

Report for the Quarter Ending March 31, 1878.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE, ROOM 19, CITY HALL, NEW YORK, May, 1878.

Hon. SMITH ELY, Jr., Mayor:

SIR-In accordance with section 27 of the Charter, I have the honor to submit to you herewith a report of the transactions of the Department of Public Works for the quarter ending March 31, 1878.

EXPENDITURES.

The following is the amount of requisitions drawn upon the Comptroller during the quarter:

This exceeds the amount of requisitions for the corresponding quarter of last year in the sum of \$36,806.98.

This increase in expenditures over the first quarter of last year is due to the mildness of the winter, which permitted the prosecution of work on street improvements and water-pipes almost without interruption; and to the payments made on account of repaying streets under the law of 1875,

Showing that except for the new work above-mentioned there has been a reduction in the ex.

penses of the Department for the first quarter of 1878 over that of 1877 of \$24,699.34.

The system of writing proposals for all classes of work and supplies which are not by law required to be advertised for public letting, together with the fall in the market prices in staple articles of trade, have resulted in great saving to the city, as will appear from the following statement of

BUREAU OF CHIEF ENGINEER.

An injunction obtained by the Commissioners of Highways, of the Town of South East, Putnam County, has prohibited the Department from filling the new reservoir on the middle branch of the Croton river up to the close of the quarter; but it is expected that arrangements can be made to open the gates and let in the water in time to receive the April rain-falls, and thus to make the reservoir available for next summer. The dam being practically completed, the remainder of the work is progressing slowly, there being no further necessity for extra exertion to complete it. (The reservoir is now being filled, and already contains about 700,000,000 gallons.)

The dams and flumes at the outlets of the natural lakes are all completed, and the lakes and ponds are filled to high water-mark, except lakes Gilead and Gleneida, which are nearly full.

A map of the land required, plans for the dam, and estimates of the cost for the proposed new Storage Reservoir on the east branch of the Croton river are completed. The reservoir will cover 490 acres, with a depth of 61 feet, and a capacity of 4,300,000,000 gallons. The estimated cost is \$600,000. As we shall now have the benefit of the large reservoir just completed on the middle branch of the Croton, and as we have other plans for increasing the water supply, it will not be advisable to proceed at present with the construction of the reservoir on the east branch. The plans are, however, prepared, and the work may be put under contract whenever it is deemed proper to do so.

The surveys to ascertain the capacity and availability of the Bronx river as an auxilliary to the Croton in furnishing the city with pure water having been completed, it is proper to briefly state the

Two reservoirs are to be formed—one at the outlet of Rye Pond, with a dam eight feet high, and a capacity of 575,000,000 gallons—the other near Kensico Station, with a dam thirty-five feet high, and a capacity of 900,000,000 gallons. The water will be taken out at a level of 210 feet above mean tide, and conducted through iron pipes to a distributing reservoir near Williams Bridge, of 60,000,000 gallons capacity, and 50 feet above the level of the aqueduct. It is estimated that a daily supply of 10,000,000 gallons can thus be obtained, and that the cost of the necessary works, lands, etc., to bring this supply to the reservoir at Williams Bridge will be \$1,230,000. In proportion to the quantity of water to be obtained, this estimate of cost compares favorably with the cost of the Croton water works, notwithstanding the increase in the value of lands, cost of materials, and other items since the Croton works were constructed.

I have, in previous reports, stated the advantages of a supply of water from the Bronx and the Rye ponds, viz., that it will come from a water-shed other than the Croton, and through a conduit independent of the Croton aqueduct, thus increasing the actual daily supply to the city about ten per cent., even when the Croton aqueduct is filled to its maximum capacity every day of the year.

The water of the Bronx will also be delivered at an elevation fifty feet above the present aqueduct, and will thus reach the high grounds of the annexed district.

As not exceeding one-third of the quantity proposed to be drawn from the Bronx water-shed will, for some time, be required in the new wards, the surplus may be discharged into the Croton aqueduct, and to that extent will increase the supply to the lower part of the city. For these reasons, I think, the Bronx project feasible and economical. It will, by an outlay not much exceeding one million of dollars, avoid the necessity of building a new and expensive aqueduct for several years, and until the city is better able to bear the burthen, while the conduit from the Bronx will always remain a useful part of our water system.

