This might be justified under some special circumstances, but as a practice would encourage evasion of responsibility and a return to old time iniquitous methods of supervising public work by utility corporations.

Commissioner of Street Cleaning—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$650,000, to Cover an Estimated Deficit in the Account Entitled "General Plant Service, 2388, Final Disposition," for the Year 1918.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Sir—I respectfully request that your honorable Board, pursuant to the provisions of section 188, subdivision 8, of the Greater New York Charter, authorize an issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of six hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$650,000), to provide an estimated deficit in the account entitled General Plant Service, 2388, Final Disposition, caused by the failure of the firm of Messrs. Dailey & Ivens to carry out the provisions of the contract with this Department for the disposal of ashes, street sweepings and rubbish in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, for the year 1918.

Department of Health—Request for Authority to Purchase Forage Without Public Letting. Amount, \$2,461.10.

October 22, 1918.

Mr. P. J. SCULLY, City Clerk, Municipal Building, City of New York:

Dear Sir—On August 13, 1918, bids were opened by the Central Purchase Committee, for the delivery of forage to the various City departments, including deliveries to the Municipal Sanatorium, Otisville, Orange County, N. Y.

The award, in so far as deliveries to Otisville were concerned, was made by this Department on or about August 15th. The Police Department, who was a co-contractor with the Department of Health on this contract, had no funds to which their share of the contract could be applied. These bids, however, were not finally rejected by the Central Purchase Committee until October 8th. In the meantime, the Department of Health had to purchase forage to maintain the animals at Otisville, which, together with the quantities required for the balance of the month of October, will amount to twenty-four hundred and sixty-one dollars and ten cents (\$2,461.10), to be purchased on open market orders.

The Department of Health hereby respectfully requests the Board of Aldermen to authorize the purchase of this forage to the amount stated above, without public letting. Very truly yours,

President, Borough of Brooklyn—Request for Authority to Purchase Coal for Use During the Period from November 1, 1918, to April 30, 1919, Without Public Letting.

Hon. Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Gentlemen—Owing to the conditions prevailing in the coal market at present, I would request that your honorable Board adopt the following resolution which extends the resolution at present in effect, permitting us to purchase coal without public letting, up to and including October 31, 1918.

"Resolved, That, acting in pursuance of section 419 of the Charter, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn is hereby authorized to purchase without public letting, such coal as may be necessary for use during the period from November 1, 1918, to April 30, 1919."

Dear Sir—Permission is hereby requested to purchase by open market order, without public letting, about 3,000 cubic yards of asphaltic wearing surface sand, at an estimated cost not to exceed \$3,000.

The material is required in the production of asphalt mixture to be used in the repair of asphalt pavements.

The department is unable to enter into a contract on account of the market conditions and Government restrictions, which have not changed since the last exemption was granted under date of June 4, 1918.

Central Purchase Committee—Request for Authority to Purchase Coal for Use of Various Departments During the First Three Months of 1919, Without Public Letting.

City of New York, Central Purchase Committee, Municipal Building, October 26, 1918.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen, City Hall, N. Y.:

Gentlemen—Permission is hereby requested to purchase coal in the open market, without public letting, for the first three months of 1919 for the following departments:

Armory Board, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, Department of Correction, Department of Docks and Ferries, Fire Department, Department of Health, Department of Parks, Manhattan and Richmond; Department of Parks, Bronx; Department of Parks, Brooklyn; Department of Parks, Queens; Department of Plant and Structures, Police Department, Department of Public Charities, Department of Street Cleaning, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

The reason for this request is that the condition of the coal market at the present time is the same as in April and May of this year, when efforts were made by the Central Purchase Committee to obtain competitive bids for all of the above departments, with the result that bids were received on but few of the items requested, and these bids ranged from \$1 to \$1.50 per ton higher than the open market prices prevailing at that time. The reasons for these high prices and lack of bids were the uncertainties on both prices and quantities of coal available to the New York Market. The coal prices are subject to Federal Government regulation and are liable to frequent changes, hence the dealers would not bind themselves to long term prices. An example of this change in prices is the 25 per cent. advance in freight rates which became effective near the end of June last, and which caused coal prices to rise from 35 to 45 cents per ton.

