors, and 26,525 qualified for jury duty, of which 2,081 jurors were transferred to the 1917-1918 Jury List.

Under chapter 257, laws of 1904, there was submitted to the Board for the Selection of Grand Jurors a list of persons who qualified to act as jurors during the ensuing year. From this list there was selected and returned 668 persons for service as Grand Jurors.

During the year covered by this report, August 31st, 1916, to August 31st, 1917, there has been drawn from the list of \$24,444 who qualified, 22,695 Trial Jurors, 480 Grand Jurors.

The number of jurors drawn and the Courts to which they were summoned, the number who served, the number of persons fined, etc., is shown in the following statement:



For the Supreme Court of the State of New York there was drawn 10,600 Trial Jurors.  
For the Kings County Court there was drawn 9,435 Trial Jurors and 480 Grand Jurors.

For the Surrogate's Court there was drawn 680 Trial Jurors.  
For the Municipal Courts, First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth and Seventh Districts of the Borough of Brooklyn, there was drawn 1,980 Trial Jurors.

Pursuant to chapter 68, Laws of the State of New York, 1915, a list of 251 Trial Jurors was selected from the Jury List by the Sheriff of Kings County.

Pursuant to chapter 279, section 122, of the Laws of the State of New York, 1915, there was selected from the Jury List 100 names of jurors to act for the several Municipal Courts.

Pursuant to article 3, section 1063, Code of Civil Procedure, there was selected by an order from the Supreme Court for the second Monday, 14th day of May, 1917, 24 Struck Jurors. Returns from the Court show 14 served, 1 was excused and 9 could not be found.

Making a total of 23,550 jurors drawn for all Courts.

By referring to the returns made to this department by the Clerks of the Supreme, County, Surrogate's and Municipal Courts, it will be seen that out of a total of 22,695 persons drawn and summoned as Trial Jurors, 15,470 served; 4,830 were excused by the Judges of the several Courts; 143 were returned as having been fined for non-attendance; 2,012 were returned by the officers serving jury notices, after diligent search and inquiry on the part of said Jury Notice Servers, as not to be found; 40 jurors were withdrawn at the March Term, 1917, of the Kings County Court and returned to the jury wheel by an order from Hon. Robert H. Roy; also 160 were withdrawn at the March Term, 1917, of the Supreme Court and returned to the jury wheel by an order from Hon. David F. Manning, Justice of the Supreme Court, and 40 jurors were withdrawn at the April Term, 1917, of the Supreme Court by an order from Hon. Isaac M. Kapper, Justice of the Supreme Court.

Of the 480 Grand Jurors drawn 268 served; 182 were excused by the Court; 2 were fined; 28 were returned as not to be found.

I also state that from the official returns of the several Courts, as will be shown upon examination, I have received the names of 145 delinquents, who were fined, all of whom were examined by the Board for the Remission and Enforcement of Jury Fines, who met at the office of the Commissioner of Jurors on March 8th, 1918, of which 82 were remitted; 58 could not be found; 2 paid and 3 cases await the action of the Board.

On the date of the last report from this department there were awaiting the action of the Board for the Remission and Enforcement of Jury Fines 10 cases. They have been disposed of as follows: 6 cases were remitted; 2 could not be found and 2 cases await action of the Board.

The receipts from fines confirmed and collected are as follows:

Samuel Jarnow, No. 6178, County Court, December Term, 1916, \$10, and John P. Fitzgerald, No. 3371, Surrogate's Court, October Term, 1916, \$25, which I have paid over to the City Chamberlain.

The excuses and answers offered for remission of the fines and the cause of such remission are stated and placed opposite the name of each person on the list herewith annexed. Respectfully submitted,

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the President of the Borough of Queens:

**President, Borough of Queens—Request for Authority to Purchase Oil and Asphaltic Cement Without Public Letting.**

The City of New York, Offices Commissioner of Public Works of the Borough of Queens, Long Island City, April 3, 1918.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York, N. Y.:

Sirs—In accordance with the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, I hereby request your approval of the purchase, without public letting, of the following supplies and materials necessary for the maintenance of the highways of this borough for the year 1918:

35,000 gallons of fuel oil, at 15 cents a gallon; 400,000 gallons of No. 4 oil, at 10 cents a gallon; 45,000 gallons of No. 6 oil, at 12 cents a gallon; 375 tons of asphaltic cement at \$40 a ton.

An effort was made by this department to obtain competition for these items and when bids were opened none were received. This situation, I am informed, is not unusual at this time, for the reason that the government is making great demands upon oil producers of the country, and I am certain that competition will result in a failure to receive bids. However, it may be possible to obtain some of these items, or a part or all of them, through the purchase by open market orders of limited



quantities at a time, and in view of the importance of the maintenance of highways, I believe it would be to the best interest of the City if your Board approved of the request I make herewith. Very truly yours,

**An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Licenses, by Adding Thereto a New Article to Be Known as Article 16, Entitled "Wardrobe Checking Places."**

By Alderman Smith—

AN ORDINANCE to amend chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to licenses, by adding thereto a new article to be known as article 16, entitled "wardrobe checking places."

