

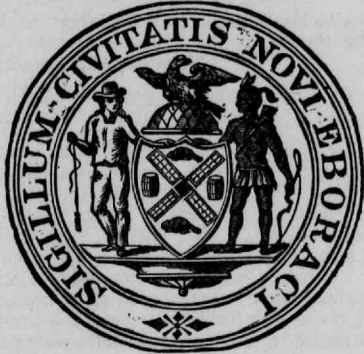

CITY PRISON (TOMBS), October 9, 1893.

Quarterly Report of Work Done by Paid and Unpaid Labor ending September 30, 1893.

Carpenters—Made 1 large table for prison kitchen; made and put in 12 window frames, boys' prison; made and put in 9 window frames, female prison; made and put up 2 sink frames for water tank, old prison; made and put up 1 clothes closet in old prison; made 6 wooden bunks for new prison; repaired floor in storm house, new prison; repaired door in dormitory, female prison; made and put up 2 new doors, boys' prison; made and put on 8 seats in water-closets, boys' prison; put on wooden casing on gas and water-pipes in prison yard.

Plumbers—Put up 50 feet gas-pipe and 13 gas-fittings in new prison; repaired vent-pipes, female prison; put in 2 overflow sinks for tank, old prison; put in 7 Bibb cocks in old and new prison.

Masons—Cemented ash pits in boiler room; repaired fire-box for boilers; repaired and pointed-up walls around the prison yard.

Roofers—Repaired roofs in Magdalen female and old prisons.

Tinsmiths—Made 1 gallon tin can for female prison; made 2 tin boxes for storeroom; made 1 coffee pot, 2 pans, 3 8-gallon pails and 1 new boiler copper bottom for kitchen; made 4 large ash cans for fire room; made 1 new collender for kitchen; made 4 dirt boxes for old prison; made 2 lamp frames.

Painters—Painted the walls, ceilings, closets and partitions in the front office; painted walls, railings, doors, gates, and calcimined ceiling in old prison; painted walls, railings, doors, and calcimined ceiling in boys' prison.

Glaziers—Put in 12 panes glass in boys' prison; put in 15 panes glass in female prison; put in 30 panes glass in new male prison.

Blacksmiths—Average number of men employed daily, 34, assigned as follows: 6 men at drills, 12 helpers, 1 clerk, 1 runner, 3 blacksmiths, 2 machinists, 2 men at drills, 2 men at wagons, 1 door keeper and 6 men at bedsteads. Made—2 fire escapes and 2 flights of steps for Ward's Island Hospital, 170 bolts, 98 feathers, 34 window guards, 4 dogs, 2 tiers, 5 keys, 2 fire hoes, 2 slice bars, 2 operating tables, 144 points, 82 chisels, 1 screw head, 54 hand drills, 2 iron bands, 2 strap hinges, 33 wedges, 12 wall staples, 1 coal barrow, 12 stanchions, 300 rivets, 2 sea wall derricks, 1 grating, 1 wrench, 4 axes, 4 gas tank covers, 1 boiler cover, 10 spikes, 12 plugs, 13 handles, 2 wheels, 2 cot frames, 1 clever, 5 handles. Carpenters and Painters—Average number of men employed daily, 86, as follows: 6 carpenters, 8 helpers, 2 circular saw, 15 wheelmen, 2 turners, 6 coopers, 6 wheelbarrows, 12 coffin makers, 3 wheelwright helpers, 1 bed blocks, 1 shop clerk, 1 shop cleaner, 1 door keeper, 1 runner and 21 men picking hair and painting. Made—3 water pails, 2 screen doors, 34 wood stools, 2,575 bed blocks, 12 hammer handles, 1,012 adult coffins, 3 felloes, 1 standard, 1 whiffletree, 1 spring block, 1 meat board, 2 tables and 1 set of pigeon holes, 1 chest, 7 hand barrows, 450 infant coffins, 8 physicians' boxes, 2 sea wall derricks, 5 pump spears, 6 wood mallets, 1 window sash, 14 cell buckets, 72 pairs crutches and 1 operating table. Tinsmiths—Average number of men employed daily, 40, assigned as follows: 1 marking tin and iron, 1 cutting tin and iron, 1 forming, 2 folding, 1 edging, 2 rivetting, 2 soldering, 1 grooving, 1 scraping, 1 gas fitting and plumbing, 1 shop cleaner, 1 shop runner, 1 door keeper, 1 clerk, 25 men at roofing, pointing walls, etc. Made—50 six-gallon cans, 7 coffee pots, 572 mess pans, 18 eight-gallon boilers, 118 wash basins, 100 dish pans, 1 sprinkling can, 11 garbage cans, 1 water cooler, 2 dirt cans, 496 feet leader pipe, 675 feet stove-pipe, 6 bake pans, 24 galvanized iron clothes cans, 6 twenty-gallon boilers, 15 sugar boxes, 26 saucepans, 36 bread boxes, 24 D boxes. SIR—Following please find detailed statement of the amount and description of mechanical and miscellaneous labor performed at this institution for the quarter ending September 30, 1893.

