AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Adjourned Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, March 21, 1888, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, the Commissioner of Public Works, and Commissioners Barnes, Ridgway and Fish; also Chief Engineer Church, Deputy Chief Engineer Rice and Consulting Engineer Fleley.

The minutes of the executive session of February 29, and of the stated meeting of March 7, adjourned meeting of March 9, stated meeting of March 14, and executive session of March 16, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit submitted the following report:

The Committee of Finance and Audit, to whom was referred the recommendation of Division Engineer Morris and Chief Engineer Church, to increase the pay of Charles McKeon, Janitor and Driver, have considered the same, and report adversely thereon, and ask to be discharged from its further consideration. Adopted.

Also submitted the following report:

The Committee of Finance and Audit, to whom was referred the subject matter of accepting the work done for the Commission by Messrs. Coldwell, Wilcox & Co., report that the work called for in the contract with the said Coldwell, Wilcox & Co. on the 4th day of August, 1886, consisted of iron-work for floor beams, bolts, washers, separators, brackets, etc., and yellow pine, etc., for the Sawmill river blow-off and waste-weir at Ardsley, on Section 7 of the New Croton Aqueduct, to be delivered at the site of said blow-off and waste-weir, and that said work was to be paid for when so delivered and accepted by the Chief Engineer; that the said iron-work, etc., has been furnished and delivered in accordance with said contract and accepted by the Chief Engineer; and inasmuch as the said Coldwell, Wilcox & Co. have furnished satisfactory evidence that the claims of all persons who have done work or furnished materials under said agreement have been paid or satisfactorily secured, we recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners do accept the work done and materials furnished by Coldwell, Wilcox & Co., under their agreement made with this Commission on the 4th day of August, 1886, for furnishing the iron-work, etc., necessary for the Sawmill river blow-off and waste-weir at Ardsley, on Section 7 of the New Croton Aqueduct, and that a proper voucher for final payment for work done and materials furnished under said agreement be approved by the Commissioners and certified to the Comptroller for payment. Adopted.

The Committee on Construction submitted the following report:

The Committee on Construction transmit herewith the resignation of Langdon C. Easton, Transmittan, and recommend that the same be accepted, to take effect as of March 23, the date of a leave of absence granted to him without pay. Adopted.

Also recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer is hereby authorized and directed to purchase seven special 12-inch stop-cock valves for the gate-house at Croton Dam, on Section 1 of the New Aqueduct; and that an appropriation of not exceeding \$300 is hereby made to cover the cost thereof. Adopted.

The Comptroller, under date of March 10, 1888, gave notice of the issue of warrants for bills not certified to by the Aqueduct Commissioners, for—

Which was ordered entered upon the books of the Commission and filed.

A communication was received from the Secretary, recommending that he be authorized to subscribe for the "Legislative Record," and keep the same on file in the office of the Aqueduct Commissioners.

On motion of Commissioner Barnes, the recommendation was adopted.

The Secretary gave notice of the issue of a lien by Ellen Teabor against Sections 13 and 14 of the New Aqueduct; and the Secretary was directed to place the same on file, and give notice to the contractors for said section of this action.

On motion of Commissioner Barnes, the report of the Committee on Real Estate, in relation to the matter of the protection of the New Aqueduct through the lands of Mount Hope Cemetery property in the town of Greenburg, in Westchester County, submitted to the Aqueduct Commissioners at their stated meeting of March 7, 1888, was then taken from the table and read; and the said report was then, on motion of Commissioner Barnes, unanimously adopted.

Commissioner Barnes then offered the following resolution, and moved its adoption:

Resolved, That the bid or proposal of the Reading Foundry Company, Limited, for work No. 2, for furnishing and delivering cast-iron pipe, etc., on Section 16 of the New Aqueduct, is hereby rejected; and the Comptroller is hereby requested to return the check of said Foundry Company upon their application therefor.

Commissioner Ridgway moved as an amendment, that the matter be laid on the table until to-morrow, and the same was lost.

The resolution was then adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, the Commissioner of Public Works, and Commissioner Barnes—4.
Negative—Commissioners Ridgway and Fish—2.

The Commissioners then adjourned to meet to-morrow, 22d instant, at 2 o'clock P. M.

BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

To the Armory Board:

GENTLEMEN—I have prepared an estimate for the Twenty-second Regiment Armory Building, but it so far exceeds the amount appropriated that I deem it useless to present same to your Honorable Board.

As a tax-payer, however, having some knowledge of what is desirable and appropriate for our city, I hope a sufficient sum will be appropriated to carry out the plans as they are. I do not find in them calls for any unnecessary expenditures, or any extravagant details; and while the design is in my judgment the best (architecturally) yet made for a City Armory, it is only made more costly by the form of the ground.

In the presence of E. G. Marsh, Esq., representing the Comptroller, the bids for the construction of an Armory Building for the Twenty-second Regiment were then opened.

The lowest bids for the masonry, carpentry, iron work, steam-heating and ventilating, and the plumbing and gas-fitting work, comprising the whole Armory, amounted to \$329,952.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending March 24, 1888, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending March 17, 1888.

Col. EMMONS CLARK, Secretary Board of Health:

SIR—There were 861 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, March 24, 1888, which is an increase of 61, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 164 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1887. The actual mortality for the week ending March 17, 1888, was 857, which is 128.8 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 29.45 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,513,306.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held in its office, No. 301 Mott street, January 27, 1888, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 13 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:
Sec. 13. That no owner or lessee of any building, or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the same or any portion thereof, to be occupied by any person, or allow the same to be occupied, as a place in which, for or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said buildings or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ventilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesomeness, for which this Code or any law of this State provides, or in which they or either of them require any such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person rent, hire out, or allow, having power to prevent the same to be used as or for a place of sleeping or residence, any portion or apartment of any building, which apartment or portion has not at least one foot of its height and space above the level of every part of the sidewalk and curbstone of any adjacent street, nor of which the floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occupancy of cellars or rooms less elevated than aforesaid, and as a part of any building rented or let, when they are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole dwelling apartment.

BATHING TUBS.—For each tub in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

BUILDING PURPOSES.—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work to be measured as brick—ten cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum.

DINING SALOONS.—shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows:

HORSES, PRIVATE.—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar.

HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

HORSE TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-box.

PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SODA, MINERAL WATER AND ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

STEAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each; and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

WATER-CLOSERS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises.

Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.

WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.

For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law."

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose.

All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 352 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 1, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 1, 1887, shall be treated, collected and paid for water in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 1, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water used.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
