Compared with the preceding quarter the present quarter shows a relative increase of structural orders, such as placing new skylights, scuttles, providing glass panels in hall doors, cutting windows in dark interior rooms, providing water closets, removing school sinks, etc. Of the latter class of orders, 660 were issued during the present quarter as compared with 160 during the preceding quarter.

The work actually accomplished as shown by the following tabulation of separate items in dismissed violations, presents a similar increase over the preceding quarter in structural orders. Nearly 11,000 fire escapes were provided or repaired, as against 8,861 in the preceding quarter; 1,880 windows were cut into dark interior rooms as against 959 the preceding quarter, 648 school sinks were removed as compared with 272, and 4,240 new water closets were provided, as compared with 2,163.

This tabulation shows an increase of complaints with reference to uncleanly conditions, dampness, drainage, improper disposition of garbage and ashes, defective plumbing, defective or foul water closets, and an especially great increase in complaints as to water supply, over the preceding quarter. These increases are presumably due to the season of the year, as the period covers the summer months.

On the other hand, a decrease in complaints about chimneys, danger from fire, and lighting and ventilation of halls, is shown.

During the quarter 185 buildings were reported for vacation as against 241 in the preceding quarter.

A copy of a resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, September 13, 1906, authorizing the renewal of the lease of the premises Nos. 54 and 56 Water street, Stapleton, S. I., in the Borough of Richmond, for the use of the Department of Health, was received and ordered on file.

The proposed amendment to sections 68 and 69 of the Sanitary Code, was taken from the table, and on recommendation of the President, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That sections 68 and 69 of the Sanitary Code of the Department of Health, be and they are, hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 68. No person shall have, sell or offer for sale in The City of New York, any food which is adulterated or misbranded. The term food as herein used shall include every article of food and every beverage used by man, and all confectionery.

Food as herein defined shall be deemed adulterated:

- (a) If any substance or substances has or have been mixed and packed with it so as to reduce or lower or injuriously affect its quality or strength.
 (b) If any inferior or cheaper substances have been substituted wholly or in part for the article.
 (c) If any valuable constituent of the article has been wholly or in part abstracted.
 (d) If it consists wholly or in part of diseased or decomposed or putrid or rotten animal or vegetable substance, or any portion of any animal unfit for food, whether manufactured or not, or if it is a product of a diseased animal, or one that has died otherwise than by slaughter.
 (e) If it be colored or coated or polished or powdered, whereby damage is concealed, or it is made to appear better than it really is.

(f) If it contains any added poisonous ingredient, or any ingredient which may render such article injurious to health; or if it contains any antiseptic or preservative not evident and not known to the purchaser or consumer.

(g) If in the case of confectionery, it contains terra alba, barytes, talc, chrome yellow, or other mineral substance or poisonous color or flavor, or other ingredient deleterious or detrimental to health; or any vinous, malt or spirituous liquor or compound or narcotic drug.

(h) If in the case of spirituous, fermented and malt liquors, they contain any substance or ingredient not normal or healthful to exist in such liquors, or which may be deleterious or detrimental to health when such liquors are used as beverages.

Food shall be deemed misbranded:

(a) If it be an imitation or offered for sale under the distinctive name of another article.

(b) If it be labeled or branded so as to deceive or mislead the purchaser, or purport to be a foreign product when not so; or if the contents of the package as originally put up shall have been removed in whole or in part and other contents shall have been placed in such package; or if it fails to bear a statement on the label of the quantity or proportion of any morphine, opium, cocaine, heroin, chloroform, cannabis indica, chloral hydrate or acetanilid, or any derivative or preparation of any such substances contained therein.

(c) If in package form and the contents are stated in terms of weight or measure, they are not plainly and correctly stated on the outside of the package.

