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COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock a. m., on Wednesday, March 25, 1908.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Herman A. Metz, Comptroller; James J. Martin, Chamberlain; Timothy P. Sullivan, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held March 11, 1908, were approved as printed.

The Comptroller brought up the matter of the request of the Commissioner of Docks, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the purchase of certain waterfront property lying within the vicinity of Jamaica avenue, Astoria, Borough of Queens, for the sum of \$85,000. (See Minutes, 1907, pages 1010, 1246, 1267, 1321.)

In connection therewith the following communication was received from the Corporation Counsel:

NEW YORK, March 24, 1908.

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Esq., Secretary, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—I have received your communication under date of March 19, 1908, reading as follows:

"At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, held December 4, 1907, a hearing was had in the matter of a request of the Commissioner of Docks, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the purchase of certain waterfront property lying within the vicinity of Jamaica avenue, Astoria, Borough of Queens, and action thereon laid over on account of the City's financial condition at that time.

"Chapter 372 of the Laws of 1907 provides that no resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approving or authorizing the acquisition of any part of the waterfront within the limits of The City of New York shall be of any validity or effect unless passed at a public hearing of said Commissioners, of which public notice shall be given by publication for six consecutive days in the CITY RECORD, not less than seven nor more than thirty days before said public hearing, etc.

"A hearing having been had in the matter, the question has been raised as to whether or not another hearing will have to be had before the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund can adopt the resolution to authorize the proposed purchase, in view of the fact that the statute expressly declares that the required resolution shall be passed at a public hearing of the Sinking Fund Commission, instead of after such hearing, which is the usual language employed in such cases.

"Will you kindly advise me as to this at your earliest convenience and oblige."

Chapter 372 of the Laws of 1907, so far as material to the question you propound, reads as follows:

"No resolution of the commissioners of the sinking fund or of the board of estimate and apportionment, approving or authorizing the acquisition of land or directing the vesting in the city of New York of any title to property * * * shall be of any validity or effect unless passed at a public hearing of said commissioners or

board, of which public notice shall be given by publication for six consecutive days in the CITY RECORD not less than seven nor more than thirty days before said public hearing."

The statute seems, therefore, to be imperative that a resolution of the character therein referred to should, in order to be valid, be passed at a public hearing of which public notice has been given in the manner prescribed in the statute and not at some meeting held subsequent to that at which the public hearing is given.

The public hearing concerning the purchase of the property referred to in your communication having been held, pursuant to public notice, and no action having been taken thereon, but the matter having been "laid over" without adjourning the hearing to a day certain, I am of the opinion that under the peculiar provisions of the act it will be necessary to give a further public hearing after due publication of notice thereof before the purchase in question can be authorized.

The following was then offered for adoption:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby fix the hour of 11 o'clock in the forenoon, on Tuesday, April 14, 1908, in Room 16, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, as the time and place for a public hearing in the matter of the request of the Commissioner of Docks that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the purchase of certain water-front property lying within the vicinity of Jamaica avenue, Astoria, Borough of Queens.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks requesting the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of a sale by him at public auction of the old ferryboats "Southfield," "Westfield" and "Middletown," pursuant to the provisions of section 1553 of the Charter.

On motion, the matter was referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller and the Chamberlain.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks submitting for the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund a plan adopted by him March 2, 1908, for improving the water-front of The City of New York between Montgomery and Jackson streets, East River, and amending the former plan for improving this portion of the water-front adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund April 27, 1871.

Chapter 372 of the Laws of 1907 provides in part that no resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopting or approving or consenting to, or certifying to any plan or plans, or to any change therein for the whole or any part of the water-front within the limits of The City of New York shall be of any validity or effect unless passed at a public hearing of said Commissioners or Board, of which public notice shall be given by publication for six consecutive days in the CITY RECORD, and not less than seven or more than thirty days before said public hearing.

The Comptroller then offered the following resolution for adoption.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby fix the hour of 11.05 o'clock in the forenoon on Tuesday, April 14, 1908, in Room 16, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, as the time and place for a public hearing relative to the plan adopted by the Commissioner of Docks March 2, 1908, for improving the water-front of The City of New York between Montgomery and Jackson streets, East River, and amending the former plan for improving this portion of the water-front adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund April 27, 1871, and submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented a report of the Appraiser of Real Estate, Department of Finance, recommending a renewal of the lease to the City of building and grounds on the crescent at the head of Temple street, about 200 feet south of Grand avenue, Long Island City, Borough of Queens, for the use of the Board of Education, for a period of two years from May 1, 1908, at an annual rental of \$1,000, payable quarterly, and on the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease.

