

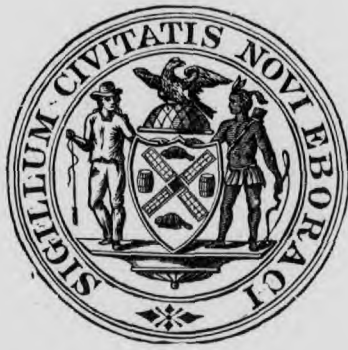

BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,
NEW YORK, June 30, 1891.

A special meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 1 o'clock P. M., at the office of his Honor the Mayor.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of Public Works, and Brigadier-General Fitzgerald.

The reading of the minutes of the last meeting was dispensed with.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments offered the following:

Resolved, That, with the concurrence of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller be authorized to rent from month to month from date, to and not beyond May 1, 1892, the premises on Broadway and Sixth avenue, Thirty-fifth and Thirty-sixth streets, for use and occupancy as an armory by the Seventy-first Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y., at a rental of not exceeding seven hundred and fifty dollars per month, from date to January 1, 1892, and at the rate of one thousand dollars per month from January 1, 1892, to May 1, 1892.

BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

[From Proceedings of Board of Aldermen of June 30, 1891.]

UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

Alderman Flegenheimer called up G. O. 401, being a resolution and ordinance, as follows:
 Resolved, That the flagging and curb now on the sidewalk on the north side of West Seventy-second street, extending one hundred feet east of Amsterdam avenue, be relaid and reset where necessary, and that new flagging and curb be furnished where the present flagging and curb are defective, as provided by section 321, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, as amended by chapter 569, Laws of 1887, and chapter 179, Laws of 1887, under the direction of the Commissioners of Public Parks; and that the accompanying ordinance thereof be adopted.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.
 Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:
 Affirmative—The President, the Vice-President, Aldermen Bailey, Brown, Dooling, Duffy, Flegenheimer, Flynn, Hart, Kunzeman, Lynch, Mead, Moebus, G. B. Morris, J. Morris, Morgan, Rogers, Smith, Tait, and Terrell—20.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number, of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
