FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Report for the Quarter Ending September 30, 1911.

January 5, 1912.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor of The City of New York.

SIR—Pursuant to the provisions of section 154 of the Greater New York Charter, I have the honor to transmit herewith report of the operations and action of this department for the quarter ending September 30, 1911.

The budget appropriations made to this department in the several boroughs for the year 1911 aggregated \$2,107,329.00. Of this amount there was expended during the third quarter \$2,044,204.37, which, added to the amount expended during the first and second quarters (\$2,042,600.20), made a total of \$4,086,804.57, leaving available at the close of the third quarter a balance of \$63,124.63.

Uniformed Force.

On September 30, 1911, the uniformed force in all the boroughs aggregated 4,390. On said date there were in service 230 apparatus companies. During the quarter 18 probationary firemen were appointed, and 23, having satisfactorily completed their probationary period of service, were appointed fourth grade firemen. There were 34 promotions during the quarter. The number of retirements on application was 9, 1 being on full pay (that of Deputy Chief of Department Thomas J. Ahearn) and 8 on one-half pay; and for disability, 6 on one-half pay and 2 on one-third pay, a total of 8. The retirements from both causes aggregated 17. The number of dismissals was 3. There were 9 deaths in the active force, 6 on the retired list and 1 on the relieved list. The cases of illness were 293 and of injury 119, being 412 in all, and the time lost from each cause, 3,929 and 2,121, respectively, a total of 6,050.

There were 3,519 alarms for fire received, of which number 3,173 were fires.

Civilian Force.

The civilian force on September 30, 1911, numbered 555.

Fire Alarm Telegraph.

At the end of the third quarter the underground system in the Borough of Manhattan consisted of 138.97 miles of cable in subways. During the quarter 7,234 feet of cable were used, of which 3,551 were for extensions to the system and 3,683 for alterations and repairs; 1,200 feet of aerial cable, 500 feet of aerial wire and 16 feet of pipe were laid for purposes of alterations and repairs.

In the Borough of The Bronx 1,000 feet of wire were strung for alterations and repairs to the system.

In the Borough of Richmond 250 feet of aerial cable and 6,080 feet of wire were strung for alterations and repairs.

In the Borough of Brooklyn, at the close of the third quarter, 1,116.93 miles of electrical conductors were in operation.

In the Borough of Queens 16,506.80 feet of wire were used for repairs and replacements.

Fire Prevention.

During the quarter 3,190 inspections of buildings were made; 631 at the request of the Police Department and the Bureau of Licenses of premises for which applications were made for theatrical and common show and public dance hall licenses; also 4 at the instance of the Department of Health in cases where lodging house permits were sought. There were 2,563 inspections of theatres. The total number of inspections of all kinds was 6,388.

Fires.

The total number of fires during the third quarter in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond was 2,200, with a total estimated loss of \$1,111,917, and an average loss per fire of \$505.

In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens the total number of fires was 973, with a total estimated loss of \$634,190 and an average loss per fire of \$651.78.

The aggregate number of fires in all Boroughs was 3,173, with a total estimated loss of \$1,745,207.

The number of arrests for arson in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond was 7, the disposition of which was as follows: Convicted and sentenced, 3; acquitted by jury, 1; discharged by magistrate, 1; Grand Jury failed to indict, 2.

The number of arrests for arson in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens was 6, the disposition of which was as follows: Convicted and sentenced, 1; discharged by magistrates, 2; of the other 3 cases, 2 were awaiting the action of the Grand Jury and 1 the action of a Police Magistrate.

Combustibles and Explosives.

The total amount of receipts for licenses, permits and penalties during the third quarter was \$23,205. Special surveys to the number of 10,369 were made to determine the fitness of premises for the storage of combustibles and explosive material. In this total is included the number of complaints investigated. Special surveys were made of places of amusement in 759 cases. The number of blasting operations supervised was 21,975. There were 274 seizures of explosives and examination was made of 28 explosive and dangerous contrivances.

Fire Apparatus.

During the quarter there were purchased 4 auto high pressure hose wagons and 2 auto delivery trucks. During the quarter there has been on trial one Waterous auto engine.

In the machine, blacksmith, wheelwright and rubber tire shops, 785 jobs were done; in the paint shops, 658, and in the harness shops, 607.

Buildings, Etc.

