

No. 397.

Whereas, The Government of the United States has directed that the victorious troops of the regular and volunteer armies shall at once be removed from the seat of war to encampments to be

laid out at Montauk Point, in this State; and
Whereas, The whole American people are desirous of demonstrating, in some fitting way,
their gratitude for the magnificent achievements of the men who have added lustre to the Amer-

ican name;

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor of The City of New York be and he is hereby requested to invite the people of the United States to assemble in this city upon some day to be hereafter determined, to receive and tender to these returning soldiers such a welcome as will, in a measure, give expression to the intense feeling of gratitude which pervades the entire people.

Resolved, That he be requested to select a committee of at least one hundred citizens to arrange the necessary details for such reception and welcome.

Resolved, That he be requested to apply to the Government of the United States for such co-operation as will enable the municipality to make the occasion a national celebration, commemorative of the union of all sections of our beloved country in the cause of humanity, a testimony of our appreciation of the services of the armies and navies which have secured such wonderful results in so brief a time, and an approval of the magnanimity which has been accorded to derful results in so brief a time, and an approval of the magnanimity which has been accorded to the brave soldiers and sailors of our adversary.

No. 399.

An Ordinance to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of The City of New York, and for payment of the quota of the State taxes due from the County of New York, and for other purposes, and to levy taxes on the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx of The City of New York, pursuant to law, in and for the year 1898.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

Section I. There shall be and is hereby imposed and levied upon the estates, real and per-Section 1. There shall be and is hereby imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx of The City of New York, the sum of forty-six million four hundred and two thousand seven hundred and forty-three dollars and sixteen cents (\$46,402,743.16), to pay the expenses estimated to be necessary to conduct the public business of The City of New York in each department and branch thereof for the year 1898, by the board of estimate and apportionment of The City of New York, as constituted prior to January 1, 1898, by its final estimate adopted December 23, 1897; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which, with the accumulations of interest thereon, will be sufficient to redeem the stocks and bonds issued by The City of New York, as constituted prior to January 1, 1808, to provide for the supply of water, pursuant to the provision of section 10 of sufficient to redeem the stocks and bonds issued by The City of New York, as constituted prior to January 1, 1898, to provide for the supply of water, pursuant to the provision of section 10 of article VIII. of the Constitution of the State of New York, and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the state tax required to be paid by the country of New York in the year 1898, which sum, forty-six million four hundred and two thousand seven hundred and forty-three dollars and sixteen cents (\$46,402,743.16), so imposed and levied by this ordinance, is that portion of the amount appropriated for such purposes as estimated by the board of estimate and apportionment of said city of New York in its final estimate for the fiscal year 1898, made and adopted on December 23, 1897, amounting in the aggregate to fifty-one million four hundred and forty-three thousand six hundred and forty-three dollars and sixty-four cents (\$51,443.643.64), remaining after deducting therefrom the sum of five million forty-thousand nine hundred dollars and forty-eight cents (\$5,040,900.48), supplied by the general fund for the reduction of taxation, as stated by the comptroller of The City of New York, in a communication dated June 2, 1898, together with his certificate of the amount of the appropriations made in the final estimate, are as follows:

The aggregate receipts of the General Fund thus far collected justify the foregoing estimate. The attention of your Honorable Body is respectfully called to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, as follows:

"Section 248. It shall be the duty of the municipal assembly to include in any and every ordinance or resolution passed by them, imposing and levying taxes for any purpose or purposes authorized by law, such sum, in addition to the aggregate amount required for such purposes, as they shall deem necessary, not exceeding three per centum of said aggregate amount, to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount imposed and levied therefor."

Your attention is also specially called to the provisions of section 909 of the same act, prescribing the method of preparing and disposing of the assessment rolls, and also to the provisions of section 911 of the same act, designating the first day of September as the date when the assess-

ment rolls shall be finally completed, to be delivered to the Receiver of Taxes, with the proper warrant or warrants annexed thereto, directing him to collect the several sums mentioned in said rolls, and to pay the same, from time to time, when so collected, to the Chamberlain of said City.

