COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock A. M., on Wednesday, May 6, 1914.

Present at Roll Call—John Purroy Mitchel, Mayor; Alexander Brough, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; Henry Bruere, Chamberlain; Henry H. Curran, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

George McAneny, President, Board of Aldermen, arrived later. (See note.)

The minutes of the meetings held April 17 and 22, 1914, were approved as printed.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, transmitting for approval plan for the alteration and amendment to the plan for the improvement of the water-front and harbor of The City of New York in the vicinity of Pier 19, foot of Warren street, North River, Borough of Manhattan, made and adopted by the Commissioner of Docks April 28, 1914.

A public hearing being necessary, the following resolution was offered for adoption:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby fix 11 o'clock in the forenoon on Wednesday, May 27, 1914, in room 16, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, as the time and place for a public hearing, relative to a request of the Commissioner of Docks that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve the plan for the alteration and amendment of the plan for improving the water-front and harbor of The City of New York, as adopted by the Board of Docks April 13, 1871, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund April 27, 1871, in the vicinity of Pier 19, foot of Warren street, North River, Borough of Manhattan, adopted by the Commissioner of Docks April 28, 1914.

Which resolution was adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a lease to the City of premises at No. 81 Sullivan street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning: April 30th, 1914.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—The Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, in a communication to your Board, under date of March 26, 1914, requests a lease of the store at No. 81 Sullivan street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of his Department as a section station, for a period of three years, beginning May 1, 1914, at an annual rental of \$480, payable quarterly.

The premises in question consist of a store, 19 feet by 49 feet, and are to be used in place of the present section station now located at No. 99 Sullivan street, Manhattan, which, because of its unsanitary condition, has been ordered vacated by the Department of Health.

The premises desired to be leased, together with the basement, were previously rented at \$780 a year.

The lessor is to make outside repairs, pay taxes and water rates and provide janitor service; the lessee to supply heat and light and to make such inside repairs and alterations as it may deem necessary, and to keep the sidewalk clean during the term of the lease.

Deeming the rent reasonable and just, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a lease of the store, 19 feet by 49 feet, at No. 81 Sullivan street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning, for a period of three years from June 1, 1914, at an annual rental of \$480, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, provide janitor service and make outside repairs; the lessee to supply heat and light, make such inside repairs and alterations as it may deem necessary and keep the sidewalk clean during the term of the lease; lessor, Joseph De Lucia, 185 Spring street, Manhattan.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a lease to the City of premises at No. 1598 Amsterdam avenue, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning:

April 30th, 1914.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—The Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, in a communication to your Board, under date of April 4, 1914, requests a lease of the store and basement at No. 1598 Amsterdam avenue, Borough of Manhattan, for use of his Department as a section station, for a term of one year from May 1, 1914, at an annual rental of \$600, payable quarterly.

The premises in question consist of a store, 21 feet by 59 feet, and basement, 22 feet by 40 feet, and is for use of Section No. 51, at present occupying part of Stable C, located at 130th street and 12th avenue, Borough of Manhattan, which latter premises are required entirely for stable purposes.

The lessor is to make outside repairs, pay taxes and water rates and furnish heat and janitor service; the lessee to provide light and make such inside repairs and alterations as it may deem necessary.

The adjoining similar property rents for \$600 a year.

Deeming the rent reasonable and just, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a lease of store, 21 feet by 59 feet, and basement, 22 feet by 40 feet, at No. 1598 Amsterdam avenue, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning, for a period of one year from May 15th, 1914, at an annual rental of \$600, payable quarterly; the

lessor to make outside repairs, pay taxes and water rates and furnish heat and janitor service; the lessee to provide light and to make such inside repairs and alterations as it may deem necessary; lessor, Elmira Schwitters, care of Elfers & Abberley, 277 Broadway, Manhattan.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, of a lease to the City, of the store 21 feet by 59 feet, and basement 22 feet by 40 feet, at No. 1598 Amsterdam avenue, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning, for a period of one year from May 15, 1914, at an annual rental of six hundred dollars (\$600), payable quarterly; the lessor to make outside repairs, pay taxes and water rates and furnish heat and janitor service; the lessee to provide light and to make such inside repairs and alterations as it may deem necessary; lessor, Elmira Schwitters; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to a lease to the City of premises at No. 315 East 112th street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Health:

April 29, 1914.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City of New York:

Gentlemen—At a meeting of your Board held December 17, 1913, a resolution was adopted authorizing the Comptroller to execute a renewal of the lease to the City of certain premises located at 315 East 112th street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Health, for a period of one year from January 1, 1914, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$450; lessor, Broadway Trust Company. This resolution was amended on January 21, 1914, by substituting as the name of the lessor, S. Soraci. The lessor refuses to execute the renewal unless the privilege for an additional year is stricken out.

