

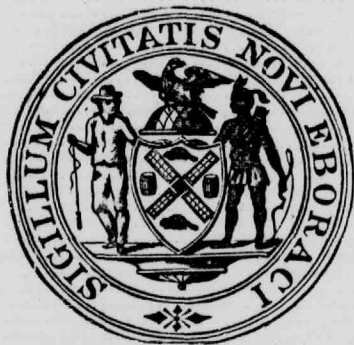

Section 106, of the act of the Legislature of the State of New York, entitled "An act to reorganize the local government of the City of New York," passed April 30, 1873 (chapter 335, Session Laws of 1873), makes it the duty of the Commissioners of Accounts, once in three months, and oftener if they deem it proper, to examine all vouchers and accounts in the offices of the Comptroller and Chamberlain and to make and publish in the CITY RECORD a detailed statement of the financial condition of the city, showing the amount of its funded and floating debt, the amount received and expended since the last preceding report, with a classification of the sources of revenue and expenditure, and such other information as they shall deem proper.

The Commissioners of Accounts respectfully report that they have examined the accounts and vouchers in the offices of the Comptroller and Chamberlain for the fourth quarter of the year 1879, and have found the same to be correct.

The statements required by statute have likewise been prepared, and, together with other information following, are herewith submitted for publication in the CITY RECORD.

STATEMENT NO. 1.

Bonded Debt, December 31, 1879.

This statement contains the particulars of the funded and temporary debt, which amounted, on the 31st day of December, 1879, to \$143,439,900.07. Of this amount there were held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the redemption of the debt \$32,610,550.07, as per Statement No. 2 A, herewith, and by the public \$110,829,350.

The floating debt represented by Revenue Bonds, issued in anticipation of annual taxes, amounted to \$6,006,500; and the bonded debt of the annexed territory, for which the city is liable, \$992,500. Both of these items are included in the aggregate amount of the debt first above mentioned.

The total amount of Stocks and Bonds, other than Revenue Bonds, issued during the year, and likewise included in the above aggregate, is \$8,395,673.19, and the total amount paid \$11,598,555.35. The total amount of Revenue Bonds issued during the year is \$26,149,500, and the total amount paid \$26,089,100. The total amount of special Revenue Bonds issued during the year is \$37,466.41, and the total amount paid \$9,775.50, as shown by Statement No. 2 B.

The rate of interest on the bonds issued during the year varied from three to five per cent. per annum. Bonds aggregating \$7,323,000 were sold at a premium amounting to \$137,298.30, a little less than two per cent. No bonds were sold for less than par.

STATEMENT NO. 3.

Receipts and Payments for the Fourth Quarter, and also for the Calendar Year 1879.

This statement shows a balance brought forward from the third quarter of 1879 of \$2,026,027 44. And gross receipts during the fourth quarter of 1879 of 39,590,471 13.

Making a total of \$41,616,498 57. The payments during the last mentioned period were 39,355,755 50.

And there remained in the Treasury on the 31st day of December, 1879, a cash balance of \$2,260,743 07.

The summary of receipts and payments for the calendar year 1879 is as follows: Balance from 1878 \$1,552,736 43. Receipts during the year 1879 74,183,561 79.

Total \$75,736,298 22. Payments during the year 1879 \$73,475,555 15. Balance carried to 1880 2,260,743 07.

Total \$75,736,298 22.

An alphabetical classification of the sources of revenue and expenditure is contained in Statement No. 3, and a classification of warrants drawn, and of the amount outstanding December 31, 1879, in Statement No. 4.

The Commissioners of Accounts deem it proper to publish the further information contained in the statements mentioned below, viz.:

COMPARATIVE STATEMENT NO. 1.

Of the Bonded Debt for the Years 1868 to 1879, inclusive, showing

That the gross debt on the 31st day of December, 1868, was \$52,205,430.80; that it increased nearly \$14,000,000 in 1869; upwards of \$25,000,000 in 1870; \$17,000,000 in 1871; \$10,000,000 in 1872; \$13,000,000 in 1873; about \$10,000,000 in 1874; \$2,700,000 in 1875; \$3,500,000 in 1876; and \$700,000 in 1877; and that it decreased \$3,200,000 in 1878 and \$3,100,000 in 1879.

