



### BOARD OF EDUCATION.

WEDNESDAY, November 15, 1876.

The Board of Education held a stated session on Wednesday, November 15, at 4 o'clock, P. M. at the Hall of the Board, corner of Grand and Elm streets.

Present—Wm. Wood, Esq., President, and Commissioners Baker, Beardslee, Dowd, Fuller, Goulding, Halstead, Hazletine, Kane, Kelly, Klamroth, Place, Schell, Traud, Vermilye, Walker, Watson, West, Wetmore, and Wilkins—20.

Absent—Commissioner Mathewson—1.

The minutes of the preceding session were amended and adopted.

The President announced that Alexander Macdonald, Esq., M. P., Stafford, England, was present, and he had invited him to take a seat within the rails.

The President laid before the Board a communication announcing his resignation of the office of Commissioner, with a copy of said resignation forwarded to his Honor the Mayor; together with the communication from the Mayor, appointing Benjamin F. Watson, Esq., to fill said vacancy.

Ordered, That said communication be entered in the minutes and placed on file.

Commissioner Kane presented the following:

Whereas, Mr. Ernest Caylus has, this day, withdrawn from the Board of Education, on account of his impaired health; and

Whereas, During his brief connection with this Board he has endeared himself to his associates by his gentlemanly bearing and courteous manner; therefore,

Resolved, That we, the members of the Board of Education, do hereby express our regret at losing the services of Mr. Caylus, and especially for the cause which compels him to sever his pleasant association with us. Adopted.

The President announced that Commissioner Watson was appointed to fill the vacancy on all Committees in place of Commissioner Caylus.

The President laid before the Board the following communication:

From the Twenty-second Ward, relative to salary and expenses of Janitor of Grammar School No. 69. Referred to the Committee on Buildings.

From the Twelfth Ward, to have certain class-rooms in Grammar School No. 39 refurbished. Referred to the Committee on School Furniture.

Also, to purchase two lots adjoining Grammar School No. 39. Referred to the Committee on Sites and New Schools.

From the Thirteenth Ward, for payment of sundry bills. Referred to the Finance Committee.

From the Twenty-fourth Ward, relative to closing Grammar School No. 64, on account of sickness and death in the family of the Janitor.

Commissioner Wilkins offered a resolution confirming said action. Adopted.

The bill of Hon. Wm. Herring, counsel for the Board in the matter of the "Corporate Control and Disbursement" of School-money by the Board. Referred to the Committee on By-Laws, etc.

An invitation from the Council of the Chamber of Commerce to attend the examination of pupils of the Nautical School. Accepted.

From Keuffel & Essler, asking to have "Drawing Studies" placed on the list of supplies. Referred to the Committee on Course of Study and School Books.

The appeal of Miss J. T. Delaney from the action of the Trustees of the Seventh Ward. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From A. G. Newan, relative to ventilating apparatus. Referred to the Committee on Warming and Ventilation.

Reports of Standing Committees were presented as follows:

By Commissioner Goulding, from the Committee on School Furniture, recommending the purchase of a piano for Primary School No. 36, and Primary Department Grammar School No. 13. Referred to Finance Committee.

By Commissioner West, from the Committee on By-Laws, Elections and Qualifications, submitting amendments to the By-Laws on Truancy. Laid on the table, and subsequently amended and adopted.

Also, to pay the salary of F. Melville, for certain services. Adopted.

Also, relative to certain claims of Thos. A. Smith. Adopted.

By Commissioner Walker, recommending that certain books be added to the list of Supplies. Adopted.

By Commissioner Halsted, adverse to the appointment of a male Vice-Principal for Grammar School No. 60. Adopted.

• By Commissioner Klamroth, appointing Miss Laura P. Adair Teacher in Colored Grammar School No. 3. Adopted.

By Commissioner Beardslee, making the award of contracts for supplies for 1877. Adopted.

Also, recommending that the Groindin Disinfectant be added to the list of Supplies. Adopted.

By Commissioner Baker, from the Auditing Committee, to pay sundry bills. Adopted.

By Commissioner Dowd, from the Finance Committee, to appropriate \$53,835 for the new building in West Fifty-eighth street. Adopted.

Also, to appropriate \$500 for repairing roofs of buildings in the Fourth and Seventh Wards. Adopted.

Also, relative to a bill of John Neal & Co., \$61.28. Adopted.

Also, to pay taxes on certain property in West Fifty-eighth street. Adopted.

Also, to purchase pianos for Primary School No. 36, and Primary Department Grammar School No. 13. Adopted.

Also, relative to contract for certain alterations and repairs on school buildings in the Ninth Ward. Adopted.

Commissioner Beardslee was appointed a committee to obtain the approval of a Judge of the Supreme Court of the amended by-laws relative to Truancy.

On motion of Commissioner Wetmore, the Board proceeded to elect a City Superintendent for two years, from December 2, 1876. Honorable Henry Kiddle was declared elected. The election of Assistant Superintendents was postponed to the next meeting of the Board.

On motion of Commissioner Beardslee, the matter of delivering supplies to the Schools for 1877, was referred to the Committee on Supplies, with power.

The Board then adjourned.

Resolved. That the Sanitary Superintendent be and is hereby directed to cause an inspection to be made of the life-saving apparatus of this Department, and of the ferryboats running to and from this city.

Resolved. That the President be and is hereby authorized to engage Prof. Morton as a witness as an expert in certain suits for violations of the Sanitary Code.