I therefore recommend that the resolution adopted on December 17, 1913, and amended on January 21, 1914, be rescinded, and in place thereof the following resolution be adopted:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute a renewal of the lease to the City, of the first store and two rear rooms on the easterly side of house entrance on the ground floor of the six-story brick tenement and stores, located at 315 East 112th street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Health, for a period of one year from January 1, 1914, at an annual rental of four hundred and fifty dollars (\$450), payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, make outside repairs, and furnish heat and light; the lessee to furnish janitor service, and to make such interior alterations and repairs as it may deem necessary; lessor, S. The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to a new lease of premises at the southwest corner of Centre and Walker streets, for use of the Department of Health:

May 4, 1914.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City of New York:

Gentlemen—The Commissioner of the Department of Health in a communication under date of March 20, 1914, submitted a list of changes desired in the construction and management of the building occupied by his Department at No. 149 Centre street, Borough of Manhattan, in order to adapt it somewhat better to the needs of the Department.

These changes consist of the rearrangement of the heating system, repairing the floors in various parts of the building, replacing the wooden floor of the main concourse on the first floor by a tiled floor, rearranging the roof so that it can be used as an airing and lounging place for employees; the erection of partitions and a sink on the fifth floor in order to provide a kitchenette and rest room for female employees, the construction of a double doorway between the main vestibule and the concourse on the first floor, and more extended elevator service.

On August 7, 1911, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorized a lease from the Abingdon Construction Company of premises located at the southwest corner of Centre and Walker streets, Borough of Manhattan, containing approximately 90,000 square feet of space, for use of the Department of Health, for a term of five years from May 1, 1912, at an annual rental of \$58,500, payable quarterly; the lessor to furnish steam heat and elevator service, pay taxes and water rates, and furnish and erect partitions with doors and transoms as required, not exceeding 3,500 running feet, of which amount at least 350 feet is to be glass partition five feet high; also to make outside repairs; the lessee to furnish light and janitor service, and make any further alterations or repairs it may deem necessary during the term of the lease or its renewal.

The above communication from the Commissioner of the Department of Health requires reformation of this lease. After considerable negotiations with the owners of this building, they have agreed to make the above alterations and repairs to the building, providing the City will cancel the old lease and enter into a new lease for a period of five years from June 1, 1914, at an annual rental of \$60,000.

It is estimated by the owners of the building that the cost of all the alterations, betterments, etc., required by the Commissioner of Health will amount to at least \$8,000, regardless of the expense entailed by additional labor bills, coal bills, electricity bills and the additional wear and tear in the use of the steam heat and the elevator system.

The owners of this building originally requested a rental of \$62,500 a year, if the lease was to be reformed. After negotiations with the Real Estate Division of this Department, this rent was reduced to \$60,000 per annum.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a lease from Excelsior Estates Company of the premises located on the southwest corner of Centre and Walker streets, Borough of Manhattan, containing approximately 90,000 square feet of space, for use of the Department of Health for a period of five years from June 1, 1914, at an annual rental of \$60,000, payable monthly; the City to pay for water, furnish light and janitor service, and make such inside and outside alterations and repairs as it may deem necessary; the lessor to pay taxes and furnish elevator service between the hours of 7 a. m. and 7 p. m., daily, except Sundays; supply heat between the hours of 6 a. m. and 7 p. m. to directly heat the central waiting room on the seventh floor and install two additional radiators in the main office on the first floor; to repair the splintered floors in various parts of the building, replace the wooden floor of the main concourse by a tiled floor; to cover the roof of the building so that the same may be used as an airing place for employees; to erect partitions and a sink where required on the fifth floor, to construct an additional doorway between the main vestibule and the concourse on the first floor; to remove the terra cotta partition work now constructed at

