

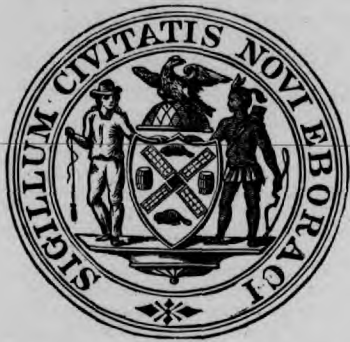

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 354.

During the past week 70 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

42 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

44 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 84 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 83 houses, 83 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

2 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 13, 1883:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was as follows: 809 tenement-houses, 76 private dwellings, 62 other dwellings, 13 manufactories and work-shops, 11 stores and warehouses, 32 stables, 55 slaughter-houses, 2 gas-mains, 8 sunken and vacant lots, 73 yards, courts and areas, 101 cellars and basements, 198 waste-pipes and drains, 169 privies and water-closets, 19 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 7 dangerous stairways, 2 smoky chimneys, 4 cesspools and 4 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the inspectors was 218.

During the past week 98 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

38 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

40 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The disinfecting corps have visited 73 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 73 houses, 73 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

3 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 595 births, 66 still-births, 216 marriages and 618 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, January 6, 1883. This shows a decrease of 26 births and 33 marriages, and an increase of 10 still-births and 37 deaths when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1882, there was an increase of 122 births and 21 still-births, and a decrease of 14 marriages and 140 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from croup decreased 3; typhoid fever, 4; malarial fevers, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 7; phthisis pulmonalis, 14; bronchitis, 7; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 4; meningitis and encephalitis, 11; premature and pretermatural births, 5; surgical operations, 1; drowning, 1; while the deaths from measles increased, 9; scarlatina 6; diphtheria, 17; erysipelas, 1; cerebro spinal fever, 3; rheumatism and gout, 2; cancer, 6; pneumonia, 3; heart diseases, 4; aneurism, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 9; convulsions, 12; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 7; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; gastritis, gastro-enteritis and peritonitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 4; and suicide, 4. The number of deaths from whooping cough, puerperal diseases, inanition, alcoholism, apoplexy, and cyanosis and atelectasis was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 115 were in institutions, 326 in tenement-houses, 163 in houses containing three families or less, 8 in hotels and boarding-houses, 6 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 10 were on the basement floor, 122 on the first, 174 on the second, 119 on the third, 52 on the fourth, 20 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 611 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 7 non-residents; 78 were stated to be single, 172 married, 76 widowed, and the condition of 292 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 618; still-births, 66; bodies in transitu, 12; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 84 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 595 births; 66 still-births; 618 deaths; 12 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 86 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 7 transcripts of the birth record, 10 of marriage, and 54 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending January 6, 1883, was 26.8 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.118, the mean humidity was 78, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,276, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.15 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The certificates of 546 births, 61 still-births, 200 marriages, and 683 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, January 13, 1883. This shows a decrease of 49 births, 5 still-births and 16 marriages, and an increase of 65 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1882, there was a decrease of 39 births, 4 marriages, and 78 deaths, and an increase of 4 still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from diphtheria decreased 14; typhoid fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 8; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 4; aneurism, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; convulsions, 12; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 5; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 9; croup, 18; whooping cough, 1; puerperal diseases, 8; diarrhoeal diseases, 5; inanition, 1; alcoholism, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 31; bronchitis, 2; pneumonia, 14; heart diseases, 15; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 6; meningitis and encephalitis, 7; apoplexy, 6; Bright's disease and nephritis, 6; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and pretermatural births, 6; surgical operations, 1; suicide, 1. The number of deaths from measles, erysipelas, malarial fevers, enteritis, gastritis and peritonitis, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 144 were in institutions, 348 in tenement-houses, 168 in houses containing three families or less, 13 in hotels and boarding-houses, 7 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 12 were on the basement floor, 136 on the first, 175 on the second, 123 on the third, 64 on the fourth, 18 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 673 were stated to be residents of New York City and 10 non-residents; 93 were stated to be single, 206 married, 90 widowed, and the condition of 294 was not stated—these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstracts of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held January 24, 1883.

Present—Franklin Edson, Mayor; Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Allan Campbell, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Chamberlain; and John O'Neil, Chairman Finance Committee Board of Aldermen.