The Central Purchase Committee has, for the past several months, been receiving quotations from various wholesale coal dealers who have been supplying the City departments heretofore, and whose bids were for immediate delivery on coal which they had at their disposal. The departments were consulted on these bids and the purchases recommended if the coal was satisfactory and the prices reasonable. These prices are reviewed in the Fuel Administrator's office by the Finance Department Inspectors.

All the anthracite coal coming into the New York market is classified as either company coal or individual coal; the former being coal that is mined by the large railroad companies, and the latter by the small individual mine operators who are obliged to ship their coal over the same railroads that produce and transport the so-called company coal. Of the domestic sizes, about 95 per cent. of the coal coming to this port is company coal, and about 5 per cent. individual coal. Of the steam sizes, about 90 per cent. is company coal and about 10 per cent. is individual coal. Due to the difference in transportation charges, Federal regulation has established different prices to the mine operators for coals from these two sources. All the city coal dealers are allotted certain limited tonnages of the different coals, based on their 1916 tonnages. The prices to the dealers are fixed by Government regulations, but are subject to frequent changes, the dealers being allowed only a small profit.

As the City is receiving both company and individual coal, and as the prices of both of these are subject to change, it is impossible to estimate with any degree of accuracy the total cost of the fuel requirements for the first quarter of 1919.

From the above facts your Honorable Board can readily see the difficulty we have in contracting for coal and as you have granted permission for purchasing coal in the open market for the past nine months, I trust you can grant the above request for the first quarter of 1919. Very truly yours,

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the Commissioner of Public Markets:

No. 882.

Commissioner of Markets—Statement in Relation to Supply of Food and Fuel. Subject of No. 870—Minutes of October 22, 1918.

Department of Public Markets, The City of New York, Municipal Building, New York, October 26, 1918.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—There was a resolution passed by your Honorable Board on Tuesday, October 22, requesting the Commissioner of Public Markets to appear before your body and make a statement as to

1. What definite assurance can the Commissioner give to the inhabitants of New York as to a supply of coal suitable for domestic use in time for the fast approaching winter?"

This was referred to the Committee on Markets, and, at the invitation of the Committee on Markets, I met them on Thursday, October 24, 1918, and had a conference with them. I informed that Committee that the matter of food and fuel was no longer in the Department of Markets, since, by action of the Board of Aldermen in the month of July, the Mayor's War Board of Food and Fuel Control, appointed by the Mayor, was named as the agency to succeed the Commissioner of Markets, and that action became effective August 1st. Hence the matter of food and fuel no longer legitimately belongs in the Department of Public Markets nor was it a matter that logically belonged to the Committee on Markets.

However, the Commissioner desires to say to the Board of Aldermen that he has no objection to appearing before the Board of Aldermen or to answering any questions apropos to food and fuel, so far as he has had and now has, as a member of the Mayor's War Board, anything to do with it. Unfortunately, the date that the Board of Aldermen requests the Commissioner of Public Markets to be present, the Commissioner expects to be out of the City. A full statement was made to the Committee on Markets about the situation, but I would briefly summarize it in this written communication.

1. In regard to coal, the City was given the power to buy fuel and sell the same to the inhabitants of the City by the State Food Commission of the State of New York. The State Food Commission, however, is subordinate to the Federal Fuel Administrator. Pursuant to the power given to the City and by the City conferred upon me as Commissioner of Public Markets, I made a contract for coal and submitted the contract to the Fuel Administration. At the time the contract was submitted, there was no State Fuel Administrator. Subsequent thereto, Mr. Delos W. Cooke was made State Fuel Administrator for the State of New York. Mr. Cooke was of the opinion that the City should not in any large way go into the distribution of coal. The City had a number of offers of domestic coal which might have been distributed to inhabitants of the City through the Mayor's War Board of Food and Fuel Control, but the Fuel Administration asked us to desist from further contracts to procure an additional coal supply, since they were developing plans for the distribution of domestic coal, to the tenement districts particularly.

However, the Fuel Administration was willing for the City to distribute a limited amount of coal, and, in case the amount was not too large, whatever coal we could get from the DeJulio Company, with whom the Commissioner of Markets made a contract for coal. It does not look now as though it would be very large. The

DeJulio Company has shipped some coal, but most of the coal that has arrived is peat coal and very few tons of it have been accepted by consumers. The DeJulio Company is working two banks of coal in Schuylkill County, Pennsylvania. The City has exclusive option and right to the domestic sizes of these banks. Two portable washers and screeners have been installed and coal is being loaded daily, and, perhaps, by this time coal has actually been shipped in domestic sizes from these banks.

