MINUTES.

Present to call by President Halton, the members of the Local Board, Twenty-first District, met on February 7, 1901, at 3 P. M., at the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, Municipal Building, Criminal Court, One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street and Third avenue.

Minutes of previous meeting were read and adopted.

REPORTS.

Harold Place, Improvement by Abolition with Chapter 646 of the Laws of 1897.

The following recommendations were read, viz:

In the Matter of the Construction and Improvement of Bosobel Place.

REPORT.

Chapter 646 of the Laws of 1897, by section 1, provides for the acquisition by the City of the land given designated as Bosobel place, and that "the commissioner of street improvements of the Twenty-first and Twenty-fourth wards shall proceed immediately to construct and improve the same."

Section 2 of said act provides that "the cost and expense of the construction and improvement of said public place shall be paid by the issue of revenue bonds, which the comptroller of the City of New York is hereby authorized and directed to issue therefor, and the redemption thereof shall be provided for by the board of estimate and apportionment in the final estimate for the year succeeding the year in which any contract therefor shall become due and payable."

In pursuance of the duties required by said act, the then Commissioner of Street Improvements, How LOUIS C. HARRIS, caused a survey to be made, and on November 26, 1897, submitted a plan with an estimate of the cost of the work to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Eugene K. McDonald, Rep., Engineer of the Finance Department, made a report thereon under date of December 10, 1897, in which he says:

"The law is mandatory throughout, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is required to provide for the completion of the lands issued by the Comptroller in the manner expressed in the act. The improvement, as laid down on the plans submitted by the Commissioner, with a very fine and desirable addition to the eastern approach to the Bridge; but, I do not see what action can be taken by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at this time, since the law does not require it to approve or consent to the plan."

At its meeting, December 25, 1897, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on motion of the Comptroller, directed the Clerk to transmit a copy of Engineer McDonald's report to the Comptroller. On September 10, 1897, title to said Bosobel place vested in the City.

On January 1, 1898, the office of the Commissioner of Street Improvements was abolished, and the Greater New York Charter, by section 325, provides that all the powers, privileges and duties of the said Commissioner which in any way relate to regulating, grading, regrading, curbing, flagging and guttering streets are hereby devolved upon the Commissioner of Highways of the City of New York, and are to be exercised and performed by him according to the provision of this act. Section 1466 of the Charter defines the words "street" or "streets" so as to include a "public place." By section 565 of the said Charter, the duties of said Commissioner relating to public sewers and drainage are to be administered by the Commissioner of Sewers.

In view of the mandatory provision of the statute it appears to be the present duty of the city authorities to proceed promptly in carrying out the improvement, as authorized and directed by said chapter 646 of the Laws of 1897.

Green and others, duly advertised, and submitted (the 7th day of February, 1901, the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that the sewer line at the easterly end of Washington Bridge, Borough of The Bronx, as laid out on the final map and profiles of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards (now the Borough of The Bronx), be constructed and improved in accordance with chapter 640 of the Laws of 1897, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

East One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street, Regulating, Resurfacing, Grading, Repaving, Paving and Repaving.

DEPARTMENT OF SEWERS—BOROUGH OF THE BRONX,
CITY OF NEW YORK,
January 17, 1901.

Hon. Louis F. HAYES, President, Borough of The Bronx.

DEAR SIR—I am desirous of having built, in connection with the siphon under the Bronx river, which is a part of the water sewer through Bronx Park for the Withersbridge Sewer System, a series of catch-basins north of this siphon to collect the heavy deposit which now settles in the siphon.

The settling of this heavy material in the siphon, said siphon being nearly 300 feet long, with openings only at each end, makes it necessary for us to clean this siphon several times a year, and each cleaning necessitates the pumping dry of this siphon, the diverting of the flow of the sewer at a point above the siphon into the Bronx river and then practically digging this material out of the siphon, which can readily be understood is an expensive piece of work.

So, in order to avoid this, I wish, as I have stated above, to take up about one hundred feet of the sewer north of this siphon and depress it about four feet and make it a twin sewer throughout this depression and divide this depressed sewer into ten catch-basins, with suitable manhole openings above them.

The twin sewer is advisable, so that the flow can be diverted by gates into one while the other is being cleaned, and then the flow diverted into the clean one until the same becomes filled up and so on.

The approximate estimate of cost, to accomplish this alteration and improvement, will be five thousand dollars (\$5,000).

I would therefore respectfully request the Local Board to pass a resolution providing for the altering and improving of about 100 feet of sewer north of the siphon across the Bronx river, in Bronx Park, in order to prevent the filling up of this siphon.