Appended will also be found a tabulated statement of the admissions, discharges, etc., for the quarter, as well as of the location of and numbers remaining at the other institutions at the end of the quarter.

Carpenters—Made 26 peels, 2 tables, 3 closets, 4 towel rollers, 1 washstand, 6 dough boxes, 16 mosquito frames, 2 counters, 1 tailboard, 1 hydrant box, 1 dough trough, 1 feed bin, 2 clothes boxes, 1 manhole cover, 400 tallies, 4 stairways and rails, 1 stand, 1 partition; laid 2,035 square feet flooring; ceiled 1,300 square feet surface, put up 4 stalls, set 14 clothes posts. Repaired 34 pairs window sashes, 24 tables, 11 wheelbarrows, 2 water closets, 42 bread boxes, 1 row boat, 3 doors, 2 meat boxes, 1 bench, 1 dumb waiter, 2 chairs, 2 wardrobes, 1 desk, 1 set drawers, 1 axletree, 12 clothes boxes, 12 window shutters.

Repaired 166 pieces tinware, 2 ice chests, 2 leaders, 1 watering cart, 1 ice box.

Bricklayers—Laid 210 feet drain-pipe; built 2 sewer trap; laid 222 square feet flagging.

Plasterers—Scraped and pointed up 306 square feet stone-walls; scratched and browned 17 square yards wall surface. Repaired 1 baker's oven.

Engineer—Repaired 10 water leaks, 2 pumps, 17 steam leaks, 2 gas fixtures, 2 sewing machines, 7 handholds, 1 belt, 1 drop-light, 2 washing machines, 2 sinks, 1 watering cart, 1 hydrant, 4 radiators, 14 cot frames, 2 lawn mowers, 5 water cocks, 1 roof. Cleaned 9 water closets, 4 sewer pipes, 1 sink. Caulked 44 window bars, 2 holdfasts, 1 eye-bolt. Set up 50 feet railing, 2 radiators, 4 gas bells, 4 water cocks. Put up 42 cross-bars, 10 steam pipe hangers, 2 valves. Cemented 215 feet gas pipe. Disconnected 110 feet gas pipe, 3 water pipes, 2 steam pipes, 2 gas-fixtures, 1 pendant. Connected 4 water pipes, 2 steam pipes, 1 leader. Made 2 sewer strainers. Cotmakers—Put up 3,932 cot bottoms and repaired 1,447.

Tailors—Made 256 pairs suspenders, 251 pairs mitts. Bound 400 pairs women's shoe uppers. Repaired 2,111 pairs pants, 589 jackets. Pressed, cleaned and repaired 931 suits prisoners' own clothing.

Shoemakers—Made 100 pairs canvas slippers, 200 pairs women's shoes. Repaired 533 pairs shoes.

Female Workhouse Help—Made 1,366 shirts, 796 chemises, 369 roller towels, 297 sheets, 1,063 pillow cases, 100 petticoats, 550 pillow ticks, 458 night gowns, 1,450 shrouds, 100 crib ticks, 106 spreads, 402 bed ticks, 392 dresses, 31 hoods, 207 aprons, 75 drawers, 12 jumpers, 120 capes. Painter has done the following work—Painted Nurses' rooms in 5 Wards; painted Keeper's rooms, Branch Penitentiary; painted Bath-rooms in 3 Wards, and put in 48 lights of glass.

Engineer, Fireman and Assistants have been employed in the manufacture of gas consumed on the Island, made repairs to the machinery in use at the Boiler-house and Laundry and have kept the steam-heating apparatus in order throughout the hospital.

Workhouse men have been employed as Helpers in the fire-room at the Boiler-house and Gas-works, as Laborers on the farm, and as Drivers at the stables; also as Boatmen on Randall's Island Ferry.

Workhouse women have been employed as Helpers in the Wards and Laundry, in scrubbing and general housework.

North Hospital—Carpentry: 2 rooms, 8 by 10 feet, removed from Ward 7 to enlarge ward; 2 rooms in Ward 9 removed for a like purpose; repaired 8 sashes in Ward 6, and 3 doors in Wards 7 and 8, and 9 locks in building; renewed 30 sash cords; overhauled steam-pipe and radiators; renewed 80 square feet plaster ceiling.

