Re "NEW YORK PUBLIC LIBRARY."

Hon. RANDOLPH GUGGENHEIMER, Council Chamber, City Hall, New York:

DEAR SIR—In accordance with your request made in Mr. Brainard's interview with you yesterday, we beg to explain to you the changes made in Contract No. 3 on New York Public Library, these changes being the subject of the revision of the contract referred to you by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at their meeting on Monday, the 6th instant.

The most important change is in the form of bid, which has been so amended as to permit the use of white marble in the courts from a different quarry from that used on the main exterior of the building.

The amount of marble to be used in this building is so large that several of the quarry companies are reluctant to bid, but they have expressed a desire to do so if they could furnish a portion of the stone. The granting of permission to the general contractors to obtain the marble for the courts from quarries other than those used for the main exterior will, we believe, result in lower bids in total for the marble, as there will be greater competition. Some of the larger quarry companies have assured us that they would prefer to have the main contract for marble without the courts, as it would reduce the amount to a much less embarrassing total. Considering the probable reduction in the bids on this account, we have thought it a desirable and proper economy, as the architectural effect of the building will not be injured by the use of two varieties of marble if they are distributed as above suggested. Owing to the increasing cost of building materials, and especially the problematical cost of white marble, it will probably be necessary to keep the cost down as low as possible in order to avoid exceeding the appropriation for this work, which is \$2,850,000. We were at the beginning of the building quite apprehensive as to the cost, but we have lately obtained farther information, and are now quite confident that the bids will fall within the appropriation; nevertheless, it seems best as a matter of caution and conservatism to effect as many economies as possible.

A second change has been made in the form of bid in dividing the interior marble work from the bid for the rest of the work, so that each bid will be made up of three items:

First—Covering all of the work embraced in the contract excepting interior marble work.

Second—Item for all of the interior marble work on the Fifth avenue side.

Third—Item for all of the interior marble work on the Forty-second street side.

This division of the work is an entirely natural one, so will appear from an examination of the plan, and it permits the use of marble from quarries other than those used for the exterior, which should result in reduced cost owing to greater competition.

This change will also permit us to select for the interior stonework a marble which would be better adapted for the interior work than some of the marbles which would be superior for exterior work.

There are no other changes in the form of bid, excepting that the time for the completion of the contract has been corrected to three years as provided in the contract, through some error the previous form of bid having stated it as two years and six months, which was contrary to the terms of the contract.

The contract has been changed in the matter of the Connemara marble columns for the Exhibition room; there being thirty-six of these columns. It was discovered that this stone was controlled by one company in New York and that they purposed to ask an excessive price for the material, their bid being \$108,000. We found that we could obtain the Cippolino marble for about \$54,000, and as we considered this stone equal in beauty and more sound and substantial, we have recommended this change.

The Corporation Counsel has amended the Labor Law to harmonize it with the recent decisions of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court and the Court of Appeals as to "Rate of Wages" and "Cut Stone Law."

We believe that with the changes made in the form of bid and in the specification as outlined above, the bids will fall within the appropriation. We will be glad to confer with you again about the matter if you so desire.

We hope that you will find it convenient to report to the Board on this matter so that it will be acted upon at the next meeting, as the contract should be let as early as possible in order to secure the advantage of the present open season, and also to avoid the probable increase in the cost of building materials. Since the postponement of the bidding the cost of the steelwork for the building has increased by \$10,000, and we anticipate a similar increase in a like period.

SIR—A communication from the Department of Parks by its Secretary, Willis Hully, dated April 15, was received, which reads as follows:

"By direction of the Commissioner of Parks for the boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond I send herewith amended form of contract in triplicate for the work embraced in Contract No. 3 for the New York Public Library, etc. Your attention is drawn to the following changes:

"1. In the form of bid or proposal, separating exterior work from interior marble, in order that a price may be named for each.

"2. On page 27 substituting 'Cippolino' for 'Connemara' marble for the interior columns.

"Necessary change has also been made in the Labor Law clause.

"Will you please indorse these forms with your approval, and thereafter forward the same to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the approval of that Board?

