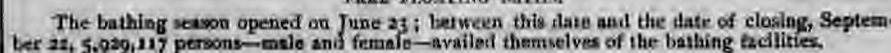

Certificates were issued for the installation of 99,447 incandescent and 1,168 arc lamps, 38 generators of a total of 686½ kilo-watts capacity and 1,514 motors of a total of 4,724½ horse power capacity; 2,925 certificates were issued for interior wiring.

10,362 miles of overhead wires were removed from the streets, and 15,271 inspections were made by the inspectors during the quarter.

## OFFICE OF ASSISTANT ENGINEER.

The experiment of using a cheaper grade of coal (buckwheat) at the light and power plant of the Criminal Court-house has been continued, and results show a saving of about \$650. This result has been so far satisfactory that the same experiment is being tried at the Harlem Court-house.

An annual saving of \$1,000 has been accomplished by the adoption of improved methods of lighting Boulevard Lafayette, Depot lane, Washington Bridge, Fort Washington Park and High Bridge Park; and a saving of \$1,476 has been accomplished during the quarter in the consumption of gas in the various public buildings using gas only.

## DOCUMENT "C."

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS, LIGHTING AND SUPPLIES,  
BUREAU OF REPAIRS AND SUPPLIES, NOS. 13 TO 21 PARK ROW,  
NEW YORK, October 15, 1900.

Hon. HENRY S. KEARNY, Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies:

DEAR SIR:—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of the Bureau for the quarter ending September 30, 1900.

## CRIMINAL COURT BUILDING.

The usual orders were renewed for cleaning glass in doors and windows. Plumbers' and carpenters' supplies, supplies for cleaning purposes and engineer's and electrical supplies were furnished. 2 barrels of soap powder and 1 barrel of cylinder oil, 12 carboys of 1,300° electrolyte, 1 refrigerator No. 6 with 2 refrigerator pans, 1 Nepple lift discharge and test pump, 100 feet 3/4-inch rubber hose with nozzle and reel furnished. 3 sets of halyards furnished and reeved on flagpole on roof of above building. 35 shades made of Nonpareil shade cloth hung on old rollers put up complete on windows of above building; 205 shades were repaired and new tin rollers furnished where necessary. A galvanized iron blower pipe 30 inches by 14 inches by 34 inches with elbows, etc., complete, properly connected with window on Elm street side of engine-room, furnished and put up complete in engine-room. The steam and electric plants in above building were thoroughly repaired and overhauled. Old material used where practicable, new material where necessary. The main roof and ventilators of above building were thoroughly repaired. The following repairs were made to elevators Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6, stops adjusted and regulated.

No. 2. New operating cable furnished and put in place at the bottom of shaft.  
No. 3. New bushings furnished and put in place in the hand rope pulleys and new packing put in place in the pistons.

No. 4. Piston and valve repacked, operating rope renewed; operating lever and lead leading sheaves under the valve wheel repaired, and same raised to allow clearance for rope.

The hinges in fan shaft, also plates in floor of boiler-room, repaired.  
The plastering was repaired in four rooms on Centre street side and eight rooms on White street side on top floor of above building. The brickwork cut down to enable steamfitters to work around air ducts and same rebuilt. The plastering was also repaired in twelve rooms of above building on Franklin street side.

Cloth covered screens taken out, also recovered and replaced.  
Matrons' room—Toilet cabinet with a supply of clean towels weekly furnished.  
Supreme Court, Criminal Term, Judges' Chambers—Two toilet cabinets with a supply of clean towels weekly furnished.

Court of Special Sessions—Three toilet cabinets with a supply of clean towels weekly were furnished. 2 City Directories were furnished. Side walls were prepared and washed off. Ceilings were decorated. The side walls were painted four coats of paint composed of Atlantic White Lead and Linseed Oil. All necessary repairs made to the plastering. Walls and ceilings were decorated the same as in Part II of General Sessions, in same building, colors changed where necessary. All stains in plaster work received a coat of shellac before calcimine or paint was applied. All woodwork was thoroughly washed off and sandpapered. All bare spots of woodwork bleached and touched up to correspond in color with other woodwork, and all received one coat of cabinet rubbing varnish.