South Hospital—Carpentry: fitting and hanging 2 arch double doors 5 by 7 feet, and repaired 5 locks in play room; cut plaster partition and set in door frame leading from pantry to dining-room; overhauled steam-pipes and radiators; renewed 30 square feet plaster ceiling.

Pavilions 21 to 24—Carpentry: Boxed up 145 square feet waste-pipe; set 2 registers in floor of Ward 21; made walnut seat for closet; repaired 2 clothes closets, 2 large tables, 5 chairs and 9 shades; painting: Ward 21, Nurses' room, bath-room and side walls, done in 2 coats; wainscoting in color; ceilings cleaned and calcimined; plasterers pointed up and repaired walls for painters; Wards 22 and 23 painted the same as above; repacked valves and cleaned boiler and steam-pipes; put in closet bowl and connections in Ward 22.

Wards 11 to 13—Carpentry: Put up 12 sleeping rooms on top floor for male employees, 1,620 square feet partition and 350 feet capping, 1½ by 4 inches; platform built for closet on bath-room; hung 5 doors made from sliding doors; 8 wardrobes, 6 by 2 feet, 6 by 12 inches, with doors, placed in above rooms; put up 8 new posts 7 by 7 inches, 15 feet long to support balconies of second floor, and repaired 5 others; also repaired the balcony rails; in Ward 11 made and put up two new sash doors, 7 feet 2 inches by 3 feet 4 inches, 2-inch thick; renewed 35 square feet flooring and 36 square feet wainscoting; also put in 2 ash saddles for doors; repaired 2 locks and hung 10 curtains; put up and encased one flight of stairs on outside of building front; in rear of building took down one flight of stairs and put up same repaired; removed 140 square feet of partition from library on ground floor. Painting: in Ward 11 and adjoining rooms, side walls and wood-work done in 2 coats, doors in color; also ceiling calcimined; Ward 12 same as above; painted 12 sleeping rooms for male employees on top floor, 1,620 square feet partition; ceiling washed and calcimined; outside of building, brick work painted in two coats of Venetian Red; cornices in stone color. Plumbing: removed school sink in Ward 11 and put up instead flush closet and cistern in room adjoining Ward; removed school sink in Ward 13 and replaced same by flush closet; plasterers pointed up and repaired walls for painters in Wards 11, 12 and 13; furnished 20 lengths of 4-inch leader pipe.

Dormitory 2—Carpentry: On ground floor made and put in sash door 3 by 7 feet leading to pantry in rear; renewed 3 upright posts 7 by 7 inches to sustain balconies; made and put in batten door at foot of stairs in rear; renewed 45 square feet flooring on first floor, bath-room; encased waste-pipe, first floor, dining-room, box 20 feet long, and repaired one door on second floor; repaired hand rails on 4 balconies.

Pavilion F—Carpentry: Set in one double sash at outside stairway; put up partition for use of smaller idiot children, including pantry, 280 square feet partition; removed brick shed and fencing formerly at east of building in order to improve light and ventilation of first floor; structure was 7 by 20 feet and 8 feet high; enclosed sink in pantry; renewed 50 square feet of flooring; replaced 38 sash cords, and repaired 2 doors, 5 benches and 5 chairs. Roads, Sewers, Improvement to Grounds, etc.—Brick culvert northwest of Dormitory 2, 5 feet deep, 3 feet long, and 3 feet wide, 12-inch wall, connected with main sewer (25 feet) by 12-inch earthen pipe; gutters 2 feet wide (brick tarred), front and rear of Pavilions 21 to 24, 900 feet; gutters 2 feet wide (brick tarred), front and rear of Pavilions 25 to 28, 900 feet; rear of above two pavilions tarred to a distance of 15 feet, to drain off water; sodded ditch leading across lawn to