The causes that led to the accumulation of this extraordinary burthen of debt are well known to the public, as are also the persistent efforts of the administrations that succeeded the so called "Ring Government" to put a stop to fraudulent and extravagant expenditures and to reduce the debt. If these efforts were not altogether and at once successful it must be considered that the task was a herculean one and not to be accomplished in a day. The table shows that whilst the bonded debt continued to increase until the year 1877, the yearly increases from 1873 on (with the single exception of the year 1876) grew smaller. The point of actual reduction was not reached, however, until 1878, when, with the aid of the Sinking Fund, the debt paid exceeded the debt incurred by \$3,000,000. A like reduction was effected in 1879, which gives ground for the belief that an era of permanent reduction has fairly begun.

COMPARATIVE STATEMENT NO. 2.

Possible Future Workings of the Sinking Fund.

An elaborate calculation has been made in this office with the view of ascertaining the possible progressive annual increase of the Sinking Fund, and the time when it shall equal the amount of the present debt.

This calculation, which excludes all contributions from taxation and from extraordinary sources, shows that the Sinking Fund will probably more than equal the debt, for the redemption of which it is now held, in the year 1902.

Inasmuch as the Sinking Fund is affected by the act of June 3, 1878, a synopsis of the act is herewith given, together with a statement of the results thus far attained under and by virtue of its authority:

Chapter 383, Laws of 1878, continues the Sinking Fund, and requires that any excess there may be in said fund, after providing for the payment of the stocks and bonds, payable therefrom, shall form a fund for the payment of other stocks and bonds of the City and County of New York.

The outstanding stocks and bonds that were originally made payable from the Sinking Fund under ordinances of the Common Council, amounted, on the 31st day of December 1879, to \$18,467,143 47.

The assets of the Sinking Fund Commissioners on the same date amounted to 33,021,985 70.

Leaving an excess of \$14,554,842 23 applicable to the payment of the other stocks and bonds referred to in this act.

The Sinking Fund for the payment of interest on the stocks and bonds, the principal of which is payable from the Sinking Fund for redemption of the debt, is continued, but it is provided that the surplus of said interest fund not needed for payment of interest on said stocks and bonds, shall form a fund which shall be transferred, after the year 1878, to the Sinking Fund Redemption Account, and shall thereby become a part of the last mentioned fund. The amount of money so transferred during the calendar year 1879, was \$1,000,000. This constitutes a new source of revenue to the redemption fund; the surplus interest moneys having, previous to 1879, been applied through the general fund, towards the reduction of taxation. The practical result of this change is that taxation now becomes an annual contributor to the Sinking Fund.

Another new source of revenue to the Sinking Fund is provided by the act of June 3, 1878, which directs that all moneys remaining in the treasury at that date that were theretofore collected on account of assessments made and confirmed, for local improvements, and all moneys which shall hereafter be collected on account of assessments made and confirmed, or which may be made and confirmed for local improvements completed prior to that date, shall be paid into and become part of the Sinking Fund for the redemption of the debt. The amount of moneys so transferred from the date of the passage of the act to the 31st day of December, 1879, is \$2,071,692.60.

The act authorizes the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to call in and redeem any portion of the Bonded Debt, other than Revenue Bonds, and to direct the Comptroller to issue and sell, or exchange therefor, at not less than par, "Consolidated Stock," payable within a period of not less than twenty nor more than fifty years from the date of issue thereof, and at a rate of interest not exceeding 5 per cent. per annum. Such Consolidated Stock to form a charge upon the Sinking Fund after the preferred stocks and bonds payable from that fund shall have been fully provided for. Any part of said Bonded Debt falling due not exchanged for or redeemed from the proceeds of the Consolidated Stock may, in the discretion of the Sinking Fund Commissioners, be paid from said Sinking Fund, provided said payment shall not impair the preferred claims thereon. The amount of Consolidated Stock thus issued, to and including the 31st day of December, 1879, is \$6,900,000, bearing interest at the rate of 5 per cent. per annum. This stock was sold at a premium aggregating \$364,320, which, together with the principal sum of the stock, was paid into the Sinking Fund, and applied to the payment of bonds that had matured, and which were thereupon canceled and retired.

