The owners, lessees, tenants, occupants and managers of every building, vessel or place in or upon which a locomotive or stationary engine, furnace or boilers are used, shall cause all ashes, cinders, rubbish, dirt and refuse to be removed to some proper place so that the same shall not accumulate, nor shall any person cause, suffer or allow cinders, dust, gas, steam or offensive or noisome odors to escape or be discharged from any such building, vessel or place, to the detriment or annoyance of any person or persons not being therein or thereupon engaged.

The recommendation to add a section to the Sanitary Code to be known as section 181, was taken from the table, and, on motion, it was

Resolved, That the following sanitary ordinance be and the same is hereby adopted and added to the Sanitary Code, to be known as section 181:

Section 181. No person shall cause, suffer or allow dense smoke to be discharged from any building, vessel, stationary or locomotive engine, place or premises within The City of New York, or upon the waters adjacent thereto within the jurisdiction of said City. All persons participating in any violation of this provision, either as proprietors, owners, tenants, managers, superintendents, captains, engineers, firemen or otherwise, shall be severally liable therefor.

A certified copy of a resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund December 11, 1906, amending so much of a resolution adopted by the said Board April 18, 1906, as relates to a renewal of the lease of the premises No. 341 Pleasant avenue, Borough of Manhattan, by omitting the words "with a privilege of renewal for an additional two years," was received and ordered on file.

A copy of a report of the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics of the Department of Finance relative to the contract awarded to H. H. Vought & Co. for the construction of a dining pavilion for the use of the inmates of the sanatorium for the care and treatment of persons affected with tuberculosis from The City of New York, located at Otisville, Town of Mount Hope, Orange County, N. Y., was received and ordered on file.

George A. Hall, secretary, Mornay Williams, representing the Child Labor Committee; Mrs. Frederick Nathan, president, and Miss Pauline Goldmark, executive secretary, representing the Consumers' League, appeared and submitted a list of violations of the law relating to the employment of women and children in mercantile and other establishments and were heard in reference to same. The Sanitary Superintendent was directed to investigate the violations charged and the persons appearing were requested to suggest measures at the next meeting of the Board for the effective enforcement as well as such amendments as may be necessary to be made by the law at the coming session of the New York State Legislature.

Report of damage caused to the submarine telephone cable extending from the mainland in the Borough of The Bronx to North Brother Island, by the schooner "Mary E. Morse," while in tow of the tug "Emerald," thereby cutting off telephonic communication with Riverside Hospital, was received and the Secretary was directed to forward the matter to the Corporation Counsel for such action as may be necessary to recover the cost of repairing said cable.

Request of the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, under date of December 12, for authority to transfer Umberto Clemto, from Laborer, office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, to Dock Laborer, in his Department, for the reason that he had not served under the title of Laborer for a period of one year.

Request of the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, under date of December 12, for authority to transfer Charles Timpone, from Laborer, office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, to Dock Laborer, in his Department, for the reason that he had not served under the title of Laborer for a period of one year.

Request of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, under date of December 11, for authority to reinstate Frank Gulma as a Driver and to transfer him to the position of Hostler, for the reason that he was transferred to the position of Stableman on March 30, 1906, and had not served under that title for a period of one year.

The report of the President was adopted.

The following appeals were granted upon the recommendation of the Labor Clerk:

The Commission may, by resolution, except from competitive examination any person engaged in private business who shall render any professional, scientific, technical or expert service of an occasional and exceptional character to any City officer, and the amount of whose compensation in any one year shall not exceed \$1,000; provided that such limitation of compensation shall not apply to any person so employed by the Mayor or Corporation Counsel; and, provided, further, that the Commission may, by resolution approved by the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, suspend such limitation in other cases."

The Secretary was directed to communicate with the Corporation Counsel and call his attention to the letter of the Commission under date of September 12, 1906, requesting his opinion as to the legality of certain transfers made by the former Secretary of the Commission under the authority of the then existing rule, and to again request that an opinion be furnished at an early date.