I, Bird S. Coler, Comptroller of The City of New York, in compliance with the provisions of section 247 of the Greater New York Charter, do hereby certify to the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York that the aggregate amount estimated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York as constituted prior to January 1, 1898, in its Final Estimate for the fiscal year 1898, made and adopted on Thursday, December 23, 1897, and herewith submitted, is fifty-one million four hundred and forty-three thousand six hundred and forty-three dollars and sixty-four cents (\$51,443,643.64), which is the total sum of the appropriations included therein to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the said City of New York, in each department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the fiscal year 1898, including the sums necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal and interest of stocks and bonds becoming due and payable by said city during said fiscal year not otherwise provided for; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which, with the accumulations of interest thereon, will be sufficient to redeem the stocks and bonds issued, as provided by section to of article VIII. of the Constitution of the State of New York; also the amount required by law to be appropriated to various charitable institutions, and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the said City of New York in said year 1898, a cony of which said Final Estimate, made and adopted by the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment the 23d day of December, 1897, is hereto annexed. I, Bird S. Coler, Comptroller of The City of New York, in compliance with the provisions of

1897, is hereto annexed.

I further certify that the estimated amount of the revenues derived from all sources of the General Fund in the year 1898 is five million forty thousand nine hundred dollars and forty-eight cents (\$5,040.900.48), as stated in detail in a communication to your Honorable Body, herewith submitted, setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be imposed and raised by tax in and for the said year 1898.

FINAL ESTIMATE FOR 1898.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on the 30th day of October, 1897, adopted the Provisional Estimate for the year eighteen hundred and ninety-eight (1898), and have considered the objections to and rectifications of said estimate, made by the Board of Aldermen on November 12, 1897, of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of The City and Cou ty of New York in each department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit: For the year eighteen hundred and moety-eight (1898), in which estimate is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of interest on the bonds of the said city and county which becomes due and payable within said year, which is not otherwise provided for; also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year, which is not otherwise provided for; also the amount to be raised by tax, annually, which, with the accumulations of interest thereon, will be sufficient to redeem the stocks and bonds issued to provide for the supply of water, pursuant to the provisions of section 10 of article VIII. of the Revised Constitution of the State of New York, adopted at the general election held November 6, 1894; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State Tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York in said year 1898, as provided by section 189 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, which objections to and rectifications of said Provisional Estimate were transmitted by the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen on November 12, 1897, and considered by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 23, 1897; therefore sidered by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 23, 1897; therefore Resolved, That, after such consideration of the said objections to and rectifications of said

Provisional Estimate, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment do hereby make this a

In addition to the sum of forty-six million four hundred and two thousand seven hundred and forty-three dollars and sixteen cents (\$46,402,743.16) imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, of the City of New York, in and by the first section of this ordinance, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon said estates, to be raised, collected and paid according to law, nine hundred and fifty-four thousand, one hundred and nineteen dollars and ninety-seven cents (\$954,119.97), the said amount being necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this ordinance, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter.

Section 3. The assessment rolls of the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx of The City of New York, for the year 1898, are hereby approved and confirmed and the aggregate amount of the assessed valuations of said estates for such year is hereby fixed at the sum of two billion three hundred and sixty-five million four hundred and ninety thousand three hundred and seventy-two dollars (\$2,365,490,372), in accordance with the returns of the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments for said year, submitted to the Municipal Assembly on the 5th day of July, 1898, as follows, to wit:

Whereas, The amount of assessed valuations of the real and personal estates subject to taxtion of and within the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx of The City of New York, excepting the personal estates of the several corporations, joint-stock companies and associations which are exempted by law from local taxation for State purposes, is two billion two hundred and ninety million nine hundred and forty-five thousand three hundred and ninety-six dollars (\$2,290,-045, 206), and

Whereas, The amount of the assessed valuations of the personal estates of such corporations, joint-stock companies and associations as are exempted by law from taxation thereon for State purposes is seventy-four million five hundred and forty-four thousand nine hundred and seventy-six dollars (\$74,544,976), which sum is liable to taxation for city and county purposes only;

Be it furthermore Ordained, That the said real and personal estates shall be subject to taxation as provided by the following section:

Section 4. The rate of tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx of The City of New York, excepting the personal estates of such corporations, joint-stock companies or associations as are by law exempt from assessment and taxation thereon for State purposes, shall be and is hereby fixed at 2.01 per centum of the assessed valuations thereof, and upon the personal estates of such corporations, joint-stock companies or associations the rate of tax shall be and is hereby fixed at 1.7558 per centum of the assessed valuations thereof in and for the year eighteen hundred and ninety-eight (1898).
