

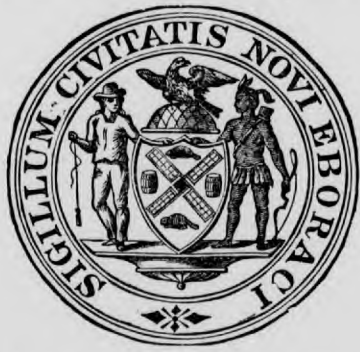

Work Done by Carpenter During the Months of April, May and June, 1898.

Ward 1—Repairing windows and shades, door, four feet bead, shades, drawers for closet of operating room. Putting up new closet, 36 feet lumber, 5 feet 1 1/4 inch lumber, 4 feet 3/8 inch lumber, 1 lock, 2 pair hinges, 2 dozen screws, 1 hook and eye, 2 pounds nails. Repaired bed stand. Put 1 new lock on closet. Repaired 1 stool. Put in 5 sash cords, 4 feet stop bead on windows, 1 16-pound sash weight, 3 feet of moulding on windows, 1 panel 4 feet white wood on windows. Taking down 10 pair shades. Repairing windows and pulleys, 16 feet moulding, 12 feet stop bead. Repairing new sash weight. Repaired 1 screen, 3 stools, 1 sash pulley, 4 bed stands, 1 table, 3 feet 1/2-inch lumber. Made 1 new panel, 5 feet white wood. Repaired windows and shades, 7 sash cords, 1/2 pound 1 1/4 wire nails, 1 pound 8-penny bin nails, windows, 3 sash cords, 3 tables, closets, 2 cornices, 4 feet 1/2-inch lumber, 1 iron bracket, 2 dozen screws, windows and shades, 4 sash cords, shelving, windows in pantry, 2 sash cords. Put 1 new pocket in window 2 feet 7/8-inch lumber. Put up 12 window bars. Repaired windows. Put up clothes rack and hooks in closet, 1 new pocket in window, 3 dozen square iron hooks, 4 clothes hooks, 4 sash cords, 4 dozen 1 1/2 inch screws, 25 feet stop bead, 20 feet party strip, 5 feet white wood for window panel, 14 feet, 7/8-inch lumber, 2 1/2 feet of lumber for base. Repaired 2 shades. Put in 2 new rollers, new floor, 220 feet yellow pine, 10 pounds nails, 2 dozen screws, 60 feet of moulding for base, 1 mortise lock, 1 door knob, 1 plate.

Ward 2—Repaired door, 1 foot lumber, 2 socks; screen, 1 dozen screws; 4 stands, 4 stools.

Ward 3—Put in 1 lock and key, 2 locks, 1 lock, hook and eye. Repaired 1 bed stand, made 1 new bed stand, 12 feet 7/8-inch lumber.

Ward 4—Made 1 new sign for clock box, 2 feet lumber. Repaired 1 chair, 3 buttons, 1 screen, 8 hinges, 3 dozen screws.

Ward 5—Repaired seat sliding for chair. Made 1 splint, 2 feet ash. Repaired 2 screens, 6 feet pine. Put up new closet, 210 feet 7/8-inch lumber; 6 pair hinges, 3 locks, 3 buttons, 1 1/2 gross screws; 6 clothes hooks, 3 pounds nails; put new shelves in Nurses' room, 20 feet 7/8-inch lumber; put up shelving, 15 feet 7/8-inch lumber, 4 feet 1/2-inch pine, 1 iron bracket, 2 dozen screws.

Ward 6—Repaired windows and shades, 3 sash cords. Put up rack in closet. Repaired 1 stool, windows, 1 sash cord; screws; door, 2 pairs hinges, 1/2 dozen 3-inch screws; 1 stool. Made new saddle for door, 2 feet lumber. Repaired screen, 2 feet lumber, 4 pairs hinges, 3 dozen screws; screen, closet; water-closet, 3 feet lumber, 1 hinge, 1/2 dozen screws; screen, 8 pairs hinges, 6 dozen screws.

Ward 7—Repaired 2 chairs, windows and shades, 1 sash cord; screen; windows, 1 sash cord; 2 bed trays; windows and doors, 12 feet white wood for panels, 40 running feet, stop bead, 30 running feet, party strip, 12 sash cords, 12 feet half-round moulding, 1/2 pound 1 1/2-inch wire nails, 10 feet moulding; screens.

Ward 8—Putting up 30 brass hooks for cards and charts, 8 clothes hooks. Repairing windows, 2 sash cords, 2 chains.

Ward 9—Repaired windows, 2 sash cords, splint, 1 butt, 2 screens.

Ward 10—Repaired screen, base 12 feet moulding. Made new table, 20 feet of lumber. Repaired drawer, lock; shelving, 13 feet lumber, 4 pairs hinges, 4 dozen screws.