The DeJulio Company represents that it should come at the rate of from two to four hundred tons a day. The only assurance, therefore, that the Commissioner of Markets, as Chairman of the Mayor's War Board, could offer to the people who have placed applications for coal is to fill those orders as rapidly as the coal arrives. The Commissioner is aware that this is indefinite. However, with 25,000 tons of domestic sizes being distributed by the regular coal dealers, under the auspices of the Fuel Administrator, it ought to be possible for any who have placed their orders with the City to procure coal and at very reasonable prices.

This is not a criticism of the Fuel Administration nor an apology for the Mayor's War Board. It is a statement of the coal situation as it actually exists.

In regard to eggs.

"2. In view of the extraordinarily high price for eggs in the prevailing market, why does not the Commissioner put upon the market the whole or some material portion of the eggs which he put in storage for the purpose of holding down retail prices?"

The eggs which are now in storage may be distributed gradually or in quantities if they will assist people in procuring eggs in any section of the city at cheaper prices. The eggs sold by the Department of Markets in the early spring brought prices down considerably in various sections of the city. The Federal Food Board and the Food Council of Greater New York, of which the Commissioner of Markets is Chairman, are working together diligently in an attempt to regulate prices.

The Board of Aldermen, of course, are aware that, owing to the delay in appropriations last spring for the purchase of eggs for storage purposes, a very limited amount of eggs were actually stored; less than \$100,000 worth, in fact, being placed in storage. These, however, are ready for distribution and will be distributed at very much less prices than those being generally charged for eggs.

In this connection the Commissioner of Public Markets would like to call the attention of the members of the Board of Aldermen to the fact that buying and selling food and fuel has nothing to do with the Department of Markets, but was temporarily assigned to the Department of Markets. The Department of Markets was organized under the law creating the Council of Farms and Markets of the State of New York. The purchase and sale of food and fuel by the City is carried on under the law creating the State Food Commission of the State of New York.

An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 14, Article 11, of the Code of Ordinances by Adding Thereto Additional Sections to Be Known as Section No. 148.

City of New York, Police Department, New York, October 28, 1918.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

My Dear Mr. President—At the direction of Special Deputy Police Commissioner John A. Harriss, in charge of traffic, and in accordance with an understanding had with Mr. Martin, Ordinance Clerk of the Board of Aldermen, this a. m., I have the honor to invite your attention to the attached drafts of proposed ordinances, which it is desired to have placed before your honorable body at an early date, for their consideration.

These proposed ordinances were submitted to the Board several months ago, and in looking up their present status it has been found that there is no previous record of their having been received or introduced by that body.

Be it Ordained that chapter 14, article 11, of the Code of Ordinances be amended by adding thereto an additional section, to be known as section 148, as follows:

Section 148. Every vehicle, other than a pleasure or licensed vehicle, shall at all times display, plainly marked on both sides in letters and numerals not less than 3 inches in height, the name and address of the owner thereof.

No. 885 (Ord. No. 96).

An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 24, Article 3 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Traffic Regulations, by Adding Thereto Additional Sections to Be Known as Sections 42, 43 and 44.

Be it Ordained that chapter 24, article 3 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to traffic regulations, be amended by adding thereto additional sections, to be known as sections Nos. 42, 43 and 44, as follows:

Sec. 42. Pedestrians. No pedestrian while traversing any street, avenue or highway shall cross said street, avenue or highway, except at a regular street crossing,

or at designated points in the centre of blocks which are four hundred feet or more in length.

Sec. 43. Compliance With Police Directions. Pedestrians shall, at all times, comply with any direction by voice, hand or whistle, from any member of the Police Force as to starting or stopping.

Sec. 44. Enforcement of Chapter; Duties of Police Department. The Police Department shall have exclusive control of the management of pedestrian and vehicular traffic. The Police Commissioner shall cause suitable abstracts of the provisions of this chapter to be posted in all public places, stables and garages, and at all hack, cab and truck stands. He shall cause copies thereof to be kept at all police stations, to be issued to the public on application, without charge.