Court of General Sessions—7 copies of Cook's Criminal and Penal Codes (annotated) for the year 1900 and 2 copies of Trow's Directory for Manhattan and The Bronx for the year 1900 were furnished.

Judges' Chambers—5 toilet cabinets with a supply of clean towels weekly were furnished.  
Clerks' Office—1 toilet cabinet with a supply of clean towels weekly was furnished.  
Coroners' Office—1 toilet cabinet with a supply of clean towels weekly was furnished.

Civil Service Commission—4 New York City Directories, 4 Brooklyn Directories, for 1900; 2 No. 18 quartered oak standard desks, 6 feet; 2 quartered oak revolving chairs, Bank of England style; 1 quartered oak 8-foot library table; 1 quartered oak 4-foot library table; 1 quartered oak 3-foot office table; 1 dozen small tables; 6 quartered oak armchairs, spindle back, Bank of England style; 1 roller bookshelf cabinet, containing 12 metal roller bookshelves; 1 special quartered oak cabinet containing 96 drawers; 1 roll-top typewriter desk; 1 Edison oscillating mimeograph, and 46,000 index cards were furnished. 2 safes were removed from the Criminal Court Building to new offices of above Commission on fifth floor of No. 345 Broadway; 1 large Marvin's safe removed from room 531 to 540 in above office. 2 large metallic cases were boxed and removed to new offices of above Commission; 18 awnings, with double galvanized iron frame, properly secured to stonework with patent bolts, etc., covered with best Crown striped canvas, furnished and put up.

District Attorney's Office—One Underwood typewriting machine furnished.

## COUNTY COURT-HOUSE.

The usual orders for steam supply were renewed, 5 toilets and 4 urinals were furnished and installed in above building in accordance with plans on file in this office. Cleaning supplies, including soap powder, 5 dozen feather dusters and 1 barrel of Tillinghast's disinfectant were furnished. The orders for cleaning glass in windows and doors of above building were renewed. The curtains, draperies, portieres, etc., in the various court rooms and offices in above building were taken down, cleaned, repaired and rehung. The steel roof on the above building was repaired and painted, 1 large McBride & Davidson safe shifted and raised, and platform made for same. 11 window shades hung on Hartshorn rollers, made of best Nonpareil shade cloth, furnished and put up complete. Old and worn-out parts of Welshach lights replaced with new parts. Arches and halls in above building were bricked up, and new tiling furnished where necessary in various closets, also step platform of stoop recut.

Supreme Court—In Special Term, Parts I. and II., two 15-inch Lundell motor fans, with all necessary fixtures complete, furnished and installed.

Surrogate's Office—One dozen cane-seat bentwood chairs furnished, 23 yards of tile-pattern linoleum furnished and laid. Order for 1 set of telephone instruments connected with Exchange, and 2 Exchange stations connected with telephone in above office during remainder of year issued.

Old and worn-out parts of Welshach burners were replaced with new parts. 6 dozen bottles Lion brand typewriter oil, for use of above office, were furnished.

## NEW HALL OF RECORDS.

A well was built in cellar, on Centre street side of new building, in accordance with plans and specifications on file in this office.

## HARLEM COURT-HOUSE.

The usual cleaning supplies were furnished. Orders were renewed to clean glass in windows and doors in above building. All worn-out parts of Welshach burners were replaced with new parts. 4 six-inch leaders were taken down, repaired and painted and replaced, and new parts furnished where necessary.