During the quarter 3 new sites were acquired at a total cost of \$11,400. There were 7 extensive repair jobs done at an outlay of \$12,714.80, and 475 of a minor character at a cost of \$2,531.51. One contract was awarded for the sum of \$1,432.

Horses.

At the close of the quarter there were in service 1,471 horses.

Stores.

The cost of supplies delivered to the paid and volunteer systems during the quarter amounted to \$7,195.09; of those received for said systems, \$2,754.60.

Contracts.

Contracts for supplies, for establishing and equipping extensions of fire alarm telegraph system and for alteration and repair work awarded during the second and third quarters and executed during the last mentioned quarter amounted to \$196,528.77. Agreements entered into during the third quarter for the purchase of supplies amounted to \$12,040.05. The aggregate of the contracts and agreements executed during the period covered by this report was \$208,568.82. Contracts awarded during the third quarter and not executed therein amounted to \$100,705.84. The total amount of unexecuted contracts at the close of the third quarter was \$102,971.84.

The delay in submitting the report of this Department for the third quarter of the year 1911 has been due to the fact that the Acting Fire Marshal, Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, was unable to submit his part thereof until yesterday, owing to his inability to ascertain earlier the amount of settlements on many losses by fire during said period. Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond.

On September 30, 1911, the active personnel of the Department in these boroughs numbered 3,047, the uniformed force comprising 2,647 members, assigned, with the exception of 39 chief officers (of whom 6 are medical officers), to the 145 companies of the 22 battalions. There are also 2 Chaplains, with the honorary rank of Chief of Battalion. The companies are classified as follows:

Of the above companies 6 are known as combination companies, each equipped with an engine, a hook and ladder truck and a hose wagon. Ten of the engine and 9 of the hook and ladder companies are known as double companies, provided with two sets of apparatus, one of which remains in quarters, while the other is absent in response to an alarm. Three of the engine companies are known as high pressure companies, 2 of them each supplied with two high pressure automobile hose wagons, and the third with two high pressure horse-drawn hose wagons. One engine company (No. 58) is equipped with an automobile engine and hose wagon. One of the engine companies and 2 of the hook and ladder companies have each a water tower assigned to them, one of which is an automobile (Engine Company 31). One engine company and 1 hook and ladder company are each equipped with a searchlight engine.

Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

On September 30, 1911, the active personnel of the Department in these boroughs numbered 1,898, the uniformed force comprising 1,743 members, assigned, with the exception of 33 chief officers (of whom 5 are medical officers) to the 113 companies of the 20 battalions. There are also 2 Chaplains, with the honorary rank of Chief of Battalion. The companies are classified as follows:

Of the above companies 13 are known as combination companies, each equipped with an engine, a hook and ladder truck and a hose wagon. Three of the engine companies are known as double companies, 1 equipped with 2 engines, 2 hose wagons and 1 hook and ladder truck, and 2 each equipped with 2 engines and 2 hose wagons. One of the single engine companies is equipped with a chemical engine and 1 with a searchlight engine. One of the hook and ladder companies has a water tower assigned to it.

BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

Synopsis of Proceedings.

A meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, December 19, 1911, at 3.30 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; and Messrs. Farley, O'Keefe, Paulding, Robbins, Sachs and Stern, Trustees. Excused—Mr. Drummond. The minutes of the meeting of December 5 were approved.

Bills amounting to \$47,908.61 were presented and ordered forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

A communication has been received from the Director of Laboratories, stating that the bids for subscriptions to the medical journals for the years 1911 and 1912 have been received and exceed \$1,000. Permission is requested, therefore, to advertise for these journals.

A communication has been received from Dr. A. A. Smith, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital, asking that Dr. Louis E. Klingon and Dr. Francis H. Marx be recommended to the Board for certificates as Pathological Internes, their names having by inadvertence been omitted from the list previously submitted.

It is recommended that a revision of the Budget schedules for 1912 be requested in order to conform with the present salary schedules.

The owner of the present residence of the General Medical Superintendent has made a request that the same be vacated, in order that certain construction work in connection with the property may be undertaken. While the lease does not expire until October, 1912, in view of the work that will be going on in the adjacent house, it would seem desirable to make a change in the near future. It is therefore requested that negotiations be begun at once for the leasing of a suitable house or apartment elsewhere.

Authority was granted to advertise for medical journals for the years 1911 and 1912.

The General Medical Superintendent was authorized to grant certificates as Pathological Internes to Drs. Klingon and Marx.

