MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

By the President—

Resolved, That a ferry be and hereby is established from and to the foot of One Hundred and Thirtieth street and Manhattan street, in the City of New York, over and across the waters of the Hudson or North river to Dempsey avenue, Ridgefield Township, Bergen County, in the State of New Jersey; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York are hereby authorized and directed to sell at public auction, to the highest bidder or bidders, the right to operate the ferry hereby established (subject to the existing rights of any ferry now lawfully operating to or over any part of the route herein described) for such period, on such terms and conditions and subject to such restrictions and regulations as may be prescribed by said Commissioners.

Which was referred to the Committee on Ferries and Franchises.

By the Vice-President—

Whereas, The Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth Street Railroad Company some years ago obtained a franchise to operate a street surface railroad from and to various points in the City of New York, and on and along Twenty-eighth street and Twenty-ninth street, in the said city; and Whereas, The said company has laid tracks but has never operated any cars on said tracks; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby respectfully requested to inform this Board, at his earliest convenience, what action, if any, has been taken by him toward having the franchise of the Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth Street Railroad Company revoked.

Resolved, That, upon the annexed consent filed herewith, permission be and hereby is granted to John Cavagnaro to erect, keep and maintain a bootblack stand in front of the premises No. 88 Duane street, New York City, in the City of New York, but within the stoop-line of said premises, and which shall not extend over four feet from the house-line, nor exceed six feet in length, the work to be done and material furnished at the cost and expense of said under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; the permission hereby granted to continue during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That One Hundred and Eleventh (111th) street, from Amsterdam avenue to the Boulevard, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones set and sidewalks flagged a space of four (4) feet in width through the centre thereof, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

By Alderman Goodwin—

Resolved, That the west side of Thirteenth avenue, between Twenty-fourth and Twenty-fifth streets, for a width of twenty feet, where not heretofore paved, and where the same is within the limits of grants of land under water, be paved with granite-block pavement on sand foundation, and that the present crosswalks within that space be relaid, using the present bridge-stones, where not worn or broken so as to be unfit for use, and using new bridge-stones in place of defective stones, and laying new bridge and curb stones where required, under chapter 449, Laws of 1889, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was referred to the Committee on Street Pavements.

By Alderman Muh—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to August O. Ruschhaupt to place and keep an ornamental clock and post on the sidewalk, near the curb, in front of his premises, No. 699 Tenth avenue, provided that the dimensions of said post shall not exceed those prescribed by law, eighteen inches square at the base, and the clock not to exceed two feet in diameter, the work to be done and materials supplied at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

By Alderman Olcott—

Whereas, A number of years will be required for the completion of a new system of rapid transit in the City of New York, such as was approved by the voters at the last election; and

Whereas, The need of the City is pressing for immediately increased facilities for travel, and the Board of Experts of the Rapid Transit Commission has unanimously reported that this need will best be met by the extension or improvement of the present elevated railroad system;

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen approve of and urge the granting to the Manhattan Railway Company of third track and other additional facilities by the Rapid Transit Commission, pending the development and completion of the proposed underground system; and

Resolved, That, in exchange for such additional facilities, the Manhattan Railway Company should be required to make full, reasonable and proper compensation to the City, and to adopt the best obtainable contrivances for the plant and rolling stock of the road, including noise-diminishing appliances for the roadbed, motors and cars.

Which was referred to the Committee on Railroads.

By Alderman Goodman—

Resolved, That the Chairmen of the respective Committees of this Board and the Clerk of the Common Council be and they are hereby directed to see that all notices of Committee meetings which are published in the CITY RECORD be so worded as to indicate, as far as practicable, the nature of the several subjects which are to be considered; and that marked copies of the CITY RECORD be mailed to all parties known to be interested, in order that they may be enabled to attend or to be otherwise represented or heard from.

Resolved, That Henry Davis, of No. 1428 Lexington avenue, be and is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds in and for the City and County of New York.

Which was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Offices.

By Alderman Woodward—

Resolved, That the resolution calling for the regulating and grading of Twelfth avenue, from One Hundred and Thirty-third street to One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, which was adopted by the Board of Aldermen December 12, 1894, and approved December 21, 1894, be and the same is hereby annulled, rescinded and repealed.

By Alderman Wines—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Ludwig Tangredi to place and keep an ornamental lamp and post on the sidewalk, near the curb, providing the dimensions of the same shall not exceed those prescribed by law, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Which was referred to the Committee on Law Department.

By Alderman Randall—

Resolved, That water-mains be laid in One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street, between Cambreling avenue and Arthur avenue, New York City, under direction of Commissioner of Public Works, as provided for in section 356 of the New York Consolidation Act of 1882.

Which was referred to the Committee on Streets.

