BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

(PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.)

A meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York was held in Room No. 16, City Hall, on Friday, July 21, 1905, at 10.30 o'clock in the forenoon.

Present—The Mayor, the Comptroller (Acting Comptroller Stevenson), the President of the Borough of Manhattan (Acting President Dalton), the President of the Borough of Brooklyn (Acting President Brackenridge), the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond.

The Mayor, Hon. George B. McClellan, presided.

MANHATTAN TERMINAL, WILLIAMSBURG BRIDGE.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the following resolutions, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 14th day of July, 1905, be and the same hereby are rescinded, viz.:

"Resolved, That Delancey street, between the bridge at Clinton street and the westerly side of Norfolk street, be turned over to the Bridge Department as a bridge plaza.

"Resolved, That the map of The City of New York be changed by taking a strip fifty feet wide from the southern side of Delancey street, between Suffolk and Norfolk streets, as an addition to the bridge plaza."

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—13.

Thereupon the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board held on the 23d day of June, 1905, resolutions were adopted proposing to change the map or plan of The City of New York so as to close and discontinue a portion of Delancey street, being required as a part of an approach to the Williamsburg Bridge, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, and appointing a hearing at a meeting of this Board to be held on the 7th day of July, 1905, at 10.30 o'clock a. m., at which meeting such proposed action would be considered by this Board, and requesting a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed action would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 7th day of July, 1905; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 7th day of July, 1905; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons interested in such proposed change who have appeared, and such proposed change was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, deeming it for the public interest to change the map or plan of The City of New York by closing and discontinuing a portion of Delancey street, being required as a part of an approach to the Williamsburg Bridge, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, does hereby favor the same, so as to close and discontinue a portion of the aforesaid street as follows:

All that portion of Delancey street lying between the easterly side of Clinton street and the westerly side of Suffolk street included between a line distant 40 feet northerly from and parallel with the southerly side of Delancey street as heretofore laid out, and a line 150 feet northerly from and parallel with the said southerly line of Delancey street; also all that portion of Delancey street lying between the westerly side of Suffolk street and the easterly side of Norfolk street included between the southerly side of Delancey street as heretofore laid out and a line 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the aforesaid southerly line of Delancey street.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—13.

The following communication from the Commissioner of Bridges was presented:

DEPARTMENT OF BRIDGES—CITY OF NEW YORK, }
July 13, 1905. }

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—Referring to the Manhattan terminal of the Williamsburg Bridge, I beg leave to enclose herewith a print showing plot of land, about 50 feet by 200, lying on the southerly side of Delancey street and between Suffolk and Norfolk streets, and to request that your Honorable Board will authorize the acquisition of this property for bridge purposes, as a preliminary step in the acquisition of property and rights for the construction of a railway terminal at the Manhattan end of the Williamsburg Bridge.

The following was then adopted:

Whereas, The Commissioner of Bridges has selected certain property located in the Borough of Manhattan, more particularly described below, to be acquired for the use of said Department of Bridges; and

Whereas, The Commissioner has filed maps, showing the property so selected, in accordance with the provisions of section 1436 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended;

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves the acquisition, for the use of the Department of Bridges, of the property so selected, more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of the southerly side of Delancey street with the westerly side of Suffolk street, running thence southerly fifty (50) feet along the westerly side of Suffolk street; thence westerly and parallel with Delancey street, two hundred and forty-nine hundredths (200.49) feet to the easterly side of Norfolk street; thence northerly along the easterly side of Norfolk street fifty (50) feet to the southerly side of Delancey street; thence easterly along the southerly side of Delancey street two hundred and forty-two hundredths (200.42) feet to the place of beginning.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and he hereby is directed to institute proceedings for the acquisition of the foregoing described property.

Resolved, That nothing in this resolution contained shall be construed as preventing the Comptroller of The City of New York from entering into contracts for the acquisition of any portion of the above described property at private sale, subject to the approval of this Board.

DEAR SIR—There is sent herewith diagram of a portion of lands within existing street areas (shaded by ruled lines), which the Bridge Department asks to be discontinued and closed for street purposes in connection with the construction of the underground railway terminal at the Manhattan end of the Williamsburg Bridge. I would therefore respectfully request that a public hearing be ordered by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on this subject.

The following resolutions were then adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter as amended, deeming it for the public interest so to do, proposes to change the map or plan of The City of New York by closing and discontinuing as a public street, in connection with the construction of an underground terminal for Williamsburg Bridge, certain portions of Delancey street, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, shown upon a map submitted by the President of the Borough of Manhattan, dated July 20, 1905.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed change at a meeting of the Board to be held in the City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on the 22d day of September, 1905, at 10.30 o'clock a. m.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board cause these resolutions and a notice to all persons affected thereby that the proposed change will be considered at a meeting of the Board, to be held at the aforesaid time and place, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 22d day of September, 1905.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—13.

VESTING TITLE TO THIRD AVENUE WIDENING, THE BRONX.

