A communication was presented from the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission, dated November 16, stating that the following resolutions of the Municipal Commission of The City of New York had been approved at a meeting held on November 15:

Beggs, who was excepted from examination by the Commission on October 2, 1907, pursuant to the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 6, to be employed for a temporary period as an Expert Searcher in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and Arrears, had failed to report for duty, and requesting authority to substitute Mr. Louis A. Muldoon of Far Rockaway, Borough of Queens, in place of Mr. Beggs. The request was granted.

A letter was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Public Charities, dated November 18, requesting, by direction of the Commissioner, that the Commission hold an examination for promotion to Superintendent of the Kings County Hospital Training School, the incumbent of that position having signified her intention of resigning on January 15, 1908.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to proceed with an examination for promotion to the position of Superintendent of the Kings County Hospital Training School, Department of Public Charities, such examination to be open to the Deputy Superintendents of the several training schools under the jurisdiction of that Department, and also the Supervising Nurses employed therein.

A letter was presented from the Assistant Secretary of the Board of Education, dated November 14, transmitting a certified copy of a resolution adopted by that Board at its meeting on the 13th inst., requesting an amendment of Part I. of the Competitive Class by including therein the position of Supervisor of Janitors. The Secretary was directed to advertise a public hearing on the proposed amendment in accordance with Rule III.

A letter was presented from the Assistant Secretary of the Fire Department, dated November 12, stating that, pursuant to an opinion of the Acting Corporation Counsel, dated August 8, 1905, the following orders had been made by the Fire Commissioner under dates of October 31 and November 11, 1907, respectively:

"In accordance with the terms of an opinion of the Acting Corporation Counsel, dated August 8, 1905, Special Order No. 82, dated May 18, 1907, reinstating John J. Slyman in the capacity of third grade Fireman in this Department, to take effect at 8 o'clock a. m. on May 19, 1907 (he having been appointed a fourth grade Fireman June 10, 1905, advanced to the third grade June 10, 1906, having resigned as such third grade Fireman to become a Patrolman in the Police Department February 2, 1907, and been reinstated in this Department as third grade Fireman to take effect May 19, 1907), is hereby amended by adding at the end of the first sentence thereof the words 'with service record as third grade Fireman of two hundred and thirty-seven (237) days,' so that the date of entrance into the second grade shall be September 24, 1907, one hundred and twenty-eight (128) days from the date of reinstatement, and the Chief of Department will take the necessary action to give effect thereto; said Slyman, under date of November 1, 1907, having signed a waiver filed in this Department of all claims to arrears of compensation, as the result of his appointment and reinstatement, or which has accrued to him as the result of the action taken conceding his recognition of service as herein stated."

II.

"In accordance with the terms of an opinion of the Acting Corporation Counsel, dated August 8, 1905, Special Order No. 9, dated January 11, 1907, transferring Patrolman sixth grade Thomas Kilbide, Police Department, to this Department in the capacity of fourth grade Fireman, to take effect from 8 o'clock a. m. January 14, 1907 (he having been appointed a fourth grade Fireman August 23, 1905, having resigned as such to become a Patrolman in the Police Department October 20, 1905, and having been transferred back to this Department as fourth grade Fireman, to take effect at 8 o'clock a. m. January 14, 1907, as hereinbefore stated), is hereby amended by adding at the end of the first sentence thereof the words 'with service record as fourth grade Fireman of fifty-eight (58) days,' so that the date of entrance into the third grade shall be November 17, 1907, the same being three hundred and seven (307) days from the date of reinstatement; and the Chief of Department will take the necessary action to give effect thereto."

The Secretary was directed to note the amendments on the records of the office.

A letter was presented from the Tenement House Commissioner, dated November 11, with reference to the case of Jacob Rubenfeld, who was appointed to the position of Office Boy in his Department in April, 1907, and about whom the Commission addressed a communication to him under date of November 6. The letter was ordered filed.