the north entrance on the grade floor of the building and restore the same to its original condition and erect in front thereof a partition similar to the one at the southeast bay of the grade floor, to construct, if directed by the Department of Health, an isolation room in the north end of the building by partitioning part of the coat room with solid terra cotta partition and making a proper entrance to the same from the concourse; the lease to contain a clause providing for the cancellation of the existing lease of these premises as of June 1, 1914. Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City from the Excelsior Estates Company, of the premises located on the southwest corner of Centre and Walker streets, Borough of Manhattan, containing approximately 90,000 square feet of space, for use of the Department of Health, for a period of five years from June 1, 1914, at an annual rental of sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000), payable monthly; the City to pay for water, furnish light and janitor service, and make such inside and outside alterations and repairs as it may deem necessary; the lessor to pay taxes and furnish elevator service between the hours of 7 a. m. and 7 p. m. daily except Sundays, supply heat between the hours of 6 a. m. and 7 p. m. to directly heat the central waiting room on the seventh floor and install two additional radiators in the main office on the first floor; to repair the splintered floors in various parts of the building, replace the wooden floors of the main concourse on the first floor by a tiled floor; to cover the roof of the building so that the same may be used as an airing place for employees; to erect partitions and a sink where required on the fifth floor; to construct an additional doorway between the main vestibule and the concourse on the first floor; to remove the terra cotta partition work now constructed at the north entrance on the grade floor of the building and restore the same to its original condition and erect in front thereof a partition similar to the one at the southeast bay of the grade floor; to construct, if directed by the Department of Health, an isolation room in the north end of the building by partitioning part of the coat room with solid terra cotta partition and making a proper entrance to the same from the concourse; the lease to contain a clause providing for the cancellation of the existing lease of these premises as of June 1, 1914; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted, and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to a lease of accommodations for the mounted drills of Company A, First Battalion, Signal Corps, N. G., N. Y., in the premises known as the Durland Company Riding Academy, 5 West 66th street, Borough of Manhattan:

April 30, 1914.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—The Secretary of the Armory Board in a communication to your Board under date of April 24, 1914, transmits a resolution adopted at a meeting of the Armory Board held April 22, 1914, requesting a lease of accommodations for Company A, First Battalion, Signal Corps, N. G., N. Y., in the premises known as the Durland Company Riding Academy, situated at 66th street and Central Park West, Borough of Manhattan, said accommodations to include the use of the riding hall three evenings each week, suitable locker rooms, toilet accommodations, shower baths, light, heat, repairs and alterations and the storage of government wagons, carts, harness, horse furniture, etc., included in the equipment issued to the organization, for a period of one year from May 1, 1914, at an annual rental of \$2,250, payable quarterly, with the privilege of renewal for another year on the same terms and conditions.

These premises are intended to take the place of those now rented in the Central Riding Academy for two nights a week, but it has become necessary to have drills on three nights a week, and the rent to be paid in the new location is at the same rate, considering that the new premises will be used three nights a week instead of two, and in the new location all of the equipment will be under one roof, while in the present quarters some of the equipment was stored several blocks away.

There is no similar property in this locality with which comparison may be made. Deeming the rent reasonable and just, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a lease to the City of accommodations for the mounted drills of Company A, First Battalion, Signal Corps, N. G., N. Y., in the premises known as the Durland Company Riding Academy, 5 West 66th street, Borough of Manhattan, said accommodations to include the use of the riding hall three evenings each week, suitable locker rooms, toilet accommodations, shower baths, light, heat, repairs and alterations and storage of government wagons, carts, harness, horse furniture, included in the equipment issued to the organization, for a period of one year from May 1, 1914, at an annual rental of \$2,250, payable quarterly, with the privilege of renewal for another year upon the same terms and conditions. Lessor, The Durland Company, 5 West 66th street, Borough of Manhattan. Respectfully,

Y., in the premises known as the Durland Company Riding Academy, 5 West 66th street, Borough of Manhattan, said accommodations to include the use of the riding hall three evenings each week, suitable locker rooms, toilet accommodations, shower baths, light, heat, repairs and alterations and storage of government wagons, carts, harness, horse furniture included in the equipment issued to the organization, for a period of one year from May 1, 1914, at an annual rental of twenty-two hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,250), payable quarterly, with the privilege of renewal for another year upon the same terms and conditions; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report of the Corporate Stock Budget Committee, and offered the following resolution relative to a request of the Armory Board for the transfer of unexpended funds to the account "C. A. B.—24D, Furniture and Equipment, etc., Twenty-second Regiment":

April 17, 1914.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On November 18, 1913, the Armory Board adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and are hereby requested to make the unencumbered balance of \$9,246.78 remaining unexpended in fund entitled, 'C. A. B.—24A, Twenty-second Regiment, Erection and Completion of Armory, including architect's fees,' applicable to 'C. A. B.—24D, Furniture and Equipment, etc., Twenty-second Regiment.'"

