

SANITARY BUREAU.

Summary of Work.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases, for the quarter ending September 30, 1886 : The number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 70,589. The number of causes of complaint returned was 6,846.

The number of causes of complaint returned was 6,846. The number of complaints received from citizens was 4,351, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instruction and authority of the Board, granted 911 permits to discharge cargoes, upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 1,114 permits to scavengers to empty privies; 92 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds; and 97 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code. During the three months ending September 30, 1886, ten thousand two hundred and thirty-seven (10,237) permits were granted for burials. During the same period two hundred and fiftyone (251) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted ; seven hundred and seventy one (771) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children ; one thousand and thirty-three (1,033) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded ; one thousand five hundred and seventy-six (1,576) searches of the records of births, marriages and deaths were made; and nine hundred and twenty-three (923) transcripts of the records of deaths, one hundred and twenty-five (125) of marriages, and one hundred and three (103) of births from said records were issued. There were five thousand seven hundred and ninety (5,790) persons registered as married during the quarter, and eight thousand and ninety (8,090) children were born during the same period.