Ward 11—1 new lock. Put up new shelving, 10 feet pine, 1 dozen screws. Repaired windows, 4 sash cords. Put up 60 brass hooks for bed cards; 6 feet 1/2-inch lumber, 2 7/8-inch lumber. Repaired medicine closet, 2 feet lumber; 1 board for operating table, 10 feet 7/8-inch lumber.

Ward 12—Repaired 2 stools, 3 chairs, 1 stool, shades, screen.

Ward 13—Repaired operating table; operating table, 3 feet lumber, 3 dozen screws; table. Put new seat in chair.

Ward 14—Repaired lock. Made 1 bandage roller. Put up 60 brass hooks for cards and charts. Made bandage roller, 6 feet lumber, 1 dozen Hamilton splints, 2 dozen side splints. Repaired closet put strip on base 80 feet of moulding.

Ward 15—Repaired lock, 1 key, pipe box, 2 feet of lumber, Doctors' room; board for operating table, 3 feet of lumber. Repaired lock, 1 key for ice box.

Ward 16—Made 2 inclined frames, 12 feet lumber. Repaired 1 stool. Made 2 splints, 10 feet pine, 4 pair butts, 4 dozen screws. Repaired windows, 1 sash cord, lock, drawers, closet, 1/2 dozen screws, screen, 4 chairs, 5 chairs, lock, 1 key.

Ward 17—Repaired 2 chairs, chair, 2 feet pine; seat of closet, 3 clothes hooks; 1 dozen screws, 2 hinges; windows, 1 sash cord; seat of water closet.

Ward 18—Repaired clothes boxes, 1 foot pine, 2 hinges, 1 dozen screws; 1 chair and one table.

Ward 19—Repaired clothes boxes, 1 foot lumber, 2 hinges, 1 dozen screws; seat in closet; seat in water closet, 5 feet pine, 2 pair hinges, 3 dozen screws, 2 pair crutches, chair. Put 20 bars on windows, 7 dozen screws, 16 feet lumber, 2 Hamilton splints. Made new screen 10 feet 7/8 inch lumber, 3 set new screens, 32 feet lumber, 12 hinges, 3 dozen screws.

Ward 20—Repaired screens, 1 paper 6 ounce tacks, screens and drawers, ice box, 5 feet ash, 1/2 dozen hooks, 1 hook and eye, 4 stools; moved medicine closet; repaired shelf, medicine closet screen, 2 shades; made new door saddle.

Ward 21—Repaired bed tray, 62 feet 3/8 lumber for panels, 42 feet 1/2 lumber for drawer bottoms, 18 drawer pulls, 3 dozen screws; 4 drawer locks, 1/2 dozen screws; 11 pair hinges, 3 buttons, 2 closet locks, 4 hooks and eyes, 1 rim lock, 13 dozen screws.

Ward 22—Repaired 2 screens, 2 feet pine, 1/2 dozen screws; windows, 1 sash cord, 3 feet stop bead; clothes boxes, 5 feet lumber, 2 dozen screws; 5 stools, windows and shades, ice box, 4 sash cords; 1 new lock and key for medicine closet, 1 lock for closet; repaired screen, 2 feet pine; screen, 1/2 dozen screws; screen, 1 dozen screws.

Ward 23—Repaired chair, chair, windows and shades, 4 sash cords; chair. Put up 9 wire screen windows, 180 feet of sash, 1/2-pound 1-inch wire nails, 20 feet 7/8-inch strip, 1 inch wide.

Ward 24—Repaired clothes boxes, 1 foot lumber, 2 hinges, 1 dozen screws, 1 new lock, 1 closet lock; window, 1 sash cord; head-rest. Made 12 bars for window, 15 feet 7/8-inch lumber, 4 dozen screws. Repaired medicine closet, 2 feet lumber; lock, 1 stool, 1 closet lock. Put up 60 brass hooks for cards and charts. Repaired chair.

Ward 25—Made 9 bars for windows, 10 feet 7/8-inch lumber; 3 dozen screws. Repaired head-rest, windows and shades, 1 sash cord. Made strips for curtains, 2 feet 1/4 inch whitewood. Repaired 1 stool, lock, 1 key. Put up 60 brass hooks for cards and charts. Made new clothes box, 20 feet lumber, 1 1/2 dozen screws; 2 trunk handles, 2 hinges. Repaired 1 clothes box.

SOUTH HOSPITAL, WARDS 1, 2 AND 3.

Carpentry.

Repaired 7 frames of wire mattresses, 2 water-closet seats and 3 long dining tables. Made 1 crutch, 1½ inches by 3 inches and renewed 17 sash cords. Material used 45 square feet of ¾-inch pine.

Plumbing.

Repaired and cleaned out gas jets and several water-closets and waste pipes. Cleaned out waste pipes of 3 bath tubs and put in 40 feet ¾-inch supply pipe.

