

A special meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 1 o'clock P. M., at the office of his Honor the Mayor. Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Com-missioner of Public Works, and Brigadier-General Fitzgerald. The reading of the minutes of the last meeting was dispensed with. The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments offered the following : Resolved, That, with the concurrence of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comp-troller be authorized to rent from month to month from date, to and not beyond May 1, 1892, the premises on Broadway and Sixth avenue, Thirty-fifth and Thirty-sixth streets, for use and occu-pancy as an armory by the Seventy-first Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y., at a rental of not exceeding seven hundred and fifty dollars per month, from date to January I, 1892, and at the rate of one thousand dollars per month from January I, 1892, to May I, 1892. Which was adopted by the following vote : Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commis-sioner of Public Works and Brigadier-General Fitzgerald. The 952 deaths represent a death-rate of 29.58, against 23.10 for the previous week and 24.94 for the corresponding week of 1890. Contagious diseases continue to decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, scarlet fever and measles respectively being 73, 164 and 254, against 80, 179 and 343 for the previous week. Diphtheria decreased markedly between Division and Rivington streets, the Bowery and Norfolk street, between Twenty-sixth and Fortieth streets, West, and in the lower part of the annexed district. Scarlet fever decreased south of Park Row and Division street, and between Division and Fourteenth streets, Avenue B, Norfolk street and the Bowery ; while it increased between Twenty-sixth and Fortieth streets, West, and above Eighty-sixth street.