By Alderman Ware—

Whereas, Room 13 in the City Hall has been regularly assigned to the use of the Board of Aldermen as a committee room; and

Whereas, Room 13 has, without any known authority, been perverted to a private use which results in crowding the halls of the building to the detriment of public business;

Resolved, That Room 13 be restored to its public and proper occupancy as the committee room of the Board of Aldermen.

Alderman Marshall moved that the resolution be referred to the Committee on County Affairs.

Alderman Oakley announced that if the Committee on County Affairs did not report in the matter of the resolution relating to the so-called Marriage Bureau he would ask that the matter be taken up in the Committee of the Whole.

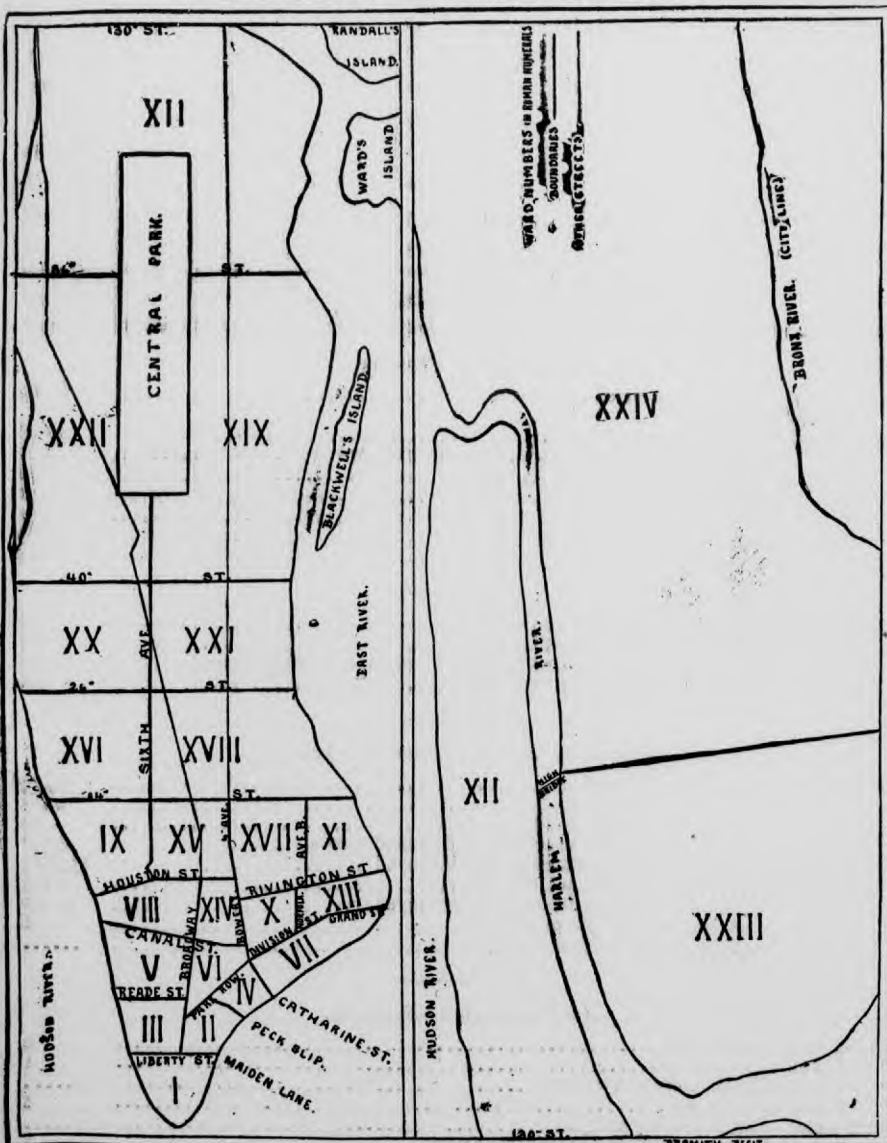

The 949 deaths represent a death-rate of 24.82, against 26.32 for the previous week and 24.25 for the corresponding week of 1894.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a marked decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 155, 82, 93, 6 and 3, against 200, 78, 118, 12 and 6 for the previous week, a total of 339 against 414. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Eleventh Ward, and the decrease in the Seventh, Twelfth and Thirteenth Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Sixteenth, Twentieth and Twenty-first Wards, and the decrease in the Sixth Ward. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Thirteenth and Twenty-fourth Wards, and the decrease in the Twelfth, Nineteenth and Twenty-third Wards. Five of the 6 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and the 3 cases of small-pox were between Twenty-sixth and Eighty-sixth streets, West.

1st. Submitting plans for retaining-walls along the westerly side of Riverside Park, between Ninety-sixth and One Hundred and Nineteenth street, with an estimate of the cost.