Commissioner of Street Cleaning—Request for Authority to Contract for Repair of Five Department Scows, Without Public Letting; Cost, \$29,435.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the Commissioner of Street Cleaning:

City of New York, Department of Street Cleaning, Office of the Commissioner, Municipal Building, New York City, October 28, 1918.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—In accordance with the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, I hereby request that the Board of Aldermen authorize the making of contracts for the repair of five (5) Department scows, without public letting, at a total expenditure of \$29,435.

The reason for this request is as follows:

On March 2, 1918, the firm of Dailey & Ivins, which had the contract with the City for the final disposition of ashes, street sweepings and rubbish in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, suddenly abandoned their contract and the work of disposal devolved upon this Department, which has since been unable to obtain another contract. Among the vessels which were used by Dailey & Ivins for the transportation of ashes and rubbish were 56 deck scows belonging to the City, which were turned over to them for their use by the terms of the said contract. When the Department recovered these vessels they were found to be very badly in need of repair. Most of them, however, needed only minor repairs, which were made directly by the Department itself. The condition of some of the other scows is such that they are useless at the present time. Five of them, known as Nos. 12, 7, 45, 13 and 18, cannot be used any longer without being put in proper condition. Most of the repairs necessary to these five vessels is due to wear and tear which occurred both before and since the abandonment of the contract by Dailey & Ivins. It is estimated that the cost of the repairs will be:

A total of \$29,435 00

The cost of these repairs is chargeable against the bond of the contractors.

The season when the output of ashes is heaviest is about to begin and the Department will need every available scow it owns, together with about 150 hired scows to handle the daily output of ashes and rubbish.

If bids for making these repairs were advertised, the Department would lose from four to six weeks' time, as contracts, specifications and plans would have to be prepared, printed, advertised for ten days and a contract let in the usual way. In the meanwhile the City would have to pay the sum of \$75 per day for the hire of five scows to replace those in question. It is urgent that they be put into service at the earliest possible time.

For the above reason the request is made for permission to make the repairs without public letting. Yours truly, A. B. MACSTAY, Commissioner.

An Ordinance in Relation to Sheltering or Housing of Soldiers, Sailors, Marines or Others in Uniform, in the War Service of the United States, While in The City of New York.

By the same—

AN ORDINANCE in relation to the sheltering or housing of soldiers, sailors, marines or others in uniform in the war service of the United States while in the City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

Section 1. No person, the owner or keeper of a hotel, lodging house, rooming house or kindred place in which refuge or shelter is afforded to people, shall allow any soldier, sailor, marine or other person in uniform in the war service of the United States to register as a guest or lodger, or harbor or house such person, unless such soldier, sailor, marine or other person in uniform in the service shall first display his furlough or other evidence of leave of absence, the day and hour of expiration of which shall be entered upon the register alongside of his name. In places where no public or other register is kept the owner or keeper of such a place shall make and keep a record of the name, day and hour of expiration of the furlough or other evidence of the leave of absence of any soldier, sailor, marine or other person in uniform in the service, harbored or sheltered, which record shall at all times be open to the inspection of the public authorities.

And no person, the owner or keeper of a place as herein described, shall harbor, keep or shelter any soldier, sailor, marine or other person in uniform in the service for any time beyond the day and hour of the expiration of the furlough or other evidence of leave of absence as indicated on the register or record kept as herein provided.

Sec. 2. Every violation of any of the provisions of section 1 of this ordinance shall subject the offender, upon conviction thereof before a magistrate, to a fine of \$25.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately and continue in force during the period of the war.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Dear Sir—I respectfully request that the Board of Aldermen pass a resolution authorizing the issuance of revenue bonds amounting to five thousand three hundred and twenty-eight dollars (\$5,328), pursuant to section 188, subdivision 8 of the Greater New York Charter, to cover the expense of hiring laborers to trim the vessels used for the disposal of garbage.

On October 2, 1918, the Metropolitan By-Products Company, Inc., which had a contract with the City for the final disposition of garbage in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn, notified this department that it would discontinue operations after said date, and it actually did so. In consequence, the work of disposing of the garbage has fallen upon this department directly, and it is using its own vessels to transport the garbage and dump it at sea. In order that these vessels will float upon an even keel it is necessary that the materials dumped upon them from the carts shall be trimmed, and in the emergency it has been necessary to hire labor for this purpose, consisting of eighteen (18) laborers at \$4 per day each. No funds are available for the purpose, because of the fact that the Metropolitan By-Products Co., Inc., was supposed to pay the City a revenue for the privilege of taking away this garbage, and all vessels used were furnished and trimmed by them and at their own expense.

