

Santary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending August 27, 1887:

There were 10,856 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police. There were 944 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.

There were 512 complaints received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and

Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health

Officer of the Port, 83 permits.

There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 6 permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 54 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 3 miscellaneous permits.

I herewith forward reports from Chief Inspectors Tracy, Edson and Bullard, of the work performed by themselves and their respective corps.

The certificates of 701 births, 59 still-births, 175 marriages and 698 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, August 27, 1887. This shows an increase of 85 births, and a decrease of 1 still-birth, 85 marriages, and 60 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was an increase of 51 births, 5 still-births and 35 marriages, and a decrease of 2 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; measles, 1; scarlatina, 2; croup, 1; whooping cough, 1; erysipelas, 1; typhoid fever, 5; cerebro-spinal fever, 5; diarrhœal diseases, 23; inanition, 1; cancer, 6; phthisis pulmonalis, 1; bronchitis, 1; pneumonia, 4; aneurism, 1; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 8; Bright's disease and nephritis, 16; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and preternatural births, 3; surgical operations, 1; while the deaths from diphtheria increased 8; malarial fevers, 1; puerperal diseases, 1; heart diseases, 3; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 6; convulsions, 4; direct effect of solar heat, 1; apoplexy, 8; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 10; drowning, 4. The number of deaths from alcoholism, rheumatism and gout, hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis and suicide was the same in the two successive weeks. in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 127 were in institutions, 424 in tenement-houses, 124 in houses containing three families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 17 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 9 were on the basement floor, 129 on the first, 158 on the second, 121 on the third, 90 on the fourth, 44 on the fifth, 3 on the sixth; 689 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 9 non-residents; 72 were stated to be single, 191 married, 77 widowed, and the condition of 358 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 698; still-births, 59; bodies in transitu, 20; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 90 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 701 births, 175 marriages, 59 still-births, 698 deaths; 20 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 100 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 7 transcripts of the birth record, 12 of marriage, and 74 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending August 27, 1887, was 66.8 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 29.794; the mean humidity was 62, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,034, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.99 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observators. Central Park.

The disposition of 690 deaths and still-births, or 91.15 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 20; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 278; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 99; Greenwood (undenominational), 35; Lutheran (undenominational), 107; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 13; Evergreen (undenominational), 47; Woodlawn (undenominational), 17; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 17; Union (Methodist Protestant), 6; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 11; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 3; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 12; Washington (undenominational), 25.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending August 20, 1887, was in the following Wards, viz.: First, 9; Second, 1; Third, 2; Fourth, 11; Fifth, 8; Sixth, 14; Seventh, 31; Eighth, 19; Ninth, 29; Tenth, 22; Eleventh, 31; Twelfth, 112; Thirteenth, 23; Fourteenth, 15; Fifteenth, 7; Sixteenth, 18; Seventeenth, 39; Eighteenth, 38; Nineteenth, 146; Twentieth, 49; Twenty-first, 58; Twenty-second, 66; Twenty-third, 21; Twenty-fourth, 10.

The actual mortality for the week ending August 20, 1887, was 779; this is 60 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1886, and 73 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.22 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,487,950.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Brooklyn was 24.71; Baltimore, 22.49; Boston, 27.97; New Orleans, 20.78; Richmond, 24.96; Lowell, 40.29; Worcester, 24.09; Cambridge, 30.60; Fall River, 35.64; Lawrence, 29.04; Lynn, 28.34. NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by detective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no

further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occurants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.
