The 758 deaths represent a death-rate of 20.77 against 20.81 for the previous week, and 20.73 for the corresponding week of 1892.

Contagious and infectious diseases continue to decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 75, 57, 22, 26 and 12, against 67, 78, 36, 21 and 2 for the previous week, a total of 192 against 204. The decrease of diphtheria was mainly in the Eighteenth and Twentieth Wards, and the increase in the Eight, Nineteenth and Twenty-second Wards. The decrease of measles was chiefly in the Tenth, Eleventh and Twelfth Wards, while there was a notable increase in the Ninth and Twenty-first Wards. The decrease of scarlet fever was most marked in the Tenth, Eleventh and Nineteenth Wards, and the increase in the Seventh and Seventeenth Wards. Ten of the 26 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 8 of the remaining 16 were below Fourteenth street. Six of the 12 cases of small-pox were in the Seventh Ward, and the remainder pretty well scattered.