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 1 of article 1 of chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

§1. When required.

In addition to the businesses, places, trades, occupations and things required to be licensed by statute or by other chapters of this code, the following must be duly licensed as herein provided, namely:

- (a) Billard and pool tables;
- (b) Bowling alleys;
- (c) Dealers in second-hand articles;
- (d) Dirst carts;
- (e) Drivers or chauffeurs of hacks, cabs, taxicabs and expresses;
- (f) Expresses and expressmen;
- (g) Exterior hoists;
- (h) Hacks, cabs and taxicabs;
- (i) Hand organs;
- (j) Itinerant musicians;
- (k) Junk dealers;
- (kk) Massage operators and institutes;
- (l) Peddlers, hawkers and vendors;
- (m) Public carts and cartmen;
- (n) Public porters;
- (o) Shooting galleries;
- (p) Street musicians;



(q) Stands within stoop lines and under the stairs of elevated or subway stations;  
(r) *Wardrobe checking places.*

No person shall engage in, or carry on any business, trade or occupation, or maintain any place or thing specified in this section without a license therefor.

Sec. 2. Chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to licenses, is hereby amended by adding thereto a new article to read as follows:

Article 16.

Wardrobe Checking Places.

Section 180. Definition.  
181. License fee.  
182. Bond.

§180. Definition.

Any place within the city where the wardrobes of persons are checked, whether for fee or otherwise, under a concession, shall be deemed a wardrobe checking place.

§181. License fee.

Every person holding a concession for the conduct of a wardrobe checking place shall pay a license fee of \$25 per annum. All licenses shall be issued as of August 1st of each year and shall expire on July 31st next succeeding the date of issue thereof.

§182. Bond.

Every concessionaire of a wardrobe checking place shall give a bond to the city in the penal sum of \$100, with a sufficient surety, approved by the commissioner of licenses, conditioned for the safe and prompt return of all articles entrusted to his care by the owners thereof.

**An Ordinance to Amend Article 3 of Chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances by Inserting Therein a New Section Requiring Motor Vehicles to Be Equipped with Bumpers.**

AN ORDINANCE to amend article 3 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances by inserting therein a new section requiring motor vehicles to be equipped with bumpers.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Article 3 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by inserting therein a new section to be known and styled as follows:

§36a. Motor vehicles; bumpers.

Every motor vehicle running on any street or public place shall be equipped with a bumper having a maximum resilient yield of not less than six inches, and extending two feet from the radiator and into a position to guard the front wheels and to be not less than twenty inches from street level, and to be sufficiently strong in a vertical direction to support a person weighing 250 pounds under running conditions.

**Report of the Committee on Finance in Favor of Adopting an Ordinance Selecting a Site for a Disposal Plant in the Borough of Queens.**

The Committee on Finance, to which was referred on March 19, 1918 (Minutes, page 639), the annexed request of the President of the Borough of Queens for the approval of a site for a disposal plant, respectfully

REPORTS:

That Mr. Brock, representing President Connolly, and Dr. Barry, of the Board of Health, appeared before the Committee and stated the present plant is inadequate to the demands and must be enlarged.

Your Committee, believing the site proposed the most available, recommends the adoption of the accompanying ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE selecting a site to be acquired for use as a disposal plant in the Bureau of Sewers, under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Queens.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby selects as a site for use as a disposal plant in the Bureau of Sewers, under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Queens, the following lands described in metes and bounds as follows:

All that piece or parcel of land situated, lying and being in the Fourth Ward of the Borough of Queens, adjacent to the Jamaica Disposal Plant, bounded and described with reference to the street system as established by section 189 of the Final Maps of the Borough of Queens, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 9, 1916, and filed with the Clerk of Queens County on October 27, 1916, as follows:

Beginning at the point formed by the intersection of the centre line of Atfield Avenue, as laid out south of Stanley Avenue, with the southerly line of Stanley Avenue; running thence easterly along the southerly line of Stanley Avenue to its intersection with the prolongation of the easterly line of Atfield Avenue, as laid out north of Stanley Avenue; thence northerly along the easterly line of said Atfield Avenue 150.16 feet to the southerly line bounding the property of the Jamaica Disposal Plant; thence easterly along said southerly bounding line to the easterly line bounding the property of the Jamaica Disposal Plant; thence northerly along said easterly bounding line 211.6 feet to the northerly line bounding the property of the Jamaica Disposal Plant; thence easterly along the prolongation of said northerly bounding line to the centre line of Baker Avenue; thence southerly along the centre line of Baker Avenue to a point distant 250 feet south of the southerly line of Stanley Avenue; thence westerly and parallel to Stanley Avenue to the centre line of Atfield Avenue, as laid out south of Stanley Avenue; thence northerly along the centre line of said Atfield Avenue to the point or place of beginning.

