



SANITARY BUREAU.

Summary of Work.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases, for the quarter ending September 30, 1886:

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 70,589.

The number of causes of complaint returned was 6,846.

The number of complaints received from citizens was 4,351, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instruction and authority of the Board, granted 911 permits to discharge cargoes, upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 1,114 permits to scavengers to empty privies; 92 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds; and 97 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY—NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the three months ending September 30, 1886, the number of notices issued by the Board was 4,006. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees, and agents to violation of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning, and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon re-inspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, November 10, 1886, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, the Commissioner of Public Works, Commissioners Baldwin, Barnes, Ridgway and Fish.

Also, Chief Engineer Church; and Chief Engineer Birdsall of the Department of Public Works.

The meeting was opened for public hearing pursuant to public notice.

On behalf of persons interested in the lands at Shaft Site No. 8, Mr. Henry C. Griffin appeared for the Commissioners of Highways of the town of Mount Pleasant, and also for George Hart, owner of one of the parcels, who was also present; and Mr. Edward Wolls on behalf of the holders of the second mortgage upon the lands of Hart, all asking for information, and expressing their readiness to enter into any required stipulation for shortening proceedings to acquire the fee in said lands and bring the matter promptly before the Commissioners of Appraisal.

Mr. E. T. Lovatt, the attorney of S. N. Leggett, and of the tenants upon the lands of Hart, not being present, and having asked an adjournment for the purpose of enabling him to appear, the hearing upon that subject was then adjourned to Friday, 12th instant, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Mr. Thomas H. Wagstaff, Jr., and Mr. Campyon Cutter, executor of the estate of Samuel Moore, appeared on behalf of the holders of a mortgage upon the lands proposed to be taken for Shaft Site No. 15 1/2 at the Ravensdale road, and signifying their readiness to acquiesce in any required proceedings for bringing the matter promptly before the Commissioners of Appraisal.

No one else appearing, and there being no objection made with regard to acquiring the fee simple in the lands at that shaft site, the hearing upon that subject was then declared closed, and the Commissioners went into Executive Session, and upon resuming the Open Session, the regular order of business was taken up.

The minutes of the meeting of the 3d instant were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 2135 to 2147, inclusive, amounting to \$1,895.41, and, on motion of Commissioner Dowd, the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee of Finance and Audit next reported that they had had under consideration the supplementary pay-roll of the Engineer Corps for the period ending October 31, 1886, containing the names of Albert H. Porter, Joseph C. Ryan, Roland G. Rood, John T. Havanagh and James McCarthy, and that they have approved of the same, except the amount set opposite the name of Joseph C. Ryan, which they refer to the Board for their consideration and action. The report of the Committee was approved, and that part of the report relating to Joseph C. The Committee on Construction made report, recommending that Daniel Murray be appointed an Inspector of Masonry, he having passed the required examinations for such position. Report adopted.

The Committee on Construction next made report, recommending that the resignation of Robert Montgomery, as an Inspector of Masonry, be accepted, to take effect as of the 4th instant. Report adopted.

The Comptroller, under date of the 6th instant, gave notice of the issue of a warrant for a voucher not certified to by the Aqueduct Commissioners in favor of George C. Appell, Westchester Section, \$811.70. Which was ordered to be placed on file, and entered upon the books of the Commission.

The Chairman of the Committee on Construction reported verbally that the Committee had examined into the charge made by the Comptroller that inferior sand had been used at Shaft No. 19 1/2. They found that no inferior sand was used at said shaft, and that the objections of the Comptroller were not well founded. Report approved.

Commissioner Barnes then moved that when this Commission adjourns, it adjourns to meet on Friday next, 12th instant, at 3 o'clock P. M.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
