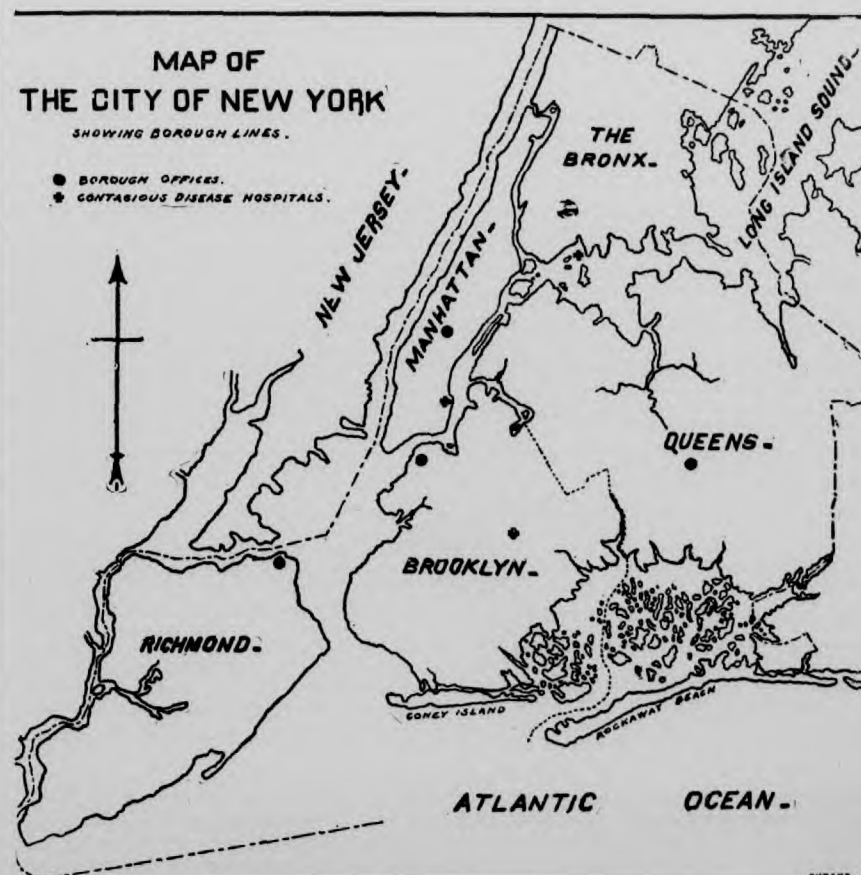

## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Friday, March 1, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M. Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held February 21, 1901, were approved.

The communication from the President recommending that the Pier at the foot of West Forty-fourth street, North river, be extended out to the new pierhead-line was again tabled for one month.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 20705, submitting plan for the improvement of the water front on the southerly side of the Harlem river, between One Hundred and Thirtieth and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, was again tabled for two weeks.

The communication from the Engineer-in-Chief submitting proposed plan for the improvement of the water front between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-eighth streets, North river, was tabled for one month.

The communication from the Department of Water Supply transmitting complaint relative to the collection of wharfage from tugboats taking water from the hydrant on Pier, old 28, East river, was referred to the Corporation Counsel for an opinion as to whether such charge can legally be made.

The application of Richard J. Foster for permission to occupy 150 feet of the bulkhead on Washington avenue, between Piers 3 and 4, at the Wallabout Basin, Borough of Brooklyn, with the privilege of erecting an ice bridge, etc., thereon, was referred to the Treasurer.

The application of the Bouker Contracting Company for permission to occupy a berth for unloading stone between Eightieth and Eighty-first streets, North river, was referred to the Dock Superintendent to examine and report.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Mayor—

1st. Stating that the limitations fixed by law on the expenditures of this Department must be complied with. Action of the President in replying that this Department has at all times kept within the limitation as fixed by law approved.

2d. In relation to the condemnation proceedings now pending for the acquisition of waterfront property. Action of the President in requesting the Corporation Counsel to advise the Board, first, whether any liability accrues in proceedings for the condemnation of wharf property where Commissioners have been appointed but no report made by them, and, second, whether any reports of such Commissioners will be made prior to January 1, 1902, approved.