(d) If the package or its label shall bear any statement, design or device regarding the ingredients or the substances contained therein, which statement, design or device shall be false or misleading in any particular; provided, that an article of food which does not contain any added poisonous or deleterious ingredients shall not be deemed to be adulterated or misbranded in the following cases:

First—In the case of mixtures or compounds which may be now or from time to time hereafter known as articles of food, under their own distinctive names, and not an imitation of or offered for sale under the distinctive name of another article, if the name be accompanied on the same label or brand with a statement of the place where said article has been manufactured or produced.

Second—In the case of articles labeled, branded, or tagged so as to plainly indicate that they are compounds, imitations, or blends, and the word "compound," "imitation," or "blend," as the case may be, is plainly stated on the package in which it is offered for sale. Provided, That the term blend as herein used shall be construed to mean a mixture of like substances, not excluding harmless coloring or flavoring ingredients used for the purpose of coloring and flavoring only: And provided further, That nothing in this section shall be construed as requiring or compelling proprietors or manufacturers of proprietary foods which contain no unwholesome added ingredient to disclose their trade formulas, except in so far as the provisions of this section may require to secure freedom from adulteration or misbranding.

Section 60. No person shall manufacture or produce or have, sell, or offer for sale in The City of New York any drug which is adulterated or misbranded. The term drug as herein used shall include all medicines for external or internal use, or both.

Drugs as herein defined shall be deemed adulterated:

(a) If when sold by or under a name recognized in the United States pharmacopœia or National formulary, it differs from the standard of strength, quality or purity as determined by the test laid down in the United States pharmacopœia or National formulary official at the time of investigation: Provided, That no drug defined in the United States pharmacopœia or National formulary shall be deemed to be adulterated under this provision if the standard of strength, quality, or purity be plainly stated upon the bottle, box, or other container thereof, although the standard may differ from that determined by the test laid down in the United States pharmacopœia or National formulary.

(b) If its strength or purity falls below the professed standard under which it is sold.

A drug shall be deemed misbranded:

(a) If it be an imitation or offered for sale under the distinctive name of another article.

(b) If the contents of the package as originally put up shall have been removed, in whole or in part, and other contents shall have been placed in such package, or if the package fails to bear a statement on the label of the quantity or proportion of any alcohol, morphine, opium, cocaine, heroin, chloroform, cannabis indica, chloral hydrate, or acetanilid, or any derivative or preparation of any such substances contained therein.

Whereas, The said lands and premises are urgently required for school purposes, and title thereto should be acquired at as early a date as possible; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to adopt a resolution, in accordance with the provisions of section 1,439 of the Revised Charter, as amended, directing that title to said lands and premises and all interest therein, vest in The City of New York ten days after the passage of such resolution.

Whereas, The property on Orchard and Munson streets and East river, Long Island City, which has been acquired as a site for an athletic field, includes the premises occupied by the Hell Gate Light Station; and

Whereas, The Light-House Establishment desires to lease the same from The City of New York; and

Whereas, The matter of such a lease is within the jurisdiction of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Education hereby turns over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that portion of the above-mentioned premises acquired for the purposes of an athletic field for the Department of Education, which is occupied by the Hell Gate Light Station, for such disposition as said Commissioners may deem advisable.

On motion, all absent members were excused for non-attendance at this meeting.

On motion, the Board adjourned at 6 o'clock p. m.

MINUTES, BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK, NOVEMBER 16, 1906.

RAPID TRANSIT RAILWAY.

Brooklyn Bridge and Fulton Street Connection (Borough of Brooklyn).

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York, transmitting resolutions as to route and general plans of a rapid transit railway along Washington, Tillary and other streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and known as "Brooklyn Bridge and Fulton Street Connection (Borough of Brooklyn)," and requesting the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

BOARD OF RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS,
No. 320 BROADWAY, NEW YORK.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

The Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York was heretofore duly organized pursuant to chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891, as amended, and since such organization it has conducted the inquests and investigations necessary to determine whether it is for the interest of the public and of the City that a rapid transit railway or railways for the conveyance of persons and property should be established therein; and after such inquests and investigations has duly determined by resolutions adopted the 18th day of October, 1906, by the concurrent vote of six of its members that a certain rapid transit railway hereinafter described, in addition to any already existing, authorized or proposed, is necessary for the interest of the public and the City, and has duly determined and established the route thereof and the general plans of construction, and it herewith transmits to your honorable body certified copies of the route and general plans so determined and established.