The prompt disposal of garbage is necessary to preserve the public health, and the operation is a continuous one and cannot be interrupted without seriously affecting the public health. It is therefore requested that this application be acted upon at once.

The deficiencies in the appropriations are due primarily to the emergencies which have arisen in the hospitals of the department and the high costs prevailing at the present time.

The large deficit in the appropriation for fuel supplies is due to the high cost of coal and the fact that the department has placed in operation during the past year a new wing to Harlem, thereby actually doubling the size of the hospital, and opened the new building for the Out Patient Department at Gouverneur.

The need of replenishing certain appropriations of the department was included in our request of May 18, 1918, for special revenue bonds in the sum of \$238,550, which was allowed by the Board of Aldermen, and concurred in by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the extent of \$209,525. The Trustees under date of October 15th applied to that Board for the additional \$19,500, and at the same time informed the Board of Estimate of the application about to be made for a further issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$105,000 to meet the deficits in the appropriations, and also that the department would be glad to have the funds made available from any source, such as by transfer from balances in appropriations of other City departments or from such accrual funds as may be available.

I think that this suggestion would relieve the coal famine during the war.

AN ORDINANCE to amend chapter _____ of the Code of Ordinances by inserting therein a new section to promote the health and efficiency of Firemen in the Fire Department of The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Chapter _____ of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by inserting therein a new section to be known and styled as follows:

Section 1. On and after the first day of May, 1918, the commissioner or other head of the Fire Department of The City of New York shall divide the officers and members of companies of such uniformed fire force into two bodies or platoons, one to perform day service and the other to perform night service. The hours of day service shall not exceed ten, commencing at eight o'clock in the morning; the hours of night service shall not exceed fourteen, commencing at six o'clock in the afternoon; except that in cases of fire at relieving time, riot, serious conflagration or other such emergency, the fire commissioner or other head of the fire department or the officer in charge at any fire shall have full power to assign all of said members of said force to continuous duty, if necessary. No members of either of said platoons shall be required to perform continuous day service or continuous night service for a longer consecutive period than one week, nor be kept on duty continuously longer than ten hours in the day platoon or fourteen hours in the night platoon, except as may be necessary to equalize the hours of duty and service, and also except in case of fires at relieving time, riot, serious conflagration or other emergency as above provided.

Section 2. The Commissioner of the Fire Department, the chief of the Fire Department, or other officer having the control or direction of the uniformed force of the Fire Department of The City of New York, or any officer of the uniformed force who shall violate any of the provisions of this article shall be punished by a fine of not less than fifty dollars or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Provided, however, that the term "passenger" shall not include, or be construed to include, any officer, agent or employee of such elevated railroad, or any public officer or public employee, whose duties may require the riding on any such rear platform. Any person who shall violate any provision of this section shall, upon conviction therefor, be punished by a fine of not more than \$10, or by imprisonment for not exceeding 10 days or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Dear Sir—On August 20 I called at your office to protest against the mistake that had been made in requiring medical massage practitioners to pass the same examinations and pay the same license as per Ordinance No. 77, Approved Paper No. 531, article 15, entitled *Massage, Institutes and Operators*.

Medical massage is recognized as a valuable aid to the practicing physician and surgeon, and is just as valuable as nursing, electricity and other legitimate medical aids. We are specialists, and have no connection with massage parlors, institutes or Turkish baths.

Secondly, the very law, requirements, (B) while it was necessary for the operator to have references from two respectable physicians, was immediately nullified by clause (2), reading "or five reputable citizens," etc.

What does the average citizen know of the requisites of a qualified massage operator?

If the Mayor's commission was still in existence perhaps they might be able to throw a little light on this subject. Very few, if any, of the massage parlors are run by people who have any knowledge at all regarding massage of the anatomy of the human body, let alone pathology, physiology, etc. The same can be proved of the Turkish baths. Even the schools are in many cases just money making machines.

