REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING JUNE 30, 1907.

Police Department of the City of New York. Office of the Commissioner, No. 300 Mulberry Street, New York, July 3, 1907.

His Honor, the Mayor, City Hall, New York City:

Sir—As required by section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, I have the honor to submit the following report for the quarter ending June 30, 1907:

On June 30 the total Force was 9,402. In addition there were on probation 36 Patrolmen and 3 Doormen.

The effective Force on June 30 was 8,524, 429 being absent with leave, 208 sick, 6 suspended, 3 absent without leave, and 232 detailed.

During the last quarter the losses in the several ranks were as follows:
Retired—Four Captains, 18 Lieutenants (including the former ranks of Sergeant
and Detective Sergeant) 1 Sergeant (formerly Roundsman), 38 Patrolmen, 3 Doormen, making a total in all ranks of 64.
Died—One Captain, 3 Lieutenants (including the former ranks of Sergeant and
Detective Sergeant), 2 Sergeants (formerly Roundsmen), 18 Patrolmen, making a

total in all ranks of 24.

Dismissed—Two Lieutenants (including the former ranks of Sergeant and Detective Sergeant), 21 Patrolmen and 7 Patrolmen on Probation, making a total in all ranks of 30, including Probationary Patrolmen.

Resigned—Twenty-four Patrolmen, 6 Patrolmen on Probation and 1 Doorman on Probation, making a total in all ranks of 31, including Probationary Patrolmen and

The legislation designed to secure certain changes in the Force, which was referred to in the preceding quarterly report, became law April 19. As a result the Detective Bureau has been reorganized and the office of Inspector has become a temporary detail from the rank of Captain.

Surgical districts for members of the Force now include members living within certain boundaries, instead of those doing duty within certain boundaries. A member of the Force reporting sick is now treated by the Police Surgeon within whose district he lives, where formerly the Surgeon might have had to traverse the length of the city to reach an officer ill at his home and living far from his precinct. The change is better for the Surgeons and better for the officers

The annual parade of 1907 took place Saturday, May 11, and was witnessed by your Honor, who was pleased to send the Police Commissioner a complimentary letter upon the performance of the Force, which letter was duly published in general orders. One new feature is worthy of notice. For the first time a body of men in the School of Instruction—the recruits—marched as a separate command. These men performed a fairly difficult drill in front of the grand stand which could not have been better done by veterans, and between their marching and that of the more seasoned men there was practically nothing to choose. there was practically nothing to choose.

The usual presentations of medals for 1906 were made by his Honor, the Mayor, just before the parade. Contrary to custom, only one medal of honor of the Police Department was awarded for 1906, the desire being to make the award of this medal the highest mark of official approval that can be shown to a member of the Force.

Special attention was paid during the quarter to the arrest of persons carrying concealed weapons, and a number of fruitful raids were made.

There was a strike of longshoremen beginning in the early part of May and lasting

There was a strike of longshoremen beginning in the early part of May and lasting for several weeks. It was said that ten thousand men were out. Careful attention was paid to the matter and fortunately but few and slight occasions of violence arose.

The first of May being the time for renewing licenses, all issued by this Department were rigidly scrutinized, and in cases of violation of the law on record during the past year the owners and managers were looked into, their licenses held up for some time, but all were finally issued, with caution for good behavior in the future. There were many complaints by the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children against the five-cent shows of various kinds. Most of these were running under a common show license issued by the License Bureau in the Mayor's office. A great number of them were carefully examined and inspected under my personal direction, and the evidence in each case was submitted to his Honor, the Mayor, with request for revocation of the license. This matter is still under advisement and before the Court. The suppression of these cheap shows which violate the law would be a prominent factor in the betterment of city conditions, and it is earnestly hoped that your Honor will not be lenient in permitting the renewal of these licenses. In every case which was reported this Department is prepared to give corroborative evidence.

After numerous and vexatious delays, considerable progress has been made in obtaining sites and beginning work on the plans for new station houses in the lower part of Manhattan to replace some of the old and unsanitary station houses. Owing to the high price of land in Manhattan it has not been possible to accomplish as much with the appropriation as was at first hoped for, and request has been made to the City authorities for a second installment of two million dellars for this pur-

much with the appropriation as was at first hoped for, and request has been made to the City authorities for a second installment of two million dollars for this purpose. I cannot too urgently press the necessity for this reconstruction of old station houses. The conditions are truly horrible in some of them, not only for prisoners, but also for the men themselves. Some of the sleeping quarters are hardly better than kennels, and I believe that new station houses will assist greatly in raising the tone of

the Police Force.

While the Police Department nominally has seven launches for patrolling the waters of the City, as a matter of fact none of them is fit for use. Only two of them can be kept in commission for a week or two at a time. Plans have been drawn and bids called for for the construction of two new launches of proper design. So urgent is the need for new launches that the Department has already asked for the issue of bonds for the construction of two more at once. The Department should have eight of these launches of these launches.

Considerable work has been done towards the compilation of a new Police Manual of Rules and Regulations. The Department is so short of these manuals that it has been impossible to supply several hundred new recruits with copies to which they are entitled, but the cost of the eleven thousand is so great that it has been deemed advisable to revise the whole book, which has been a pressing need for some time.

Considerable progress has been made in systematizing the work of the Detective Bureau under the new organization. This work naturally progresses slowly and must be carefully conducted. It is the endeavor so to plan whatever is done that it will last for many years and prove a broad foundation for the great growth in this Department which must naturally come with time.

Instead of telephoning out a mass of "general alarms" to look for missing persons, stolen articles, etc., these are now printed daily and furnished to the Force in pamphlet form, except in cases of extreme urgency, when the use of the telephone is imperative. This saves the time of the Lieutenants on desk duty in the several station houses, who were formerly obliged to take these "alarms" from the telephone, and it also furnishes the "alarms" in better shape for use and preservation.

The method of rendering service to persons looking for missing relatives or friends has also been put on a better basis.

Having in mind the general lack of knowledge on the part of the public of the mechanism of the Department, and of the proper action for prompt relief in emergencies and in cases of police inefficiency, discourtesy, etc., a pamphlet was prepared for general distribution, containing such brief instructions as it was thought would bring about more effective co-operation between the public and this Department and a better understanding of the Department's facilities for efficient service. These booklets have been eagerly sought, and I am satisfied plish their purpose.

The following schedules give, for the quarter ending June 30, 1907, the statistics customarily reported:

Sick Time.

The time lost by members of the Force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received during the quarter and a brief summary of the work of the Surgeons of the Department will be found in the schedule marked "A."

The statistics regarding arrests are given in the schedule annexed marked "B."

Lost Children.

The number of lost children received by the Department and disposed of is given in the schedule marked "C."

House of Detention.

The particulars regarding witnesses confined in the House of Detention are given in the schedule annexed marked "D."

Disposition of Property Coming Into the Hands of the Police.

Figures showing the value of lost or stolen property recovered and returned to owners, transactions of Property Clerk's office, etc., will be found in the schedule annexed marked "E."

Sanitary Company.

The transactions of the Sanitary Company (Steam Boiler Squad) for the quarter will be found in the schedule annexed marked "F."

Discipline.

The annexed schedule marked "G" gives in brief a record of disciplinary transactions concerning members of the Force for the quarter.

The number and character of licenses issued during the quarter, the fees received and the number of applications for licenses denied will be found in the schedule annexed marked "H."

Detective Bureau.

The work accomplished by the Detective Bureau during the quarter is shown in the schedule annexed marked "I."

The names of members of the Force who died during the quarter, with the date of death, the rank of each and the command to which he was attached at the time of his death, are in the schedule annexed marked "J."