main culvert, 7 feet by 35 feet long; approaches to ward entrances, asphaltum graded to stone steps, 5 in all, 10 by 15 feet each, widening outwardly in curved lines, 1 at Ward 23, Ward 24, Ward 25, Ward 26, Ward 27; brick walks made, 5 feet wide, in all 210 feet; at east gable end of Pavilion F, 4 feet excavated for a space of 30 by 20 feet to permit play of windows in cellar; cellars of all the buildings whitewashed; square in front of School building (80 feet by 180 feet), others at various points, streets and paths where needed for convenience or ornament, these laid with screened ashes rolled, aggregating 72,420 square feet, or 1.66 acres; ground leveled and converted into lawns (14 lawns of over 6,000 square feet each, and 17 smaller ones) aggregating 225,382 square feet, or 5.85 acres; ribbon wire fencing put up around lawns (2 lines of wire with iron posts at intervals of 8 feet), aggregating 2,481 feet, or .47 mile; graded and rolled road east from School House to the Sound, 24 feet wide, 495 feet long; racks for individual towels put up in 28 wards; brush and comb boxes for individual brushes and combs put up in 14 wards; perforated pipe in trough to permit children to wash separately, put up in 22 wards. Roads, sewers, improvements to grounds, etc., done by Penitentiary men under the general direction of the Superintendent of this institution: Macadamized road north of Pavilions 21 to 24, 18 feet wide, length 300 feet; macadamized road north of Pavilions 25 to 28, 18 feet wide, length 300 feet; macadamized road, from northwest corner Dormitory 2, north to Ward 11, 18 feet wide, length 192 feet; macadamized road from west of Ward 14 to main back road (latter now being made), 18 feet wide, length 162 feet; macadamized main road from Pavilions A, B, C, to coal dock road now being made, 18 feet wide, 1,000 feet completed; macadamized walk from Drug store, across to long Pavilions, 7 feet wide, length 270 feet; macadamized walk from Office to Laundry, 9 feet wide, length 180 feet; macadamized walk from Dormitory 2 to Pavilion F, 10 feet wide, length 140 feet; stone drain—called blind drain—300 feet long, 4 feet wide and 13 feet deep, west of Pavilion F, made to carry off surface water for the purpose of keeping cellar of that building dry; stone culvert, east of Dormitory 2, 2 feet by 2 feet, drains onto farm; stone drain to same, 2 feet wide, 76 feet long; stone drain across road east of Ward 11, 2 feet by 18 inches, 25 feet long; brick gutter, 18 inches wide, 139 feet long, for road east Dormitory 2 and Ward 11; flagged floor of kitchen, 30 by 60 feet, with flagging obtained from different parts of institution grounds; small frame structure for contagious diseases, known as barracks, removed to Infants' Hospital to avoid the possible carrying of contagion from the latter institution which for the most part made use of this structure; removed measles quarantine to a point on a line with front of New Quarantine Building.

Engineer—Hall 1: Made iron bands for frame on bath tubs; repaired float in cistern over water-closets, hot-water faucets, waste-pipe of sink, hot-water pipes; repaired and put leg on sink; cleaned out waste-pipes of water-closet and bathtub. Hall 2: Repaired bursted steam pipe of steam table, hot and cold water faucets, ball cock float in cistern over water-closet; cleaned out waste-pipes of bath tub, etc. Hall 3: Put new leg on sink in wash room; put tin on rat holes; repaired hot and cold water faucets and waste-pipe of bath tub. Plumbing—Attended to general repairs to plumbing and sewerage throughout the Main Asylum, Branch, Annex, Pavilions and Female Asylum.

Electric Work—Attended to general repairs to electric-light fixtures, etc., throughout the Asylum.

Out-door Improvement—Emptied 1 barge of ice; cleared 2 acres of brushwood on north side of island; ploughed 5 acres of new land for raising vegetables; unloaded 5 barges of coal; saved and preserved 25 tons of hay; graded walks around grounds; excavated 1,500 feet of sewers; carted goods from dock to Asylum and Ward's Island Hospital; removed swill from buildings and attended to other general repairs about stable, boiler-house, farm and grounds, etc.

SIR—I respectfully forward to your Honorable Board the following report for the quarter ending September 30:

Of the male patients, a daily average of 122 have been engaged as follows: 22 in kitchens, 7 in laundries, 2 in engine-room, 5 in stable, 2 in offices, 1 in carpenter's shop, 1 in blacksmith's shop, 1 in plumber's shop, 1 making soft soap, 1 in store, 16 on sea-wall, 31 whitewashing bath-house and pavilions, making new roads and walks, painting, unloading and storing ice, carting coal to engine-house and pavilions, removing ashes, screening and drawing sand, mowing grass and weeds, keeping lawns mowed and in good condition, removing and burying swill, delivering bread, ice and stores, removing freight from dock, keeping roads and walks in repair and the grounds around the pavilions clean.

Of the female patients, a daily average of 701 have been engaged in the following manner: 56 in laundries, 8 in general dining-room, 8 at out-door scrubbing, 8 as help for Medical Staff and Officers, 621 at housework, sewing and knitting.

135,040 pieces have been laundered for this Asylum, and 2,436 pieces for the City Asylum, Ward's Island.

