The letter of the Corporation Counsel, dated October 7, 1899, referring to the matter of the lighting of the streets and avenues of the Borough of Richmond, was read and ordered on file.

The following resolution was offered by Councilman O'Grady and was unanimously adopted: Resolved, That the Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, hereby recommends to the Commissioner of Water Supply of The City of New York that permission be granted for the extension of water-mains in Fair View and Crichton avenues, in the First Ward of the borough.

The following resolution was offered by Alderman Vaughan and was unanimously adopted: Resolved, by the Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, that it be referred to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion as to whether or not Stone street, in the Second Ward of the borough, is a public street.

The following resolution was offered by Councilman Bodine and was unanimously adopted: Whereas, It has come to the attention of this Board that there is considerable opposition among the residents and taxpayers in the vicinity of the proposed new crematory for the incineration of garbage at the foot of Bodine street, in the First Ward of the Borough of Richmond; and Whereas, This Board has no information sufficient to enable it to form a judgment as to whether or not the interests of the public are properly safeguarded; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board be and he hereby is directed to communicate with the Commissioner of Street Cleaning and respectfully request that a copy of the contract under which said crematory is to be constructed and operated be transmitted to this Board, together with such other information bearing upon the matter as may be pertinent thereto.

Mr. John O'Brien appeared before the Board and reported that there was an epidemic of diphtheria on John street, in the First Ward of the Borough, caused by the accumulation of stagnant water and the lack of proper drainage of the districts lying in the vicinity of said street, and asked that the Board do all in its power to relieve the condition complained of.

The following resolution was then offered by President Cromwell and was unanimously adopted: Whereas, It has been brought to the attention of this Board that an epidemic of disease is threatened in the vicinity of John street, in the First Ward of this borough, by reason of the unsanitary conditions prevailing there and the necessity for proper drainage and sewer improvements; and

Whereas, The case in point is simply one of many similar cases existing in the borough, all of which depend for their relief upon the adoption of a general map and plan of the borough; therefore be it

Resolved, That this Board earnestly recommends to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the importance of as liberal an appropriation as possible for the pushing forward to completion at the earliest possible day of the general map and plan of the Borough of Richmond.

On motion of Alderman Vaughan it was voted that a copy of the above resolution be forwarded by the Secretary to the Board of Health and to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York.

On motion the meeting adjourned.