This subject will be treated of in more detail in a later report, and after the surveys of the Housatonic, to be prosecuted this season, are completed. The subject of a permanent and abundant supply of water for this great city is one of the most important and interesting which can engage the attention of the authorities. In conjunction with the Chief Engineer, I have given the matter careful consideration, and desire, while I remain in the Department, to place upon its records the full results of our surveys and examinations, in the shape of maps, plans, estimates, and reports to be used in connection with those of my predecessors, when necessity shall require.

The Aqueduct.

The aqueduct has constantly delivered a volume of water 7 feet 4 inches in depth. For a short period only, during the cold weather in January, the consumption exceeded the capacity of the aqueduct, reducing the depth of the water in the Park reservoirs 18 inches, showing that to some extent the people still resort to the pernicious expedient of keeping faucets open and running in cold weather to prevent the water from freezing in the pipes, instead of properly protecting their plumbing against

In proceeding with the work of strengthening the aqueduct, 425 cubic yards of retaining walls have been built, and 515 cubic yards of embankment removed from the top to the sides, 125 yards of stone fence, and 800 feet of board fence were built. Stone houses were constructed at Croton dam and Sing Sing for the storage of materials. The ordinary repairs and care of the aqueduct received

The 6-foot pipes, which were laid in 1866-69 in Ninetieth street and Eighth avenue, to replace the masonry aqueduct, are a source of constant care and expense to the Department. They are of insufficient strength, without proper allowance for contraction and expansion by changes of temperature, and laid on insecure foundation. Twenty of them split at the hubs or joints when the water was first let into them; thirty of them cracked in 1872, and twenty in 1873, after Eighth avenue was regraded, probably in consequence of the additional weight of material placed over them.

In 1875 ten of them broke and had to be repaired, and in 1876 twenty-two of them in Ninetieth street were broken after the street was graded. In January last twenty-five of the pipes were broken, and are now being repaired. The repairs consist in placing iron bands or sleeves around the broken parts. To make these pipes permanently secure it will be necessary to expend about \$50,000 in placing bands and sleeves around them, or in placing a solid mass of concrete under and around them.

Thirty-three large and forty-one small fire-hydrants were placed. Contracts have been made for the manufacture of 4,090 tons of pipe and for laying 20-inch pipes in Tenth and Eleventh avenues. Bids have also been invited for two other contracts, including all the small pipes authorized by the

The supply of water to shipping and for building purposes, which was under contract until last June, has been continued under the immediate direction of the Department, with satisfaction to the consumers, and profit to the city, both by increased revenue and saving of water. The amount collected during the quarter is:

BUREAU OF WATER PURVEYOR.

A small force was kept at work throughout the winter, except a few weeks of very cold weather, in repairing the pavements, but no new pavements were laid during the quarter.

Under the date of February 5, I certified to the Board of Aldermen that the following streets required repaving under the provisions of chapter 476 of the Laws of 1875:

With Granite-block Pavement.

Barclay street, from Broadway to College place. Washington square roadway, from Fifth avenue to South Fifth avenue. Waverley place, from Broadway to Christopher street. Mercer street, from Canal to Bleecker street. Fourteenth street, from University place to Ninth avenue. Fifteenth street, from Broadway to Fifth avenue. Irving place, from Fourteenth to Twentieth street. Seventh avenue, from Fourteenth to Forty-third street. Fifteenth street, from Third to Fourth avenue. Morris street, from Broadway to Greenwich street.

With Trap-block Pavement.

Water street, from Whitehall to Fulton street. Maidson street, from Pearl to Market street. Market street, from Division street to East river. Clinton street, from Division street to East river. Pearl street, from Broadway to New Bowery. Twenty-third street, from Third avenue to East river. Forty-second street, from Third to Fourth avenue. Barrow street, from Washington place to West street. White street, from Broadway to Centre street. One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street, from Fourth to Sixth avenue.

With Macadam Pavement.

Fifth avenue, from Fifty-ninth to Seventy-second street.

Fifth avenue, from One Hundred and Twenty-fourth to One Hundred and Thirtieth street.