33,658 articles of clothing and bedding have been repaired, and 4,352 articles made.

The Engineer, Firemen and assistants have cleaned electric-light boilers; repaired electric-light engine twice; repaired steam-pump in hose-house, sewers of kitchen and pavilions, water-closets, bath-tubs, pipes and sinks in all pavilions; put new sewer from Pavilion 2; repaired faucets and placed new ones in Pavilions 2, 3, 4 and 5; put new hot-water tanks in Pavilion 5 and repaired hot-water tank in laundry; repaired steam-pipes and subway of laundry; made water connections with 12 buildings at the upper end of the Island, formerly occupied by the Branch Workhouse, put 8 bath-tubs, 4 Hitching's heaters, 24 hoppers for water-closets, with their connec-

ions with the sewers in these buildings: repaired and placed 14 sinks with water connections, and made new sewer connections to 13 buildings; kept all electric-light wires in repair.

The Tinsmith made crow-foot brace for tank, 20 hooks for plumbers, 6 one-gallon cans, 4 new meat boxes, and put 4 new chimney tops on Pavilion 1; put 8 sets of shoes on horses; covered rat holes in pavilions; worked in forge 14 days repairing tools and chains for Mason; repaired fire-tools for boiler-room; repaired stoves and cleared out stove-pipes in Pavilions 1, 2, 3, C, E, dining-room and Physicians' Kitchen; repaired roofs of Laundry, Pavilions C, E, Bakery and Kitchen No. 2; repaired water coolers, ash-cart and truck, hand-carts, 1 wagon, boiler for kitchen, hose-cart, and 12 iron bedsteads; repaired milk cans and tinware for kitchen and all the pavilions. The Carpenter and assistants partitioned off 2 rooms for sleeping apartments for Engineer, with double sheathed partitions; made and put in sky-light on roof, put up spring rollers and shades on windows, shelves in kitchen; hung 1 panel door; put on mortice lock; repaired floor of bath-room and water-closet, and covered ceiling with canvas; changed door and window of Physicians' dining-room; made and put in 1 door-frame and window-frame, and repaired outside casing and floor; made new ash frame for body of meat-cart, repaired the running gear of same and sheathed the inside; made movable grating for floor of pantry in general dining-room and draining board for sink; built staging for painter to paint gables of Pavilion 2; repaired float and gangway of boat landing; put up window shades and brackets in Officers' apartments; removed partition dividing bakery from kitchen; made 1 pine box for holding attendants' soiled clothes for laundry; made 2 extensions for tables and repaired tables in Pavilion 3; put mortice lock on drug store and 4 wardrobe locks on medicine chests; put bolts and locks on night attendants' rooms, also shelves and clothes racks in same; put new sash cords in 58 pairs of windows; repaired panels and framework on 5 doors; repaired 12 pass locks; replaced 16 wardrobe locks on pantry-closets and 8 locks on drawers; cut pockets in floors for electric-light wires and cut floor for plumbers; changed and cut down front seats in Church, eased and repaired doors and windows in same. At the upper end of the Island—Made and put in place 10 water-closet seats, put on 23 new pass locks on doors, fitted up 2 pantries in dining-rooms with shelves and dish drainers, put 4 partitions in different halls, made and put up 3 new doors and put 16 pairs new hinges on doors, removed 8 old partitions, made 2 clothes closets for male patients and 2 circular hot-water tanks and stands; made 16 temporary table tops and 40 wooden stands for same, put up 46 spring rollers and shades on windows of Attendants' rooms; removed office fixtures and partitioned off day-room, dining-room and water-closet in same; made 1 new door-frame, removed partition from dining-room, framed and sheathed archway for same, removed all old locks and bolts, and kept all furniture, etc., in repair.

The Painter and assistants painted the outside of Pavilion 2, the veranda and outside of Acting Medical Superintendent's residence, and the outside partitions and rooms of Engineer's quarters; painted bath-tubs of Pavilion 2; pipes, radiators and water-closets in Pavilion 5; hung wall-paper in Physicians' dining-room. At the upper end of the Island—Painted roofs of bakery, kitchen, Pavilion 3, day-rooms, dining-rooms, bath-rooms, all new partitions, inside of kitchen, wainscoting, etc.; bath-tubs and Attendants' rooms: primed all new work; frosted the windows in water-closets and bath-room; repaired paint in all pavilions and put in window lights where required.

The Stone-mason built 4,180 cubic feet of sea-wall, paved 324 square feet in boiler-room, put 108 feet of cement floor in laundry, blasted 150 yards of rock and put new fire-box and bridge-wall in one of the horizontal boilers.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereat.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
