Whereas, The recent report of the President of the Board contains reference to important current matters and school problems, as evidenced by the following extract from said report:

As to a possible means of assisting the solution of the part-time question, "Attention is called to the fact that the organization of an 'intermediate school' on the lower East Side has done much to solve the part-time question in its neighborhood; the plan, though tentative, appears to merit reproduction in other crowded localities, more especially as the general proposition is one of arrangement, management and administration, and need not involve large capital expenditures thus to obtain an increase of available school accommodation."

Therefore, be it

Resolved, That so much of the President's report as refers to the establishment of additional intermediate schools as a possible means of assisting in the solution of the part-time question be, and the same is hereby referred for action to such appropriate committee by the President of the Board as he, in his judgment, deems fitting and proper.

Whereas, On account of personal illness, Mr. Frederick Stanbridge, Janitor of Public School 27, Borough of Manhattan, has tendered his resignation, to take effect on September 30, 1906; and

Whereas, For a period of twenty-six years Mr. Stanbridge has performed the duties of Janitor of Public School 27 in an exemplary manner, and has continuously earned the commendation of Principals, Teachers and the local school authorities; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Education of The City of New York hereby records its appreciation of Mr. Stanbridge's long, faithful and meritorious service as Janitor of Public School 27, and expresses its regret at the necessity which has arisen for the severance of his relations with this Department.

The President stated that the next matter to be taken up would be the election of a member of the Executive Committee to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Hon. Henry N. Tift.

Mr. M. S. Stern moved that the election of a member of the Executive Committee be postponed until the next meeting of the Board.



## GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