The matter of preparing the report of the Commission for the year 1906 was referred to Commissioner Talley.

A communication was presented from Mr. James D. Dunlap, Sixth Grade Clerk in the Pay Roll Bureau of the Commission, waiving his right as a veteran of the Civil War to promotion to Seventh Grade Clerk, in favor of Mr. George H. Eberle, Sixth Grade Clerk in that Bureau.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the salary of Mr. George H. Eberle, Clerk, be and the same hereby is fixed at the rate of \$2,100 per annum, taking effect December 1, 1906.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated December 15, stating that the application of Thomas Richmond, of No. 230 East Broadway, for Interpreter, had been rejected, he having failed to furnish proof of the accuracy of the date of birth given, and that the papers had been forwarded to Mr. D. P. Meetze, of the Department of Justice, as the candidate seemed to have been guilty of fraud in obtaining his naturalization. The action of the Chief Examiner was approved.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated December 14, with reference to the request of Meyer M. Pundick, of No. 82 Beaver street, Brooklyn, that the examination for Fifth Grade Clerk, taken by him on May 15, 1906, be construed to have qualified him for promotion to the Sixth grade, stating that at the examination on May 15, candidates were not examined for a higher grade than the Fifth, which fact clearly appeared upon the examination papers set upon that date. The request was denied.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated December 15, forwarding a report of Mr. Rafferty, Examiner, on the case of James Colligan, a candidate for the position of Attendant, with a request for instructions. It appeared that the candidate had served in the position of Attendant in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan up to August 14, 1902, upon which date he was removed upon charges preferred by Mr. W. W. Weeks, Superintendent; that Mr. Weeks, however, under date of October 3, 1906, recommended the acceptance of the candidate's new application. After due consideration, the application was accepted.

A communication was presented from the Record Clerk, dated October 13, stating that it appeared from the application of Henry Lindenfeld, No. 525 West Thirty-eighth street, for the position of Inspector of Foods (Milk) that he was naturalized before he was twenty-one years of age; that the candidate claimed, however, that he was twenty-one years old at the time of his naturalization, and requested permission to take the examination subject to his obtaining a birth certificate from Germany. The request was granted.

The application of Miss Sophie Segaloff, No. 279 Madison street, Manhattan, for the position of Interpreter (Russian and Yiddish), was rejected on the ground of non-citizenship.

The application of Richard J. Costello, No. 193 Russell street, Brooklyn, for the position of Inspector of Foods (Milk), was rejected for the reason that the same was not presented within the time fixed for the receipt of such applications.

The following communication was presented from the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission:

"Mr. F. A. SPENCER, Secretary, Municipal Civil Service Commission, No. 299 Broadway, New York City:

"Dear Sir—I have to advise you that at a meeting of the State Civil Service Commission held on the 14th inst., resolutions of your Commission submitted under dates of October 9, November 12, 21 and 30, and December 13, 1906, amending the rules and classification of positions in the civil service of The City of New York, were considered. Action upon the resolutions was had as follows:

"1. Commissioner Brown reported in regard to proposed amendments to rule XV., paragraphs 7 and 8, which had been referred to him, that he and President Baker of your Commission had agreed upon changes to be made, and that he therefore recommended that the paragraphs in form already submitted be returned without approval, and I be authorized to approve amendments to said paragraphs when re-submitted by the Municipal Commission so as to show the following:

"A. Quality of work.
 "B. Quantity of work.
 "C. General conduct.
 "D. Punctuality and attendance.
 "E. Remarks. (State here if candidate has shown noteworthy executive ability for initiative.)
 "F. Far above average.
 "G. Above average.
 "H. Average.
 "I. Below average.
 "J. Far below average.
 "K. Monthly record to be filed annually. Officers to certify that record is made monthly.

"On motion the report was received and the recommendations adopted.