It was resolved to request a modification of the salary schedules for 1912, as recommended by the General Medical Superintendent.

The General Medical Superintendent was authorized to secure a new house or apartment for his own use and to report.

With the approval of the Committee on Supplies, the lowest bid in each case was accepted on the estimates received for open market purchases from November 21 to December 18.

With the approval of the Building Committee, the lowest bid in each case was accepted on the estimates received for open market purchases from November 21 to December 18.

Reports of Committees.

Mr. Farley reported that the Building Committee had made a careful investigation of the requirements of the Department for the authorization and issue of corporate stock during the year beginning July 1, 1912, and that consultations had been held with representatives of the various architects concerned in the building operations of the Department, and submitted several letters received on the subject. In submitting this report, Mr. Farley referred to a conference which had been held with McKim, Mead & White in regard to which section of the new Bellevue Hospital should be built next, and recommended that provision be included in the Corporate Stock Budget for Pavilions F and G, and that the architects be requested to proceed with the preparation of the plans for the entire central section of the new hospital, in order to determine whether or not it is advisable or necessary to build the proposed Pavilions E and H. The Chairman of the Building Committee also reported the steps which had been taken in regard to the acquisition of a new site for the proposed out-patient department at Gouverneur Hospital, and recommended that this building should include a new boiler house, Nurses' residence and employees' quarters, and that additional funds to the extent of \$200,000 be asked for that purpose. After consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, all the recommendations of the Building Committee were approved, and it was

Mr. Farley, Chairman of the Building Committee, submitted a letter received from Dr. S. S. Goldwater, dated December 14, stating that he was prepared to resume his duties as expert in hospital construction on January 1, 1912, and that he would proceed at once with the plans for the extension of Harlem Hospital.

Mr. Farley also reported upon the bids received at last meeting for the installation of the machinery in the new laundry building at Bellevue Hospital. It was resolved to accept the lowest bid received, and to award a contract accordingly to the American Laundry Machinery Company in the amount of \$61,197.

The Committee on Finance reported that upon investigation it had been found that \$29,000 would be required to meet the deficit in the appropriations for the current year, and stated that a request for revenue bonds in this amount had been made to the Board of Aldermen. The Committee further reported that a request had been made for the transfer of \$5,750 within the appropriations as recommended by the Contract Clerk. The report of the Finance Committee was approved.

Communications.

A communication dated December 5 was received from R. F. Almirall, transmitting final bill, amounting to \$11,374, in favor of the Benedetto & Egan Construction Company, contractors for the enclosure of the balconies at Fordham Hospital, and certifying that the contract had been executed on November 23, 1911.

It was resolved to authorize the acceptance of the contract as of that date, and to ask the Architect for a recommendation in regard to the delay in the completion of the work after October 15, 1911, when the contract expired.

A communication dated December 7 was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copy of resolution returning to this Department the offer of the Douglas Robinson, Charles S. Brown Company to sell property between 29th and 30th sts., and recommending that consideration of the question of the purchase of this property be deferred until the issue of corporate stock for the year 1912. As provision for the purchase of a site for the new power plant at Bellevue Hospital had been made in the Corporate Stock Budget, the communication was ordered placed on file.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital held on November 28 were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the resolution in regard to the services of physicians and surgeons to out patients while not on duty as assistant visiting physicians or surgeons to the hospital was disapproved, inasmuch as it was considered that they should attend during the two hours of the clinics and should take active part in the care and treatment of the patients, and not merely attend and supervise for one hour as stated in the resolution.

The minutes of the meeting of the Fordham Hospital Medical Board held on December 4 were presented. Action upon the nomination of internes was deferred, pending the receipt of further information which had been requested from the Medical Board in regard to these appointments. A resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on November 26, authorizing the issue of Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$400 to pay the salaries of three temporary employees, was read and ordered placed on file.

Two resolutions adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 29, modifying the salary schedules for the current year and transferring \$500 within the appropriations for salaries, were read and ordered placed on file.

A communication dated December 6 was received from the Borough President of Manhattan, stating that, while formal permission could not be given for the erection of a fence in front of Harlem Hospital, no objection would be raised on the part of the Borough President's Office if the Trustees proceed with the work.

Three copies of an assignment by the Namon Gewertz Company in favor of the Hardy Voorhees Company for the sum of \$314 were presented, and consent given to the assignment.