"It being important that these preliminaries should be effected with as little delay as possible to enable the early readvertisement of the work, may I ask that you will cause the matter to be passed upon at your earliest convenience?"

The contract and specifications mentioned in the said communication are herewith transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in accordance with the request contained in said communication, and attention of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is respectfully called to the following corrections made in the said contract:

On page 3 the time has been changed from two years and six months to three years.

The bid or proposal has been changed so that alternate bids may be made for certain parts of the marble work; separate bids being requested for certain parts of the interior marble work.

On page 27 of the contract "Cippolino" marble has been substituted for "Connemara" marble, and a typographical error has been changed by which statuary marble is made interior marble.

On pages 35 and 36 corrections in red to show that from section 199 to section 209 is interior work.

On page 59 correction of the provisions of the Labor Law to comply with recent decisions of the Court of Appeals.

The said contracts, three in number, having been amended in the particulars described, are approved as to form.

SIR—The Corporation Counsel, in communication of April 24, 1901, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmits the form of Contract No. 3 for the New York Public Library, with certain changes and amendments suggested by the Commissioner of Parks for the boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond.

He calls the attention of the Board to the following corrections:

"On page 3 the time has been changed from two years and six months to three years.

"The bid or proposal has been changed so that alternate bids may be made for certain parts of the marble work; separate bids being requested for certain parts of the interior marble work.

"On page 27 of the contract "Cippolino" marble has been substituted for "Connemara" marble, and a typographical error has been changed by which statuary marble is made interior marble.

"On pages 35 and 36, corrections in red to show that from section 199 to section 209 is interior work.

"On page 59, correction of the provisions of the Labor Law to comply with recent decisions of the Court of Appeals.

"The said contracts, three in number, having been amended in the particulars described, are approved as to form."

The changes and corrections may properly receive the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, consisting mainly in the alteration in the form of proposals, or bids, by which instead of the bid being for the whole work, the marble work will be divided into exterior and interior work, giving a prospect of lower bids.

The substitution of "Cippolino" marble for "Connemara" is in the way of economy; the "Cippolino" costing much less, while, in the opinion of the Architects, it is of equal beauty and a stronger stone. They say:

"We consider it in every way a preferable material, and as it can probably be obtained for about one-half of the cost of the 'Connemara' stone, we consider the change a most desirable one, which would result in a saving to the City of at least \$50,000."

The other changes made are to correct typographical errors, and the placing of the provisions of the Labor Law to comply with recent decisions of the Court of Appeals.

GENTLEMEN—In pursuance of the provisions of chapter 134 of the Laws of 1901, a copy of which is herewith inclosed, I make the following offer:

I will exchange the block of land in the Eighth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by First avenue and New York Bay and Fifty-first (51st) and Fifty-second (52d) streets, together with the right, title and interest of the owners of the upland, and to the lands in front of said block under the waters of the New York Bay, extending to bulkhead and pier lines, for the block of land in the said Eighth Ward and borough, owned by The City of New York, bounded by First avenue and the New York Bay, Forty-third (43d) and Forty-fourth (44th) streets, together with the right, title and interest of the City in and to the land in front of the said block under the waters of the New York Bay, extending to bulkhead and pier lines.

DEAR SIR—Agreeable to your request, I have inspected the plot bounded by Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, First avenue and the water-front, in the Eighth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, and find as follows:

1st. The land measures 89,300 square feet of surface and belongs to the Hunt estate.

2d. Fifty-first street is not cut through from Second avenue to the water-front.

3d. Fifty-second street has been opened down to water line by the Brooklyn City Railroad Company, which owns adjoining property.

DEAR SIR—Agreeable to your request, I have inspected the plot belonging to the City, bounded by Forty-third street, Forty-fourth street, First avenue and the water-front, in the Eighth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, and find as follows:

1st. The land measures 92,600 square feet.

2d. Forty-third street is graded to water-front.

3d. Forty-fourth street not yet cut through between First avenue and water.

4th. This plot is practically graded to street level, and is distant four blocks from Thirty-ninth Street Ferry.