In connection with the regulating and grading of the widened portion of Third avenue, between East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Willis avenue, Borough of The Bronx, which was authorized on July 14, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on the 26th day of May, 1905, adopted a resolution requesting the Corporation Counsel to acquire title, wherever the same has not heretofore been acquired, for the use of the public, to the lands, tenements and hereditaments that shall or may be required for the purpose of opening and extending the widening of Third avenue, between East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Willis avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York; and

Whereas, It appears to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, from the surveys

made and information furnished to it that there are buildings upon the lands that shall or may be required for the purpose of opening and extending said widened portion of Third avenue; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 990 of the Greater New York Charter, directs that upon the day six months subsequent to the date of the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment appointed by the Supreme Court in proceedings to acquire title to the land aforesaid, the title to each and every piece or parcel of land lying within the lines of the said widening of Third avenue, between East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Willis avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, so required, shall be vested in The City of New York.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—13.

VESTING TITLE TO SEVENTEENTH STREET, OAK AND WEST AVENUES, QUEENS.
The following report of the Chief Engineer was presented:

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT,
OFFICE OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER,
July 20, 1905.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on Friday, July 14, the Board authorized the construction of large outlet sewers and a sewage disposal plant for the Inglewood District of the Borough of Queens. In my report upon the resolution attention was called to the fact that, while the Commissioners for the opening of three of the streets involved had been appointed, they had not yet filed their oaths, but were to have appeared in court on the 12th inst. to qualify. Upon inquiry at the Bureau of Street Openings to-day, I am advised that the oaths have not yet been filed, and in order that the President of the Borough of Queens may not make a contract for these sewers and enter upon land lying within the streets about to be opened before he has the legal right to do so, I would recommend the adoption by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of resolutions providing that title to the land lying within the lines of Seventeenth street, between Queens avenue and Oak avenue; Oak avenue, between Seventeenth avenue and West avenue, and West avenue, between Hillside avenue and Jamaica avenue, be vested in the City thirty days after the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, there being no buildings upon the land to be acquired. Proceedings for opening Seventeenth street and Oak avenue were instituted on September 30, 1903, and proceedings to open West avenue were instituted on July 15, 1904.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 30th day of September, 1903, adopted a resolution requesting the Corporation Counsel to acquire title, wherever the same has not heretofore been acquired, for the use of the public, to the lands, tenements and hereditaments that shall or may be required for the purpose of opening and extending Seventeenth street, from Queens avenue to Oak avenue, and also Oak avenue, from Seventeenth street to West street, Third Ward, in the Borough of Queens, City of New York.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 990 of the Greater New York Charter, directs that thirty days after the date of the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, who may be appointed by the Supreme Court in proceedings for the acquisition of title to said streets, the title to each and every piece or parcel of land lying within the lines of said Seventeenth street, between Queens avenue and Oak avenue; and also in Oak avenue, between Seventeenth street and West street, Third Ward, in the Borough of Queens, City of New York, so required, shall be vested in The City of New York.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—13.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 15th day of July, 1904, adopted a resolution requesting the Corporation Counsel to acquire title, wherever the same has not heretofore been acquired, for the use of the public, to the lands, tenements and hereditaments that shall or may be required for the purpose of opening and extending West avenue, from Hillside avenue to Jamaica avenue, Third Ward, in the Borough of Queens, City of New York;

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 990 of the Greater New York Charter, directs that thirty days after the date of the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment who may be appointed by the Supreme Court in proceedings for the acquisition of title to said streets, the title to each and every piece or parcel of land lying within the lines of said West avenue, between Hillside avenue and Jamaica avenue, Third Ward, in the Borough of Queens, City of New York, so required, shall be vested in The City of New York.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—13.

OPENING WEST FARMS ROAD, THE BRONX.

The following communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx and form of agreement was presented:

THE CITY OF NEW YORK,
OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOROUGH OF THE BRONX,
New York, July 17, 1905.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIR—Referring to the opinion of the Corporation Counsel, rendered May 31, 1905, and the reference by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under date of June 16, 1905, of said opinion to me, relative to deed of cession to The City of New York, executed by the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad Company and the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, of certain of their property included within the lines of the proposed opening of West Farms road, from the Bronx river to Westchester creek, I respectfully call your attention to the request of the Acting Corporation Counsel contained in said communication, as follows:

"I therefore respectfully request your Board to adopt the necessary resolutions agreeing to the cession of the lands, tenements, hereditaments and premises belonging to the railroad companies, and further that the compensation and recompense to be made to the railroad companies executing said deed shall be one dollar, and that the remaining railroad lands of said companies shall be exempt from any assessment for the opening and widening of said West Farms road, and authorizing me, on behalf of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to accept and record said deed of cession in pursuance of said agreement."

I respectfully request that the necessary action indicated be taken by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at the next meeting of said Board.