The General Medical Superintendent presented a list of special nurses, who had been authorized at Bellevue Hospital from December 5 to 19. The appointment of these nurses was approved.

A bill in favor of the Namon Gewertz Company, amounting to \$1,417.50, was received, being final payment on their contract for the alterations to Ward 31 of Bellevue Hospital. This bill was approved for payment, provided a certificate is received from the Architects that the work was completed within the contract time.

The minutes of the meeting of the Board of Managers of the Bellevue Training School held on December 1 were received.

New Business.

The General Medical Superintendent was directed to report upon the present situation in regard to the exercise of economies in the use of medical and surgical supplies ordered over five years ago.

It was resolved to ask for revenue bonds to meet salaries during the year 1912 as follows: Resident Physician (Assistant), alcoholic wards, \$600; Clerk, alcoholic wards, \$600; Trained Nurse (social service), Harlem Hospital, \$800; Increase to Mr. Dinwiddie, Investigator, from \$1,200 to \$1,500, \$300. Total \$2,300.

The General Medical Superintendent was asked to furnish evergreens for the wards of the hospitals at Christmas if funds are available, and at all events to arrange for their purchase by the City in all future years.

Mr. Paulding referred to bill introduced in Congress by Mr. Esch, regulating the manufacture of phosphorus matches, and having for its object the suppression of the disease known as "phossy jaw." The Secretary was directed to communicate with the Committee on Ways and Means, to which the bill had been referred, and to urge a favorable report upon the bill.

The General Medical Superintendent reported that some unknown person had been collecting money from the relatives of patients upon false representations, and submitted receipts which he had obtained from three different families who had been mulcted in this way. The Superintendent also reported the steps that had been taken in an effort to detect the responsible party. The General Medical Superintendent was authorized to communicate with the Police Department, and to issue through the press a warning to the public, and also to have this statement translated and published in the Jewish and Italian newspapers.

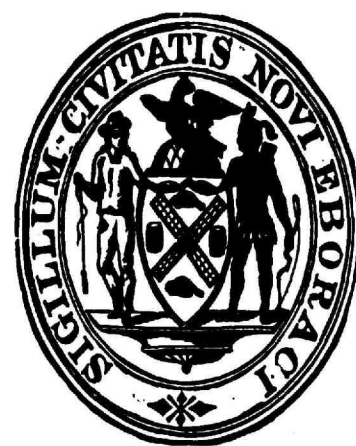

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Bronx Traction Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of the City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of the City of New York, as follows, to wit:

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This Contract, made this day of 1912, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Bronx Traction Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a double track extension to its present street surface railway, with the necessary wires and equipment, for the purpose of conveying passengers only in the Borough of the Bronx, in The City of New York, upon the following route, to wit:

Beginning at and connecting with the existing double track railway of the Company at or near the intersection of West Farms road with Westchester avenue; thence in, upon and along Westchester avenue to its intersection with Eastern boulevard, and to cross such other streets and avenues, named and unnamed, as may be encountered in said route.

The said route with turnouts, switches and crossovers hereby authorized is shown upon a map entitled: "Map showing proposed extension of The Bronx Traction Company in the Borough of the Bronx, City of New York, to accompany petition dated November 24, 1911, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment," and signed by Edward A. Maher, President, and T. F. Mullaney, Chief Engineer; a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, and is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description, and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within three (3) months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall within said three (3) months or within one (1) month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, until January 19, 1936, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years, and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other, fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the

annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding, provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum or above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

The annual charges herein provided are intended to include the percentages of gross receipts now required to be paid by railway companies to the City, pursuant to the Railroad Law, as amended.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any laws of the State of New York.

Fourth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payment for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privilege hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fifth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions over the route hereinbefore described.

The use of the railway constructed by the Company under this contract, including the tracks, wires and other equipment or any structures used in connection therewith in streets and avenues hereinbefore described shall be permitted by the Company, to any individual or corporation to which the City may have granted, or may hereafter grant, the right or privilege to use such streets and avenues for street railway purposes, upon payment of an annual sum by such individual or corporation to the Company,

which shall equal the legal interest on such proportion of the actual cost of the construction of such railway and structures, and additions and betterments thereto, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same; and also such proportion of the cost of keeping the tracks and electrical equipment in repair, and the cost of additions and betterments thereto, such proportion of laying and repairing of pavement and removal of snow and ice and all other duties imposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract in connection with the maintenance or the operation of said railway so used, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same, together with the actual cost of the power necessary for the operation of the cars thereon of such individual or corporation. Provided, however, that if, in the opinion of the Company, the legal rate of interest upon the cost of such railway shall be an insufficient sum to be paid for the use of such tracks, it may appeal to the Board and the Board may fix a percentage upon the cost to be paid to the Company, at a sum in excess of the legal rate of interest, if, in its opinion, such action is justified.