On motion of the Comptroller, the Mayor was elected Chairman for the ensuing year.

On motion of the Chamberlain, W. H. Dikeman was elected Secretary for the ensuing year.

The Comptroller, to whom was referred the requisition of the Commissioners of Docks, dated December 13, 1882, for the issue of \$250,000 dock bonds, submitted the following resolution, viz.:

Resolved, That the Comptroller, in accordance with subdivision 11 of section 6 of chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, be and hereby is authorized and directed to prepare and issue, from time to time, as he may deem necessary to meet the requirements of the Department of Docks, "Dock Bonds of the City of New York," to the amount of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000), for the purpose of raising moneys necessary to carry out the provisions of said act relating to said Department, its powers and duties, the said sum being the amount of the requisition of the Dock Department, dated December 13, 1882.

On motion, the resolution was adopted.

The Comptroller submitted the following communication from the Commissioners of Docks, transmitting a duplicate of the "Agreement for the sale of Bulkhead and Piers 13 and 14, East river."

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS,
NEW YORK, December 29, 1882.

Hon. WILLIAM R. GRACE, Mayor and Chairman of the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York:

SIR—By direction of the Board governing this Department and pursuant to the resolution adopted at a meeting held December 20, 1882, I beg leave to transmit herewith a duplicate of the agreement made and entered into by and between the various owners of the bulkhead and piers opposite to and in front of Nos. 49, 50, 51, 52, 53, 54, and 55 South street, and the northerly half of Gouverneur Lane, and the Corporation of the City of New York, represented by this Department, for your consideration and approval; also to certify to your Honorable Board the action taken by this Board in respect thereto and embodied in the following preamble and resolutions, adopted December 27th instant:

"Whereas, pursuant to the terms and conditions of a resolution adopted by this Board December 20, 1882, an agreement for the sale to the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, of the bulkhead, water-front, etc., in front of and opposite to Nos. 49, 50, 51, 52, 53, 54, and 55 South street, and the northerly part of the private street known as Gouverneur Lane, and in front of the street known as Jones Lane, with all interest in the piers known as Nos. 13 and 14, East river, for the sum of \$180,500, has been submitted to this Board by Simon Stevens, Esq., representing the owners of the said bulkhead and piers, and the said agreement appearing to have been signed and executed by all the parties claiming interests in the said property, and the same having been approved as to form by the Counsel to the Corporation; therefore

"Resolved, That the President, Treasurer, and Secretary of this Board be and hereby are authorized and directed to sign, seal, and deliver the said agreement for the purchase of the said premises for the sum of \$180,500, such agreement being made subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, as provided by law.

"Resolved, That the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have the said agreement entered in full on the minutes, and to certify to the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund the action of the Board in the foregoing matter, submitting therewith a copy of the said agreement for their consideration and approval.

On motion, the communication, together with the "Agreement" transmitted, were, on motion, referred to the Comptroller.

The Comptroller submitted the application of R. Lo Forte, for return of \$74.31, overpaid on account of street vault, north side of Fifty-seventh street, one hundred feet west of Lexington

avenue; also the application of Moritz Bauer, for return of \$141.40, overpaid on account of street vault, east side of Third avenue, between Sixty-ninth and Seventieth streets, together with the following resolution, viz.:

Resolved, That two warrants, payable from the "Sinking Fund for Redemption of the City Debt," be drawn for refunding overpayments on street vaults, viz.: One in favor of R. Lo Forte, for \$74.31, amount overpaid for vault north side Fifty-seventh street, one hundred feet west Lexington avenue, and one in favor of Moritz Bauer, for \$141.40, amount overpaid for vault east side Third avenue, between Sixty-ninth and Seventieth streets.

On motion, the resolution was adopted.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—I present herewith an application of the New York County Medical Society for the payment of one-half of fines imposed under chapter 513 of the Laws of 1880, for practicing medicine without license, on the complaint of the officers of the society, as duly certified by their counsel and the clerks of the Courts of General and Special Sessions, the amount of the fines having been paid into the City Treasury to the credit of the Sinking Fund for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt.

A resolution is submitted to pay the New York Medical Society the sum of \$125, pursuant to section 3 of said act.