From the Comptroller—In relation to substitution of sureties on Contract No. 701.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted for the substitution of the American Bonding and Trust Company of Baltimore City and the American Surety Company of New York, as sureties in the place of Maurice Kaim and Albert Heller, on the estimate of the New York Central Coal Company for furnishing and delivering about 2,000 tons of anthracite coal, under Contract No. 701.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Transmitting approved forms of leases of Pier, new 47, North river, to the Quebec Steamship Company, Limited; of Pier, new 54, North river, to the Anchor Line; of Pier, new 29, East river, to the Central Vermont Railway Company; of Pier, new 31, East river, to the Old Colony Steamboat Company; and of Pier, new 32, East river, to the Maine Steamship Company.

On motion, the report of the President recommending that the time for the commencement of the lease of Pier, new 32, East river, be fixed at May 1 instead of February 1, 1901, was received, said recommendation adopted and the Dock Master directed to collect wharfage at the pier until May 1, 1901; and the Commissioners were authorized to execute the various leases received from the Corporation Counsel.

2d. Transmitting check for \$328.77, in settlement of the claim against the Atlantic Transportation Company for rent of the Pier foot of West Forty-fourth street, from August 1 to August 16, 1899.

From the Department of Parks—Claiming that necessary repairs to the Pier foot of Bay Ridge avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, should be made by the Department of Docks and Ferries. Secretary directed to request the Commissioner of Parks to advise this Board whether in the event of the repairs being made by this Department, the pier could be used for wharfage without hindrance from him.

From the Department of Highways—In relation to repairs required to the curb and sidewalk at the south end of Whitehall street, opposite the Staten Island Ferry. Secretary directed to state that the premises in question are under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—Requesting permission to transfer the dumping-board from the south side to the north side of the Pier foot of West Forty-seventh street, and to rebuild the dump on the southerly side as soon as repairs to said pier shall have been made by this Department. Application granted, the dump to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board, and the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

From the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies—Requesting that berths be assigned for the free floating baths for the season of 1901.

On motion, the request of said Department for the setting aside of a berth at the Pier foot of Third street, East river, was denied, a berth for the bath set aside on the south side of the Pier foot of Fifth street, East river, and the remainder of the request of said department referred to the President.

From Edward Hett—Transmitting copy of application to be made to the Commissioners of the Land Office for a grant of land under water at New Dorp Beach, Staten Island.

From E. Fincken's Sons & Co. and others—Requesting that one of the new piers to be built on the North river, between Bloomfield and West Twenty-third streets, be maintained as an open pier.

From Peter De Witt & Co.—Requesting permission to drive fender piles at their dock foot of Forty-ninth street, East river. Application granted, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, and to be kept within existing lines.

From Kane & Wright—Requesting permission to repair the crib-bulkhead between Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets, East river, and to drive piles along said bulkhead and in the slip in front thereof.

On motion, the application for permission to drive fender piles in the slip outshore of the bulkhead was denied, and permission granted to repair the bulkhead and to drive piles along same, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief and to be kept within existing lines.

From John B. McDonald and the Degnon-McLean Contracting Company—Requesting permission to erect a dump on Pier, old 28, East river. Application denied.

From James Farman—Requesting permission to erect a boat-house north of Jackson Boulevard, at North Beach, Borough of Queens. Secretary directed to state that this Board will not grant permits for structures of the character contemplated, and that application therefor will have to be made to the Department of Buildings.

From William N. Dykman, attorney—Transmitting agreement executed by the Bush Company, Limited, that no additional item of value shall be claimed beyond the actual cost of the structure, if permission is granted to erect a shed on the Pier foot of Fortieth street, Brooklyn.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Bush Company, Limited, to erect a shed on the extension to its Pier 3, between Fortieth and Forty-first streets, South Brooklyn, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and in accordance with plans and specifications to be first submitted to and approved by him, said company having filed an agreement that no additional item of value shall be claimed beyond the actual value of the shed, in case this Department requires the premises for the improvement of the water front.