The Company shall not at any time oppose, but shall, upon the request of the Board, consent to the construction or operation of any street surface railway which may necessitate the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed by the Company pursuant to this contract.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipments of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without costs, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual. If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Eighth—The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within three (3) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are filed with the Board, or from the date of the order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court made pursuant to section 174 of the Railroad Law confirming the determination of the Commissioners appointed thereunder, that such railway ought to be constructed, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within three (3) months from the date of filing such consents or the date of such order; otherwise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City provided that the period for commencement and the period for completion and placing the railway in full operation may be extended by the Board, but the total extension of time for either of such periods shall not exceed in the aggregate six (6) months; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within the control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board a copy of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Ninth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Tenth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railway shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues, over which such officials have jurisdiction and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Eleventh—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of The Bronx, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Twelfth—Upon six (6) months' notice by the Board to the Company, all wires for the transmission of power, except trolley wires for the operation of the railway, upon all or any portion of the route hereby authorized, shall be placed in conduits beneath or alongside of the railway. The Company shall provide in such conduits two

(2) ducts not less than three (3) inches in diameter for the exclusive use of the City. Such ducts shall be used only by the Company for the operation of its railway and by the City, as above.

Thirteenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride from any point on its road, or on any road, line or branch operated by it or under its control, to any other point thereof, or of any connecting branch thereof, within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Department of the City, when such employees are in full uniform.

Fourteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway.

Fifteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Sixteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Seventeenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Eighteenth—Cars on said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty (30) minutes, both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as may be directed by the Board.

Provided, however, that the Company during the first five (5) years of this contract shall not be required to operate its cars between the hours of one (1) o'clock a. m. and five (5) o'clock a. m., each day, unless the Board shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public convenience requires the operation of cars during said hours.

Nineteenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues in which said railway shall be constructed, shall, if directed by the President of the Borough of The Bronx, cause to be watered at least three (3) times every twenty-four (24) hours when the temperature is above thirty-five (35) degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets and avenues, except when the width of such streets and avenues shall exceed sixty (60) feet between curb lines, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only sixty (60) feet in width of such roadway, and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets and avenues in a satisfactory manner.

Twentieth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets and avenues upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Twenty-first—As long as said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in any street or avenue, the Company shall pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street or avenue in which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. In case of the neglect of the Company to make pavement or repairs after the expiration of thirty (30) days' notice to do so from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, said President may make the same at the expense of the Company. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street or avenue, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City official, at its own expense, and the provisions as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twenty-second—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage systems, or to any other surface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-third—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a street surface railway shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twenty-fourth—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the railway is hereby authorized be changed at any time after the railway has been constructed and during the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets and avenues the Company shall take care of and protect the tracks and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Twenty-fifth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1, of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number of passengers carried during the year.
16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.

17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.

18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-sixth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross receipts from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts, the total miles in operation within the limits of the City, and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-seventh—In case of any violation or breach of failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-eighth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-ninth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Thirtieth—This grant is upon the express condition that any and all sums of money or any and all securities heretofore deposited with the Comptroller by the Company under and pursuant to franchises heretofore granted to it by the City as a fund for the security for the performance by the Company of the terms and conditions of the franchises so granted, shall likewise be a fund for the security for the faithful performance by the Company of all the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice, the quality of construction of the railway and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions or compliance with such orders, or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract and orders of the Board acting hereunder, relating to the roadway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheel-guards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheel-guards, in case of a violation of the provisions relating to those matters, all of which sums may be deducted from said fund.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President or other officer, to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount, and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Thirty-first—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City, as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direc-

tion, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Thirty-second—The words "streets or avenues" and "streets and avenues" wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, concourses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement," encountered in the route hereinabove described, and upon or in which authority is hereby given the Company to construct a railway.

Thirty-third—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers, shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Section 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New York.

Sec. 4. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of article 5 and the other provisions of the Railroad Law pertinent hereto shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Sec. 5. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.