When the Commissioner of Licenses said that we, the medical massage practitioners, wanted to make it impossible for any one, except those who have graduated from certain schools, to practice massage, I said, "Yes," and I still say no one should be allowed to practice medical massage who has not been properly trained. He said: "But those who have been making their living don't want to be deprived of their livelihood." But I ask you if you break your leg are you going to the best carpenter that you know to have him set it just because he needs bread and butter for himself and family? Or if you have appendicitis will you get your butcher to cut out your appendix? One is as reasonable as the other.

Of course if the City finds it necessary to license bowling alleys, dirt carts, hand organs, junk dealers, street musicians, etc., together with massage parlors and other disreputable means of earning a livelihood by some people, that is the City's business and duty, but please can't we be exempted from the above class, and if need be pay our licenses under an other article or law, whereby we may be respected at least while we are trying to help mankind as well as trying to earn our living?

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 20, article 2, chapter 12 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "fires and fire prevention," and in particular to "fire-alarm and fire-extinguishing appliances."

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 20 of article 2 of chapter 12 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "fires and fire prevention," and in particular to "fire-alarm and fire-extinguishing appliances," is hereby amended to read as follows:

§20. Fire-alarm and fire-extinguishing appliances.

The owners and proprietors of all manufactories, hotels, tenement-houses, apartment houses, office buildings, boarding and lodging-houses, warehouses, stores and offices, theatres and music halls, and the authorities or persons having charge of all hospitals and asylums, and of the public schools and other public buildings, churches and other places where large numbers of persons are congregated for purposes of worship, instruction or amusement, and all piers, bulkheads, wharves, pier sheds, bulkhead sheds or other water-front structures, shall provide such means of communicating alarms of fire, accident or danger to the police and fire departments, respectively, as the fire commissioner or the police commissioner may prescribe, and shall also provide such fire hose, fire extinguishers, buckets, axes, fire hooks, fire doors and other means of preventing and extinguishing fires as the fire commissioner may direct. (Ord., effective Jan. 1, 1912.)

Dear Sir—A comparatively recent decision of the Supreme Court of Illinois (People vs. Thompson, 119 N. E. 41), indicates the method by which the Board of Aldermen of this City can free it of the scandalous profiteering in theatre tickets of which both residents of this City and those who come to visit it are the victims.

Ever since 1885 it has been the opinion of successive Corporation Counsels that it was unconstitutional and beyond the power of the municipal legislature to regulate the price of admission to theatres. For that opinion certain cases have been cited again and again, namely, Collister vs. Hayman, 183 N. Y. 250; ex parte Quarg, 84 Pac. Rep. 766, and People vs. Steel, 231 Ill. 340.

The bugaboo of these cases has been the means of blocking every effort to prevent the owners of theatres and ticket scalpers or ticket brokers, who usually are their confederates, from imposing upon the public.

An ordinance adopted in Chicago provides that every ticket of admission to a theatre shall have printed upon its face the price thereof and that no person who holds a license to conduct a theatre and no officer, manager or employee of any licensee shall directly or indirectly receive any consideration, of any nature whatsoever, upon the sale of any such ticket beyond or in excess of the price designated thereon, or directly or indirectly enter into any arrangement or agreement for the receipt of such consideration.

In attacking the validity of that ordinance Chicago lawyers of national eminence invoked the aid of the decisions which I have mentioned. But the highest court of Illinois sustained the ordinance and showed how these cases have no application. The substance of the view of the court is expressed in the following sentence quoted from its opinion:

"Witnessing a theatrical performance is not one of the necessities of life, but that affords no reason why the legislative power should not be exercised to prevent misrepresentation and fraud in the sale of theatre tickets by the theatre owners themselves and to require fair and impartial treatment of the public."

In view of this decision the Citizens Union urges the adoption by your Board of an ordinance substantially similar to the one adopted in Chicago. Yours very truly,

Report of the Committee on Markets of the Board of Aldermen in Favor of Adopting Resolution Requesting the Commissioner of Markets to Appear Before the Board.

The Committee on Markets, to which was referred on October 22, 1918 (Minutes, page 59), the annexed resolution in favor of requesting the Commissioner of Markets to appear before the Board of Aldermen, and a direction that report thereon be made at the next meeting, respectfully.

REPORTS:

That the Committee met for consideration of this resolution, the Commissioner, Mr. Day, present. Under discussion of the subject matter Mr. Day stated that he thought a personal appearance before the Board needless; he failed to see what purpose could be served thereby and volunteered to submit a written statement of all information of the matters at his command. To the latter the Committee assented.

