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## BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

MINUTES, BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK, ROOM 16, CITY HALL, FRIDAY, MARCH 11, 1904.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Edward M. Grout, Comptroller; Timothy P. Sullivan, Acting President of the Board of Aldermen; John F. Ahearn, President of the Borough of Manhattan; Martin W. Littleton, President of the Borough of Brooklyn; Louis F. Haffen, President of the Borough of The Bronx; Joseph Bermel, Acting President of the Borough of Queens, and George Cromwell, President of the Borough of Richmond.

After disposing of the Public Improvements Calendar the following financial matters were considered:

The Secretary presented the claim of Nelson J. Waterbury for compensation for legal services rendered to The City of New York in the trial of William H. DeForest before the Commissioners of Appraisal in the Aqueduct Proceedings.

The President of the Borough of Brooklyn moved that the matter lay on the table, which motion was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the President of the Borough of Queens—11.

Negative—The Comptroller—3.

Not voting—The President of the Borough of the The Bronx and the President of the Borough of Richmond—2.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Appraiser of Real Estate, Department of Finance, relative to the amendment of the description contained in the resolution adopted December 11, 1903, relative to the acquisition of a site for a hospital in the Borough of The Bronx:

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held on December 11, 1903, adopted a resolution for the acquisition, at private sale, of a piece of property containing four acres, located on the Southern Boulevard and Crotona avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, as a hospital for the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

The Trustees of the St. John's College, Fordham, owners of the ground, have objected to the description of the property as recited in the contract, and have requested that the description, as adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, be amended in one or two particulars. The amendments are not material except to the College, and I see no reason why the Board of Estimate and Apportionment should not amend their resolution of December 11, 1903, as follows:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the westerly side of the Southern Boulevard with the northwesterly side of Crotona avenue, and running thence northerly along the westerly side of Southern Boulevard two hundred and fifty-nine (259) and seventy-two (72) one-hundredths feet to the southerly line or side of a private road or lane; thence running northwesterly in a straight line along the southerly line or side of said private road or lane three hundred and twenty-two (322) and eighty-four (84) one-hundredths feet; thence running southwesterly four hundred and seventy-nine (479) and sixty-seven (67) one hundredths feet; thence running southeasterly three hundred and nine (309) and eighty-two (82) one-hundredths feet to Crotona avenue; thence running northeasterly along the northwesterly side of Crotona avenue two hundred and fifty-eight (258) and nine (9) one-hundredths feet to the point or place of beginning, together with all the right, title and interest of the owners of said premises of, in and to the public streets, avenues and roads adjoining said premises, to the centre thereof, it

being distinctly understood that no right, title or interest of, in or to said private road or lane is conveyed or intended to be conveyed by these presents, —and I so recommend.

Beginning at the point of intersection of the westerly side of the Southern Boulevard with the northwesterly side of Crotona avenue and running thence northerly along the westerly side of Southern Boulevard two hundred and fifty-nine (259) and seventy-two (72) one-hundredths feet to a private road; thence running northwesterly along the private road three hundred and twenty-two (322) and eighty-four (84) one-hundredths feet; thence running southwesterly four hundred and seventy-nine (479) and sixty-seven (67) one-hundredths feet; thence running southeasterly three hundred and nine (309) and eighty-two (82) one-hundredths feet to Crotona avenue; thence running northeasterly along the northwesterly side of Crotona avenue two hundred and fifty-eight (258) and nine (09) one-hundredths feet to the point or place of beginning, together with all the right, title and interest of the owners of said premises of, in and to the streets, avenues and roads adjoining said premises to the centre thereof.

—and the Comptroller of The City of New York is hereby authorized to enter into an agreement for the purchase of the above-described premises at a price not exceeding eighty thousand dollars (\$80,000), which contract or agreement is to be submitted to the Corporation Counsel for his approval."