Sec. 2. The Corporation Counsel is hereby authorized and directed to institute condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of said lands and premises.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall not preclude the acquisition of the above described lands and premises, or any part thereof, by purchase from the owner or the respective owners thereof, at a price to be fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Sec. 4. The Clerk of the Board is hereby directed to prepare two similar surveys, maps or plans of said lands and premises and file the same, one in the office of this Board and the other in the office of the Clerk of the County of Queens, in accordance with the provisions of section 1432 of the Greater New York Charter.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Gentlemen—On April 2, 1917, I requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to issue corporate stock for the acquisition of land adjoining the Jamaica Disposal Plant, under the jurisdiction of the Bureau of Sewers. This sludge overran the surrounding property and resulted in a suit against The City of New York.

At a later date it was deemed advisable to acquire the property between the Disposal Plant and the conduit, operated by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, but that Department advised the purchase of property to the south and east of the existing plant.

We have been unable to agree as to the price for this land and propose to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the acquisition of this necessary land by condemnation.

**Report of the Committee on General Welfare in Favor of Adopting an Ordinance in Relation to the Wilful Destruction of Foods.**

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on March 19, 1918 (Minutes, page 645), the annexed ordinance in relation to the wilful destruction of foods, respectfully

REPORTS:

Your Committee is of the opinion that any measure which tends to the conservation of food and the prevention of food wastage should be adopted. In these times, when the most destructive war in the history of the world is being conducted, and when the Federal Government at Washington is resorting to the most drastic measures to prevent the wastage of food products, your Committee believes that the proposed ordinance would go far to correct an evil which in some instances is probably more the result of carelessness than criminality, and recommends the adoption of this ordinance, to be known as section 9-A, chapter 27, of the Code of Ordinances.

It is the purpose of your Committee to further consider this proposition, and it may at a later date recommend certain amendments for the purpose of further strengthening the ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE to amend chapter 27 of the Code of Ordinances by inserting therein a new section in relation to the wilful destruction of foods.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

Section 1, chapter 27, of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by inserting therein a new section to be known and styled as follows:

§9a. *Wilful destruction of food prohibited; exception. No person, firm or corporation shall wilfully waste or destroy, or cause, suffer or allow to be wilfully wasted or destroyed, any wholesome food fit for human consumption. Provided, however, the provisions of this section shall not apply where the wilful destruction and waste of such food is regulated or controlled by the provisions of the United States Food Control Laws, or the New York State Food Control Laws. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate the provisions of this section shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of five dollars (\$5), or be imprisoned for a period not exceeding one day, or may be both fined and imprisoned.*

*This section shall take effect immediately and shall continue in force during the time the United States is at war and thereafter until the mayor shall declare that the emergency causing the enactment thereof no longer exists.*

Sec. 2. The table of section headings of chapter 27 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I respectfully urge upon the Board the passage of an ordinance penalizing the wilful destruction of any wholesome food fit for human consumption.

A short time ago a Committee from the Broadway Association, consisting of Jefferson de Mont Thompson, Leon Weinstock and August Janssen, called at my office and brought to my attention a condition of waste of food stuffs that Mr. Janssen claimed came under his personal observation in the course of a tour of inspection through certain sections of the city.

Wilful waste at any time is sinful—at a time like this it is criminal.

President Wilson, calling upon the country to organize for war, among other things, said that "America now had an opportunity to remedy her unpardonable fault of waste in food stuffs of all kinds."

For one year in this country, private as well as public agencies have sought to the best of their ability to impress upon the people the necessity for a strict conservation of our food supply. Placarded throughout the city has been the slogan "Food will win the war. Save it." Notwithstanding these appeals there is undoubtedly a waste of food stuffs going on at the present moment for which there can be no excuse. How much of it should be charged to the head of the house and how much to the help no one can tell. But in a time like this a duty is imposed on the head of every household to see to it personally that no food is wasted. This duty of personal supervision is, I fear, too often neglected. The country cannot afford this waste, which, moreover, contributes to higher prices, to combat which every energy of the Government is being exerted.

The purpose of the ordinance is to fix, if it be possible, the responsibility for the waste spoken of in the letter signed by August Janssen, Chairman of the Food Conservation Committee of the Broadway Association, which is attached hereto and speaks for itself. Yours very truly,

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, N. Y. C.:

My Dear Mr. President—When the food situation some time ago became serious, I took it upon myself to taking a certain district of our town one morning, zigzagging on the upper part of the town, between 70th and 90th Streets, and investigated the waste of food in the garbage cans. I found the following conditions:



In front of one residence I saw three roast beef bones completely covered with meat, and had this been turned over to me I would have prepared a most luscious meal for one-half dozen people. I found one ham bone with entire knuckle of ham and a good part running along the entire bone of at least one and one-half pounds of meat. This undoubtedly was enough for four people.

