To the Honorable the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—In accordance with your instructions we have conferred with the President of the Board of Public Improvements in regard to the proposed sewer in Two Hundred and Fourth street (Potter place). After our conference, the Board addressed to you a letter containing a report of their Chief Engineer on the subject.

As it appears that the Board of Public Improvements cannot find any way by which the expenses of building the sewer could be divided between the Sewer Department and your own, the matter is now narrowed down to the question whether you will build an entirely independent structure of your own, or whether you will build at your expense the structure to be used in common by both Departments. We agree with the Engineer of the Board of Public Improvements that it is preferable for the City at large that a single structure should be built in the street. If you agree with us, we would ask you to consider the suggestion contained in the inclosed communication "that the Aqueduct Commissioners petition the Board of Public Improvements for a change in the plan of drainage for the sewer district of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, as shown on sections 17 and 20 of the final maps and profiles of the said wards, by altering the size and grade of the sewer in Two Hundred and Fourth street (Potter place)."

The necessary maps have already been prepared by the Sewer Department and are acceptable to our Chief Engineer. The formalities to be then complied with are indicated in the letter of the Chief Engineer of the Board of Public Improvements; the Board suggesting that the work be done under the supervision of the Sewer Department. That suggestion is called to your attention. If you accept it, however, it will be necessary, in accordance with the laws under which the Aqueduct Commissioners are working, that they advertise directly for bids, and that the work done be ultimately inspected and approved by your Engineer.

We append hereto the communication from the Board of Public Improvements of June 9, 1898, with inclosure.