West Washington—The steel rolling shutters were repaired, painted and scraped at the following stands of above Market: Nos. 18, 20, 22, 24, 27, 38, 40, 42, 49, 51 and 53 Thompson avenue; Nos. 25, 27, 29, 47 and 49 Loew avenue; Nos. 26, 28, 44, 46 and 48 Bloomfield avenue; Nos. 34, 36, 40, 42, 44, 46 and 48 Lawton avenue; Nos. 17 and 18 Thirteenth avenue; Nos. 23, 24, 25, 30, 32 and 33 Hewitt avenue. The old skylights over stand No. 309, in above Market, removed, frame repaired where necessary, and new galvanized-iron skylight, about 6 feet 8 inches square, 2 feet 6 inches high, with louvers all around and hip skylight on top, glazed with 1/4-inch glass, put in place. All damaged tin on roofs, gutters, lanterns, etc., on the roofs of above Market removed and replaced with new tin. All damaged leaders or parts thereof removed and all replaced with same size and quality leaders at present in use. All new tin received one coat of paint on under side before being applied and two coats of paint on top. All old tin received one coat of paint also. Quality of paint used, Prince's metallic ground in linseed oil, and Atlantic white lead, in equal portions. All seams and joints were carefully examined and properly soldered where necessary. All flashings were properly secured with paint skins. All old rubbish was removed from premises and same left broom clean. Old plaster cut out of ceilings and side walls at stands Nos. 20, 22 and 24, and same repaired.

Clinton—All worn-out parts of Welshach lights replaced with new parts; 6 dozen street brooms and 6 dozen corn brooms were furnished.

F. heavy, N. P. drinking cups with handles, properly fastened to marble wainscoting with necessary brass chain, bolts and holders, furnished and put in place, in connection with drinking fountain. The top floor over stairway was reinforced, and stairway repaired and reconstructed. 1 combination cabinet to contain 8 document files and 3 rolling book shelves in the upper section, same to be covered with sliding curtain with lock. The lower section to have 1 sliding shelf, underneath same 2 box drawers, underneath the box drawers a cupboard containing pigeon holes, 2 of the pigeon holes to have pigeon-hole box with hinge tops. Underneath these pigeon holes, on the right-hand side of the cupboard, a Shannon letter files. On the left-hand side of the cupboard a small sub cupboard containing 1 cash drawer and one regular drawer. All special cupboards, regular cupboards, box drawers, etc., to be locked with 1 key. The walls and ceilings were washed off, all plaster cracks filled; ceilings were decorated. The walls received 2 coats of paint with frieze; decorations made equally as good as that at present on walls. All woodwork was washed off, bleached up where necessary, and received 1 coat of wax varnish. The rooms of Companies A, B, C, H, and I painted in same manner as Staff room, except that the decoration is similar to that in present room of Company B. The room of Company K had that part of ceiling damaged by water repaired, redecorated to correspond with the balance of ceiling. The first and second main hallway, including that part of stairs connected therewith, also the two upper main hallways, were painted and decorated as directed. The



plastering in the two upper main hallways and stairways in above Armory was repaired and all rubbish removed from premises. 120 chairs were recaned and 36 chairs repaired and upholstered, 800 keys fitted for Yale locks, two master keys for same, and 200 brass checks stamped as directed furnished, 33 Yale locks altered to fit master keys and 12 Yale locks repaired. About 675 yards of carpet taken up, cleaned and relaid in above Armory. The old tubes in upright boiler in above Armory were removed and replaced with 56 new 2-inch charcoal tubes, the safety valves were also renipped. Roof on northwest and southwest corner of drill room reinforced with angle-iron bolts, lag screws, etc., 30 inside and 24 outside target frames and two pistol target easels constructed and set in place. Sash cords placed where necessary. High railing with scroll border and pickets on top, handhole with wicket gate and glass shelf made and erected in Adjutant's office.

Ninth Regiment—All worn-out parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts. The following supplies were furnished: 1 case laundry soap, 1 case of Bon Ami (6 dozen to a box), 1 box toilet paper (best roll) and 6 dozen cotton mops (15 pounds) and 1 barrel of Marvin's floor dressing. Repairs, alterations, etc., were made as directed to the steam plant in above Armory. Order was issued for a supply of electric current to operate motors in above Armory. Old plaster cut out of ceilings and side walls and same repaired.

Twelfth Regiment—All worn-out parts of Welsbach lamps were replaced with new parts. Lockers about 26 feet long, 10 feet high and 2 feet 8 inches deep were made and erected in above Armory. Fronts and ends of lockers are made of ash, the interior made of pine. About 400 yards of carpet was taken up, cleaned and relaid. 2 barrels of Crown "A" soap was furnished.