"2. On motion the resolution including in the exempt class in the Department of Docks and Ferries two additional Assistant Superintendents of Ferries, was ordered continued upon the calendar.

"3. Resolution waiving the provision of paragraph 2 of Rule VIII. so far as the same applies to the coming examination of Stenographers and Typewriters for employment outside The City of New York, approved.

"4. On motion the approval under date of December 1, 1906, of the resolution of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York adopted November 14, 1906, and approved by the Mayor November 20, 1906, excepting from examination under Rule XII., paragraph 6, Mr. Wilbur R. Kimball, to be employed as expert in the Comptroller's office, was confirmed.

"5. Resolution of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, adopted November 21, 1906, and approved by the Mayor, November 27, 1906, excepting from examination under Rule XII., paragraph 6, Mr. James E. Kenny, expert in the Department of Bridges, approved.

"6. Resolution of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, adopted December 5, 1906, and approved by the Mayor, December 11, 1906, amending the classification of positions in the labor class, Part II., by including therein the title 'Nickel-Plater,' Fire Department, approved.

"7. Resolution of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, adopted December 5, 1906, and approved by the Mayor, December 11, 1906, suspending the limit of compensation in the case of Mr. William Hogg, employed in the Jamaica Bay Improvement Commission, as expert, under the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 6, approved.

"Copies of the resolutions upon which final action was taken are inclosed herewith.

These papers were ordered filed, and, on motion, it was

Resolved, That Rule XV. of the rules of this Commission, as prescribed and established December 4, 1903, be and the same hereby is amended by substituting for paragraphs 6, 7 and 8 the following:

"6. The subjects of rating and the relative weights thereof in any competitive promotion examination shall be as follows: For comparative conduct, seniority and efficiency in previous service, as may be determined from the transcript of the efficiency record (or as may be otherwise determined under paragraph 8 of this rule), between the date of the original appointment of the candidate and the final date for the receiving of applications for any stated examination, 50; and for written papers on pertinent subjects, 50. (In cases where the candidate has obtained a promotion as the result of a competitive examination, the record shall be a continuation of the last record furnished; but if the promotion be obtained without competitive examination, the record shall commence from the date of his promotion to the position or grade.)

"In rating the records where more than one grade is opened, such rating shall be based upon the service of a candidate in all of such positions or grades.

"7. To provide a basis of rating for previous service, there shall be kept in each Department or office continuous and permanent records of the efficiency, character and conduct of all persons employed in graded positions therein. Such records shall be known as 'efficiency records,' and the entries made therein shall have reference to (a) quality of work performed by each such officer or employee; (b) the quantity of work performed by him; (c) his general conduct; (d) his punctuality and attendance; (e) his executive ability and capacity for initiative, where his work is of a character that will permit definite estimation.

"8. The entries upon an efficiency record shall be made by the administrative officer most closely in touch with the work of the officer or employee to be rated, who shall be designated for such purpose by the appointing officer. Such entries shall be made monthly, and the following terms shall be employed to indicate the degree of efficiency: (a) far above average; (b) above the average; (c) average; (d) below the average; (e) far below the average. A transcript or summary of such record, and all rewards or measures of discipline shall be furnished to the Commission annually, and shall contain the certification of the appointing officer that such entries were made monthly; and whenever the Commission so requires, like certification of the full record of each candidate shall be furnished by the appointing officer in advance of a particular examination. For periods of service prior to the establishment, or in the absence of, any such record, such rating shall be based upon such certificates, covering the several elements of service herein specified, in such forms as the Commission may require.

"Whenever, in the judgment of the Chief Examiner, more exact information is required for the purposes of such rating than that given in any summary, the original record may be consulted in such case. Such records shall be open either to the Chief Examiner or to any Examiner designated by him, and, at reasonable times, to any officer or employee whose conduct is noted therein."

The request of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, under date of December 6, 1906, that the list for promotion to second grade Clerk in that Department be changed to a list for promotion to the third grade, was granted, for the reason that the scope of the examination was sufficiently broad to qualify the candidates for the third grade, and for the further reason that there was no list in existence for promotion to that grade.