The act referred to also provides, that whenever the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall certify to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the accumulations in the Sinking Fund shall be sufficient to meet the payment of any stocks or bonds falling due in the next following calendar year, the Board shall include in the annual estimate for such year, to be raised by tax, such an amount to be applied to the payment of said stocks or bonds as shall be certified by said Commissioners, and the amount so included in said estimate shall be paid into the Sinking Fund; provided that the amount so to be raised by tax shall be not less than one million nor more than two million dollars in any one year. The amount raised by tax and paid into the Sinking Fund during the year 1879, under this requirement, was \$1,000,000.

The act further provides that for the payment of all stocks and bonds, other than Revenue Bonds, issued after June 3, 1878, and which, under the statutes authorizing the same, are payable from taxation, there shall be included in the annual tax levy a sum sufficient, with the accumulation of interest thereon, to meet and discharge the amount of said stocks or bonds by the time the same shall be payable; such sum to be certified to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the Comptroller, and which sum so raised by tax shall be paid annually to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and shall be invested by them in the same manner as the revenues pledged to the Sinking Fund for the redemption of the City Debt. The amount included in the tax levy of 1879, for this purpose, was \$36,179.55, which was paid into the Sinking Fund in January, 1880.

The amount of stocks and bonds outstanding December 31, 1879, towards the redemption of which the above fund was contributed, was \$2,667,755.34, which amount is included in the aggregate Bonded Debt, as per Statement No. 1.

The act also provides that assessment bonds issued after June 3, 1878, to provide for the expense of local improvements contracted for, or commenced, after that date, and which expense is to be assessed upon the property benefited, shall be issued by the Comptroller when authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at not less than par, for a period not exceeding ten years, and bearing interest not exceeding six per cent. per annum.

The amount of bonds thus issued to December 31, 1879, all of which bear interest at the rate of five per cent. per annum, is \$310,000, which amount is likewise included in Statement No. 1.

COMPARATIVE STATEMENT NO. 3.

Tax Levies, Collections, and Balances for the years from 1874 to 1879, inclusive.

The balance of taxes remaining uncollected on December 31, 1873, is \$19,177,967 89. The aggregate tax levies for the six years mentioned amount to 181,204,900 83. The total collections during the same period were 174,656,314 83. The amount of discount allowed for prompt payment of taxes is 680,637 90. The amount of errors, remissions, etc., during the same period amounted to 200,016 71. The balance remaining uncollected December 31, 1879, is 24,879,303 53. More than \$11,000,000 of this balance is represented by the tax on personal property, very little of which, in the opinion of those best informed, is likely to be collected.

COMPARATIVE STATEMENT NO. 4.

The General Fund.

A comparative table of the revenues, payments, and balances of this fund for the six years from 1874 to 1879, inclusive, is herewith submitted:

The aggregate revenues for the period mentioned were \$18,570,360 94. The payments were 18,508,306 62.

Leaving a balance to the credit of this fund at the close of 1879 of \$62,054 32.

It will be noted that the revenues for the year 1879 show an apparent falling off of \$1,500,000 as compared with the previous year. This is accounted for by the fact that the surplus revenue of the Sinking Fund Interest Account in 1878 was exceptionally large. It amounted in that year to more than \$1,500,000, as against \$1,100,000 in 1877, which, with the exception of 1878, shows the largest amount transferred to the General Fund from that source in any year contained in the table. The apparent falling off of revenue in 1879 is further accounted for by the fact that under the authority of the act of June 3, 1878, \$1,000,000 of surplus interest moneys were, in 1879, carried to the Sinking Fund Redemption Account, instead of to the General Fund, as in previous years.

COMPARATIVE STATEMENT NO. 5.

Sinking Fund Redemption Account.

This table shows that the ordinary revenues of this fund for the past six years aggregated \$17,995,686.47. It will be noted that there was an increase of \$300,000 in 1878 as compared with 1877. This is principally accounted for by enlarged receipts from Dock and Slip Rents, and by a natural increase of the revenue from investments. An apparent increase of \$400,000 in 1879, as compared with 1878, arises partly from a similar cause, but mainly from the payment of bonds and mortgages, and sales of real estate, which two last-mentioned items do not constitute actual additions to the fund, but are simply a conversion of its assets.