Twenty-second Regiment—All worn-out parts of Welsbach lamps were replaced with new parts. Nine large lockers for uniforms, etc., one saddle case and one pistol case was made and erected in Quartermaster's room in above Armory. Fronts and ends of lockers made of ash; all interior made to correspond as nearly as possible with woodwork at present in said room. Necessary repairs were made to drill room floor in above Armory as directed. The woodwork on the drill room floor and main entrance in the above building was cleaned off, bleached, stained and varnished as directed.

Sixty-ninth Regiment—All worn-out parts of Welsbach lamps were replaced with new parts. The following supplies were furnished: 1 coal scow No. 3, 1/2 dozen snow shovels (steel), 1 combination bench vise, 1 set Armstrong stocks and dies, 1/2 inch to 1 inch; 1 three wheeled cutter for iron pipe, one 24-inch Stillson wrench, one 18-inch Stillson wrench 2 dozen Ball's lamp wick, 1 box Dixon's graphite and 100 pounds chloride of lime was furnished. All necessary repairs were made to slate roof, all chimney tops secured and same painted. The gutters all around the roof of above Armory were repaired and painted and new gutters furnished where necessary. Two new chimney-tops placed on Sixth street side of above Armory. The tin roof over entrance on Seventh street side repaired and painted. Four 3-inch leaders also repaired and painted and 75 feet of new 3-inch leaders furnished. 12 lockers made and erected in above Armory having bronze hardware.

One 6-inch Rider gas engine with all necessary connections for water supply and discharge to tank, and all necessary gas connections, furnished and put up in above Armory. The pipes used in all cases the same as those at present in use. One platform, size and construction as directed, upon which to place the above-mentioned engine furnished. The engine was properly secured to platform and placed where directed in pump room in the above Armory. Two sets of halyards were furnished and placed on flagpole.

Squadron "A"—All worn-out parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts. New grate bars were furnished and put in place under boilers in above Armory, also walking beams for pumps, piston rods with buckets for pumps made and put in place. Opening out in window guard and gate made for same with necessary hinges, lock, etc.; 24 stalls were removed and 24 new stalls constructed and erected in their place. The walls and ceilings of Troop C locker-room were prepared and painted; also the walls and ceilings of reception room were painted and decorated. All woodwork cleaned off and varnished. All the walls and ceilings of the Major's room, Adjutant's room and room occupied by Captain Chapman, large toilet-room, bath-room, and large hall in corridor on same floor cleaned off, prepared and tinted in colors, as directed, receiving two coats of water-color paint after preparation. All woodwork was cleaned off, touched up where necessary and bleached, then given one coat of wax varnish. The walls and ceilings of non-commissioned officers room, locker-room, large toilet and winding hallway were also prepared and painted, as directed. The tower hallway leading to band room and tower hallway leading to kitchen were prepared and painted and all woodwork varnished. All the necessary plumbing, excavating and concreting incidental to the removal and erection of 24 new stalls was performed as directed. All the old rubbish was removed from the stable floor in above Armory and same left broom clean. Iron work on stalls were reinforced.

Order renewed for 1 set of telephone instruments and switchboard connected with exchange in above office; 1 quartered oak pigeon-hole case, containing 264 pigeon-holes, as per sketch on file, furnished and erected in above office, also 1 roll-top desk, 5-foot, No. 67, made of quartered oak; 1 stationary case, constructed in accordance with plans on file in office of Bureau of Repairs and Supplies; fronts, ends and exposed parts of same made of oak and balance of woodwork as directed; doors furnished with flat key locks, keys for upper and lower sections different from others; 1 dozen cane-seat bentwood chairs, 1 Bailey letter-press and stand and 1 Vost typewriting machine with No. 4 Elite type. Three 16-inch Lundell fans were repaired, also 1 16-inch Deihl motor fan removed from Mayor's office, the same repaired and installed in above office; also 1 Western electric fan removed from Surrogate's office, repaired and installed in above office. Safe and furniture were shifted to permit the laying of carpet; 15 window shades made of Nonpareil shade cloth, hung on Hartshorn tin rollers with all necessary fixtures complete were furnished and put up. Two toilet cabinets with a supply of clean towels weekly were furnished.