On February 19th the Board of Aldermen adopted, and on February 26th the Mayor approved, the necessary resolution to authorize the repaving of these streets. Forms of contracts and specifications for the work were at once prepared, and proposals invited by advertisement for all except Fifth avenue, from Fifty-ninth to Seventy-second street, and from One Hundred and Twenty-fourth to One Hundred and Thirtieth street; One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street, from Fourth to Sixth avenue, and Waverley place, from Broadway to Christopher street, which were reserved for subsequent lettings if the lowest proposals for the others should leave a sufficient balance on the appropriation of \$300,000.

The proposals were opened on March 15, and the following, being the lowest, were accepted: Paving Washington square roadway and Mercer street with granite, John G. Leaving a balance on the appropriation of \$34,313.58. This balance was sufficient only to cover the estimated cost of repaving Fifth avenue, from Fiftyninth to Seventy-second street, and proposals for that work were then advertised for, to be opened on the 10th of April.

Four of the contracts let on March 15, were signed before the close of the quarter, and the prospects for the prompt execution of all the works are favorable.

Many applications by citizens for renewal and repair of pavements are received daily. As above stated the appropriation of \$300,000 for repaying will be exhausted upon the streets already under contract. Under the head of repairs, however, a considerable improvement can be made, but there are many important thoroughfares, like the Second avenue now paved with cobble, which require early and thorough renewal with block pavement. These must be postponed for another year.

BUREAU OF STREET IMPROVEMENTS.

During the quarter work has been in progress on ten contracts for regulating and grading streets, and two contracts, viz. : regulating and grading, etc., Eleventh avenue, from Fifty-ninth to Seventy. second street, and One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, from Tenth avenue to the Boulevard, have been completed.

Shade trees are being planted along the Boulevard, Sixth and Seventh avenues, from One Hundred and Tenth street to Harlem river, Avenue St. Nicholas, and One Hundred and Tenth street, from Avenue A to Riverside Drive.

BUREAU OF SEWERS.

The following sewers have been completed under contracts:

Sewer in First avenue, between Ninety-second and One Hundred and Tenth streets, etc.

Sewer in Tenth avenue, between Seventy-seventh and Eighty-first streets, etc.

Sewer in Eleventh avenue, between Sixty-sixth and Seventy-sixth streets, etc. Sewer in Ninth avenue, between One Hundredth and One Hundred and First streets, etc.

Sewer in Eleventh avenue, between Sixtieth and Sixty-fourth streets, etc.

Sewer in Forty-second street, from Third avenue to East river, etc.

Sewer in One Hundred and Nineteenth street, between Fourth and Fifth avenues, etc.

Sewer in Sixty-ninth street, between First and Second avenues, etc.

Sewer in Ninety-fourth street, between Third and Fourth avenues.

The following are the quantities of work done under these contracts:

2,397 lineal feet of sewers built.

213 lineal feet of culverts built. 361 lineal feet of open culverts built.

12 receiving-basins built.

616 lineal feet of sewers rebuilt.

The cleaning and repairs of sewers and basins have received prompt and efficient attention.

BUREAU OF STREETS.

The roads and improved streets in the upper part of the city, which are under the charge of this Bureau, have been maintained in proper condition for travel.

BUREAU OF LAMPS AND GAS.

The total number of street-lamps maintained by the city has been increased from 20,917 to

The examinations by photometrical apparatus of the gas furnished the city by the several gas companies continue to show satisfactory results as to the illuminating power of gas.

BUREAU OF SUPPLIES AND REPAIRS.

Considerable repairs and alterations were made in the City Hall, the New Court-house, and the Brown Stone Court-house in the City Hall Park, for the better accommodation of the offices located in these buildings. A new gravel roof has been put over the greater portion of Washington Market. The ordinary repairs to other public buildings received proper attention. The armory of Company K of the Twenty-seventh Regiment, National Guard, located in Morrisania, has been completely fitted up with furniture, gun-racks and other necessaries. Fuel, office furniture, law books, and other necessary supplies, have been promptly furnished to the various offices, courts and bureaus. The Free Floating Baths have been put in condition for use during the coming season.

BUREAU OF INCUMBRANCES.