In another can I found two half broiled chickens where only the breast had been touched a little, and the rest of it looked as fine as it possibly could.

In still another can there was an entire breast of mutton to which were adhering some vegetables and barley, showing that the cook had prepared a Scotch broth and thrown away the meat. I found enough ice cream in almost every second or third pail, in the whole forms, the way they left the table, completely frozen; enough fancy cakes and other cake to fill up a good sized pastry shop, abundance of lettuce, fruit salads and cheese, enough crackers to fill up two dozen large tins, potato peels to which were adhering half the potatoes and cooked in many varied forms.

In front of another residence, where evidently a dance had been held the previous evening, there was a stock of diamond-cut sandwiches, frozen in a solid form, filled with ham, tongue and various other fillings.

Now I am coming to the last, but not to the least, and the most important, and that is the question of bread. When I know that the waste of bread in New York City alone amounts to more than one million loaves weekly, or about 690,000 bushels of wheat every year, and a serious shortage we are now facing, it is the proper time to hold up the danger flag and cry "STOP!" I found enough bread and toast to stock up a large bake-shop—whole loaves of bread hardly touched and rolls by the bushel.

I will not go into the question of the leavings of breakfasts, which I found when I came further down. I will only mention a few items. These were evidently from early breakfasts served: Oatmeal, hominy, fruits, chops, bacon, eggs in various forms hardly touched, and abundance of wheat cakes.

The seriousness of my findings made me think deeply. I was dumfounded at this terrific waste and I immediately called upon Mr. Jefferson de Mont Thompson, President of the Broadway Association, of which association I am a director, before whom I laid all these facts. He immediately appointed a committee, myself as chairman.

After several meetings, to which I invited various heads of women's civic societies, we came to the conclusion that only a drastic measure would bring about results, and that in shape of an ordinance. With the assistance of the Commissioner of the Board of Health, we drafted the ordinance which is now before your honorable body.

My dear Mr. President, too much publicity cannot be given to this measure, that the public be made aware of the great scarcity of food at this time and how important it is to begin a real conservation of food from the proper angle which this ordinance would bring about. Yours very truly,

Dear Sir—There were appropriated \$25,490 for the purchase of automobiles and auto trucks to be assigned to the Bureaus of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity and to the Division of Supplies.

It has been found impossible to prepare specifications which would permit of free and open competition for this equipment. Where attempts have been made in the past to secure open bidding it has been found that the specifications have been so drafted as to favor some particular make of automobile, and, in my opinion, this is a clear evasion of section 419 of the Charter.

It is not possible to prepare specifications which do not embody these same ideas and I therefore respectfully ask that the Honorable Board of Aldermen grant me permission to expend this sum of money for the purchase of automobiles and automobile trucks without the formality of advertising for competitive bids.

Restoring macadam surfaced with tarria and grits, and improved granite block on sand grouted, per square yard, and new curb on concrete, per linear foot	1 75
Restoring granite or other blocks of sand with sand joints per square yard	1 40
Restoring plain macadam, per square yard	1 10
Restoring old curb on concrete, per linear foot, and old bridging per square foot	70
Restoring new flagstone, per square foot	40
Restoring cement sidewalk per square foot, and old curb on sand per linear foot	35
Restoring unpaved streets, per square yard	20
Restoring old flagstone, per square foot	15

2. Areas in excess of 10 square yards. The fees for such excavations in the borough of Richmond shall be such as may be determined by the President of the borough or his representative. The area of surface to be repaved shall in all cases be computed by the president of the borough or his representative, from the diagram in the application as verified or corrected by comparison with the maps and records on file.

3. Inspection of back filling. The fee for the inspection of the back filling of any trench in a street in the borough of Richmond shall be as follows:

Gentlemen—I desire to bring to your attention that for some time past this department has realized that the charges heretofore collected for the restoration of pavements and the supervision over the refilling of trenches in the Borough of Richmond have been inadequate, due to the increased cost of highway material and the great increase in wage rate.

The present ordinance governing connections with sewers, etc., certain use of the public streets and the making of openings in pavements and restoration thereof in this Borough was enacted a number of years ago when the prevailing rate for labor was \$2 a day and highway material forty per cent. cheaper than at the present time. Under the existing ordinance this department is simply a collection agency for all pavement under guarantee where open market orders are issued to the pavement companies for the restoration of pavement while under maintenance. As this ordinance governs all moneys collected in connection with the fund known as "Special Fund Restoring and Repaving," no allowance is appropriated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for three employees whose services are required in connection with said fund; to be more explicit, it must be self sustaining.

In consequence thereof, I respectfully request that chapter 23, article 9, section 97 be amended to read as per schedule hereto attached.