Further, he pleaded inability to be present on October 29th, because of engagements made, which, if kept, would find him at some distance from the city. However, if it was insisted that he appear in person on a later day such course would be agreeable.

The Committee therefore recommends the elimination from the resolution of the date of October 29th and the substitution of the words "the next subsequent meeting of the Board," and, as so changed, recommends the adoption of the resolution.

9. At what time, in what manner and at what price do you intend to offer for sale the whole or any material portion of the stock of eggs which you purchased several months ago, with the intent of combating any unreasonable rise of retail prices?

10. What investigations have been conducted by the Bureau of Production under control of the First Deputy Commissioner and, pursuant to the purpose of this Bureau, as described by you at the time the Board of Aldermen granted you the necessary funds for its creation?

11. What steps has the Bureau of Physical Plant taken towards the location and erection of terminal market structures, as proposed by you at the same time?

12. What comprehensive plans for food and fuel distribution have been developed by the Bureau of Distribution, as originally proposed by you, and what "close intensive studies" have been made into "local and sectional conditions" to that end?

Sir—In accordance with the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, I hereby request that the Board of Aldermen authorize the making of certain necessary repairs to department dumping scow No. 5, without public letting, at an expense not to exceed \$2,241.42.

On March 2, 1918, the firm of Dailey and Ivens, which had the contract with the City for the disposal of ashes, street sweepings and rubbish in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, abandoned their contract and the City was unable to obtain another contractor to complete the same, and in consequence this work fell upon this department, which has continued it ever since. In order to do so it was necessary to purchase certain of the plant owned by Dailey and Ivens, consisting of seven sea dumping scows used for the purpose of transporting ashes and dumping them at sea. These vessels dispose of the materials by means of a mechanism which opens the gates in the bottoms of their hulls, permitting the refuse to be deposited into the sea directly. On one of these vessels, known as No. 5, one of the gates was found to be broken and in want of repair, but in order to ascertain the extent of such repairs it was necessary to place it in drydock. Investigation then revealed that it needed several other repairs, including caulking.

In the meanwhile the Metropolitan By-Products Company, Inc., which had the contract with the City for the final disposition of garbage in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn, abandoned its contract on October 2, 1918, and in consequence the department is obliged to handle this material and dispose of it by dumping it at sea.

It is most urgent, therefore, that we have the use of dumper No. 5 for this purpose at the earliest possible time. If we are obliged to prepare a contract and specifications, have the same printed, advertised and let, in all probability more than four (4) weeks' time will be lost. In the meanwhile the City will be without the use of this scow and unable to dispose of the fast accumulating quantity of garbage which, of course, is at all times a serious menace to the public health.

I therefore request that the above permission be granted at the earliest possible time.

As you can see, the contract prices of September 18 and October 11 are the highest in the whole year, when, as matter of fact, they should be the lowest, owing to the fresh butter coming in from the West and stored in the various storage houses.

On September 15 and October 15, the Navy Department sent a request to the different butter people, and I understand no bids were received by them. Also, for your information, on or about September 1, the United States Government requisitioned 60 per cent. of all butter held in storage, and that is the reason of the high price and the scarcity of this commodity. I also wish to state that I heard representatives of the Government are going into the different storage houses and selecting the largest quantities and the best quality of butter for the Army, Navy and Allies.

After the rejection of the September contract, open market bids were sent to six butter merchants, and only two responded.

This appropriation was made under "contract or open order service for transportation, carfare," Budget No. 3567.

Relying on this advice, when our estimate for the year 1918 was submitted, we asked for an appropriation of only one thousand dollars for the above purpose, to be used in case it should be necessary, in conjunction with the conveyances to be furnished, and an appropriation for that amount was accordingly made in this year's budget. No conveyance has, however, been furnished, the appropriation has been exhausted, and it now becomes necessary to supplement the same to the extent of two thousand dollars, or otherwise we will be unable to provide for the transportation of the prisoners.

Code 2654, Food Supplies—Owing to the increased cost of food supplies the original appropriation has been exhausted. The requested amount of \$100,000 seems reasonable, based on the present census of the Correctional Institutions and the current prices of food staples.