The rapid transit railway herein referred to consists of a short connection between the bridge tracks upon the Brooklyn Bridge and the subways which will be constructed or which are now constructing in Fulton street, Brooklyn. These subways are designed to reach the Borough of Manhattan by a series of tunnels under the East river. The railway now proposed is intended to enable these subways to make physical connection with the bridge tracks.

The railway now proposed is only about eighteen hundred feet in length, of which about one-half is within the storage yard of the Brooklyn Bridge and one-half in Washington street. It will begin at a suitable point near the southwesterly corner of Washington street and Nassau street within the storage yard, at which a connection can conveniently be made with the bridge tracks. From thence the proposed railway will run southerly, descending through the bridge storage yard parallel with Washington street, and will then pass under Tillary street and private property into Washington street and through Washington street to Fulton street. Where it crosses Concord street, the railway tracks will be approximately at the street level, and it will therefore be necessary to close Concord street, between Washington and Liberty streets for a distance of 50 feet or less.

If the railway now proposed shall meet with the approval of your Board and the Mayor, it will enable the City to contract for the construction of a subway system in the boroughs of Brooklyn and Manhattan, which shall utilize all the bridges, as well as the proposed tunnels under the East river.

For these reasons, the consent and approval of your Board to the route and general plans herewith transmitted is respectfully requested.

BROOKLYN BRIDGE AND FULTON STREET CONNECTION (BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN).

Whereas, The Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York has determined that a rapid transit railway or railways for the conveyance and transportation of persons and property in addition to those already existing authorized or proposed are necessary for the interest of the public and of The City of New York, and should be established therein as hereinafter provided; and

Whereas, This Board has duly made the inquest and investigation necessary or proper in the premises and all such inquests and investigations as are necessary or proper for such determination:

Now, therefore, This Board by the concurrent votes of at least six members does hereby adopt the following route or routes for an additional rapid transit railway or railways in The City of New York, and does hereby determine and establish the said additional route or routes thereof as follows, and does hereby adopt a general plan of construction of the said railway or railways, the route or routes of which are herein provided, and does in such general plan hereby adopted show the general mode of operation and such details as to manner of construction as may be necessary to show the extent to which any street, avenue or other public place is to be encroached upon and the property abutting thereon affected.

Route.

A route lying wholly within the Borough of Brooklyn, the centre line of which shall begin at a suitable point near the southwesterly corner of Washington street and Nassau street within the storage yard of the Brooklyn Bridge at which a connection can conveniently be made with the railroad tracks leading from the said yard to and across the said bridge; running thence southerly through the said bridge storage yard parallel with Washington street or nearly so and descending from the level of the said bridge tracks to a point in the northerly side of Tillary street westerly from and near its intersection with the westerly side of Washington street; thence passing under and across Tillary street to a point at or near the intersection of the southerly side of Tillary street with the westerly side of Washington street; thence running southerly under private property to Washington street and under Washington street to a point or points in Fulton street southerly and easterly from its intersection with Myrtle avenue at which a suitable connection or suitable connections can be made either with the subway now under construction which passes through Joralemon street and Fulton street, or else with a subway to be hereafter constructed pursuant to the route and general plans adopted by this Board on May 25, 1905, which provide for a rapid transit railway running through Willoughby street, Fulton street and other streets in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Plan of Construction.

The general plan of construction hereby adopted is as follows:

For the whole of the route above described there shall be two tracks.

The above mentioned tracks shall be substantially parallel with each other and on substantially the same level except that near the intersection of Washington street with Willoughby street and Fulton street the tracks shall be at such levels and on such alignments as to permit of proper connections with the other subways above mentioned; and except also that wherever else required by special necessities of surface or subsurface structures or other special or local necessities, or for the purpose of avoiding grade crossings, any one or more of the tracks may be elevated above or depressed below the other track or tracks so far as may be necessary.