In connection therewith we report as follows:

The request is based upon a probable cost of \$12,000 for furnishing steel storage cases and equipment, for the Engineers, Ordnance Offices, Quartermaster's and Adjutant's departments.

Storage equipment appears to be urgently needed in these departments, but it appears that all of the equipment originally planned is not required to meet present demands.

The upper storage cases, 52 in number, ladders and the four lower drawers in tables in the equipment planned for the Engineers and Ordnance officers' departments can be eliminated, and these officers have so agreed.

The upper storage cases in the Quartermaster's department can be constructed with swinging doors instead of sliding doors. This will not diminish the storage capacity of the cases which the Quartermaster states he will require.

The counter and grill work planned for the Adjutant's quarters can be eliminated and a large table with cupboards underneath and three roll-top desks substituted therefor, the desks to be purchased out of budget funds. A blank form case, also planned for this department, can be eliminated, as there is a suitable case now on hand.

If these modifications are carried into effect, equipment for the departments mentioned can be obtained within the unencumbered balance of \$8,862.27, as of April 14, 1914, in "C. A. B., 24D."

We recommend that the request be denied and that the Armory Board be instructed to submit for the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the form of contract, plans and specifications for the equipment of the above quarters prior to advertising for bids. Respectfully,

The Chamberlain stated that it was the intention of the Board of Education to use a part of the building for the Julia Richman High School and part for administrative purposes, and that the Bureau of Public Lectures and the Bureau of Physical Training, to which were assigned space in the Municipal Building because of the overcrowded condition of the hall of the Board of Education, will be taken out of the Municipal Building and housed in the Fire Headquarters.

The Chairman of the Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, called attention to the past experience of the Board in the endeavor to have the Board of Education turn over vacant property not needed for its purposes, and suggested that, before the Fire Headquarters is turned over to the Board of Education, some understanding be had with reference to the vacant properties which the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund desire turned over for such disposition as they deem to be for the best interests of the City.

Gentlemen—I am in receipt of a communication from the Secretary of the Court House Board, stating that when the operations of that Board were begun in January, 1912, arrangements were made with the Rock Island Company to lease the premises formerly occupied by them at 115 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan. The offices available at that time were somewhat larger than the immediate purposes of the Court House Board demanded, therefore an arrangement was made whereby a portion of the same was leased for a period of five years from May 1, 1912, and the remainder of the offices was leased by the Executive Secretary of the Board for the conduct and business relating to the public libraries until such time as the offices might be needed for the purposes of the Court House Board.

During the year 1912 additional space was frequently required, and the space under lease to the Executive Secretary was utilized by the Court House Board temporarily without payment of rent. Since May 1, 1913, the Board has been in exclusive occupancy of these additional rooms, which have been used not only for its purposes, but for the competition for the inferior courts, and for the purposes of the Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on Heights of Buildings. Owing to the uncertainty of the approval by the Justices of the plans for the court house, the Court House Board delayed entering into a lease with the Rock Island Company for these additional rooms until the plans of the new building should be approved by the Justices of the Supreme Court and the continuance of the work assured.

The Court House Board has now entered into a lease for these additional rooms for a period of four years from May 1, 1913, the date of occupancy, at an annual rental of \$2,175, payable monthly in advance; the lessors to furnish heat, light, elevator and janitor service.

The rooms leased contain an area of 961 square feet, which at the rental of \$2,175 per annum, is at the rate of \$2.26 per square foot. The rent of these rooms is to be paid from the account entitled, "Expenses of Court House Board for New York County," Code No. C. C. M.—11A.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve the lease entered into between the Court House Board and the Rock Island Company, for room 1100, containing approximately 961 square feet, in the building No. 115 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Court House Board, for a period of four years from May 1, 1913, at an annual rental of \$2,175, payable monthly in advance; the lessors to furnish heat, light, elevator and janitor service; the rent to be paid from the account entitled, "Expenses of Court House Board for New York County," Code No. C. C. M.—11A.