Resolved, That a warrant for one hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$125), payable from the Sinking Fund for Payment of Interest on the City Debt, be drawn in favor of the New York County Medical Society—said amount being one-half the amount of fines imposed by the Court of General Sessions on Franz E. Ruhberg, and by the Court of Special Sessions on August French, T. E. Marini and Adam Clason for practicing medicine without license—and payable to the said society, as provided by section 3, chapter 513, Laws of 1880.

The report was accepted, and, on motion, the resolution was adopted.

COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,
January 22, 1883.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—A resolution was passed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on December 27, 1882, directing the Comptroller to sell a lease of the franchise of the ferry between Thirty-fourth street, East river, and Long Island City, along with the wharf property at the foot of that street belonging to the city.

After advertisement, as provided by law, the lease was offered for sale on January 19th, but no bid was received, and the sale was withdrawn.

Some of the citizens of Long Island City were very desirous to have the rate of ferriage for foot passengers reduced from four to two cents, and petitions were presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to make such reduction.

Several special meetings were also held for a hearing of committees of the citizens of Long Island City and counsel of the East River Ferry Co., the former lessee of the ferry.

The books of the East River Ferry Co. were examined, under my direction, by the General Bookkeeper of the Finance Department, and a report was made by him showing the receipts and expenses of the ferry.

After giving the subject careful examination, I presented a resolution reducing the ferriage for foot passengers from four to three cents, which appeared to me to be a fair and reasonable rate, and as low as it could be reduced to yield a fair return on the capital invested, and maintain and operate the ferry properly for general public convenience and accommodation.

The resolution I submitted was amended by a provision that "the ferriage for foot passengers, from 5 to 7 o'clock A. M., and from 6 to 7 o'clock P. M., shall be two cents, and at all other hours shall not exceed three cents each for crossing said ferry."

I am informed that the East River Ferry Co. have reduced the rate of ferriage for foot passengers, on the Thirty-fourth Street Ferry, to three cents each, and I now submit for the action of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, a resolution providing for that rate of ferriage, as originally presented, with the same terms and conditions as to rental and other requirements of the lease.

Under a resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, adopted December 16, 1882, the ferries running from Twenty-third street, East river, and Tenth street, East river, to Greenpoint, Long Island, were also offered for sale on January 19th, and sold at the upset prices for the franchise and wharf property fixed by the resolution, to the Greenpoint Ferry Company.

Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of the Charter, and of chapter 498 of the Laws of 1880, the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to sell, at public auction, to the highest bidder, a lease of the franchise or right to run and operate the ferry, between Thirty-fourth street, East River and Long Island City, along with the wharf property at the foot of said street, belonging to the Corporation of the City of New York, used and required for ferry purposes, for the term of five years from March 1, 1883, at a minimum yearly rental or upset price of five per cent. of the gross receipts from ferriage at said ferry for the franchise thereof, along with the wharf property aforesaid, at an additional yearly rental of two thousand dollars, the said lease to contain all such covenants and conditions as are required by law and ordinances of the Common Council and are prescribed by resolutions of the Sinking Fund, relative to the leasing of ferries and wharf property, upon a form of lease prepared by the Counsel to the Corporation and filed in the Comptroller's office; provided, also, that the ferriage of foot passengers over said ferry shall not exceed three cents each, and that the rates of ferriage for trucks, carriages, and vehicles of all kinds, and for horses, cattle, and other animals, shall not exceed, during the term of said lease, those heretofore and now charged at said ferry; and that sworn returns of the gross receipts from all ferriages shall be made by the lessee, quarterly, to the Comptroller, in such form as he may prescribe, and that the books of accounts shall be subject to his examination.

The report was accepted, and, on motion, the resolution was adopted.