Code 2656, Forage and Veterinary Supplies—There is an unencumbered balance in this code of \$2,693.01. The average monthly expenditures have been approximately \$1,760. In order to meet the present estimated expenditures, the requested amount of \$2,000 will be necessary.

Code 2657, Fuel Supplies—Owing to the increased cost of obtaining fuel last winter over the estimated cost, as provided in the 1918 appropriation, the fund is practically exhausted. It is necessary that an additional sum be provided in order to purchase coal with which to heat the institutions and provide necessary gasoline and kerosene. Based on the quantities consumed during the past winter and the present prices, the requested amount of \$10,000 is reasonable.

Code 2658, Office Supplies—The requested amount of \$600 is reasonable, the principal item being postage.

Code 2660, Laundry, Cleaning and Disinfecting Supplies—This account is entirely exhausted and the needs of funds with which to purchase the necessary supplies is very urgent. The expenditures in this code have averaged approximately \$1,000 per month, and the requested amount of \$3,000 seems reasonable.

Code 2666, Household Equipment—The principal items for which money is needed in this code are necessary, beds and blankets. It was brought out, during the preparation of the tentative budget for 1919, that these items were badly needed and the requested amount of \$10,000 seems reasonable, taking into account present prices.

Code 2671, Wearing Apparel—An examination of the storehouse ledger at the time of examining the 1919 budget request for code, showed that there was practically no clothing on hand and it is estimated that the money with which to buy the necessary winter garments for inmates will require the requested amount of \$25,000.

Code 2672, General Plant Equipment—The amount requested, \$4,500, is a reasonable amount in order to provide the necessary equipment in the manufacturing industries of the department. This account, at the present time, shows a balance of \$14.39, with many necessary requisitions pending.

Code 2673, General Plant Materials—This account is exhausted and with very little of the material on hand, as shown in the stores' accounts, with which to make necessary urgent repairs to existing structures. It is estimated that the requested amount of \$13,000 is necessary.

Code 2680, General Plant Service—This account is practically exhausted. The monthly expenditures have averaged about \$500. The requested amount of \$1,200, it is estimated, will be necessary for necessary service to the end of the year.

No appropriation was made in the annual Budget to meet this expense because of the fact that the duty to do so rested upon the contractors who had the contract with the Department for the final disposition of ashes, street sweepings and rubbish in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. These contractors, Dailey & Ivins, abandoned their contract on March 2, 1918, leaving all of the dumps in urgent need of dredging. In fact, they had failed and neglected to dredge the dumps at West

96th street, West 134th street, East 60th street, East 72d street and Lincoln avenue in The Bronx, since the year 1916.

Since March 2, 1918, we have been unable to do any dredging at any of the dumps for the lack of funds. In the meanwhile loading of scows at all of these dumps has been seriously interfered with due to the fact that they frequently go aground and, in several instances, the hulls of these vessels have been seriously damaged and claims for the same have been filed against the City by their owners. The grounding of these vessels resulted also in delays to our carts and thus retarded the Department work.

Request was made to the Department of Docks and Ferries to perform this dredging but said Department was also without funds and could not do it. The estimated cost has been fixed by the Dock Department and the contract will be let and the work done under their supervision.

The Department at the present time is requesting bids for a contract for the final disposition of refuse for the next three years under which it will be the contractor's duty to perform the necessary dredging but the Department is advised that it should deliver the dumps to the new contractor on January 1, 1919, properly dredged. Taking the matter up in conference with the Commissioner of Street Cleaning and Engineer Stearns of that Department, it has been determined that dredging at the following named dumps may be deferred until next year:

West 47th street, North River; West 77th street, North River; West 96th street, North River; West 134th street, North River; East 72d street, East River.

The total quantity eliminated is 11,000 cubic yards, the estimated cost of dredging which is \$9,400.

The dumps at which dredging is urgently needed are as follows:

Canal street, North River; West 30th street, North River; Jackson street, East River; Stanton street, East River; 19th street, East River; 46th street, East River; 60th street, East River; 107th street, Harlem River; 139th street, Harlem River; Lincoln avenue, Bronx.

The quantities to be dredged at these locations aggregate 36,300 cubic yards at an estimated cost of \$33,245.

Be it resolved, by the State Industrial Commission, that variation be and it hereby is granted to the appellant in each case for the premises noted, with the understanding that said variations be effective only so long as the conditions remain as of this date.
