As shown by the Comptroller's certificate, submitted to the Board of Aldermen and referred on May 26, 1896, the aggregate amount of the appropriations included in the Final Estimate for the year 1896, made and adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 31st day of December, 1895, is forty-six million four hundred and ninety-six thousand five hundred and seventy-one dollars and thirty-one cents (\$46,496,571.31), from which sum is deducted the sum of two million five hundred thousand dollars (\$2,500,000) for and on account of the estimated revenues of the General Fund available for the reduction of taxation in said year 1896, leaving the sum of forty-three million nine hundred and mnety-six thousand five hundred and seventy-one dollars and thirty-one cents (\$43,996,571.31) as the amount to be raised by tax under the Final Estimate, as adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on said December 31, 1895.

By section 830 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, the Board of Aldermen is directed to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of taxes that may arise from insolvencies,

discounts or rebates, for prompt payment, errors in assessed valuations, etc., as follows:
"Section 830. It shall be the duty of the said Board of Aldermen to include in any and every ordinance or resolution passed by them, imposing and levying taxes for any purpose or purposes authorized by law, such sum in addition to the aggregate amount required for such purposes as they shall deem necessary, not exceeding three per cent. of said aggregate amount, to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount imposed and levied therefor."

Your Committee has conterred with the Finance Department in regard to the amount that will

your Committee has conferred with the rinance Department in regard to the amount that win be required to provide for and meet such deficiencies as may occur in the actual product of the taxes to be imposed and levied in and for the year 1896, and it has concluded to recommend that the sum of nine hundred and three thousand seven hundred and fifty-eight dollars and ninety-seven cents (\$903,758.97) be added to and included in the sum necessary to be raised by tax for the support of the Government of the City and County of New York, and for other purposes, as authorized and provided by law, which sum is less than three per centum of the amount so required to be raised by tax, after deducting the estimated amount of the revenues of the General Fund for the reduction of taxation, the addition of which sum makes the total amount of taxes to be imposed and levied upon the real and personal estate subject to taxation within the City and County of New York in and for the said year 1890, the sum of forty-four million nine hundred thousand three hundred and thirty dollars and twenty-eight cents (\$44,900,330.28).

The 822 deaths represent a death-rate of 22.08 against 48.65 for the previous week and 23.60 for the corresponding week of 1895.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a continued decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 67, 57, 12, 48 and 0, against 105, 64, 22, 37 and 0 for the previous week, a total of 184 against 228. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Eighth Ward, and the decrease in the Nineteenth, Twenty-second and Twenty-third Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Tenth Ward, and the decrease in the Thirteenth, Seventeenth and Nineteenth Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Nineteenth Ward, and the decrease in the Twellth Ward. Twenty of the 48 cases of typhoid fever reported were above Fortieth street, and 18 were below Fourteenth street. No case of small-pox was reported.