The opinion expressed by Mr. Cary cannot be based upon any transaction, and I think any expert fully informed of actual sales and of the prices at which property is held would reach a very different conclusion. "Section 1. The City of New York is authorized and empowered to exchange the block of land in the eighth ward of the borough of Brooklyn, bounded by First avenue and the New York Bay, Forty-third and Forty-fourth streets, together with the right, title and interest of the city in and to the land in front of the said block under the waters of the New York Bay, extending to bulkhead and pier lines, for the block of land in said ward and borough bounded by First avenue and the New York Bay, Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, together with the right, title and interest of the owners of the upland in and to the lands in front of said block under the waters of the New York Bay, extending to bulkhead and pier lines.

"Sec. 2. The owners of the said block of land between Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets may, in writing, propose to the board of estimate and apportionment of the city of New York the exchange authorized in the first section of this act, and the terms they are willing to make, and the board of estimate and apportionment in its discretion may, by vote of its members, to be entered in its minutes, reject or accept the proposition for exchange, or they may modify it and fix the terms of exchange, or in its discretion the board of estimate and apportionment may hear the parties in interest and cause to agreement concerning the exchange, and the terms thereof, and after such hearing the board of estimate and apportionment may, by resolution adopted and entered as aforesaid, fix the terms of the exchange. If the owners of the block to be conveyed to the city shall, in writing, signed by them, accept the resolution as aforesaid, the exchange shall be made by deeds, which shall thereupon be executed, acknowledged and delivered and each deed shall vest in the grantee title to the lands therein described in fee.

"Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately."

I beg to advise you that the block belonging to the City, above described, between Forty-third and Forty-fourth streets, was assigned by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund June 27, 1900, by resolution, "to the use of the Second Naval Battalion * * * ; the use and occupation of the same to continue during the pleasure of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund" (see Minutes, Sinking Fund Commissioners, page 300, 1900).

On August 8, 1900, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by resolution, adopted the plans presented by the Army Board for the permanent quarters for the Second Naval Battalion, and appropriated the sum of \$50,000 for the erection of the building, authorizing the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock to that amount, in conformity with section 134 of chapter 212 of the Laws of 1898. The block now owned by the City contains 3.34 acres of upland, 6.2 of land under water adjoining the upland, and also a water grant extending to the pierhead-line, and containing 1.61 acres—total, 11.15 acres, of which the uplands and water-front are assessed on the tax books at \$75,000.

The block between Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets proposed to be exchanged contains 2.92 acres of upland and 4.72 of land under water, extending to the bulkhead-line—total, 7.63 acres. The land under water between the bulkhead and the pierhead lines, I am informed, has never been granted by the State. The assessed valuation of this property is given as \$65,000. My knowledge of water-front assessments leads me to believe that such assessments will not exceed 40 per cent. of the market value, and upon this basis, the City's property would have a value of \$187,500, while the value of the block between Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets would not exceed \$162,500, showing that an exchange of block for block as proposed would not be in the interests of the City by the sum of \$25,000 at least.

The uplands of the City's property contains .42 acres more than the block between Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, and is better adapted at present for an armory site than the latter block, wherein the surface of the ground rises to a height of 20 feet above grade from a line about 50 feet to the west of First avenue.

This would necessitate a large amount of excavation before the armory could be constructed, but the material so excavated could be used to advantage in filling the land under water last would entail considerable expense in building the armory.

In my opinion an exchange upon the terms proposed would not be in the interests of the City.

GENTLEMEN—The following proceedings were this day had before the Police Commissioner: Ordered, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby respectfully requested to transfer the sum of \$100 from the appropriation made to the Police Department for the year 1899, entitled "Supplies for Police," which is in excess of the amount required for the purposes and objects thereof, to the appropriation made to the same Department for the year 1899, entitled "Contingent Expenses of Central Department and Station-houses," which is insufficient to enable the Police Commissioner to authorize payment by the Comptroller of claim of R. A. Withams, M. D., for chemical and other examinations (dated October 5, 1899) three hundred dollars.