#### COUNTY JAIL.

All worn-out parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts; 2 1/2 dozen large-size sponges, 1/2 dozen chammois skins, 1/2 dozen ostrich feather dusters, 15 inch; 4 dozen cuspidors, painted; 1 dozen wooden pails, 1 dozen mop wringers and 6 cakes of Bon Ami were furnished. The ceilings and walls of that portion of the building known as the United States side was cleaned off, all cracks pointed up and repaired and painted two coats of cold-water paint. The wainscot or dado was painted 6 feet high. Floor of corridor and balconies received 2 coats of lead and oil paint. All the ironwork received 1 coat of asphaltum. Lattice work dividing United States part from Civil part was painted 2 coats of paint. ## VOLUNTEER FIREMEN'S HEADQUARTERS.

All wrought parts of Welsbach burners were replaced with new parts. The defective tin was removed from roof of above building and same replaced with tin of best quality.

## CORPORATION COUNSEL.

One roll-top desk, No. 67, one N. Y. C. chair, one 72-drawer steel document file cabinet with Acme lock, and 8 Trow's City Directories for 1900 were furnished; 45 yards of carpet was taken up and cleaned.

## COMMISSIONER OF ACCOUNTS.

Four City directories and one business directory were furnished. One 16-inch Hurricane fan motor was furnished and installed. In consequence of moving partitions in the above office, it was necessary to change electric call-bell service. Bureau of Lamps and Gas—1 toilet cabinet with a supply of clean towels weekly, 1 Trow's City Directory for 1900, 1 Eureka copying cloth bath No. 2, and 2 dozen cloth were furnished.

Storeroom—Bureau of Lamps and Gas, No. 49 Beekman street—The defective tin on roof at above storeroom was cut out and replaced with new tin of best quality; 1 new 5-inch galvanized iron leader about 49 feet long, and 1 new 10-inch chimney top with base about 6 feet high was furnished, and new chimney top repaired.

## FREE FLOATING BATHS.

The usual orders for lumber and small supplies were renewed. Policies of insurance were taken out, insuring against all direct loss or damage by fire the fifteen Free Floating Baths and the furniture and fixtures appertaining thereto, from July 13, 1900, to July 13, 1901. 2 corner awnings made of 10-ounce duck, with all necessary fixtures complete, were furnished and put up on One Hundred and Twelfth Street Bath and East Twenty-fourth Street Bath; also 2 corner awnings and 6 roller awnings, made of 10-ounce duck, with all fixtures, ropes, etc., complete, were furnished and placed on Bath No. 14. Orders were issued to shift barges and lighters to clear slip and change location of Bath No. 15 from Market street, East river, to Pier 33, between Pike and Rutgers streets, East river.

Winter quarters were secured for Free Floating Baths in South Brooklyn, at the foot of Twenty-ninth street to Thirty-third street. The anchors and chains of East One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street Bath, East Fifty-first street Bath, and Battery Bath were securely removed and stored at Corporation Yard.

The bathing season closed on September 23, and the baths were towed from their respective berths on the East and North rivers to their winter quarters, where they will be overhauled and repaired for the forthcoming bathing season.

The bathing season was opened June 23, and between that date and September 22, the day of closing, 5,929,117 persons availed themselves of the bathing facilities.

This Department has received a number of communications during the past bathing season, complaining of the locations at which the baths were placed, claiming that they were too near sewer outlets. Upon investigation, these complaints were found to be partly true, and were remedied as far as possible with the assistance of the Dock Department, and the Department will endeavor to secure cleaner and more convenient berths for next season.

## BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

Two galvanized-iron fire lines were installed in above building, same placed as directed and in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Fire Department.

Three toilet cabinets with a supply of clean towels weekly were furnished.

A continuation of the panel work was made and erected, being 44 feet long, and 7 feet high, with two openings for pay windows with sliding sash. A counter was also erected behind said panel work, made similar to panel work at present in above office. The iron railing was removed from Room 14 to 16, same reconstructed and placed as directed in Room 21 in above office. DEAR SIR—In compliance with the directions contained in your letter of September 24, I herein submit a report of the transactions of the Bureau of Lamps and Gas for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, for the quarter ending September 30, 1900.