Resolved. That the Register of Records be and is hereby authorized and directed to enter in the Register of Deaths the death certificate of Ami Henry Constant Christinet, February 11, 1876, in place of Ami Henry Constant Christener, the same being a clerical error.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 18, 1876: The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,510, as follows, viz.: 5 public buildings, 766 tenement-houses, 74 private dwellings, 67 other dwellings, 3 manufactories and workshops, 6 stores and warehouses, 7 other buildings, 59 stables, 2 market places, 53 slaughter-houses, 1 rag and bone house, 1 sausage factory, 2 manure dumps, 2 breweries, 2 fat-rendering establishments, 28 sunken and vacant lots, 49 yards, courts, and areas, 75 cellars and basements, 162 waste-pipes and drains, 98 privies and water-closets, 28 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 3 dangerous stairways, 1 dangerous chimney, 1 cistern and cess-pool, 16 other nuisances, together with 6 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 497.

During the past week 67 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 45 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 34 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 25 houses, 25 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

48 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The following is a comparative statement of cases of contagious disease reported at this Bureau for the two weeks ending November 18, 1876:

During the week ending November 18, 1876, there were issued from this Bureau 415 burial permits for city deaths, 17 for bodies in transitu, and 25 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 415 deaths, 134 marriages, 564 births, 25 still-births, 17 applications for transit permits, and 43 returns from Coroners. There were 18 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 3 transcripts of birth record, 3 of marriage, and 12 of death were issued from this Bureau.

Prof. C. F. CHANDLER, President Board of Health:

SIR—My attention has recently been called anew to the imperfect enforcement by the city car conductors of section 167 of the Sanitary Code, which provides that no soiled clothing shall be carried on any passenger railroad car, except on the front platform.

Our unusual freedom from contagious diseases will not, of course, continue during the months of winter when the population will be more in-doors and contagion intensified thereby. Small-pox, scarlatina, measles, and diphtheria may easily be conveyed and communicated by soiled linen on its way to the laundry, and it would seem to be no hardship to compel its being placed on that portion of the car where it will do the least hurt. I respectfully recommend that the Board take fresh measures to secure the enforcement of the wise sanitary measure alluded to.

SIR—During the week ending Saturday, November 18, there were 415 deaths reported in this city, being an increase of 2 compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 36 less than the number reported for the corresponding week of 1875. The actual mortality for the week ending November 11 was 415, which is 60.8 below the average number of deaths of the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 20.22 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,067,256.

There was a decrease of 3 deaths from zymotic diseases, 5 from constitutional, 3 from developmental, 9 from violence, and an increase of 22 from local diseases. The deaths from membranous croup decreased 2; whooping cough, 3; typhoid fever, 6; puerperal diseases, 4; diarrhoeal diseases, 6; cancer, 8; pneumonia, 1; Bright's disease, 4; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 12; diphtheria, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 4; bronchitis, 4; diseases of the heart, 7, and nervous diseases, 15. No deaths were reported from small-pox and typhus fever.

Phthisis pulmonalis caused 75 deaths, pneumonia 50, diseases of the brain and nervous system 47, diphtheria 25, heart diseases 22, scarlatina 21, and bronchitis 20, making a total of 260 deaths from these six diseases, or 62.65 per cent. of the total mortality reported for the week. There were 92 deaths under 1 year, 118 under 2 years, 161 under 5 years, 30, 70 years or more, 71 in institutions,

147 in houses containing 3 families and less, 189 in houses containing 4 families and more, and 4 in hotels and boarding houses; 5 deaths were on the basement floor, 80 on the first, 136 on the second, 63 on the third, 32 on the fourth, 5 on the fifth, and 19 on the top. The distribution of the mortality for the week ending November 11 is as follows, viz.: First Ward, 5; Second, 0; Third, 3; Fourth, 12; Fifth, 4; Sixth, 8; Seventh, 16; Eighth, 13; Ninth, 17; Tenth, 18; Eleventh, 19; Twelfth, 26; Thirteenth, 14; Fourteenth, 13; Fifteenth, 6; Sixteenth, 18; Seventeenth, 37; Eighteenth, 20; Nineteenth, 72; Twentieth, 27; Twenty-first, 19; Twenty-second, 35; Twenty-third, 6, and Twenty-fourth, 7.

The mean temperature for the week was 46 degrees Fahr., the mean humidity 85, the mean reading of the barometer was 29.986 inches, the total number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,086, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.35 inch.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, according to the estimated or enumerated population, from the most recent weekly returns (American cities) of Philadelphia was 20.47, of Boston was 20.07, Chicago 19.97, St. Louis 12.96, Cincinnati 16.13, Richmond 15.77, Baltimore 23.11, Charleston 40.36, Lansing (monthly) 6.54, Mobile (monthly) 12.66. (Foreign cities) London 21, Liverpool 24, Dublin 19.5, Belfast 17, Edinburgh 17, Glasgow 21, Calcutta 23.7, Bombay 25.7, Madras 35, Paris 23.6, Brussels 21.9, Amsterdam 22.3, Rotterdam 29.2, The Hague 21.9, Copenhagen 17.6, Stockholm 25.3, Christiania 16.3, Berlin 25.9, Breslau 23.6, Munich 36.1, Vienna 21.8, Buda-Pesth 33.9, Rome 18.6, Naples 20, Turin 18.3, Alexandria 46.3.
