Spotlight on Safety

Ebola Facts and Precautionary Measures

A recently confirmed case of Ebola in New York City has raised many questions about how the disease can be spread and what New Yorkers can do to protect themselves. Ebola is spread by direct contact with an infected person's blood or bodily fluids. It is not spread through the air or through simply being near someone who is infected. People infected with Ebola only become contagious after they begin to have symptoms, such as a fever. Still, it is good to be aware of the recommended precautions and practice proper hygiene. If you have recently traveled to the affected areas of West Africa and develop a fever within 21 days, or you have had contact with a person who is sick with Ebola:

- call 911 and mention your travel history to the operator
- do not come to work
- isolate yourself from contact with others until medical staff arrives

If a staff member or a contract employee is at a DEP location and meets the criteria (fever, travel history and/or contact with a person sick with Ebola) the employee or contractor should be isolated in a separate room and 911 should be called immediately. Visit the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene's website for answers to Frequently Asked Questions.

At DEP, everyone is responsible for safety. If you or anyone on your team is concerned about your working conditions, it's okay to ask your supervisor or your bureau's EHS liaison how they can help. If you've still got questions, you can call the EHS Employee Concerns Hotline. It's DEP's responsibility to acknowledge and fix unsafe situations, procedures, and practices. Diana Jones-Ritter, DEP's Deputy Commissioner for Organizational Development, is a guest commentator this week.


Two of DEP's core values are innovation and continuous improvement. Every DEP employee is encouraged to seek improved. more efficient and safer ways of performing the work they do to support DEP's mission. The Employee Suggestion Program provides each of you with an opportunity to submit recommendations and be recognized for innovative and creative ideas that improve the efficiency, effectiveness and the safety of our operations. It has been a year since this program launched and approximately 170 suggestions have been submitted. I would like to thank April Kelly for being a champion of this initiative and the lead in implementing this program agency-wide.

Some of the great ideas from DEP employees so far include:

- the use of new protective clothing for upstate employees to prevent field staff from contracting tick-borne diseases
- extending the hours of the office supplies closet in Kingston for the convenience of our employees
- the installation of an air compressor on the third floor parking deck at Lefrak for employee convenience and improved vehicle safety
- updating the Keeping Workspaces Clean and Safe policy to ensure new employees will have professionally cleaned workspaces upon arrival at DEP
- the creation of a Community Supported Agriculture program at LeFrak and Ward's Island
- the introduction of yoga classes at upstate facilities


Suggestions come in all shapes and sizes and each recommendation is reviewed and carefully researched before a decision is made to implement an idea or not. The Employee Suggestion Program provides the opportunity for idea sharing and fosters innovation across the agency.

Where possible, DEP honors employees who submit suggestions that are implemented during our Employee of the Month celebration. Employees who submit health and safety suggestions that are implemented are awarded up to \$100. Suggestions that result in cost-effective, tangible savings are eligible for cash awards of up to \$1000 after one year of evaluation. For example, currently at the Mahopac Wastewater Treatment Plant, DEP uses the town of Carmel's potable water in vacuum pumps for sealing and cooling. A BWS employee recognized that 788,400 gallons of water are used each year through the current process and proposed using recycled water instead. The bureau agreed that by collecting the process water in a tank and recycling it, a significant savings can be achieved with only a small investment. This suggestion is on track to be implemented in the spring and the savings will be reviewed in the coming year.

Hurricane Sandy Anniversary





Two years ago tomorrow, Hurricane Sandy, the worst natural disaster in New York City history, made landfall and caused a record 14-foot storm surge. DEP employees heroically worked through the storm clearing flooded roadways, treating wastewater, securing our infrastructure, and preparing for the daunting recovery effort. More than 1,100 DEP employees lived in the flood zones and were directly affected by the storm but, nonetheless, worked tirelessly through many long days and nights to secure the city. In the days following Sandy, DEP crews cleared downed trees and other debris, pumped flood waters (see photos of the Battery Underpass), provided drinking water to residents in Breezy Point, monitored air quality, and helped other utilities restore power and water to millions of New Yorkers.