Exhibit "A" is a statement showing the amounts on voucher for gas and electric currents supplied to the various Public Markets, Offices, Armories, etc., and for lighting and maintaining the public lamps.

Exhibit "B" is a summary of the Appropriation for "Lamps and Lighting," 1900, showing vouchers drawn during the quarter amounting to three hundred and twenty thousand three hundred and ninety-four dollars and fifty-seven cents (\$320,394.57), leaving an available balance of three hundred and forty-one thousand five hundred and twenty-one dollars and fifty-nine cents (\$341,521.59).

Exhibit "C" is a summary of the Lamp Account, showing the number of new lamps lighted, old lamps relighted and lamps discontinued during the quarter: 163 new gas lamps, 115 new naphtha lamps, 279 new Welsbach naphtha lamps and 366 new electric lamps have been lighted, 20 gas lamps have been relighted; 628 gas lamps, 311 naphtha lamps and 69 electric lamps have been discontinued. Of the gas lamps discontinued, 404 were extinguished on account of electric lights. The total number of lamps lighted on September 30 was 23,729 gas, 1,391 naphtha, 730 Welsbach naphtha and 4,855 electric, making a total of 30,705 lamps.

Exhibit "D" is a statement showing the candle power of the gases supplied to the city by each of the gas companies as are in the reach of our photometric stations.

The following statement will show the average amount of impurities found in the gases of the several gas companies as determined by E. G. Love, Ph. D., the Gas Examiner, at the Laboratories of the Department:

Hon. HENRY S. KEARNY, Commissioner:

SIR—In accordance with your instructions I submit herewith a report of the transactions of the office of Assistant Engineer for the quarter ending September 30, 1900.

Four men have been employed in office, laboratory, draughting room and general outside inspection.

Estimates have been made on the cost of heat and power in various public buildings and reports presented on proposed alterations. The use of a cheap grade of fuel (buckwheat coal) at the light and power plant of the Criminal Court-house has been continued with satisfactory results and with a net saving of about \$650. This fuel is now being tried at the Harlem Court-house.

Special plans have been prepared showing proposed improvements and alterations in lighting Boulevard Lafayette, Depot lane, Washington Bridge, Fort Washington Park, High Bridge Park; and the annual saving on these and minor changes recommended and adopted during the quarter is over \$3,000.

Maps of the City have been corrected up to September 30, 1900, showing the gas, electric and naphtha street lighting system of the several boroughs, as given in Table "A" with a grand total of 60,539 lamps.

In the laboratory tests of Portland cement for the new Hall of Records have been in progress—first, of samples taken from eight carload shipments, and later of the same cement as delivered. The long-time tests are of cement used on the same building early in the year. A summary of the average results obtained follows in tables marked "B," "C," and "D."

The saving of gas in buildings which use no electric lighting is shown in Table "E," and amounts to \$1,476.

The Chief of the Bureau prepared the following report for the Commission:

Additional statistics which have been compiled by the Bureau since the last report show the results of the work of the Court of Special Sessions, the Board of City Magistrates and the Department of Correction. These statistics will give the number, sex, etc., of persons arraigned and convicted of the various crimes and offenses, the cost per capita of convicts in the City prisons, the Workhouse, etc., number of convicts employed at skilled and unskilled labor, the amount earned by convicts during the year, the number of prisoners received in the City prisons and other particulars relating to crime.



The complete statistics of crime from all the courts and prosecuting officials are desirable, as the study of its cause and prevention is constantly attracting widespread attention.

In a recent able editorial in the "New York Times" on the "Cost of Crime," it is shown that crime costs the community much more than education, and the statistics—if the cost of the police, criminal courts and prosecuting officials are included—seem to verify the statement.

Complete statistics of this subject, compiled according to the Wins classification, would prove of great advantage in aiding the study of the cause and prevention of crime.