And offered the following:

Resolved, That the final maps of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards (now the Borough of The Bronx) be amended by showing thereon Cambrelling avenue, from Grote street to East One Hundred and Eighty-first street, and between Belmont and Crotona avenues, in accordance with sketch, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements with the recommendation of this Board.

Simpson Street, Sheet Asphalt, One Hundred and Sixty-seventh Street to Freeman Street.

Petition of M. M. Rooney and others was read. A large protest was filed, signed by Lyman Tiffany, per H. D. Tiffany, agent, and others. Laid over indefinitely.

East One Hundred and Sixty-second Street, Discontinuance, between River Avenue and Gerard Avenue.

PUBLIC NOTICE.

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO THE WEST TENTH STREET CONNECTING RAILWAY COMPANY THE RIGHT OR FRANCHISE TO CONSTRUCT AND OPERATE A STREET SURFACE RAILROAD IN, UPON AND ALONG CERTAIN STREETS, AVENUES, PARKWAYS AND HIGHWAYS IN THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Be It Ordered by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

WHEREAS, THE WEST TENTH STREET Connecting Railway Company has duly presented to the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, by presenting and filing with each house thereof, its application, in writing, for a grant of the franchise or right to use the streets, avenues, parkways and highways in the City of New York hereinafter mentioned, for the construction, maintenance and operation of a single-track street surface railroad in or upon the surface of the same; and

Whereas, The said Municipal Assembly, by resolution adopted March 20, 1901, approved by his Honor the Mayor of said city on March 28, 1901, gave public notice of such application, and that at the Council Chamber, in the City Hall, in The City of New York, on the 19th day of April, 1901, at 10 o'clock in the afternoon, such application of said railway company was first considered and a public hearing had thereon, which notice was published daily for at least fifteen (15) days successively prior to the hearing, in two daily papers published in The City of New York, viz., in the "New York Press" and in the "New York Journal and Advertiser," which papers were first designated, in writing, by his Honor the Mayor of said city, on March 28, 1901; and

Whereas, After public notice given as aforesaid and at a public hearing duly held in pursuance of such notice, wherein all persons so desiring were given an opportunity to be heard and were heard, such application was first considered by the Railroad Committee of both houses of said Municipal Assembly;

Section 1. The Municipal Assembly of The City of New York hereby grants to the West Tenth Street Connecting Railway Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and franchise to use the streets, avenues, parkways and highways of the said city, and to construct, maintain and operate a single-track street surface railroad in and upon the following streets, avenues, parkways and highways, viz.: Commencing at the intersection of Sixth Avenue and West Tenth Street, in The City of New York, running southerly with single track through, upon and along West Tenth Street to the intersection of said West Tenth Street with Greenwich Avenue, all in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York.

Sec. 2. The grant of said franchise or right to use said streets, avenues, parkways and highways is made subject to the following conditions:

First—That the said right, privilege and franchise to construct and operate its said railway shall be held and enjoyed by said railway company, its lessees or successors, for the term of twenty-five years with the privilege of a renewal of said grant for the further period of twenty-five years upon a fair revaluation of the right, such revaluation to be of the right, privilege and franchise to maintain and operate said railroad by itself, and not to include any value derived from the ownership, control or operation of any other railroad, line or tracks by the grantee, its successors or assigns; provided, however, that the consent of the owners of one-half in value of the property bounded on such streets, avenues, parkways and highways shall be first obtained, or in lieu thereof the favorable determination of three Commissioners, approved by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, that such railroad should be constructed and operated.

Second—Upon the termination of the said franchise or right, whether original or renewed, there shall be a fair valuation of the plant and property of the grantee in the streets, avenues, parkways and highways aforesaid, with its appurtenances; and the said plant and property shall be and become the property of the City on the termination of the grant on paying the grantee such valuation. Such payment shall be at a fair valuation of the said plant and property as property, excluding any value derived from the franchise.

Third—The mode of determining the valuations and revaluations herein provided for shall be as follows: One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the railroad company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder; the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the valuations and revaluations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least sixty days prior to the expiration of the grant, or of the renewal thereof, and their reports shall be filed with the Comptroller of the City not more than thirty days thereafter. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators; they may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigation without the presence of either party; they shall have the right to examine the books of the railroad company. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties.