This Bureau received during the quarter 830 complaints of obstructions in streets, all of which received prompt attention. In all but thirty-two cases, where the obstructions had to be summarily removed by the Bureau to the Corporation Yard, the articles encumbering the streets were removed by the owners. In addition to these the Bureau removed 596 cart loads of stone and dirt, for which no ownership could be traced. A large part of this was the debris from the disastrous fire at Barclay street and College place, which completely blocked up Barclay street, and required prompt removal in order to open the way for the large traffic in that street.

The cost of removals was \$556.38, and \$69.75 was received and paid into the City Treasury for the redemption of articles seized.

Having been frequently asked as to the comparative rates for water in New York and some of the principal cities of this country, I requested the Chief Engineer to report upon the subject. The following statement shows the generel result of the inquiry, and proves that our water rates are quite moderate in comparison with those of other cities:

First-Regular rates, charged on all buildings, according to size, and irrespective of the number of occupants or the purposes for which they are occupied.

In New York and Brooklyn and Chicago regular rates on buildings are charged according to frontage and number of stories; in Boston, according to valuation of buildings and number of faucets used; and in Philadelphia, according to size of buildings and number of faucets used.

The receipts for regular rates in this city for the past year were about \$800,000.

At Brooklyn rates, they would be \$1,040,000. At Chicago 1,040,000.

At Philadelphia " 1,120,000.

At Boston 1,600,000.

Tenement-houses are rated alike in New York and Philadelphia, but in Brooklyn they are 70 per

cent., in Chicago 20 per cent., and in Boston 85 per cent. higher.

In New York and Brooklyn the regular rates include one bath-tub and one water-closet for each dwelling, and extra rates are charged only for additional bath-tubs or closets. In Chicago, Philadelphia, and Boston the extra charge is made for each bath-tub or closet.

STORAGE RESERVOIRS.

During the last quarter there has been but little work done on the reservoir being built on the Middle Branch of the Croton. The dam was so far completed last year that the gates could be closed at any time. This has to the present time been prevented by an injunction, granted by the Supreme Court on application of the Commissioners of Highways of the town of Southeast, to prevent the overflowing of the highway between Carmel and Brewster's Station; and which injunction is yet in force. The legal proceedings for procuring the lands to be overflowed, belonging to the Iron Mine Company, are yet pending.

During the last quarter there has on this work been put in—

1,600 cubic yards of embankment. rubble masonry brick dry wall "

The screws put in their places at the tower, and the stop-plank ready to be placed in position

whenever the injunction is removed. 8,305 lineal feet of fence walls have been built, which completes them, except across the roads

which are still in use. The roads built around the reservoir, to replace those to be overflowed, are nearly completed, only

a few points remaining to be trimmed up when the ground has thoroughly settled.

The materials used in the road built on the northwest side of reservoir, to replace a portion of the present highway between Carmel and Brewster's Station, are hardly suitable, and it may be advisable to cover a portion of it with broken stone, no gravel being obtainable in the vicinity.

The work necessary to complete the dams and flumes at the outlets of the natural lakes, drawn from lest cover has been completed, and these lakes, with the expertion of Glancida and Gilland are from last season, has been completed, and these lakes, with the exception of Gleneida and Gilead, are

again full, as also the reservoir at Boyd's Corners. Lake Gleneida has filled three (3) feet, and was, on April 1st, within eighteen (18) inches of high-water mark, and Lake Gilead has filled up six (6) feet.

The rain-fall at the Boyd's Corners reservoir was in January 4.49 inches, in February 3.65 inches,

and in March 3.10 inches.

The surveys for a reservoir on the east branch of the Croton river have been completed, and a map made of the lands to be taken—a plan of the dam and an estimate of the costs. It is proposed to build a dam 71 feet in height above the bed of the river, and when full the water will be 61 feet deep. The dam will be 450 feet in length on top, forming a reservoir covering 490 acres of land, and holding 4,300,000,000 gallons of water. Water-rights, damages, construction of dam, roads,

etc., complete, is \$592,680.00.