Trusting that you will give this matter immediate attention as it is vitally important to put those charges in operation at the earliest opportunity.

Section 1. Subdivision 2 of section 15 of article 2 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "traffic regulations," is hereby amended to read as follows: § 150. Right of way.

2. Vehicles having precedence. The officers and men of the fire department and of the fire patrol, with their apparatus of all kinds, when going to, or on duty at, or returning from a fire; all ambulances, whether of public or private character, and all other vehicles when employed in carrying sick or injured persons to hospitals or other places for relief or treatment; vehicles of the police department; vehicles of the several bureaus of buildings; emergency [wagons] *vehicles of the department of water supply, gas and electricity and of public service corporations, and vehicles of all physicians who have a police permit shall have the right of way in any street and through any procession, except over vehicles carrying the United States mail. Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Dear Sir—The auto trucks and horse-drawn wagons of this department which are used in transporting the labor force attached to the division having charge of the care and maintenance of water mains, and also for the carrying of supplies and materials used by such force, are required to respond as quickly as may be to all calls; where breaks in water mains occur or to other parts of the City's water supply system. The matter of a few minutes delay in arriving at the scene of the accident may cause considerable damage to property.

Bearing this in mind several years ago the department started to substitute automobiles for horse-drawn vehicles. Under the ordinance vehicles of public service corporations are accorded a right of way. Many times when the vehicles of the public utilities companies appear to be in haste they are responding to calls to protect gas pipes and other subsurface structures which have become damaged as a result of a break in a water main. It seems rather strange that the auto trucks and horse-drawn vehicles of this department which are responding to the same emergency call should be held to traffic regulations. The inconsistency of this is so obvious that it would appear unnecessary to advance any further reasons for granting a right of way to the auto trucks and horse-drawn vehicles of this department.

I submit herewith a draft of an amendment to subdivision 2, section 15 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances, under which this department can secure the desired permission, and request that it be adopted. Respectfully,

#### Report of the Committee on Public Thoroughfares in Favor of Adopting an Ordinance to Amend the Code of Ordinances, Relating to "Speed."

The Committee on Public Thoroughfares, to which was referred on April 2, 1918 (Minutes, page 17), the annexed ordinance to amend subdivisions 1 and 5 of section 17, article 2, chapter 24, of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "speed," respectfully

#### REPORTS:

That the introducer of this ordinance advised the Committee that its purpose and object is to safeguard life and limb by reducing the rate of speed for commercial or heavy vehicles using the City's streets and highways.

It therefore recommends the adoption of the accompanying ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE to amend subdivisions 1 and 5 of section 17 of article 2 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances relating to speed.

*Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:* Section 1. Subdivision 1 of section 17 of article 2 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

1. General provisions. No person shall operate, drive or propel, and no owner thereof riding thereon or therein shall cause or permit to be operated, driven or propelled, on any street or public place, any bicycle, tricycle, velocipede, motorcycle, motor or tricycle, motor delivery wagon, or motor vehicle however propelled, or any vehicle drawn by horses or other animals, recklessly or negligently, or at a speed or in a manner so as to endanger, or to be likely to endanger, the life or limb or property of any person. A rate of speed exceeding 15 miles per hour for light or pleasure vehicles and 10 miles per hour for commercial or heavy vehicles shall constitute prima facie evidence of a prohibited rate of speed and manner of driving, and of a violation of the provisions of this section; a rate of speed exceeding 20 miles per hour shall constitute a prohibited rate of speed and manner of driving, and a violation of the provisions of this section, and a rate of speed exceeding 25 miles per hour, on a public highway which passes through country or outlying sections that are substantially undeveloped and sparsely settled, shall constitute a prohibited rate of speed and manner of driving, and a violation of the provisions of this section.

2. Turning corners. In turning a corner of meeting or intersecting highways, no person operating, driving or propelling any vehicle subject to the provisions of subdivision 1 of this section shall proceed, nor shall the owner of any such vehicle riding thereon or therein cause or permit the same to proceed at a rate of speed greater than 4 miles per hour.

Sec. 2. Subdivision 5 of section 17 of article 2 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

5. Congested streets. In the thickly populated residential sections and other congested thoroughfares of the city the police commissioner is hereby authorized and empowered to cause signs to be erected or maintained in any street thereof, at any time of the day or night when such street shall be congested by traffic or thronged by children, which shall be affixed to stanchions on the curb or other conspicuous places, and shall indicate that the speed limit in such street or thoroughfare shall be not more than 8 miles per hour, or that commercial or heavy vehicles keep to the right next to the curb or both. No person operating, driving or propelling any vehicle, subject to the provisions of subdivision 1 of this section, shall proceed, nor shall the owner of any such vehicle riding thereon or therein, cause or permit the same to proceed at a greater speed than 8 miles per hour upon any portion of any street so restricted, during the time when any such sign shall be erected and maintained thereon.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

#### Commissioner of Public Markets—Request for Permission to Purchase and Sell, Without Public Letting, Foodstuffs in Such Amounts as the Public Interests Require.