—in consideration of the sum of \$101, plus the additional charge of \$12.50 for the preparation of the necessary papers; the release to contain the following terms and conditions:

That the grantee waive any and all claim for damages arising out of the closing of the street or avenue.

That the grantee is the owner of the lands fronting on the section of the street or avenue to be conveyed.

That the deed contain the following reservation: Excepting and reserving to the party of the first part all easements and rights of every kind and description which it has in and to Payntar avenue by reason of its ownership of or interest in the premises hereby conveyed, or otherwise with the same force and effect and to the same extent as though this conveyance had not been delivered; and the party of the second part, in further consideration of this conveyance, does hereby for himself, his successors and assigns, waive, surrender and release any right to damages which have accrued or may at any time accrue from the use for any rapid transit, municipal, public or semi-public purposes of Payntar avenue by reason of ownership of or interest in the premises hereby conveyed or herein described; without prejudice, however, to any rights or claims which have accrued or may hereafter accrue by virtue of such use to the grantee herein or his successors in interest by reason of his ownership of the premises adjoining those hereby conveyed; provided, however, that none of the foregoing exceptions, reservations, agreements or conditions shall operate to deprive the party of the second part or his assigns or successors in interest from claims for damages in case Payntar avenue should be discontinued, closed or abandoned as a public street or avenue in front of the premises hereby conveyed.

—and be it further

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 205 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by unanimous vote, hereby authorize a release to Aaron Sigal, of No. 29 East 3d street, New York City, of the City's interest in and to the property hereinabove in this resolution bounded and described, in consideration of the sum of \$101, plus the additional charge of \$12.50 for the preparation of the necessary papers. The release to contain the following terms and conditions:

That the grantee waive any and all claim for damages arising out of the closing of the street or avenue.

That the grantee is the owner of the lands fronting on the section of the street or avenue to be conveyed.

That the deed contain the following reservation:

The deed not to be delivered until evidence has been produced that all taxes, assessments and liens due the City which appear against the land in the street or avenue and the petitioner's abutting property have been paid.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller brought up for consideration the matter of the proposed leasing of the premises on Washington Heights for use as a new City Magistrate's Court, and presented a report, without recommendation, relative to the four alternative propositions submitted by the Washington Heights Tax Payers' Association.

The President of the Board of Aldermen reviewed the propositions submitted, and stated that in his opinion the leasing of space in the Commonwealth Building, situated on the easterly side of Amsterdam avenue, extending to St. Nicholas avenue, between 159th and 160th streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, was the most advantageous of the four alternative propositions submitted and would make a suitable place for the holding of the Court when a few minor alterations have been made to the premises.

The total amount of space included in the proposition is 9,000 square feet, and is for a period of 10 years, at an annual rental of \$6,000, which sum includes the erection of such partitions as may be required by the Chief City Magistrate, furnishing suitable Judge's bench and railing and installing the necessary pens; the lessors also to furnish steam heat, pay taxes, water rates and make inside and outside repairs; the City to furnish light and janitor service.

Ex-Alderman John A. Bolles was heard in regard to the matter.

Discussion followed.

Judge McAdoo not being present, his Honor the Mayor stated that he did not wish to take any action in the matter until the Judge could have an opportunity to be heard.

On motion, the matter was laid over until the next meeting and the Secretary requested to invite Judge McAdoo to be present at the meeting.

Adjourned.

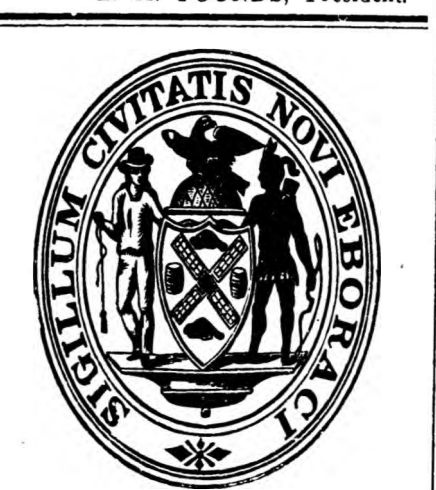

Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in

the street and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York serves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money shall not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