The reassignment to duty of Michael J. Nugent, Gardener in the Department of Parks, boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, was approved, it appearing from the doctor's certificate furnished that his absence from November 3, 1906, was due to illness.

A communication was presented from the Jamaica Bay Improvement Commission, dated December 15, stating that at a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held October 26, it was granted an extension of six months' time in which to file its report; and requesting, in view of the fact that the services of Draughtsmen would be required until the completion of its work, that the Commission again suspend the limit of compensation in the cases of Messrs. Augustus T. Kurth and Alexander H. Fox, and substitute a new limit of \$1,700 in the case of Mr. Kurth, and \$1,400 in the case of Mr. Fox.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the life of the Jamaica Bay Improvement Commission having been extended by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York to July 1, 1907, the period of employment of Mr. Augustus T. Kurth, who was excepted from examination on June 13, 1906, under the authority of Rule XII., paragraph 6, to be employed in the Jamaica Bay Improvement Commission for the purpose of copying some of the original survey sheets of the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey, be and the same hereby is extended until said date; provided, however, that his total compensation for such services shall not exceed the sum of \$1,700.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the life of the Jamaica Bay Improvement Commission having been extended by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York to July 1, 1907, the period of employment of Mr. Alexander H. Fox, who was excepted from examination on September 5, 1906, under the authority of Rule XII., paragraph 6, to be employed in the Jamaica Bay Improvement Commission to render expert services as a Draughtsman, be and the same hereby is extended until that date; provided, however, that his total compensation for such services shall not exceed the sum of \$1,400.

The emergency appointment of William Hogg, Axeman in the Jamaica Bay Improvement Commission, for seven days from December 17, was approved.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated December 13, stating that by reason of the marriage of Miss Kate Maddox, Stenographer and Typewriter in the Bureau of Sewers of his Department, her name would appear on the payroll of that Bureau in future as Mrs. Kate Maddox-Smith. The Secretary was directed to note the change of name on the records.

A communication was presented from the President of the Board of City Magistrates, First Division, dated December 13, transmitting the request of the Committee on Probation Work that a rerating, or, if possible, a re-examination be given to Mrs. Caroline McCauley and Miss Anna H. Doyle, candidates in the recent examination for Probation Officer. The request was denied for lack of power.

The leave of absence without pay, for thirty days from December 11, granted Mr. Edgar M. North, Assistant Engineer in the Department of Public Works, Borough of Richmond, was approved, subject to the furnishing of a doctor's certificate.

A letter was presented from the President of the Borough of Richmond, dated December 12, nominating for a non-competitive examination, to qualify him for a provisional appointment as Topographical Draughtsman, Mr. Victor O'Dwyer, No. 628 West One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, New York City. The Chief Examiner was directed to conduct the examination in accordance with the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 3.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to proceed with an open competitive examination for Supervisor of Complaints, in accordance with the request of the President of the Borough of Queens.

The request of the Board of Coroners, Borough of Queens, for approval of an additional leave of absence for a period of sixty days in the case of Dr. B. G. Strong, Coroner's Physician, and that the temporary employment of Dr. John C. Teas be extended for that length of time, was denied, and the Secretary was directed to state that it would be necessary to fill the vacancy in the position of Coroner's Physician permanently from an appropriate eligible list.

A letter was presented from the Department of Health, dated December 15, requesting that the name of Miss Frances Young, of No. 367 Rivington street, New York City, be restored to the list of Telephone Switchboard Operator from which it was taken on March 14, 1906. The Secretary stated that Miss Young was unable to perform her duties after March 23, 1906, on account of illness, and that she therefore did not complete her period of probation in the Department of Health. The request was granted.

A letter was presented from the Department of Health, dated December 15, asking that before the holding of the examination for Bacteriologist, the Examiner or Examiners assigned to prepare that examination confer with Dr. William H. Park and Dr. John S. Billings, Jr., of that department. The letter was referred to the Chief Examiner.