The tracks shall be placed in tunnels or subways, except that from the point of junction with the bridge railroad tracks to the point where the said tracks pass into and under Washington street, the tracks hereby authorized to be laid shall be upon a descending grade passing through and under the bridge storage yards partly through an open cut below the said storage yard and partly upon a viaduct or elevated structure. Where the said tracks cross the centre line of Concord street they will be approximately at the present level of the said street and in order to avoid a grade crossing it will be necessary to close Concord street between the westerly side or line of Washington street and a point not exceeding fifty feet westerly therefrom and between Washington and Liberty streets.

The tracks shall be placed in general under the central part of the longitudinal streets forming a portion of the route above described so far as may be practicable and convenient; but wherever required by special or local necessities or for curves the tracks or any one or more of them may be diverted as far as necessary to one side or the other of such streets or any of them, and any part of the said streets may be occupied so far as the purposes of this general plan require.

Wherever necessary for the proper support of the surface of a street the roof of the tunnels shall be of iron or steel, with brick or concrete arches, supported, when necessary, by iron or steel or masonry columns and resting upon masonry walls; or the roof shall be a masonry structure, or the whole of the lining may be of metal.

The roof of the tunnels when under a street shall be as near the surface as street conditions and grades will conveniently permit.

The tunnels shall in no case be less than thirteen feet in height in the clear.

There shall be a width in the tunnels not exceeding fifteen feet for each track in addition to the thickness of the supporting walls, except that at stations, switches, turnouts, curves and crossovers the width may be increased.

The tracks shall be of standard gauge, that is to say, of the width of four feet and eight and a half inches between the rails.

Adjacent tracks shall be connected by necessary and suitable switches and connections, and an additional track for siding accommodations may be constructed not to exceed in length one-quarter of a mile for each mile of roadway.

The tracks, wherever constructed below the surface, may at any point of the route be placed in the same tunnel; or there may be separate tunnels for one or more tracks, as shall be most convenient.

If any station is built on the route herein described, such station and the necessary station approaches shall, in general, be at the intersections of streets and shall be built under, or, if the position of the tracks so require, over the streets and immediately adjoining private abutting property, or through private property to be acquired for the purpose, or both under or over streets and through private property as aforesaid. The streets under which stations or station approaches shall be built may include cross streets, but no part of any cross street shall be used for a station approach at a distance greater than seventy-five feet from the exterior line or side of the longitudinal street of the route.

Wherever along any part of the routes above described it shall be necessary for the proper maintenance or accommodation of pipes, wires, sewers or other subsurface structures the removal, construction or reconstruction of which shall be rendered necessary by the construction of the railway, the width of any tunnel or subway may be enlarged on either or both sides by an additional width on each side of the route, not to exceed fifteen feet on either side, provided always that the limits hereinbefore provided as to the longitudinal streets of the route shall be observed. All or any pipes, wires, sewers or other subsurface structures may be placed in suitable galleries to be constructed within the additional widths hereinbefore permitted. At each cross street where accommodation for pipes, wires, sewers and other subsurface structures shall be those provided within the tunnels or subways, such tunnels or subways, in order to provide convenient access to the same, may have, within the limit of the sides or exterior lines of such cross streets or such lines produced, an additional width on each side of the routes not to exceed fifteen feet.

Pipes, wires, sewers, street railway tracks, poles for electric wires and other surface and subsurface structures at any part of the said routes shall be removed or disturbed only when necessary for the construction and operation of the railway above referred to, and if removed or disturbed shall be placed over, upon or under the several streets in such manner and in such location that the use and service thereof shall not be impaired. All pipes, wires, sewers and other subsurface structures shall be left or shall be so arranged as to give free access for their repair or alteration, or for the placing with them, so far as there may be space, of new pipes, wires, sewers and other like structures, and for making connections between the same and abutting buildings at any time.

