(PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.)

A meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York was held in Room No. 16, City Hall, on Friday, September 23, 1904, at 10.30 o'clock in the forenoon.

-The Board of Estimate and Apportionment having instructed me at its meeting held on the 16th inst. to prepare a statement showing the various park projects now pending before the Board, and the estimated cost in each case, I beg to submit the accompanying statement in which there is given, by boroughs, a list of the various the accompanying statement in which there is given, by boroughs, a list of the various projects which have been considered or laid upon the table which are now under consideration and for which resolutions have been received from the Local Boards, but have not yet been considered by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. I have given in each case the acreage of the proposed new park, or addition to existing park, the assessed value of the property, together with a statement of the probable cost of acquiring same. This statement of cost is necessarily a guess in many instances. In those portions of the City which are well developed, and where there is a fixed standard of values the assessed value of the property forms a very fair index of what would those portions of the City which are well developed, and where there is a fixed standard of values, the assessed value of the property forms a very fair index of what would be the cost of acquisition. In other cases, however, notably that of the proposed Rockaway Beach Park, the present assessed value furnishes little if any guide to what would be the cost of securing the property. In this case the four hundred acres included in the proposed park is now assessed at \$70,000, while I have been informed by those who are familiar with the value of property in that vicinity that the cost would probably be \$1,000,000.

This statement has been hastily prepared in order that it may be laid before the Board at the meeting to be held on the 23d inst., when I understand that the financial side of the park problem will be considered. I am preparing a more extended statement dealing with the present area of parks in the different boroughs, their cost up to the present time, the amount of park lands with respect to population, etc., which I hope to present to the Board at the meeting to be held on the 30th inst.

The following petition was presented to the Board:

The petition of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, and of the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad Company respectfully shows:

I. That the said the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad Company is a railroad corporation duly organized and existing under and by virtue of the Laws of the State of New York, and more particularly under and by virtue of an act entitled "An Act to incorporate the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad Company." being chapter 763 of the Laws of 1866, and the acts amendatory thereof, and is the owner of certain lands in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, and of a steam surface railroad thereon extending from the Harlem River in an easterly and northeasterly direction in and through the said Borough of The Bronx to the City of New Rochelle in the County of Westchester and State of New York, and that all of the said lands and railroads have heretofore been leased to and are now in the possession of and being operated by the petitioner the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company.

That the said the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company is a railroad corporation organized and existing under and by virtue of the Laws of the State of Connecticut, and is the owner or lessee of and now operates, under and by virtue of the Laws of said State and of the State of New York, a steam surface railroad from a connection with the New York and Harlem Railroad near Williams Bridge, in the City and County of New York, through the City of Mount Vernon, the Town of Pelham, the City of New Rochelle, and the towns of Mamaroneck, Harrison and Rye in Westchester County, to the boundary line between the States of New York and Connecticut, extending thence through the States of Connecticut, Rhode Island and Massachusetts, and terminating at the City of Boston, in said last named State. That the said the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad connects with the said the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad at a point within the said City of New Rochelle, and that substantially all of the freight carried by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company and shipped to the City of New York, or through the Cities of New York and Jersey City, in the State of New York, through the Cities of New York and Jersey City, in the State of New Jersey, to Western or Southern States, passes over the said the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad, to its freight yards at the Harlem river. That the suburban passenger traffic upon the said the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad and in connection with the elevated and other railroad lines of the Interborough II. Rapid Transit Company is very large and constantly increasing.

III. That for the corporate purposes of these petitioners, and pursuant to the powers conferred by their respective acts of incorporation and by the Laws of the State of New York, and in order to avoid accidents and to facilitate the use of the road, it is necessary to improve the entire line of the said the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad, by laying four additional tracks, making six, in all, and by eliminating all grade crossings between the Harlem river and the junction with the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, at New Rochelle. The grade of Bungay street, otherwise known as East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, as heretofore duly fixed, adopted and established by the proper Municipal authorities, pursuant to law, and shown upon said map or plan at an elevation of 36.5 feet above mean high-water mark, be changed by raising the same 0.96 feet where and as far as the said street, as heretofore duly laid out, crosses the right of way of the said the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad, and fixed, adopted and established at an elevation of 37.46 feet above mean high-water mark, where and as far as the said street crosses the said right of way.

3. The grade of Longwood avenue, as heretofore duly fixed, adopted and established by the proper municipal authorities, pursuant to law, and shown upon said map or plan at an elevation of 32.5 feet above mean high water mark, be changed by raising the same 0.94 feet where and as far as the said street, as heretofore duly laid out, crosses the right of way of the said the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad and fixed, adopted and established at an elevation of 33.44 feet above mean high water mark where and as far as the said street crosses the said right of way.

The grade of Bryant street as heretofore duly fixed, adopted and established by the proper municipal authorities pursuant to law, and shown upon said map or plan at an elevation of 41.1 feet above mean high water mark, be changed by raising the same 0.96 feet where and as far as the said street, as heretofore duly laid out, crosses the right of way of the said the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad, and

fixed, adopted and established at an elevation of 42.06 feet above mean high water mark where and as far as the said street crosses the said right of way.

7. The grade of Longfellow street, as heretofore duly fixed, adopted and established by the proper municipal authorities pursuant to law, and shown upon said map or plan at an elevation of 39.9 feet above mean high water mark be changed by raising the same 0.97 feet where and as far as the said street, as heretofore duly laid out, crosses the right of way of the said the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad, and fixed, adopted and established at an elevation of 40.87 feet above mean high water mark where and as far as the said street crosses the said right of way.

8. The grade of Whittier street, as heretofore duly fixed, adopted and established by the proper municipal authorities pursuant to law, and shown upon said map or plan at an elevation of 38.2 feet above mean high water mark, be changed by raising the same 1.05 feet where and as far as the said street, as heretofore duly laid out, crosses the right of way of the said the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad, and fixed, adopted and established at an elevation of 39.25 feet above mean high water mark where and as far as the said street crosses the said right of way.

9. The grade of Westchester avenue, as heretofore duly fixed, adopted and established by the proper municipal authorities pursuant to law, and shown upon said map or plan at an levation of 31,7 feet above high water mark, be changed by raising the same 1.60 feet where and as far as the said street, as heretofore duly laid out, crosses the right of way of the said the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad, and fixed, adopted and established at an elevation of 33.30 feet above mean high water mark where and as far

as the said street crosses the said right of way.

10. The grade of Main avenue, as heretofore duly fixed, adopted and established by the proper municipal authorities pursuant to law, and shown upon said map or plan at an elevation of 24.5 feet above mean high water mark, be changed by raising the same 6.0 feet where and as far as the said street, as heretofore duly laid out, crosses the right of way of the said the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad, and fixed, adopted and established at an elevation of 30.5 feet above mean high water mark where and as far as the said street crosses the said right of way.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed change at a meeting of the Board, to be held in the City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on

the 14th day of October, 1904, at 10.30 o'clock A. M.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board cause these resolutions and a notice to all persons affected thereby that the proposed change will be considered at a meeting of the Board, to be held at the aforesaid time and place, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten day continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 14th day of October, 1904.

Affirmative-The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of

Brooklyn, and the President of the Borough of Richmond-14.

The Comptroller moved that the matter be referred to him for the purpose of arranging with the railroad company to have the company bear the entire expense of the proposed changes, which motion was adopted by the following vote:
