The petition of The Houston, West Street and Pavonia Ferry Railroad Company respectfully

First-That your petitioner is and for many years has been a street surface railroad corporation owning, operating and using a street surface railroad through, upon and along certain streets and avenues in the City of New York, and among other streets and avenues from Houston street through upon and along Avenue C, with a single track to Third street, thence with a double track through, upon and along Avenue C to Seventeenth street; thence through, upon and along various other streets and avenues to the Grand Central Depot in the City of New York.

Second-That the Chambers Street and Grand Street Ferry Railroad Company formerly second—That the Chambers Street and Grand Street Ferry Railroad Company formerly owned and operated a street surface railroad through, upon and along certain streets and avenues in the City of New York, among other streets and avenues, from Grand street ferry on the East river through, upon and along East street; thence through, upon and along Cherry street; thence through, upon and along Madison street to Madison street; thence through, upon and along Madison street twith a double track to New Chambers street; thence through, upon and along New Chambers street to Park Row; thence through, upon and along various other streets and avenues to Pavonia Ferry, on the North river; thence through, upon and along various other streets and avenues to the Roosevelt street ferry on the East river.

Third—That beretofore, pursuant to statute, the said. The Chambers Street and Grand Street.

Third—That heretofore, pursuant to statute, the said The Chambers Street and Grand Street Ferry Railroad Company was merged with your petitioner, and your petitioner now owns, operates and uses the railroad and railroad routes formerly owned by the said The Chambers Street and Grand Street Ferry Railroad Company.

Fourth—That your petitioner desires to unite said two street surface railroad routes at the intersection of Ridge street and Delancey street, said point of union being not over one-half mile from said respective lines or routes, the connection to be made by the construction, maintenance and operation of an extension or branch of your petitioner's said railroad, commencing at the intersection of Houston Street and Avenue C in the City of New York, connecting there by suitable curves and appliances with the road of your petitioner, running thence through upon and along Houston street over the single track in said street of the road of the Forty-second street and Grand Street Ferry Railroad Company to Ridge street; thence (with suitable curves and appliances at or near Ridge street) through upon and along Ridge street with a single track to the said point of union, and by the construction, maintenance, and operation of an extension or branch of the said railroad formerly of the Chambers Street and Grand Street Ferry Railroad Company, commencing at the intersection of Montgomery street and Madison street, connecting there by suitable curves and appliances with the said road formerly of The Chambers Street and Grand Street Ferry Railroad Company, running thence with a single track through, upon and along Montgomery street to Division street; thence through, upon and across Division street to Ridge street; thence through, upon and along Ridge street with a single track to the said point of union, such connection to be operated by any motive power which is or may at any time lawfully be used on either of the routes connected thereby.

Fifth—And by the construction of such connection your petitioner will be able and hereby

Fifth—And by the construction of such connection your petitioner will be able and hereby offers, consents and agrees to establish and maintain (the requisite consents of property-owners or the lawful substitute therefor having been first obtained) a new continuous route for public travel for one fare over the line of your petitioner, running north of Houston street and over the line formerly of The Chambers Street and Grand Street Ferry Railroad Company on the east side of the City between the Grand Central Depot and the neighborhood of the Brooklyn Bridge, Post-office and the public buildings in the city at Broadway and Chambers street, and the terminus of said Chambers street and Grand street Ferry Railroad at Pavonia Ferry on the North river.

Sixth—That said connection cannot be operated as an independent railroad conveniently, to

Sixth-That said connection cannot be operated as an independent railroad conveniently to the public, but it is manifestly to the public advantage that the same shall be operated as a continuous line or route with said existing railroads.

Wherefore your petitioner prays for the consent of the local authorities of the City of New York to the construction and operation by your petitioner of said connection and to the establishment, maintenance and operation by your petitioner of said new continuous route for public travel.

son street with a double track to New Chambers street; thence through, upon and along New Chambers street to Park Row; thence through, upon and along various other streets and avenues to Pavonia Ferry on the North river; thence through, upon and along various other streets and avenues to Roosevelt Street Ferry on the East river.

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred the assessment rolls of the estates, real and The Committee on Finance, to wholi was referred the assessment tons of the estates, rear and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the City and County of New York, for the year 1892, together with a communication from the Comptroller of the City of New York, transmitted to the Board of Aldermen the Final Estimate made and adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for said year 1892, accompanied by his certificate of the amount of the appropriations authorized by law to be raised by tax in and for the said year 1892, respectfully submits the

REPORT:

The assessed valuation of the real and personal estates subject to taxation within the City and County of New York for the year 1892, as shown by the assessment rolls submitted to the Board of Aldermen by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments, and referred on July 6, 1892, amounts to the sum of one thousand eight hundred and twenty-eight million two hundred and sixty-four thousand two hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$1,828,264,275), which sum is a net increase of forty-two million four hundred and six thousand nine hundred and thirty-seven dollars (\$42,406,937) \$33.725,555 84

As shown by the Comptroller's certificate, submitted to the Board of Aldermen, and referred As shown by the Comptroller's certificate, submitted to the Board of Aldermen, and referred on June 8, 1892, the aggregate amount of the appropriations included in the Final Estimate for the year 1892, made and adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 31st day of December, 1891, is thirty-five million eight hundred and eighty-one thousand two hundred and five dollars (\$35,000,000), for and on account of the estimated revenues of the general fund available for the reduction of taxation in said year 1892, also certified by the Comptroller, leaving the sum of thirty-two million eight hundred and eighty-one thousand two hundred and five dollars and nineteen cents (\$32,881,205,19), as the amount to be raised by tax, under the Final Estimate as adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on December 31, 1891.

By section 820 of the New York, City Consolidation Act of 1882, the Board of Aldermen is

By section 830 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, the Board of Aldermen is directed to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of taxes that may arise from insolvencies, discounts or rebates for prompt payment, errors in assessed valuations, etc., as follows:

"Section 830. It shall be the duty of the said Roard of Aldermen to include in any and every ordinance or resolution passed by them, imposing and levying taxes for any purpose or purposes authorized by law, such sum in addition to the aggregate amount required for such purposes, as they shall deem necessary, not exceeding three per cent. of said aggregate amount, to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount imposed and levied therefor."

Your Committee has conferred with the Comptroller in regard to the amount that will be required to provide for and meet such deficiencies as may occur in the actual product of the taxes to be imposed and levied in and for the year 1892, and it has concluded to recommend that the sum of eight hundred and forty-four thousand three hundred and fifty dollars and sixty-five cents (\$844,350.65) be added to and included in the sum necessary to be raised by tax for the support of the government of the City and County of New York and for other purposes, as authorized and provided by law, which sum is less than three per centum of the amount so required to be raised by tax, after deducting the estimated amount of the revenues of the General Fund for the reduction of taxation, the addition of which sum makes the total amount of taxes to be imposed and levied upon the real and personal estate subject to taxation within the City and County of New York, in and for the said year 1892, the sum of thirty-three million seven hundred and twenty-five thousand five hundred and fifty-five dollars and eighty-four cents (\$33,725,\$55.84).

Section 11 of article VIII. of the Constitution of the State of New York provides as follows:

The amount hereafter to be raised by tax for county or city purp se in any county containing a city of over one hundred thousand inhabitants, or such city of this State, in addition to providing for the principal and interest of existing debt, shall not in the aggregate exceed in any one year two per centum of the assessed valuation of the real and personal estate of such county or city, to be ascertained as prescribed in this section in respect to county or city debt."

As the assessed valuation of the real and personal estate of and within the City and County of Your Committee has conferred with the Comptroller in regard to the amount that will be

As the assessed valuation of the real and personal estate of and within the City and County of New York, for the year 1892, is \$1,828,264,275, and two per centum of this sum is \$36,565,285,50, the total amount of the tax to be raised for city and county purposes for the year 1892, after providing for the principal and interest of existing city and county debt, and deducting also the amount of the State Tax to be raised in said year 1892, is \$24,984,851.63, as shown by the following statement.

This sum of 524,984,851.63 is less than two per cent, of the said assessed valuation of the real and personal estate of the City and County of New York, subject to taxation for the year 1892, which percentage amounts, as above stated, to the sum of \$36,565,285.50, leaving a very large margin within the limitation of taxes prescribed by the provision of the State Constitution above

Sections 3 and 8 of chapter 361 of the Laws of 1881 provide as follows: "Sections 3 and 8 of chapter 301 of the Laws of 1881 provide as follows:

"Section 3. Every corporation, joint-stock company or association whatever, now or hereafter incorporated or organized under any law of this State, or now or hereafter incorporated or organized by or under the laws of any other State, or county doing business in this State, except savings banks and institutions for savings, line insurance companies, banks and foreign insurance companies, and manufacturing corporations carrying on manufacture within this State, which exception shall not be taken to include gas companies or trust companies, shall be subject to and pay a tax, as a tax upon its corporate franchese or business, into the treasury of the State, annually, etc."