The request of the Board of Water Supply that Abraham M. Flamm, Office Boy, be permitted to enter the coming examination for promotion to Junior Clerk, grade D, was denied, it appearing that the said employee had not served in the Board of Water Supply for a period of six months, in accordance with the provisions of Rule XV., section 2.

A communication was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated December 18, requesting that the appointment of Mr. George W. Catey as Superintendent of Well Sinking, with salary at the rate of \$300 per month, be authorized by the Commission, and setting forth Mr. Catey's special qualifications for the proposed work. The appointment was approved under the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 7.

The appointment of the following named persons as Gage Keepers in the Board of Water Supply, with salary at the rate of \$5 a month, was approved under the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 7:

A letter was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated December 13, asking that the examination of Mr. Alton B. Roberts for promotion from sixth grade Statistician to tenth grade Chief Clerk, which had been scheduled for December 26, be held either before December 22 or after January 3, for the reason that Mr. Roberts would be out of the city between those dates. The request was granted, and the matter of setting a new date for the examination was referred to the Chief Examiner.

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, dated December 14, in answer to a letter of the Commission calling his attention to the fact that the positions in the Steam Dumper Service of his department were included in the Non-Competitive Class and appointments, therefore, should be made after an appropriate non-competitive examination, in accordance with the provisions of Civil Service Rule XVIII. The Commissioner stated that the reason for making "emergency" appointments in the Steam Dumper Service was that the department had had great difficulty in finding a sufficient number of men, especially Stokers, to do the work required; that two examinations had been held and the resulting eligible lists had been exhausted; and that at the time of writing no applications for further examinations had been received, notwithstanding the fact that they had been advertised in the various papers. The Commissioner requested that the Commission certify a list of Stokers for appointment at \$2.25 a day to fill the vacancies in that position, and permit of the making of "emergency" appointments to the other positions until such time as a sufficient number of eligibles could be obtained to hold the necessary examinations. The Secretary was directed to certify the eligible list of Stoker, and, on motion, the following "emergency" appointments were approved:

The emergency appointment of John Redican as Marine Engineer in the Department of Public Charities for seven days from December 17 was approved under the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 4.

A communication was presented from the Assistant Secretary of the Park Board, dated December 18, stating that to properly conduct the Children's School Farm in De Witt Clinton Park, Manhattan, during the year 1907, the services of one Assistant Director, at a salary of \$80 a month, and six Attendants at \$60 a month, would be necessary, and requesting, in view of the fact that in the past season considerable difficulty was had in securing suitable employees for that work, that open competitive examinations be held by the Commission in order to furnish lists of persons with a proper knowledge of the work of the school farm. The Secretary was instructed to request that the Director of the Children's School Farm appear before the Commission to discuss the matter.

A communication was presented from the Assistant Secretary of the Park Board, dated December 18, in reply to the letter of the Commission with reference to the complaint of George S. Crum, a Stationary Engineer, against his assignment to perform the duties of a Laborer. The letter stated that Mr. Crum had been assigned to work in the shops for the reason that it was found necessary to take him away from several posts to which he had been successively assigned for engine duty, with unsatisfactory and even dangerous results, as reported by his Foreman; that the matter would be taken up at once and disposed of, either by Mr. Crum's discharge or his assignment to work strictly in accordance with his title. The communication was ordered filed.

A communication was presented from the Assistant Secretary of the Park Board, dated December 18, stating that it was the intention of the Commissioner for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, to organize and employ a force for the care of street trees, he having received an appropriation for such work for the year 1907; that the force would consist of an Arboriculturist, several Gardeners, Climbers and Pruners, and, possibly, Laborers, and asking that an examination for promotion from Gardener to Arboriculturist be held by the Commission, in order that a person suitable for appointment to the latter position might become eligible at an early date.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to proceed with an examination for promotion from Gardener to Arboriculturist in the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, during the month of January.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That Mr. William Calvert, of Philadelphia, Pa., be and he hereby is excepted from competitive examination, under the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 6, to be employed by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn in reorganizing the Sewer Permit Bureau of his Department, it appearing that the services to be rendered are scientific, expert and of an occasional and exceptional character; provided, however, that his compensation shall not exceed two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250).