A letter was presented from Mr. Cornelius J. Sullivan, Commissioner of Education, dated November 15, with further reference to the bills of Associate City Superintendent Stevens, dated October 7, and amounting to \$145, for the services of an Office Boy from January 15 to April 13, 1907, and a Stenographer from August 30 to September 28, 1907. After careful consideration of the matter the Secretary was directed to communicate with the Department of Education and state that there was no provision of the Civil Service Law or rules under which the appointment of the Office Boy could be approved, as there was an eligible list in existence at the time from which a temporary appointment should have been made; that the employment of the Stenographer could be approved under the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 6, the services being of an expert nature, and to request that a separate voucher be prepared covering the services of the latter person and forwarded for certification.

A letter was presented from Dr. J. A. Gillet, Acting President of the Normal College of The City of New York, dated November 15, with further reference to the vouchers in payment of Mary B. James, Eleanor S. Christianson and Ella L. Flynn for temporary services rendered during the vacation period in the absence of the tutors. Nicholson and Layman from \$1,350 to \$1,500 per annum from September 20, 1907, the date upon which the regrading of positions in the clerical service became effective, such increase being within the maximum of the new third grade.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, dated November 16, requesting authority to employ a Blaster under the provisions of section 11 of Rule XIX. of the Civil Service Rules. The Secretary was directed to inform the Commissioner that as the title of Blaster did not appear in the classification an appointment could not be made under that rule, and to advertise a public hearing on the proposed amendment of the classification by including the said title in Part II. of the Labor Class.

A letter was presented from the Deputy Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated November 14, requesting authority to reassign Miss Sadie A. Bryan to duty as a Temporary Clerk in that Department in view of the fact that she had worked only six weeks between the date of her appointment to the position and September 18, when her name was dropped from the payroll on account of continued illness and transmitting a doctor's certificate. The request was granted.

A letter was presented from the Deputy Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated November 12, requesting approval of the transfer of Mr. John Ashmead from Draughtsman's Helper, at a salary of \$1,200 per annum, to Topographical Draughtsman, at the same salary, on the ground that his name appeared among the first three on the eligible list for the latter position. The Secretary stated that Mr. Ashmead's name would be third for such appointment if restored to the list, as it had been dropped on September 28, 1907, upon his declining an appointment in the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

On motion, it was

The Secretary called the attention of the Commission to a communication from the Department of Health, dated November 15, stating that, pursuant to a resolution of that Board adopted October 9, 1907, Mr. Shirley W. Wynne, of No. 621 West One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, Borough of Manhattan, had been appointed a Medical Clerk and assigned to duty in the Bureau of Records, Borough of Brooklyn, with salary at the rate of \$1,050 per annum. No. 620.

AN ORDINANCE regulating the matters provided for in section 1481 of the Laws of 1807, as amended by chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901, known as the Greater New York Charter.

Section 1481 being one of the sections specified under the title "The Second Schedule."

"Section to remain in force until changed by the Board of Aldermen."

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. It shall not be lawful to exhibit on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, to the public, in any building, garden, grounds, concert room or other room or place within The City of New York, the performance of any tragedy, comedy, opera, ballet, farce, negro minstrelsy, negro or other dancing, wrestling, boxing with or without gloves, sparring contest, trial of strength, or any part or parts therein, or any circus, equestrian or dramatic performance or exercise, or any performance or exercise of jugglers, acrobats, club performances or rope dancers. Provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall be deemed to prohibit at any such place or places on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, sacred or educational vocal or instrumental concerts, lectures, addresses, recitations and singing, provided that such above mentioned entertainments shall be given in such a manner as not to disturb the public peace, or amount to a serious interruption of the repose and religious liberty of the community. Any person wilfully offending against the provisions of this section, and every person knowingly aiding in such exhibitions, except as herein provided, by advertisements or otherwise, and every owner or lessee of any building, part of a building, grounds, garden or concert room, or other room or place, who shall lease or let out the same for the purpose of any such exhibition or performance, except as herein provided, or assent that the same be used for any such purpose, shall be subject to a penalty of five hundred dollars, which penalty the Corporation Counsel of said City is hereby authorized, in the name of The City of New York, to prosecute, sue for and recover; and on the recovery of a judgment for the penalty herein provided for against any manager, proprietor, owner or lessee consenting to or causing or allowing, or letting any part of the building for the purpose of any exhibition or performance, prohibited by this ordinance, the license which shall have been previously obtained by such manager, proprietor, owner or lessee is of itself vacated and annulled.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