COMPARATIVE STATEMENT No. 6.

Sinking Fund for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt.

A tabular statement of the operations of this fund for the years 1874 to 1879, inclusive, is here-with submitted:

Of which, it is estimated, that at least one-half will be collected.	

COMPARATIVE STATEMENT No. 8.

Being a Table Showing the Assessed Valuations of Real and Personal Estate and the Rates and Amounts of the Yearly Taxes from 1862 to 1879, inclusive.

It will be noted that the assessed valuation of real estate has considerably more than doubled within the past eighteen years.

In 1862 it was	\$400,239,014 00

On the contrary, the assessed valuation of personal property has decreased:

The lowest rate of tax during the years mentioned was in 1862, when it was \$1.73 per \$100. The highest rate was \$2.99 per \$100, in 1865. In 1879 the rate was \$2.58 per 100.

In other respects, the expenses of the city government would appear to have not been materially reduced.

COMPARATIVE STATEMENT No. 10.

List of Judgments Paid from 1874 to 1879, inclusive.

From this statement it appears that the city has paid judgments during the past six years aggregating \$4,888,272.65, of which \$515,430.92 was for interest, and \$173,111.10 for costs.

It will be observed that there has been a notable falling off in this class of liabilities:

COMPARATIVE STATEMENT No. 11.

Unexpended Balances of Appropriations for each year from 1871 to 1879, inclusive.

These balances aggregate \$4,126,552.64, of which \$2,014,903.38 is for the year 1879. It has been customary heretofore, in reporting these balances, to merge the balances of the various years, and to state them in the aggregate. In the present instance, a division has been made and the balances of each particular year stated separately. Balances of several years standing having no cash asset, would seem to be practically useless, but so long as they remain open they constitute a standing temptation for transfers to be added to current appropriations and expenditures. It is suggested that all balances of more than two years' standing be closed into the account "Deficiencies in Taxes" or into such other account as may, by competent authority, be deemed proper and appropriate.

It is assumed that the Cash and New Investments will realize Interest at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum, payable half-yearly; that the Original Investments all mature on the 1st of November; and that all payments for Redemption of the Debt are made on the 1st of November. It is further assumed that the maturing Original Investments will bring in 9 months interest at 4 per cent.; that the payments for Redemption of the Debt will be subject to 9 months interest at 4 per cent.; and that the Income of the Sinking Fund will produce 6 months interest at the same rate.

SIR—There were 625 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, July 31, 1880, which is a decrease of 24, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 11 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1879. The actual mortality for the week ending July 24, 1880, was 649, which is 129.6 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.84 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,211,872.

BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVEMENT.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met in the Mayor's office, at 2 P. M., on Wednesday, August 4, 1880.

The following members were present, viz.:—Edward Cooper, Mayor; John Kelly, Comptroller; Allan Campbell, Commissioner of Public Works; John J. Morris, President of the Board of Aldermen.

Absent—James F. Wenman, President Department Public Parks.

The minutes of the meeting held May 18, 1880, were read and approved.

A call signed by all the members of the Board for the present meeting was read and ordered on file.

A certified copy of chapter 159, Laws of 1880, was then read and ordered on file.

Messrs. Franklin Edson, Alexander E. Orr, and William R. Foster, Jr., appeared on behalf of the Produce Exchange, and explained the necessity of closing Marketfield street and opening a new street from Beaver street to Marketfield street.

The meeting then adjourned to meet again in the Mayor's office at 2 P. M., August 5, 1880.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met pursuant to adjournment in the Mayor's office at 2 P. M., Thursday, August 5, 1880.

All the members were present except James F. Wenman, President of the Department of Public Parks, who was unavoidably absent.