"Section 8. The corporations, joint-stock companies and associations mentioned in this act as taxable shall hereafter be exempt from assessment and taxation for State purposes, except upon their real estate and as herein provided; but they shall in all other respects be liable to assessment and taxation as heretofore.

The total amount of the assessed valuation of the personal estate of corporations, joint-stock companies or associations, doing business in the City of New York, which are found to be exempt under this statute from assessment and taxation on their personal estate for "State purposes" in the year 1892, as appears by a detailed statement thereof on file in the Finance Department, is seventy-one million three hundred and six thousand four hundred and two dollars (\$71,306,402).

The above-cited provision of law requires, therefore, a special rate of tax to be imposed upon the personal estates of corporations which are exempt from taxation for State purposes, differing from and less than the general tax-rate upon real and personal estate subject to taxation for city

and county purposes

The rates of taxation which will produce this sum are a general rate upon the valuation of real and personal estates, subject to taxation for all city and county purposes, and a special rate upon the valuation of the personal estate of corporations exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, as follows:

An ordinance to impose the taxes and fix the rates of taxation which will produce the total amount of taxes required to be raised in and for the year 1892, for the objects and purposes therein set forth, is respectfully submitted herewith for the approval and adoption of the Board of Aldermen.

AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of the City of New York and the Board of Education, and for the payment of the quota of the State Taxes, and for other purposes, pursuant to the provisions of law, in and for the year 1892.

and for other purposes, pursuant to the provisions of law, in and for the year 1892.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. There shall be and is hereby imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within the City and County of New York, the sum of thirty-two million eight hundred and eighty-one thousand two hundred and five dollars and nineteen cents (\$32,881,205,19), to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the said city and county, in each department and branch thereof, and of the Board of Education, for the year 1892; also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year, which is not otherwise provided for; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which, with the accumulations of interest thereon, will be sufficient to redeem the stocks and bonds issued to provide for the supply of water, pursuant to the provisions of section 11 of article VIII. of the Constitution of the State of New York, as amended in 1884; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State Tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York in said year, 1892, as provided by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, which sum of thirty-two million eight bundred and eighty-one thousand two hundred and five dollars and nineteen cents (\$32,881,205.19), so imposed and levied by this ordinance, is the aggregate amount estimated by the Board of Fstimate and Apportionment of said city, and appropriated for such objects and purposes in the Final Estimate for said year 1892, made and adopted on the 31st day of December, 1891, less the sum of three million dollars (\$3,000,000)

supplied by the General Fund and deducted from the total amount of appropriations made in the Final Estimate for said year 1892, amounting to the sum of thirty-five million eight hundred and eighty-one thousand two hundred and five dollars and nineteen cents (\$35,881,205.19), as stated by the Comptroller of the City of New York, in a communication dated June 6, 1892, submitted to the Board of Aldermen on June 8, 1892, along with the Comptroller's certificate of the amount of the appropriations made in the Final Estimate for the said year 1892, copies of which communication and certificate, and of the said Final Estimate, are as follows:

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York :

Section 212 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882 provides as follows: "It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of said city to prepare and submit to the Board of Aldermen, at least the duty of the Comptroller of said city to prepare and submit to the Board of Aldermen, at least four weeks before the annual meeting, in each and every year, for the purpose of imposing the annual taxes, a statement setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in that year, on account of the corporation of the City of New York, or for city purposes within said city; and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts into the city treasury during the then current year, from all sources of revenue of said general fund, including surplus revenues from the sinking fund available in accordance with law, other than the surplus revenues of the sinking fund for the payment of the city debt; and the said Board of Aldermen are hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which by law they are required to order and cause to be raised by tax in said year for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised by tax only the balance of said aggregate amount, after making such deduction."