Plastering.

Repaired side walls of store-room, 13 square feet.

Tinsmithing.

Renewed 18 feet of 4-inch leader pipe. Repaired main roof with 8 sheets of tin, also play-room roof and gutter, using 7 sheets tin and 4 pounds solder.

NORTH HOSPITAL, WARDS 6, 7, 8, 9 AND 10.

Plumbing.

Cleaned out waste pipes of several closets, 35 gas jets. Connected main sewer with leaders, using 40 feet of 6-inch earthen pipe, 4 Ts and 2 bends.

Painting.

Repaired sashes on balconies and renewed 3 sash fasteners and 13 sash cords.

Cut and set coping stone around area at north end of building, 4 pieces, 6 feet 6 inches long, 10 inches thick, 7½ inches wide ; 6 pieces 4 feet long, 10 inches thick and 7 inches wide ; 2 pieces 2 feet 6 inches long, 10 inches thick and 6½ inches wide. Cut and put stone at bottom of leader, 2 feet 6 inches by 1 foot 6 and 7 inches wide. Repaired and rebuilt 35 feet brick work in areas, using ½ barrel cement.

WARDS 11, 12 AND 13 BUILDING.

Plumbing.

Repaired and cleaned out waste pipes, 4 closets. Cleared out stoppages in several gas jets and renewed 2 feet ¾ inches lead pipe to sink.

Painting.

Cleaned and painted ceilings of bath-room and Infirmary in Ward 12. Painted 2 hallways and stained dado, using 15 pounds whiting, 1 pound blue and 3 pounds Indian red. Painted fire boards and pipe black. Cleaned down, sized and calcimined ceiling of Ward 12. Painted 17 window frames and sashes, using 25 pounds white lead, 7 posts and ventilators, painted black, using 3 pounds asphaltum. Renewed 2 sets knobs.

Tinsmithing.

Repaired 5 stove guards ; general repairs to main roof, using 13 sheets tin and 5 pounds solder.

Carpentry.

Made and put up board drainer in kitchen. Repaired closet seats. Put on 2 locks, 1 pair knobs and 2 pair bolts, using 17 square feet of 1½-inch clear pine. Renewed 11 sash cords and 2 mortise locks.

WARD 14 BUILDING.

Plumbing.

Cleaned out waste pipes of water-closets and cleaned out gas jets. Cleaned waste-pipe drain and placed therein 20 feet 6 inches earthen pipe and 1 6-inch trap.

Tinsmithing.

Ward 26—Washed down, sized and calcimined ceiling 25 by 50 of Ward 26. Washed down, sized and calcimined ceilings of operating room, kitchen, bathroom and Nurses' room adjoining ward. Painted side walls of operating room, ward, kitchen, bathroom and Nurses' room in 1 coat. Painted dado 3 feet high in each. Stained girder beams. Stained and varnished cupola woodwork, window sashes and frames, all trim. Repainted and lettered 25 brush boxes. Painted and varnished doors. Grained and varnished 1 refrigerator. Material used : White lead 300 pounds, Indian red 35 pounds, sienna 10 pounds, U. M. blue 5 pounds, whiting 30 pounds, turpentine 10 gallons, boiled oil 3 gallons, dryers ½ gallon. Ward 27—Washed down, sized and calcimined ceiling 25 by 50, of Ward 27 ; washed down, sized and calcimined surgical dressing room, kitchen, bath room and Nurses' room adjoining ward. Painted side walls of ward, surgical dressing room, kitchen, bath room and Nurses' room in 1 coat ; painted dado, 3 feet high in ward and other rooms mentioned ; stained girder beams, cupola woodwork, window frames and trim ; cut in 21 double window sashes, repainted and lettered 25 brush boxes ; grained and varnished doors and 1 refrigerator. Material used : White lead, 300 pounds, Indian red, 35 pounds ; sienna, 30 pounds ; U. M. blue, 5 pounds ; whiting, 30 pounds ; turpentine, 30 gallons ; boiled oil, 3 gallons ; dryers, ½ gallon ; varnish, 4 gallons. Ward 28—Cleaned, washed down, sized and calcimined ceiling of ward, 25 by 50 ; washed down, sized and calcimined ceilings of kitchen, bath-room and Nurses' room adjoining ward ; washed down and painted side walls of ward, kitchen, bath-room and Nurses' ward in one coat ; painted dado 3 feet high in rooms mentioned ; painted window frames and ventilator wood work ; grained and varnished girder beams, medicine closet, 3 doors and 2 vestibule doors ; painted 2 outside vestibule doors in olive green ; painted and renumbered 30 brush boxes. Masonry.

Reset 145 bricks in curving and sidewalks ; rebricked back of range and flue, 5 feet by 3 feet 6 inches ; replaced brick pier, 2 feet by 2 feet.