The manner of construction shall be by tunnelling or open excavation.

Mode of Operation.

The general mode of operation of the route or routes above described shall be by electricity or some other power not requiring combustion within the tunnels, and the motors shall be capable of moving trains at a speed of not less than forty miles per hour for long distances, exclusive of stops.

Definitions.

The word "street" wherever used herein shall include an avenue or public place.

The words "Rapid Transit Act" wherever used herein shall be taken and held to mean chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891, entitled "An Act to provide for Rapid Transit railroads in cities of over one million inhabitants," as amended by chapter 752 of the Laws of 1894 and other acts of the Legislature.

Maps and Drawings.

It is further Resolved, That the map and profile entitled "Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners of The City of New York—Routes and General Plan, Brooklyn No. 5, sheet No. 1," be and it is hereby adopted as showing the foregoing route and general plan, for convenience merely, and that said map and profile is not to be deemed a part of the description of the route or a part of the general plan, for any purpose whatever.

I certify that the above are true copies of resolutions adopted by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners at its meeting held on the first day of November, 1906, six Commissioners being present and all voting in favor thereof.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

New York, September 19, 1906.

The following communications were received, action being taken thereon as noted, to wit:

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission (69346)—Submitting the name of August Brand as being eligible for appointment to the position of Dock Laborer. Brand appointed, with compensation at the rate of 34 1/4 cents per hour while employed.

From the President of the Borough of Brooklyn (69308)—Transmitting communication from Charles A. Webber, President of the Sixth, Tenth and Twelfth Wards Board of Trade of Brooklyn, requesting to be advised as to the prospects of securing a recreation pier at Hamilton Ferry, Brooklyn. Advised that the Department has in contemplation such a large amount of commercial improvements it is not likely that the acquisition of the necessary private property at Hamilton avenue will be undertaken for some time, but that negotiations are under way for the placing of a recreation structure around the Brooklyn Bridge towers, which it is hoped will be carried into effect within a short time.

From Jacob Solomon (69212)—Demanding to know why an annual rental of \$450 should be extorted from him for his bathing house privilege between One Hundred and Fifty-seventh and One Hundred and Fifty-eighth streets, North river, covering an area of water front not one-third that which is occupied by the Washington Heights Baths, for which a rental of but \$300 per annum is charged; complaining that the Department of Health closed his baths for the better part of the season for alleged impurities of the water; and demanding a remittance of the rental for the period during which it was closed; and threatening, in the event of a denial of his demands, to start an investigation. Notified that questions concerning the Department of Health should be taken up with that Department; that the rental in question has been paid by Solomon for a number of years; that the comparison of his privileges with those of the Washington Heights Baths is not one justifiable by the facts, and that the implied threat renders a further consideration of his communication impossible.

From the A. S. Cameron Steam Pump Works (69255)—Asking whether the Department can make arrangements to have its pump included in the specifications for the ferryboats for the Thirty-ninth Street, Brooklyn, Ferry. Advised that it is impossible for the City to specifically prefer the "Cameron" pump, and that detail matters of this kind are entirely in the hands of the architect and engineer retained by the City for the designing of the boats, to whom the firm is referred.

From the New York Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor (69208)—Asking whether the Department can make arrangements on behalf of the association to keep a census of the babies, children, adult women and adult men, on different days of the week during the summer, visiting the recreation piers. Advised that it is impossible to keep an accurate record of the number of people entering and leaving the recreation piers each day and that as such a record would be of little practical value, it would not warrant special effort or expense on the part of the Department.

Advising that they have been running their West Shore ferryboats to and from the Desbrosses Street Station of the Pennsylvania Railroad since September 8, 1906, pending repairs to the ferry rack on the south side of Franklin Street Pier 23, North river, and that it may be possible for them to negotiate with the Pennsylvania Railroad Company for the use of the Desbrosses Street Ferry Station until such time as the latter company rebuilds its Cortlandt Street Ferry Station, at which time the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company will run its downtown ferries between Weehawken and Cortlandt street. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