In pursuance of the foregoing provision of law, I have the honor to submit to your Honorable

In pursuance of the foregoing provision of law, I have the honor to submit to your Honorable Body a statement setting forth in detail the amount by law authorized and required to be raised by tax in and for the year 1892, on account of the Corporation of the City of New York, or for city purposes within said city, as follows, to wit:

The Final Estimate of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each department and branch thereof, and of the Board of Education, for the fiscal year 1892, as adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on Thursday, December 31, 1891, for which appropriations were made, aggregating the sum of thirty-five million eight bundred and eighty-one thousand two hundred and five dollars and nineteen cents (\$35,881,205,19), in which estimate is included such sum as is necessary for the pryment of interest on the bonds of the said city and county which becomes due and payable within said year which is not otherwise provided for: also, such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax pryment of interest on the bonds of the said city and county which becomes due and payable within said year which is not otherwise provided for; also, such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year which is not otherwise provided for; also, the amount to be raised by tax annually, which, with the accumulations of interest thereon, will be sufficient to redeem the stocks and bonds issued to provide for the supply of water, pursuant to the provisions of section 11 of Article VIII. of the Constitution of the State of New York, as amended in 1884; also, the amount appropriated to charitable institutions required by law, and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York in said year 1892.

From the aggregate amount of the Final Estimate for said year 1802 is to be deducted the sum of three million dollars (\$3,000,000), supplied by the General Fund for the reduction of taxation, that sum being the amount of the estimated receipts of said fund payable into the City Tre sury during the said year 1892, derived from all sources of revenues applicable to and available for this object, including unexpended balances of appropriations of previous years and surplus moneys in the Excise Fund transferred to the General Fund, less the sum of twenty-three thousand five hundred and ninety-seven dollars and fifty cents (\$23,597.50), not deducted from the appropriations, as follows:

And Whereas, Section 3 of chapter 361 of the Laws of 1881 provides, inter alia, as follows:

"Every corporation, joint-stock company or association whatever now or hereafter incorporated the laws of any other state or country, and doing business in this state, except savings banks and institutions for savings, life insurance companies, banks and foreign insurance companies and manufacturing corporations carrying on manufacture within this state, which exception shall not be taken to include gas companies or trust companies, shall be subject to and pay a tax as a tax upon its corporate franchise or business into the treasury of the state annually

Whereas, Section 8 of said Act also provides as follows:

"The corporations, joint-stock companies and associations mentioned in this act as taxable shall hereafter be exempt from assessment and taxation for state purposes except upon their real estate, and as herein provided, but they shall in all other respects be liable to assessment and taxation as heretofore;" and

Whereas, The amount of assessed valuations of the real and personal estates, subject to taxation of and within the City and County of New York, excepting the personal estates of the several corporations, joint-stock companies and associations which are exempted by law from local taxation for State purposes, is one thousand seven hundred and fifty-six million nine hundred and fifty-seven thousand eight hundred and seventy-three dollars (\$1,736,957,873); and

Whereas, The amount of the assessed valuations of the personal estates of such corporations, oint-stock companies and associations as are exempted by law from taxation thereon for State purposes is seventy-one million three hundred and six thousand four hundred and two dollars (\$71,306,402), which sum is liable to taxation for City and County purposes only.

Be it also ordained. That the said real and personal estates shall be subject to taxation as pro-

vided by the following sections:

Section 4. The rate of tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the City and County of New York, excepting the personal estates of such corporations, joint-stock companies or associations as are by law exempt from assessment and taxation thereon for State purposes, shall be and is hereby fixed at 1.85 per centum of the assessed valuations thereof, and upon the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, the rate of tax shall be and is hereby fixed at 1.7135 per centum of the assessed valuations thereof, in and for the year eighteen hundred and ninety-two (1892).



The 1,081 deaths represent a death-rate of 30.80, against 38.09 for the previous week and 29.34 for the corresponding week of 1891.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a considerable decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, typhus fever and small-pox being respectively 81, 219, 55, 28, 3 and 4, against 64, 270, 78, 16, 3 and 14 for the previous week, a total of 300 against 441. The increase of diphtheria was most marked between Rivington and Fourteenth streets, east of Avenue B, between Fourteenth and Twenty-sixth streets East, and between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, from river to river, there being a decrease, as a rule, elsewhere. Measles increased between Houston and Twenty-sixth streets West, between Fourteenth and Twenty-sixth streets East, and in the upper portion of the annexed district, the decrease elsewhere being marked. There was a slight increase of scarlet fever between Rivington and Fourteenth streets, east of Avenue B, but a general decrease in other parts of the city; 12 of the 28 cases of typhoid fever were below Fourteenth street, and 8 of the remaining 16 were between Fourteenth and Fortieth streets.