From Mooney & Shipman, attorneys—Transmitting agreement executed by the Morse Iron Works and Dry Dock Company, that no additional item of value shall be claimed beyond the actual cost of the structures if permits are granted for the erection of sheds on the two piers foot of Fifty-sixth street, Borough of Brooklyn.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Morse Iron Works and Dry Dock Company to erect a shed on each of the piers foot of Fifty-sixth street, South Brooklyn, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and in accordance with plans and specifications to be first submitted to and approved by him, said company having filed an agreement that no additional item of value shall be claimed beyond the actual value of the sheds in case this Department requires the premises for the improvement of the water front.

Area of assessment includes all those lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises situate, lying and being in the Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New York, which, taken together, are bounded and described as follows, viz.: Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the westerly prolongation of a line drawn parallel to and distant 100 feet southerly from the southerly side of that part of Devoe street (East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street) lying between Lind Avenue and Sedgwick Avenue, with a line drawn parallel to the westerly side of Sedgwick Avenue and distant 100 feet westerly therefrom; running thence northerly along said parallel line to its intersection with the westerly prolongation of a line drawn parallel to and distant 100 feet northerly from the northerly side of that part of Devoe street (East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street) lying between Lind Avenue and Sedgwick Avenue; thence easterly along said westerly prolongation and parallel line to the northwesterly side of Lind Avenue; thence easterly to the intersection of the southeasterly side of Lind Avenue with a line drawn parallel to the northerly side of Devoe street (East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street), and distant 100 feet northerly therefrom; thence easterly along said parallel line to the northwesterly side of Summit Avenue; thence southeasterly along the northwesterly prolongation of a line drawn parallel to the northerly side of Devoe street (East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street) lying between Anderson Avenue and Jerome Avenue; thence northerly along said parallel line to the northwesterly side of Summit Avenue with a line drawn parallel to the southerly side of Devoe street (East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street), and distant 100 feet southerly therefrom; thence northwesterly along said parallel line to the southeasterly side of Summit Avenue; thence westerly to the intersection of the northwesterly side of Summit Avenue with a line drawn parallel to the southerly side of Devoe street (East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street), and distant 100 feet southerly therefrom; 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City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1899, the said stock is exempted, for the debt-restrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII, of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incurring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of the City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Whereas, Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand and five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), matures July 1, 1901, and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897;

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of as much of said stock as he may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be unable to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

For the reasons set forth in the foregoing report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller of the City of New York will avail himself of the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, which reads as follows:

#### CHAPTER 630.

AN ACT to authorize the extension of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond.

#### ACCEPTED BY THE CITY.

Became a law April 23, 1900, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, a majority being present. The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for the comptroller of the city of New York, in his discretion, to provide for the extension of all or any part of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, as the same may from time to time mature. Certificates of stock or bonds so extended shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding three and one-half per centum per annum, and shall be stamped across their face with the terms of such extension, which shall be for a period not exceeding twenty years.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately. Proposals will be received by the Comptroller at his office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, from the holders of six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, for extending the maturity of all or any part of the respective amounts of such stock held by them to the following dates:

JULY 1, 1917,  
JULY 1, 1918,  
JULY 1, 1919,  
JULY 1, 1920, and  
JULY 1, 1921.

Stock so extended will be payable in gold and will bear interest from July 1, 1900, at the rate of three and one-tenth (3 1/10) per cent. per annum, payable, also in gold, semi-annually, on the first day of January and of July in each year. The Comptroller proposes to apportion the amount of stock thus extended so that, as nearly as practicable, one-fifth of the whole amount extended shall be redeemable at each of the five maturity dates above mentioned. Preference will, as far as possible, be given to the proposals received according to priority in the date of their receipt, the proposals first received being entitled to the privilege of the longest extension period, unless such proposal shall indicate a preference for the shorter terms. The stock which is to be extended in accordance with the terms of this circular must be delivered to the Comptroller upon demand, when the certificates will be stamped across their face with the terms of the extension, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, provided, however, that such stock now outstanding in coupon form when presented for extension will be extended in the form of registered stock. Thereafter transfers may be made of such stock on the books of the Corporation in accordance with the general provisions of law and the rules of the Department of Finance in regard thereto.