The subject of colonizing habitual criminals in some portion of the recently acquired colonies of the United States and not allow them to return to the scenes, environments and companionship of their former criminal associates seems to be receiving greater attention and favor chiefly on account of the difficulty of obtaining employment for persons having a criminal record and the possibility of their evil influences with those whom they may be brought in contact with.

The statistics of the Department of Water Supply will show the amount of potable water used in The City of New York, and other interesting facts relating to this very important department.

Pure water is essential to life and health, and its supply should in no way be curtailed.

It is necessary that the water supply should be abundant and plentiful without any restriction whatever placed on its use. The use of the water of the upper Hudson or Lake George, which I regard as a natural reservoir, is suggested, not alone for its ability to provide this city with an unlimited water supply for years to come, but would be capable of supplying all the reservoirs of the cities along the line of the Aqueduct. The water supply of this city ought to be daily examined, chemically and microscopically, so as to enable the authorities to keep it pure and to warn the public of any impurity in it. No expense should be spared by the City for the most approved plan of filtration, or some other means to keep it pure. An abundant and unrestricted supply of water would greatly increase the manufacturing industries of the city.

The number of meters given will show some of the restrictions placed against the waste of water.

In the report I made to the Metropolitan Board of Health of New York published in the year 1899 I called attention to the use of salt water for extinguishing fires, cleaning the streets, sewers, etc. The use of river water for the above purposes would be the means of saving a corresponding amount of drinking water.

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, did submit to this the Local Board of the borough aforesaid, at its meeting held November 23, 1900, petition of resident and taxpayers of Woodhaven and South Woodhaven, in Fourth Ward of said borough, for the "right of way" (or legal opening) between the Old South road and Liberty avenue, in ward and borough aforesaid; and

Whereas, This Board did, in conformity with notice published, afford public hearing thereon, at which no person appeared in opposition thereto; and

Whereas, It is the opinion of this Board that compliance with said petition would be for the best interests of the city; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it cause Ferry street in (Woodhaven) Fourth Ward, said borough, to be laid down upon the City map of said section to be adopted, as continued on from its present terminus to and across Liberty avenue unto and intersect with the Old South road, and that upon the final adoption of such map it give that favorable consideration and prompt action toward having the necessary proceedings instituted whereby The City of New York will "obtain the right of way" or have same legally opened by acquiring title thereto as a public highway from Atlantic avenue to the Old South road aforesaid.

Also,

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, did submit to this the Local Board of the borough aforesaid, at its meeting held November 23, 1900, petition for the legal opening of Franklin street in First Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York, from its junction with Main street, Newtown and Flushing avenues, down to the foot thereof at the bulkhead-line in the East river in ward and borough aforesaid; and

Whereas, This Board did, in conformity with notice published, accord public hearing thereon at which no person appeared in opposition thereto; and

Whereas, It is the opinion of this Board that compliance with said petition would be for the best interests of this city; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it give the subject-matter of the petition its prompt and favorable consideration and action toward causing the necessary proceedings to be instituted whereby The City of New York will acquire title in said street for a public highway.

Also,

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, did submit to this the Local Board of the borough aforesaid, at its meeting held November 23, 1900, petition of owners of real estate on Front street, in First Ward of borough, in city aforesaid, for the extension of public water-main in said street, from the corner of Pidgeon street to Newtown creek in said ward and borough, and that the necessary fire-hydrants be connected therewith; and

Whereas, The reasonable demand that the requirements be responded to by the City meets with the approval of this Board; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it give the subject-matter of the petition its favorable consideration and action.

Also,

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, did submit to this the Local Board of the borough aforesaid, at its meeting held November 23, 1900, petition of owners of real estate on Johnson avenue, in (Jamaica) Fourth Ward, borough and city aforesaid, that permit be granted to the Jamaica Water Supply Company to enable it to extend its mains on the north side of Johnson avenue, between Tyndal street and Jamaica avenue, a distance of two hundred (200) feet in said ward and borough; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it extend to the wishes of the petitioners such favorable consideration and action as will enable the Jamaica Water Supply Company to make full response to the requirements of the inhabitants along the aforesaid avenue if embraced within the territory of its franchise and the terms thereof, and as the law in the matter may make obligatory so to do.