The Mayor offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement deem it to be for the public interest to alter the map or plan of the City of New York by closing all that portion of Marketfield street, on both sides of which the New York Produce Exchange has acquired title to the land to be used by said Exchange for a new building, the said portion of Marketfield street being that part of said street commencing at Broadway and extending easterly from Broadway to a straight line, which is the prolongation in a southerly direction of a straight line drawn through a point on the southerly side of Beaver street, which is one hundred and fifty-four (154) feet two and a half (2½) inches easterly from the southeast corner of Broadway and Beaver street, and through a point on the northerly side of Marketfield street, which is one hundred and forty-seven (147) feet ten (10) inches from the northeast corner of Marketfield street and Broadway, and propose, in accordance with the authority conferred by chapter 159 of the Laws of 1880, passed April 28, 1880, entitled "An act to facilitate the erection of a new building by the New York Produce Exchange in the City of New York by authorizing the closing of Marketfield street and the sale of a lot of land and building on Stone street, in said city, the property of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the city of New York," to alter the map or plan of the City of New York so as to close the said portion of Marketfield street, and to close the same.

The Chairman put the question upon the adoption of the said resolution, which was adopted by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, and the President of the Board of Aldermen—4.

The Mayor offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement deem it to be for the public interest to alter the map or plan of the City of New York so as to lay out and open a new street to extend from Beaver street to Marketfield street, the westerly side of said new street to be a straight line extending from a point on the southerly side of Beaver street one hundred and fifty-four (154) feet two and one-half (2½) inches easterly from the southeast corner of Beaver street and Broadway to a point on the northerly side of Marketfield street, one hundred and forty-seven (147) feet ten (10) inches easterly from the northeast corner of Marketfield street and Broadway; the easterly side of said street be parallel with and twenty-five (25) feet easterly from its westerly side so that the said new street will be of the uniform width of twenty-five (25) feet; and the said Board, in pursuance of authority conferred by chapter 159 of the Laws of 1880, passed April 28, 1880, entitled "An Act to facilitate the erection of a new building by the New York Produce Exchange in the City of New York by authorizing the closing of Marketfield street, and the sale of a lot of land and building on Stone street in said city, the property of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York," propose to alter the map or plan of the City of New York so as to lay out and open the said street, and to lay out and open the same.

The Chairman put the question upon the adoption of the said resolution, which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

The Chairman offered for adoption the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the aforesaid resolutions stating the proposed action of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement in respect to closing a portion of Marketfield street, and in respect to opening a new street from Beaver street to Marketfield street, be laid before the Board of Aldermen, and that full notice of the same be published for ten days in the CITY RECORD.

Resolved, That the Mayor be requested to transmit a copy of the aforesaid resolutions to the Board of Aldermen and to cause their publication in the CITY RECORD.

The Chairman put the question upon the adoption of the said resolutions, which were adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

On motion, all future meetings of the Board were directed to be called by order of the Chairman.

CHAPTER 195.

AN ACT in relation to the payment of assessments for local improvements in the City of New York.

Passed May 7, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time before the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person liable thereon may pay, to the officer authorized to receive the same, the amount of any assessment for any local improvement in the City of New York, heretofore confirmed and now unpaid, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment and at any time on or after said first day of September, and before the first day of December, eighteen hundred and eighty, any such assessment may be paid as aforesaid, with interest at the rate of nine per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment.

Sec. 2. Where any installment or installments of any assessments have been paid under the provisions of chapter one hundred and three of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fifty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, or of chapter two hundred and fifty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, the amount of such assessment or assessments remaining unpaid may be paid within the same periods prescribed in the first section of this act and upon the same terms and conditions therein prescribed.

Sec. 3. Upon such payment in full, as hereinbefore provided, such assessment or assessments shall cease to be a lien upon the property, and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged; and there shall be no further interest or penalty by reason of such assessment or assessments not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute heretofore requiring the payment of any penalty or interest over the rate hereinbefore provided for upon any unpaid assessment.

Sec. 4. No provision of this act hereinbefore contained shall be construed as applicable to or affecting any assessment for the collection of which assessment the property has been sold.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

ARREARS OF TAXES.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW York hereby gives notice to owners of Real Estate in said city, that, as provided by chapter 123 of the Laws of 1880, they may now pay any arrears of taxes and Croton water rents levied prior to the year 1877, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum. CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
