MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.**Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York Held Wednesday, April 14, 1915, at 10.30 o'Clock A. M.**

Present: Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President, and Commissioner Darwin R. James, Jr. The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity," the following: "Water Register, The Bronx," and "Consulting Engineer of Water Supply." John M. Van Harlingen, Secretary to the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Bellevue and Allied Hospitals," the following: "Superintendent of Training School," and "5 Assistant Superintendents of Training School." Miss Clara D. Noyes, General Superintendent of Training Schools, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, addressed the Commission in the matter. George T. Keyes, Assistant Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session, and the minutes of the meetings held March 15, 17 and 19, 1915, were approved.

On motion, the matter of the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification, by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading of "Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity," the following: "Water Register, The Bronx," and "Consulting Engineer of Water Supply," was laid over, and the Secretary was instructed to advertise a public hearing in the matter of striking from the exempt for that department the following positions: Chief Engineer, Consulting Engineer of Water Supply and Water Register, The Bronx.

On motion, the matter of the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification, by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Bellevue and Allied Hospitals," the following: "Superintendent of Training School," and "5 Assistant Superintendents of Training School" was laid over.

J. McKee Borden, Secretary of the Department of Public Charities, appeared in connection with the application of the Commissioner of Public Charities for authority to employ Dr. Anna Warnecke and Dr. George D. Yorke, as Examiners in Lunacy, under clause 6 of Rule XII. On motion, it was

Resolved, That, under authority of clause 6 of Rule XII, Dr. Anna Warnecke and Dr. George D. Yorke be and they hereby are excepted from the examination to be employed in the Department of Public Charities as Examiners in Lunacy; provided, however, that in neither case shall the total compensation exceed Seven hundred and fifty dollars.

Alfred D. Flynn, Deputy Chief Engineer of the Board of Water Supply, appeared in connection with the request of the Board of Water Supply for authority to employ Messrs. York and Sawyer as Consulting Architects, under the provisions of clause 6 of Rule XII. On motion, it was

Resolved, That, subject to the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, Messrs. York and Sawyer of 50 East 41st Street, Manhattan, be and they hereby are excepted from examination, pursuant to the provisions of clause 6 of Rule XII, to be employed as consulting architects in the Board of Water Supply for a period of one year from April 16, 1915, at a compensation not to exceed \$6,000.

The following resolutions were adopted after a hearing of each of the persons named therein:

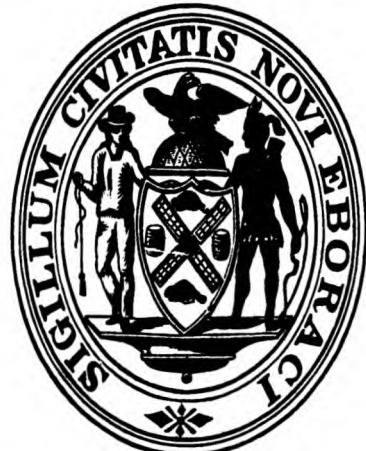

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price, as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