PAVILION F BUILDING

Carpentry.

Built recreation pavilion for male idiots, dimensions, 106 feet long, 23 feet wide, 12 feet high ; built benches on sides and end, in all 235 feet of benches. SIR—I have the honor to submit the following report of the work under my charge and supervision during the quarter ending June 30, 1898.

WORK OF CONSTRUCTION UNDER "NEW PLAN."

NORTH RIVER.

Park Place Section.

Work on this section of the bulkhead wall has been in progress. The wall is being built for the use of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, at the expense of the Rhinelander estate.

Murray Street Section.

The work of construction of the bulkhead wall at this section has been in progress; 91 feet of granite were set in the wall. The platform at the inner end of the old pier and the old bulkhead were removed. The wall at this section is being built for the use of the Old Colony Steamboat Company at the expense of the Rhinelander estate.

Piers, New 20 and 21, N. R.

These piers have been extended out to the pier-head line of 1890, and sheds are being extended over the new portion of the piers. Rent for the increased area of the piers is to be paid by the Erie Railroad Company, lessee.

Warren Street Section.

Work on this section was practically completed during the quarter; 87 feet of granite were set in the wall and earth filling is about to be placed behind the wall.

Pier, Old 40, N. R.

Pier, old 40, near the foot of Watts street, and the shed thereon, have been removed to make way for the bulkhead wall.

Recreation Structure on Pier, New 43.

The work of building a recreation structure on Pier, new 43, was about completed.

Improvement of the Water-front Between West Eleventh and Gansevoort Streets.

The work of improvement of the water-front at Gansevoort section, extending from West Eleventh to Gansevoort street, has been in progress; 39 concrete blocks were set in the wall and about 1,517 lineal feet of granite have been set; 636 feet of the wall at this section have been practically completed, 283 lineal feet of coping being set, and earth filling is being placed behind the wall.

This section embraces new piers at West Eleventh, Bank, Bethune, Jane and Gansevoort streets. Of these the pier at West Eleventh street was completed during the last quarter, and work has been in progress on the remaining four.

Sheds are being constructed on the piers at West Eleventh, Bethune and Gansevoort streets by the lessees.

West Thirty-third Street Section.

Some work of stone filling has been done on this section.

West Thirty-fourth Street Section.

Substantial progress has been made on this section during the quarter, and earth filling is now being placed in rear of wall. The old pier at the foot of Thirty-fourth street was removed to make way for a new pier to be built by the force of the Department.

Pier at West Fiftieth Street.

This pier is being extended out to the pier-head line of 1897 under contract. A contract for building a recreation structure on the pier has been awarded.

Pier at West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth Street.

The work of extending and repairing this pier has been in progress. A contract for building a recreation structure on the pier has been awarded.

EAST RIVER.

Pier at Twentieth Street.

A new pier is being built at the foot of the street by the force of the Department.

East Ninety-ninth Street Section.

The work of depositing earth filling at this section has been in progress. The ferry premises at the foot of East Ninety-ninth street are being removed by the New York and College Point Ferry Company, to enable the wall to be built at the old ferry location.

Recreation Structure at One Hundred and Twelfth Street, Harlem River.

A recreation structure on the Pier at One Hundred and Twelfth street, Harlem river, is being built.

Department Yards at West Fifty-seventh and East Twenty-fourth Streets.

At the Department yards, the force of the Department has been engaged in the construction of concrete blocks, the handling and cutting of granite, the care of material and the issuance of supplies for various pieces of work.

The yards have been maintained in good order and condition. At the Timber Basin, timber received under various contracts and Treasurer's Orders has been cared for and issued as required.

FLOATING PROPERTY.

All the floating property of the Department has been in use during the quarter and has been repaired from time to time as necessity required.

SURVEYING PARTY.

Surveys of the water-front and the structures thereon on the North, East and Harlem rivers in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx have been made.

An extensive survey of the water-fronts of the Boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond is in progress.

All the lines, levels, grades, surveys, soundings and examinations have been made and given as required.

DREDGING.

All dredging has been supervised, whether done by the Department or by private parties.

SHERMAN'S CREEK.

The work of filling-in in the rear of the crib-bulkhead erected at Sherman's creek and the removal of the reef of rock in front of the same is in progress.

REPAIRS.

Repairs other than dredging have been made at various places under order of the Board; repairs, alterations and other pieces of work by private parties, under order or permit of the Board of Docks, have been supervised during the quarter.

In the office of the Engineer-in-Chief, the Draughtsmen have been engaged on plans and studies for contract work, plans for the improvement of the water-front, plans and specifications for new piers and repairs, change of lines, examination of plans submitted by private parties, solar printing and general office work.

The total new wharfage room made by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the quarter amounted to 2,548 lineal feet.