The surveys of the Bronx river, above White Plains, and its capacity for furnishing an additional supply of pure and wholesome water to the city, has been completed, and the maps, plans and an estimate of the cost made. The character of the country in which the Bronx rises, and through which it flows, above White Plains, is very similar to the water-shed of the Croton, the land being rough and broken, of a granitic formation, and the country thinly settled, with an agricultural population. It is proposed to raise a dam at the outlet of the Rye ponds eight feet, forming a reservoir which will hold 575,000,000 gallons of water, and to build a dam on the Bronx river, near Kensico station, 35 feet high. This will form a reservoir flowing 188 acres, and will hold 900,000,000 gallons of water, available in the dry season.

It is proposed to take the water out at a level of 210 feet above mean-tide, and conduct it through cast-iron pipes of 42 inches diameter to a distributing reservoir near Williams' bridge.

This reservoir to have a capacity of 60,000,000 gallons 180 feet above mean tide, and fifty (50) feet above the water in the aqueduct at Jerome Park.

The water shed of the Bronx above the proposed dam is 13 square miles, and with the reservoir formed by the dam will, it is estimated, furnish a daily supply of 10,000,000 gallons of water.

The estimated costs of lands, water rights, damages, pipes and laying, construction of dams and reservoirs complete, is \$1,229,509.

AQUEDUCT-REPAIRS AND MAINTENANCE.

The aqueduct has delivered an uninterrupted supply of water, with a depth of seven (7) feet four (4) inches flowing through the same.

During the cold weather in January and February eighteen (18) inches in depth of water was lost in the reservoirs in Central Park, the consumption and waste exceeding the supply, but with the warm weather the waste has been checked and the loss regained.

425 cubic yards of retaining wall has been built, 515 yards of earth removed from the top and placed on the sides to support the arch, and 240 cubic yards of stone quarried for retaining walls, 125 yards of stone and 800 feet of board fence built.

The necessary work of repairing fences, cleaning ditches, drains, and culverts, and keeping in order the reservoirs, pipes, stop-cocks, gearing, etc., has been carried on, and store-houses built at Croton Dam and Sing Sing for the better protection of cement and other supplies.

The pumping engines for the high service have been maintained in good order.

The two lines of 6-foot pipes in Ninetieth street and Eighth avenue, laid in 1866-7 by the Croton Aqueduct Board, to replace the aqueduct ordered to be removed by the Legislature in 1865, continue to give much trouble, the pipes not having sufficient thickness of metal to sustain the strain upon them, and the hubs being of such form that they split with any unequal settling. When these pipes were first filled twenty of them split at the hubs, the cracks extending lengthwise of the pipes. They were repaired by placing heavy cast-iron sleeves around the pipes back of the hubs. The grade of Eighth avenue and Ninetieth street has since been raised and the pipes covered from five to twelve feet. In 1872, after the regrading of Eighth avenue was completed, thirty of the pipes cracked and were repaired. In 1873 twenty cracked, one of them having a large piece broken out the side. In 1875 ten cracked and were repaired. In 1876, the grading of Ninetieth street having been completed, twenty-two pipes in this street cracked; ten of these, bein

In January last this line again failed, and a force is now employed repairing the pipes. There were 7 broken on the west line and 15 on the east line, and since the water has been drawn off from the west line, three more have split.

the west line, three more have split.

The repairs are made by banding the pipes and caulking the crack with copper strips, and when the pipe is badly cracked, cutting off the hub and putting on cast-iron sleeves to allow play for the contraction and expansion of the iron caused by the varying temperature of the water passing through them, this variation being from 33 degrees to 78 degrees. To make this portion of the aqueduct secure, the foundation under the pipes on the avenue must be made solid, and the pipes strengthened by bands of cast and wrought iron placed around them, at an estimated cost of \$50,000, or by a mass of concrete placed under and around them sufficient to support and sustain the pressure which the pipes are now not able to bear. This, it is estimated, will cost \$56,000.

While repairs are being made, all the water passes through the sunken aqueduct in Ninety-second street to the new reservoir in the Park, but the other line, to the old reservoir, should be strengthened through its whole length (2,500 feet) by uncovering the line and banding all the pipes, or surrounding them with a mass of concrete.