April 2, 1918.

Honorable Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Gentlemen—Pursuant to the provisions of section 419, of the Greater New York Charter, I respectfully request permission to purchase in the open market without public letting food and fuel in such amounts as may be required from time to time during the year 1918.

At a meeting of your Board held October 23, 1917, application was made to the State Food Commission, pursuant to Section 14 of Chapter 813 of the Laws of 1917, to permit the City of New York to purchase milk, meats, other foods and fuel, and provide storage for and sell the same to its inhabitants. This permission was granted, and on January 7, 1918, your honorable Board designated the Commissioner of Public Markets as the City's agent for this purpose.

Your Board, in order to provide for the establishment of a fund to permit the purchase of foodstuffs and fuel to be sold to the public, as already stated, adopted a resolution at a meeting held April 2, 1918, recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of \$50,000. It is proposed to operate this fund as a continuing one so that all amounts received from the sale of the commodities purchased will be credited to this fund. These

amounts will be available for subsequent purchases and will obviate the necessity of additional appropriations.

As it is more than probable that the purchases during 1918 will exceed \$50,000, the amount of the fund, depending upon the demands of the public, it is requested that no limitation as to amount be placed upon the expenditures without public letting, from this fund.

At times it will be to the public's advantage to purchase these commodities when the best prices are offered, for spot cash and at places remote from the City. To advertise for bids for these commodities would not assist in obtaining the best prices, but would on the other hand react against the purposes for which this fund was created.

The fund will be administered in such a way that it shall be at all times subject to the audit of the Comptroller. Respectfully,

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on January 15, 1918 (Minutes, page 112), the annexed ordinance to amend section 12 of article 2 of chapter 19 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "railroads" and particularly to "transfers," respectfully

#### REPORTS:

That the Committee, after having heard the introducer of the proposed ordinance in support thereof and respective counsel for the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company and the New York Railways Company in opposition, it finds that the ordinance now in force does not afford redress to the really aggrieved party. The Committee is of the opinion that the proposed ordinance possesses merit, but, feeling that it should be strengthened, presents herewith a substitute ordinance which will relieve the condition complained of and recommends the adoption of the said substitute.

#### SUBSTITUTE.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 12 of article 2 of chapter 19 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "railroads" and particularly relating to "transfers."

*Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:* Section 1. Section 12 of article 2 of chapter 19 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "railroads" and particularly relating to "transfers," is hereby amended to read as follows:

§12. Transfers. Every car owned, operated, managed or controlled by a street surface or elevated railroad company in the streets or highways of the city shall carry throughout its route on the outside, in front and on top of each and every car so operated, a signboard or placard, upon which there shall appear conspicuously the destination of the said car. Every such company shall carry for a single fare upon such car, without change therefrom, each and every passenger to any regular stopping place desired by him, upon said car's route, in the direction of the destination so designated; and for every violation of this section [the company so offending shall be liable to a penalty in the sum of \$100;] *the company so offending shall be liable to each passenger injured or aggrieved thereby to a penalty of \$100 and each passenger so injured or aggrieved may sue for the said sum in his or her own name;* but this section shall not apply to a transfer made to a connecting line going in a different direction from that in which such car may be going, nor where by reason of any accident, *unavoidable blockade or open drawbridge*, compliance with this section is rendered impossible.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

