Permanent Census Board.

Minutes, June 27, 1910.

The Board met in the office of the City Superintendent of Schools on Monday, June 27, 1910.

Present-William H. Maxwell, City Superintendent of Schools, and William F. Baker, Police Commissioner.

On motion, the minutes of the meeting of March 8, 1910, were approved.

Various communications from the Board of Estimate and the Board of Aldermen were received and ordered placed on file.

A communication from Mr. S. G. Rosent aum, of the National Cloak and Suit Company, Nos. 203 to 217 W. 24th st., advising that certain changes in the method of taking the census be made, was presented, with a copy of the Secretary's reply attached thereto. On motion, this communication was received and ordered placed on file.

A communication was received from Rev. Sydney Ussher, superintendent of St. Bartholomew's Sunday School, asking that permission be given to copy the names of Protestant children living within a radius of ten blocks of St. Bartholomew's Parish House, as shown by the census records. The Rev. Mr. Ussher made a statement concerning his work and what he honed to accomplish. On motion, the Secretary was directed to inform him that no notice is taken of the religious relations of any of the children or parents whose names are on file in this office and that consequently the information desired by him could not be furnished.

The Secretary submitted reports as follows:



And such person shall also forthwith notify the Department of Health thereof, and of the place where such animal is confined. Every animal which is mad or has rabies shall at once be killed by the owner or person having possession

ease, or being suspected of such disease, has been killed, shall be at once surrendered to the Department of Health to be by it disposed of. Should a dog bite any person it shall be the duty of the owner or person having the same in his possession or under his control, to at once notify said Department thereof, and surrender said dog to said Department for inspection and observation; and such dog shall be returned to the person from whom the same shall have been received if found not rabid or vicious, and if found to be rabid or vicious to such an extent as to be unsafe to be at large, it shall be de-

When the police or other person or authorities destroy a dog for any of the causes herein mentioned, it shall be his or their duty to immediately notify the said Department thereof and of the location of its body, so that the same may be obtained by the said Department; and it shall be unlawful to remove any such dog or the body of any such animal heretofore mentioned except as herein provided.

Resolved, That section 97 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended so as to read

as follows: Sec. 97. Every owner, lessee, tenant and occupant of any stall, stable or apartment in the built up portions of The City of New York, in which any horse, cattle or other animal shall be kept, or of any place in which manure, stable refuse or any liquid discharge of such animals shall collect or accumulate, shall cause such manure, stable refuse or liquid to be promptly and properly removed therefrom, and shall at all times keep or cause to be kept such stalls, stables or apartments, and the drains, yards and appurtenances thereof, in a clean and sanitary condition, so that no offensive odors shall be allowed to escape therefrom. Every such stable, and the yards and appurtenances thereof, shall be connected with the sewer in the street in front thereof. It shall be the duty of every such owner, lessee, tenant or occupant to cause all manure and stable refuse to be removed daily from such stable or stable premises, unless the same are pressed in bales, barrels or boxes, and adequately screened or otherwise protected or covered so that flies cannot have access thereto as hereinafter provided. It shall not be lawful to remove manure and stable refuse in carts or wagons, or to cart the same within the City without a permit from the Board of Health, and such carts and wagons shall be of a construction approved by said Board and every such cart or approved by said Board and every such cart of wagon must have a permit from the Board, and be used in accordance with the terms of such permit, and not otherwise. Manure carts and wagons shall be loaded within the stable premises and not upon the street or sidewalk, and the manure and stable refuse shall be removed. from such premises in a manner not in any way offensive or so as to cause any nuisance. All manure and stable refuse, when transported through the streets, must be covered and secured so that no part of the same will fall upon the stree, and so as to prevent the escape of offensive odors, and the same shall not be unloaded or deposited within the City limits, except upon the conditions of a permit from the Board of Health, and at such docks and places as shall be approved by the Board, and to which a permit in writing for such use shall have previously been granted by said Board. No manure or stable refuse shall be thrown upon or allowed to fal or remain upon any street or sidewalk, or upon any ground near any stable. No manure vault shall be built or used on any premises within the built up portions of The City of New

Every owner, lessee, tenant and occupant of any stall, stable or apartment in the built up portions of The City of New York, in which any horse, cattle or other animals shall be kept, and from which the manure and stable refuse are not removed daily, as hereinbefore provided, shall cause the same at least twice in each day to be pressed in bales, barrels or boxes, and adequately screened or otherwise protected or covered so that flies cannot have access thereto, and so pressed as to reduce the same to not more than one-third of the original bulk. Manure and stable refuse pressed in bales, barres or boxes shall be removed to such docks places as shall be approved by the Board of Health, and to which a permit for such use shall have previously been granted by said Board, and such bales, barrels and boxes shall not be opened intil delivered at such docks or places.