The Comptroller also submitted the following resolution, viz.:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of the Charter and of chapter 498 of the Laws of 1880, the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to sell at public auction, to the highest bidder, a lease of the franchise or right to run and operate the ferry between the foot of Roosevelt street, East river, in the City of New York, and South Seventh street, in the City of Brooklyn, Eastern District, along with the wharf property belonging to the Corporation of the City of New York, at the foot of said Roosevelt street, used and required for ferry purposes, for the term of five years from the first day of March, 1883, at a minimum rental or upset price of twenty thousand dollars per annum, payable quarterly; the said lease to contain all such covenants and conditions as are required by law and ordinances of the Common Council, and are prescribed by resolutions of the Sinking Fund, relative to the leasing of ferries and of wharf property, upon a form of lease prepared by the Counsel to the Corporation and filed in the Comptroller's office; provided, also, that the ferriage of foot passengers over said ferry shall not exceed three cents each, and that the rates of ferriage for trucks, carriages and vehicles of all kinds, and for horses, cattle and other animals shall not exceed, during the term of said lease, those heretofore and now charged at said ferry; and that sworn returns of the gross

receipts from all ferriages shall be made by the lessee quarterly to the Comptroller, in such form as he may prescribe, and that the books of accounts shall be subject to his examination.

On motion, the resolution was adopted.

Two petitions were received, numerous signed by residents of Staten Island, relative to the leasing of the ferry from foot of Whitehall street to Staten Island, praying that when the franchise of said ferry is sold, "larger, more frequent, more rapid, and cheaper ferry accommodation than is now possessed" may be provided for in the new lease.

On motion, the petitions were referred to the Comptroller.

The following communication from the Commissioners of Docks was received:

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS,
NEW YORK, January 12, 1883.

Hon. FRANKLIN EDSON, Mayor and Chairman of the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York:

SIR—At a meeting of the Board governing this Department, held 10th instant, the following resolutions were adopted, to wit:

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and hereby are respectfully invited to examine, at their earliest opportunity, the proposed bulkhead and pier lines for the permanent improvement of the East river water-front, from Grand to Thirty-fourth street, recently prepared by order of this Board by the Engineer-in-Chief and submitted at a meeting of 3d instant, the same being laid out at length upon a specially prepared map thereof and accompanied with various appendices relating to the estimated cost in detail of the proposed improvements, stating the additional wharfage facilities to be obtained by the adoption of this plan in preference to the plan heretofore submitted and by this Department known as the Plan of 1871, together with a map of the East river (both shores) from Corlears Hook to Blackwell's Island, and also a map of the water grants on the New York side of the East river, for the same distance, so far as the same are known to be of record."

"Resolved, For the purpose of affording the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund all the information, arguments, and reasons in the possession of this Board in relation to the advantages of the plan recently submitted to this Board by the Engineer-in-Chief, for the permanent improvement of the water-front on the East river, between Grand street and Thirty-fourth street, over the plan approved by the Dock Commissioners and submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in 1871 (and which is awaiting the approval or rejection of the said Commissioners, and who have referred the question of the approval or rejection thereof to the Comptroller of the city for his consideration and report thereon), that the maps and a copy of all the appendices accompanying the same be transmitted to the Comptroller of the city, with a letter to be prepared by the President, setting forth in detail the advantage of the plan recently proposed by the Engineer-in-Chief over the plan proposed in 1871."

The Comptroller submitted the following resolution, which, on motion, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That a warrant for five thousand dollars (\$5,000) be drawn against the "Sinking Fund for Payment of Interest on the City Debt," and in favor of the Chamberlain, for deposit in the City Treasury, to credit of "Croton Water Rent Refunding Account," for refunding duplicate, erroneous, and overpayments of Croton water rent.

The Mayor submitted the following report of the Commissioners of Accounts; together with "List of Securities held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, January 1, 1883," viz.:

SIR—We beg to inform you that after the close of business on Monday the 15th instant, we made a complete examination of all the stocks and bonds belonging to the Sinking Fund, in the custody of your Secretary; and we have to report that we found bonds, of which we enclose a list, amounting to \$33,569,671.47 (thirty-three million five hundred and sixty-nine thousand six hundred and seventy-one dollars and forty-seven cents), all registered in the names of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, which was the amount called for by the books of the Finance Department, on the 31st December, 1882, and verified by us; and also the Chamberlain's receipts, dated during this month, for \$480,000 (four hundred and eighty thousand dollars) for which the bonds purchased therewith will be issued at the end of the month.

We recommend that in all cases where stock of the same denomination, maturity, and rate of interest is now held on account of the Sinking Fund, it be at once consolidated into a single bond.

It is only just to your Secretary to say that we found the bonds and certificates in perfect order, and so arranged that the thorough examination of each was readily and satisfactorily made.