Fourth—The said West Tenth Street Connecting Railway Company shall, for and during the first five years after the commencement of the operation of any portion of its railroad, annually, on November 1, pay into the treasury of the City, to the credit of the Sinking Fund thereof, three per cent. of its gross receipts for and during the year ending September 30 next preceding; and after the expiration of such five years make a like annual payment into the treasury of the City, to the credit of the same fund, of five per cent. of its gross receipts, as required by section 95 of the Railroad Law, but such percentage of gross receipts shall not be less than one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150) annually for the first five years and not less than three hundred dollars (\$300) annually thereafter.

That but one fare shall be exacted for passage over the railroad constructed under this grant and over the lines of any railroad system or systems operated in connection therewith, and that the gross receipts from joint business shall be divided in the proportion that the length of said railroad operated hereunder shall bear to the entire length of the railroad system or systems which shall be operated in connection therewith, and of the railroad to be constructed hereunder.

Wherever and whenever this connecting railway shall make it possible for the cars of a non-percentage paying line to operate upon the tracks of a percentage paying line, the former line shall keep a separate and accurate account of all fares collected from passengers who enter said cars upon the routes of percentage lines, and account to the City for them the same as if they had been collected on the percentage line, and to pay the same percentages thereon as is now provided by law to be paid by the company upon whose route they operate.

N/A—The said railroad may be operated by under-

ground electrical power substantially similar to the system of underground electrical traction now in use on the railroads in Second, Sixth, Eighth, Lenox and Madison avenues in this city, and by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power, which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners and consented to by the owners of property, in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law.

Sixth—The said railroad shall be constructed and maintained subject to the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Highways and the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies of The City of New York, in all matters with respect to which said Commissioners are respectively invested with the power of regulation and control by the Charter of said city; and the consent of the City, as owner of property bounded on West Tenth Street and on Christopher Street, is hereby given to the operation of the railroads now or hereafter constructed on said streets by the terms of motive power provided in section fifth.

Sec. 3. The said grant is also upon the further conditions, namely:

First—The said railroad shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railway construction, and the railroad and property of said company shall be maintained in good condition throughout the full term of this grant.

Second—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railroad shall be five cents; and said company shall not charge any passenger more than said sum for one continuous ride from any point on its road, or any road, line or branch operated by it or under its control, to any point thereon or any connecting branch thereof within the limits of The City of New York. The cars on said railroad shall be run as often as the public convenience may require.

Third—The said railroad company shall apply to each car a proper tender and wheel-guard conformably to such laws and ordinances as may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Fourth—All cars of said railroad company shall be heated during cold weather conformably to such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, and each car shall be well lighted either by the Pintsch gas system or by electricity, or by some system of lighting equally efficient.

Fifth—In case of any violation or breach of or failure to comply with any of the provisions of this section, this grant may be forfeited by suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the said railroad company.

Sec. 4. This grant is also upon the further and expressed condition that the provisions of article IV, of the Railroad Law applicable thereto be complied with.

Sec. 5. The said company shall at all times keep the street between its tracks and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails upon either side thereof free and clear from ice and snow.

Sec. 6. The said railroad company, so long as it shall continue to use any of its tracks upon said streets, avenues or public places, shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of such streets, avenues and public places between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe.

Sec. 7. This grant shall not become operative unless, within ten days after the approval thereof by the Mayor of said City, or the final passage thereof succeeding the return with the disapproval thereof, or subsequent to the taking effect of said grant by reason of the failure of said officer to return the same with his disapproval, the said railroad company shall duly execute under its corporate seal an instrument in writing, wherein said company shall promise, covenant and agree on its part and behalf to pay the compensation and to conform to, abide by and perform all the conditions and requirements in this ordinance fixed and contained, and within the said period file the said instrument in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York.

Sec. 8. This ordinance shall take effect immediately. Published in accordance with a resolution adopted by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York on the 21st day of May, 1901, and approved by his Honor the Mayor on the 24th day of May, 1901.