—be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the selection of a site for hospital purposes, located in the Borough of The Bronx, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the westerly side of the Southern Boulevard with the northwesterly side of Crotona avenue and running thence northerly along the westerly side of Southern Boulevard two hundred and fifty-nine (259) and seventy-two (72) one-hundredths feet to the southerly line or side of a private road or lane; thence running northwesterly in a straight line along the southerly line or side of said private road or lane three hundred and twenty-two (322) and eighty-four (84) one-hundredths feet; thence running southwesterly four hundred and seventy-nine (479) and sixty-seven (67) one-hundredths feet; thence running southeasterly three hundred and nine (309) and eighty-two (82) one-hundredths feet to Crotona avenue; thence running northeasterly along the northwesterly side of Crotona avenue two hundred and fifty-eight (258) and nine (09) one-hundredths feet to the point or place of beginning, together with all the right, title and interest of the owners of said premises of, in and to the public streets, avenues and roads adjoining said premises, to the centre thereof, it being distinctly understood that no right, title or interest of, in or to said private road or lane as conveyed or intended to be conveyed by these presents.

—and the Comptroller of The City of New York is hereby authorized to enter into an agreement for the purchase of the above-named premises at a price not exceeding eighty thousand dollars (\$80,000), which contract or agreement is to be submitted to the Corporation Counsel for his approval.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Richmond and Acting President of the Borough of Queens—16.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Justices of the Court of Special Sessions, requesting the Board to recommend to the Board of Aldermen the fixing of the salaries of certain positions in the Court of Special Sessions and the Children's Court. Laid over.

The Board went into executive session.

The Board reconvened in open session.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Edward M. Grout, Comptroller; Timothy P. Sullivan, Acting President of the Board of Aldermen; John F. Ahearn, President of the Borough of Manhattan; Martin W. Littleton, President of the Borough of Brooklyn; Louis F. The Board adjourned to meet Friday, March 18, 1904, at 10.30 A. M., for consideration of financial matters.

Resolved, That the Local Board of Chester, Twenty-fifth District, hereby approves the "map or plan showing the location of East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, from Boston road to the Bronx river, and of Tremont avenue, from the Bronx river to the Eastern Boulevard, and the change of grades of said Tremont avenue; also the public place at the intersection of Westchester avenue. Prepared by the President of the Borough of The Bronx, under authority of chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901. Dated New York, March 12, 1904," and requests the President of the Borough to forward said map to the Board of Estimate, and urge that a public hearing be given by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on April 8, 1904.

On motion, the following resolution was introduced and adopted:

Whereas, A petition for a local improvement described below has been received by the President of the Borough of Manhattan; and

Whereas, He has appointed a time for a meeting of this Local Board not more than fifteen days after the receipt by him of the said petition, at which meeting the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Local Board, and he has caused a notice to be published in the CITY RECORD that said petition has been presented to him and is on file in his office for inspection, and of the time when and the place where there would be a meeting of this Local Board at which



the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Board, which time was not less than ten days after the publication of this notice; and

#### WASHINGTON HEIGHTS DISTRICT.

At a meeting of the Board of Local Improvements of the Washington Heights District, held January 26, 1904, the following members were present:

The President presented for the Board's consideration a communication from the Corporation Counsel to the effect:

First—That resolutions of the Local Boards adopted prior to January 1, 1904, cannot be legally acted upon by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Second—That it is necessary for the Local Boards now existing to initiate all proceedings for local improvements to be submitted to the present Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and to that end it is necessary that new petitions be presented to these Local Boards and all proceedings begun anew.

The President presented for the Board's consideration communication from the Corporation Counsel to the effect that letters from the Commissioner of Public Works may be considered as "a petition" as provided for in section 432 of the Charter, which was ordered on file.

The President presented for the Board's consideration matter of regulating, grading, curbing and flagging West One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, from the Boulevard Lafayette to Riverside Drive. Estimated cost, \$12,162.12. Assessed value of the property affected, \$142,500.

Mr. J. C. Butterly appeared in favor of the proposed improvement.

On motion, the following resolution was introduced and adopted:

Whereas, A petition for a local improvement described below has been received by the President of the Borough of Manhattan, and

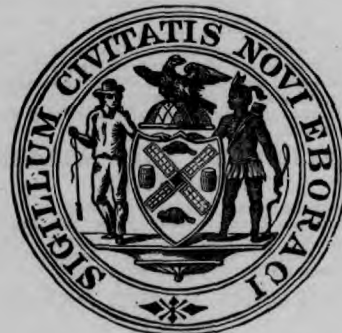

## PROPOSALS FOR BIDS AND ESTIMATES FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

## NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

**GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.**  
The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board of Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