This indenture, made this 15th day of May, in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, between the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad Company, a

domestic railroad corporation, duly organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of New York, party of the first part; the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, a steam surface railroad corporation, duly organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Connecticut, party of the second part; and The City of New York, a domestic municipal corporation, duly organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of New York, party of the third part; witnesseth that

Whereas, The said party of the first part is the owner of a certain line of steam surface railroad extending from the City of New Rochelle, in Westchester County, to a point on the Harlem river at or near Willis avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, City, County and State of New York, and the premises and lands appurtenant thereto, and did, on or about the 29th day of September, 1873, by indenture of lease, rent and lease to the said party of the second part all of its said line of railroad, lands, premises, franchises and rights for the period of ninety-nine years, and that thereafter and thereupon and by virtue of the said indenture of lease the said second party entered upon and ever since has continued and still continues to occupy, use and operate all of the said railroad, lands, premises, franchises and rights in the said lease contained; and

Whereas, The said party of the third part, on or about the 17th day of December, 1904, applies to the Supreme Court of the State of New York at a special term thereof, held at the County Court-house in the Village of White Plains, in and for the County of Westchester, for an order appointing Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in a proceeding entitled:

"In the matter of the application of The City of New York, relative to acquiring title, wherever the same has not heretofore been acquired, to the lands, tenements and hereditaments required for the opening and widening of West Farms road (although not yet named by proper authority), from the Bronx river to Westchester creek, in the Twenty-fourth Ward of the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York"; and

Whereas, It was sought in the said proceedings to cross the main-line tracks of the railroad of the said party of the first part, and leased to, used and occupied by the said second party, and acquire title to that portion of the said railroad so crossed by the said West Farms road, and also to certain other lands now owned by said party of the first part and by it leased, rented, let to, used and occupied by the said party of the second part as a part of its and their Van Nest yard; and

Whereas, The said parties of the first and second parts, respectively, duly appeared in said proceeding and duly filed its and their answer to the application of the said party of the third part, whereby it and they denied the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court to entertain the said application, and also denied the right of the said party of the third part to acquire title to any of the property of the said party of the first part; and

Whereas, The said party of the third part has promised and agreed, in consideration of the grant of the hereinafter described premises and the withdrawal of the said first and second parties' answer, to hold the said first and second parties free and harmless from any and all assessments of every kind, name, nature and description which may or might be levied upon any of the property of the said first and second parties, or either of them, on account or growing out of or through the said proceeding for acquiring title to and opening the said West Farms road;

Now, therefore, The said party of the first part and the said party of the second part, for and in consideration of the sum of one dollar (\$1) lawful money of the United States paid by the said party of the third part, and the holding and saving free and harmless of the said parties of the first and second parts, respectively, from any, all, each and every assessment or assessments, payment or payments, charge or charges, of any kind, name, nature or description on account or growing out of or through the said proceeding for acquiring title to and opening the said West Farms road by the said party of the third part, hereby consent to withdraw its and their said answer heretofore interposed in said proceeding, and do hereby grant, bargain, sell and release unto the said party of the third part for the purposes of a street, road, avenue, or highway, all that certain piece or parcel of land beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the easterly side of Unionport road and the north side of the West Farms road as established on a map entitled "Map or plan showing the locating and laying out and the grades of West Farms road, from the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad to Westchester creek, and of a public place near the junction of Westchester avenue, prepared for the President of the Borough of The Bronx under authority of chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901, dated New York, May 3, 1904, filed in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York on June 15, 1904, as Map No. 1081," and running thence south eighty-seven (87) degrees fifty-one (51) minutes six (6) seconds east and along the said northerly line of the said West Farms road as laid out on the said map and as proposed to be widened two thousand sixty-four and fifty-eight one-hundredths (2,064.58) feet to the easterly property line of the said railroad company; thence southerly and along the said easterly property line of the said railroad company three (3) degrees twenty-seven (27) minutes forty (40) seconds west twenty-five and fifty-nine one-hundredths (25.59) feet to the present northerly line of the said West Farms road; thence north and along the present northerly line of the said West Farms road eighty-seven (87) degrees seventeen (17) minutes fifty-four (54) seconds west two thousand and sixty and sixty-two one-hundredths (2,060.62) feet to the intersection of the easterly side of the said Unionport road with the present north side of the said West Farms road; and thence north along the easterly side of the said Unionport road twenty-nine (29) degrees fourteen (14) minutes ten (10) seconds west six and sixty-six one-hundredths (6.66) feet to the point or place of beginning, be the said several dimensions more or less, and containing about thirty-three thousand two hundred and fifty (33,250) square feet, as shown upon the annexed map; being a portion of the premises heretofore duly conveyed by James H. Benedict and wife to the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad Company by deed dated November 13, 1869, and duly acknowledged on November 15, 1869, and duly recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds of Westchester County on November 17, 1869, at 11 a. m., in Liber 729 of Deeds, page 283;

Together with the appurtenances and all the estate and rights of the said party of the first part in and to the said premises;

To have and to hold the above granted premises unto the said party of the third part so long as the said party of the third part shall use the same for street, highway or road purposes;

And it is further covenanted and agreed by and between the parties hereto that the said parties of the first and second parts, respectively, shall without payment of any further or other rent or charge have the right to continue to use and occupy the said above-mentioned premises to the same extent as if these presents had not been made and executed, until the said party of the third part shall regulate and grade and prepare for proper street, road or highway use that portion of the said West Farms road of which the said above-described premises form and constitute a part.

In witness whereof the said parties of the first and second parts have caused these presents to be executed by its and their presidents and its and their corporate seals to be hereto affixed the day and year first above written.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