The Health Department has weekly examinations made of the Croton water as taken from the pipes near the School of Mines. These reports show very little variation in the quality and pureness of the water during the year

FURNISHING WATER TO SHIPPING, AND FOR BUILDING PURPOSES.

Renewing the sleepers under floor at east end of building, relaying a portion of the floor with new plank, and repairing the hinges of iron door nearest the east end of building.

Armory Co. K, Twenty-seventh Regiment (Morrisania.)

Fitting up this armory by building about 40 feet of plank and glass partition on first floor, putting in about 40 lockers and one musket-rack. The lockers and musket-rock were furnished from those obtained from armories of disbanded regiments.

Painting the new woodwork and touching up the old painting of lockers and musket-rack. Putting up 16 painted shades with spring rollers.

Furnishing and laying about 70 yards of tapestry Brussels carpet in officers' room, and Furnishing 4 door-mats, 48 chairs, 12 spittoons, 2 tables, 1 chandelier and 4 globes.

Covering the roofs of the rear building and the passageway between the rear and front buildings with soap-stone roofing.

Besides the above work, the stoves in the buildings in care of this Department in City Hall Park, have been kept in repair, several smoke-jacks have been put on, stoves have been cleaned, moved, etc., as occasion required. The two carpenters in regular employ of the bureau have been kept busy in the same buildings, making book-racks, cases, etc., putting in window-cords, easing doors, opening desks, putting on and taking off locks, making other incidental repairs, and also doing considerable new work in the brown stone building and Register's office.

In addition to the usual hardware supplies, there have been purchased for their use 2,900 feet of white wood, black walnut, shelving, and flooring, 55 boards, 150 clear planks, 20 floor planks, 10 joists, and 6 pieces of spruce.

joists, and 6 pieces of spruce.

Ice, during the quarter, was taken at the City Hall and the New Court-house only, the daily supply being weighed at each building under the supervision of the janitors, and an account kept of

supply being weighed at each building under the supervision of the janitors, and an account kept of the weight.

The coal scale belonging to the Department of Charities and Correction, and used by this Bureau since the fall of 1875, was taken away by that Department in the latter part of last month.

Arrangements are being made for the purchase and setting of a larger and better scale, and the coal bought for the new Court-house, City Hall, and Brown-stone Building will continue to be weighed, as has been usual for the past three winters.

The Bureau is now engaged in making plans and specifications for fitting up the unoccupied portions of the building, corner of Centre and White streets, rented by the City, but at present containing only a dispensary, for the use of the Second District Civil Court, the Board of Assessors, and the Attorney for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes.

This change of offices will result in a saving of rent to the city.

The following general supplies were purchased during the quarter: 18 dozen corn brooms, 6 dozen scrub-brushes, 14 dozen mops, 2,250 pounds hard soap, 18 half barrels soft soap, 50 pounds soda, 2 dozen water pails, 10 pounds sponges, 6 dozen argand chimneys, 2 dozen snow-shovels, 4 dozen self-righting cuspadores, 8 dozen hand towels, 72 pounds toilet soap, 6 dozen feather dusters, 9 gross boxes matches.

In accordance with the resolution of the Gas Commission, adopted on December 14, 1877, that application be made to the Legislature for an amendment to the Charter, whereby contracts for lighting the public lamps may be made for a term other than the fiscal year, the following draft of a bill has been approved by the Common Council, and a copy thereof transmitted to the President of the Senate and Speaker of the Assembly with a request that early and favorable action be had thereon:

An AcT relating to contracts for lighting the public lamps in the City of New York.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows: Section I. The board authorized to make and enter into contracts for lighting the streets, avenues, and places of the City of New York with gas, consisting of the Mayor, Comptroller, and Commissioner of Public Works, is hereby authorized and empowered to contract for such lighting the public lamps with gas or other illumining material in said city by one or more contracts, to be let at public lettings, as provided by law, for a period of one year, or any part of a year, and commencing and terminating at any dates, the said board may determine.

Sec. 2. All acts or parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed. Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

This bill has not yet passed the Legislature, but it is to be hoped that the same may become a

This bill has not yet passed the Legislature, but it is to be hoped that the same may become a law at an early day, in order that the contracts which are to commence on May I, next, may be made for the full period of one year.