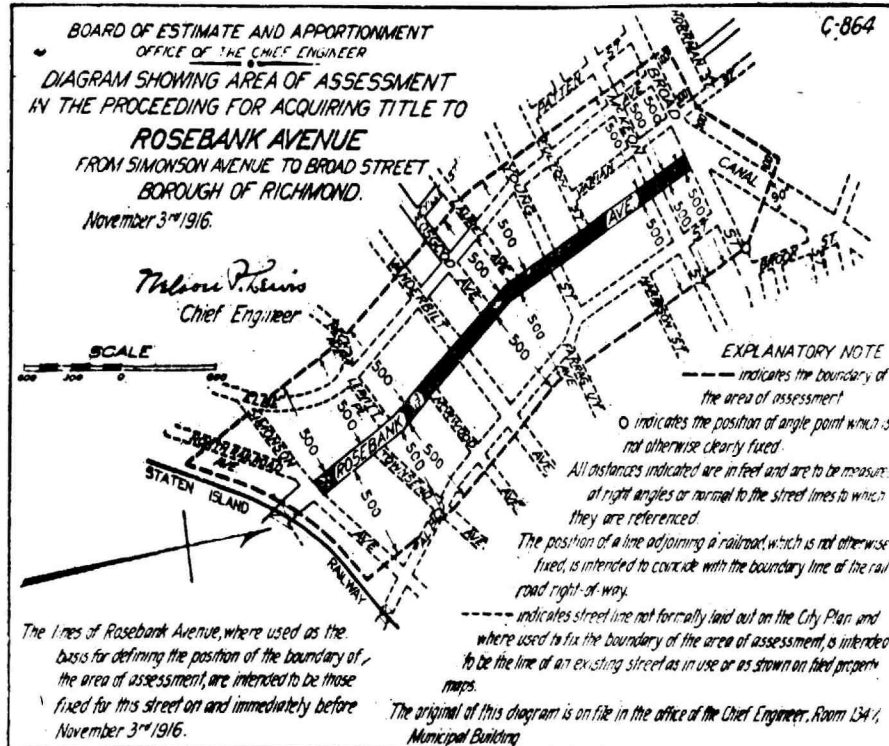

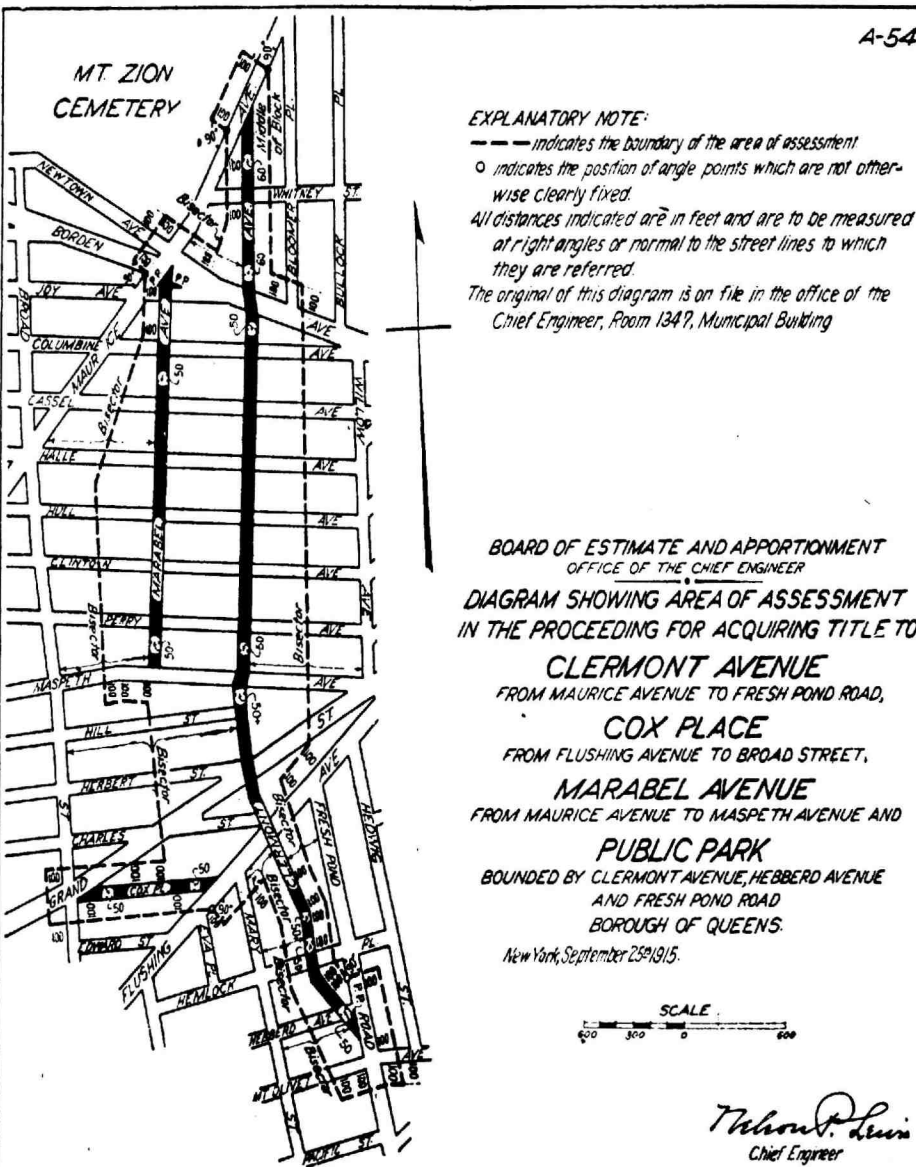

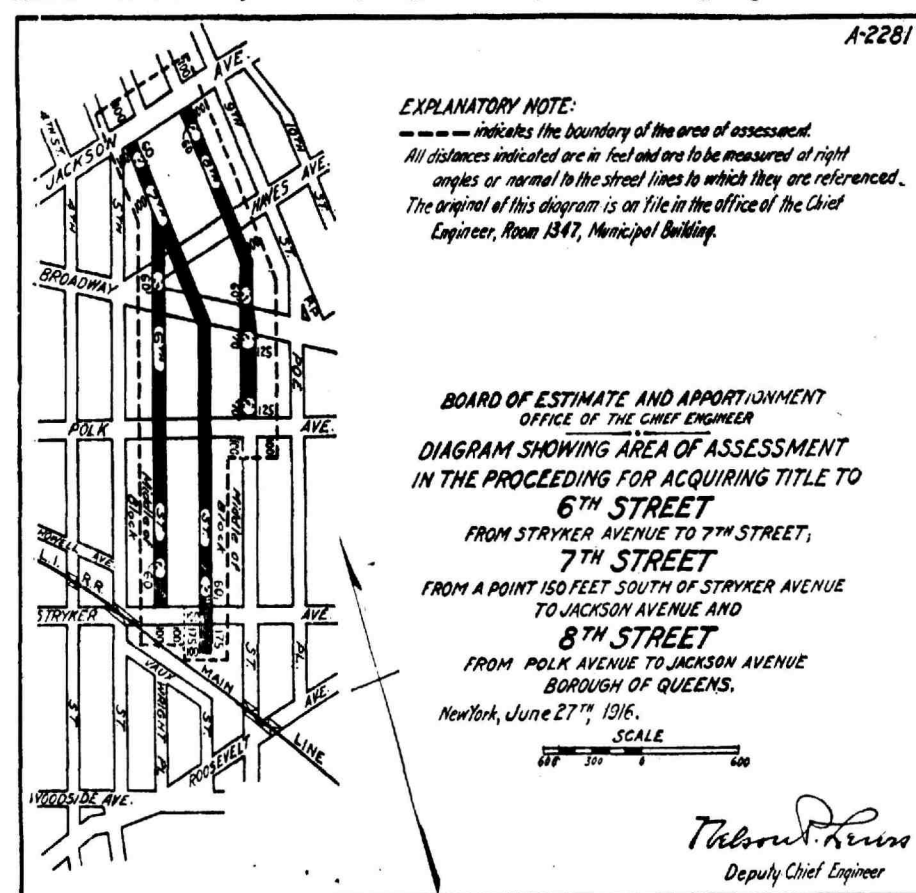

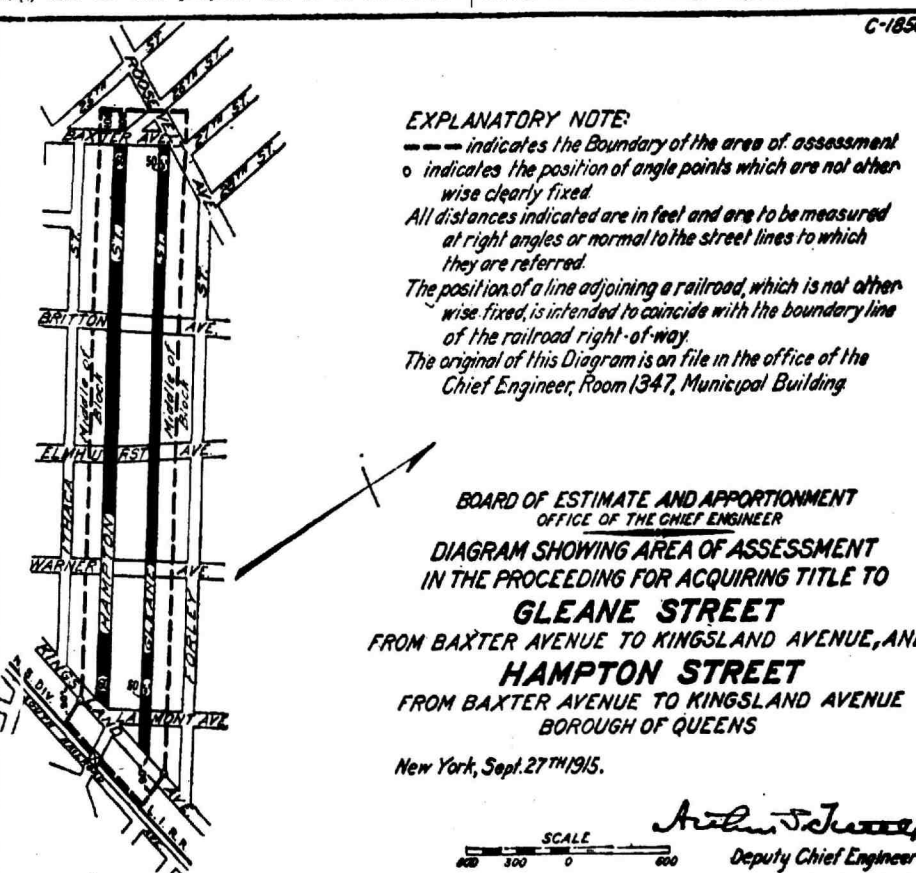

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in full of the purchase price of the buildings and appurtenances, as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, or rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances, between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly removed by all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from the demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture

of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate.