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to conduct an examination for promotion from Assistant Engineer to Chief Engineer in the Bureau of Sewers, Borough of Brooklyn, in accordance with the request of the President of that borough.

The leave of absence, without pay, for six months from December 15, granted Dr. Walter G. Hudson, Sanitary Inspector in the Health Department, was approved, it appearing from the doctor's certificate furnished that the same was granted because of illness.

The leave of absence, without pay, for six months from October 20, granted Mr. Joseph J. Sley, Axeman in the office of the President of the Borough of Richmond, was approved, it appearing from the doctor's certificate furnished that the same was granted on account of illness.

The request of the Superintendent of Sewers, Borough of Brooklyn, for an examination for promotion from first to second grade Typewriting Copyist, was denied for laches.

The request of the Fire Commissioner that Thomas F. Aram, third grade Clerk in the Administrative Bureau of the Fire Department, be admitted to the examination for promotion to fifth grade Clerk to be held December 24, was granted.

The employment of Dr. Adolph Radin and Dr. Abraham Blum as Chaplain in two departments each was approved on the report of the Secretary that he had communicated with the heads of the Department of Public Charities, the Department of Correction, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, and the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys, and from the statements received from them it appeared to be reasonable and economical to employ the same chaplain in two departments, he being able to hold services in the various institutions of one department without conflict with his duties in the other; and it was ordered that the payrolls of Drs. Blum and Radin be approved, and that copies of the several communications be forwarded to the Comptroller for his consideration.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Health, dated December 11, in answer to the letter of the President, under date of November 14, calling his attention to a violation of the Civil Service Law in his department in the assignment of eleven Laborers appointed in the Non-Competitive Class for duty at Riverside Hospital, to the work of mosquito extermination in the Borough of Richmond, and the appointment of Mr. Eugene Winship, who was formerly employed as an expert under the authority of Rule XII., paragraph 6, in that department, to the position of Laborer, with salary at the rate of \$1,200 per annum. The Secretary was directed to inform the Commissioner of Health that his letter did not answer the charges of the Commission and the Civil Service Reform Association, and that unless a satisfactory explanation were forthcoming at an early date, an investigation of the department would be necessary.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That, in accordance with an understanding arrived at with Hon. Herman A. Metz, Comptroller, after considerable correspondence and also verbal communication with the Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, the Secretary is hereby directed to attach the certificate of the Commission to certain bills heretofore paid by the Comptroller without the certificate of the Civil Service Commission, said bills covering services rendered to various departments in emergencies or by contract; the attachment of such certificate being in accordance with an opinion of the Corporation Counsel to the Comptroller under date of November 27, 1906. It being understood, however, that this resolution is to apply only to such contracts and agreements as have been made by heads of departments up to January 1, 1907, and that after that date no appointments for expert services are to be made by any appointing officer without first obtaining the approval of the Civil Service Commission, and that no bills for services rendered in emergencies shall be forwarded to the Comptroller for payment without first having been certified by the Commission.

The request of William S. Hendrick, No. 875 Knickerbocker avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, that his name be restored to the list of Stationary Engineer, was granted upon his affidavit that he was out of the city when certified to the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for appointment.

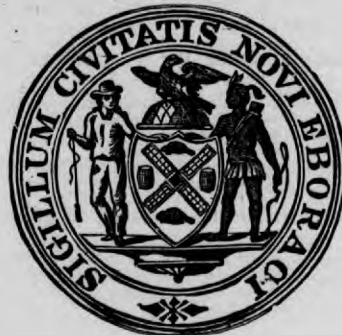

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
