But this section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occupancy of cellars or rooms less elevated than aforesaid, and as a part of any building rented or let, when hey are not let or intended to be occupied or used oy any person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole welling apartment.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinfier stated. All echarged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises.

Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.

VATER-CLOSET AND FOR PORTION OF STATES.—To hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, the closing cocks, each, per year, twenty dollars.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1883, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be here-after placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferryhouses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings. It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law."

All matters not hereimbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works,

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnobuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. As first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning fees sidewalk or street, or to lecome dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley frunning when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offsens, which will be strictly enforced.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, so house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter \$55, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New hereby and the control of 1887, passed June 9, 1887 the following water rents:

4th. A penalty of five dollars [85] is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the see of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the flurena against the respective buildings in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1881, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.