Information having reached the Board that the school had been closed by City authorities as unsafe, the matter was referred back to the Comptroller for further investigation.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to an amendment to resolution authorizing a lease of a plot of ground on the northeasterly corner of Church avenue and East Forty-eighth street, Borough of Brooklyn, for the use of the Board of Education (see page ..):

March 19, 1908.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a meeting held January 22, 1908, approved of the renewal of the lease of certain lots of vacant land on Church avenue and East Forty-eighth street, Borough of Brooklyn, for the use of the Board of Education for the purpose of erecting portable school houses thereon for the use of the people of the district.

The Board of Education, at a meeting held March 11, adopted a resolution amending the resolution which they had theretofore adopted requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize this lease, said amendment consisting of striking out the words "Owners, Wood, Harmon & Co., G. J. Luhn, agent, Church and Utica avenues, Brooklyn, N. Y." The resolution which the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted was simply to approve the lease from Wood, Harmon & Co. If it is inferred from the amended resolution of the Board of Education that Wood, Harmon & Co. has disposed of their interest in the property and that Arthur Lyman, of No. 60 State street, Boston, Massachusetts, is the owner, I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund amend their resolution by striking out the words "Wood, Harmon & Co." and insert in lieu thereof "Arthur Lyman, No. 60 State street, Boston, Massachusetts."

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held February 26, 1908, approving of and consenting to the execution by the Board of Education of a lease to the City from Wood, Harmon & Co. of the plot of ground at the northeasterly corner of Church avenue and East Forty-eighth street, Borough of Brooklyn, be and the same is hereby amended by striking out "Wood, Harmon & Co." as the name of the lessor and inserting in place thereof "Arthur Lyman."

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented a report of the Appraiser of Real Estate, Department of Finance, recommending a renewal of the lease to the City of premises Nos. 63 and 65 New York avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, for the use of the Board of Education, for a period of two years from July 1, 1908, at an annual rental of \$2,500, payable monthly, and on the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease.

On motion, the matter was referred back to the Comptroller with instructions to arrange with the owner, if possible, that the rent be made payable quarterly instead of monthly.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to an amendment to resolution authorizing a lease of premises at No. 209 Montague street, Borough of Brooklyn, for the use of the President of the Borough (see page 101):

March 14, 1908.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held January 22, 1908, adopted a resolution authorizing a lease of the entire second floor, with the exception of room No. 2, in the building No. 209 Montague street, Borough of Brooklyn, for a period of five years from February 1, 1908, with the privilege of renewal for an additional period of five years upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$4,623, payable quarterly; the lessor to furnish light, heat and janitor service; the City to make such alterations and repairs as the President of the Borough deems necessary.

Prior to the execution of the lease, the owners of the property objected to two of the clauses contained therein: (1) the five years' renewal upon the same terms and conditions; (2) the clause in relation to the rent being paid quarterly. They desire to have the rent paid monthly.

A report was made thereon on February 20, 1908, and presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held February 26, 1908, and upon the request of the Chamberlain the matter was laid over and referred to him.

At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held March 11, 1908, the Chamberlain submitted a communication from the owners of the property agreeing to accept the rent in quarterly payments at the end of each quarter. He desired that the lease should run for a period of five years and three months from February 1, 1908, the date on which the City took possession.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund amend their resolution adopted on January 22, 1908, by striking out the words "with the privilege of renewal for an additional period of five years upon the same terms and conditions, and by increasing the rental period from five years to five years and three months, so that when amended it will read as follows:

"Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City, from the Mechanics' Bank, of the entire second floor, with the exception of office No. 2, in the building No. 209 Montague street, Borough of Brooklyn, for the use of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, for a period of five years and three months from February 1, 1908, at an annual rental of four thousand six hundred and twenty-three dollars (\$4,623), payable quarterly; the lessor to furnish light, heat and janitor service; the City to make such alterations and repairs as the President of the Borough may deem necessary for the benefit of the work of the Topographical Bureau, but not without the consent of the owners of the building; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter."

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held January 22, 1908, authorizing a lease of premises at No. 209 Montague street, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City, from the Mechanics' Bank, of the entire second floor, with the exception of office No. 2, in the building No. 209 Montague street, Borough of Brooklyn, for the use of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, for a period of five years and three months from February 1, 1908, at an annual rental of four thousand six hundred and twenty-three dollars (\$4,623), payable quarterly; the lessor to furnish light, heat and janitor service; the City to make such alterations and repairs as the President of the Borough may deem necessary for the benefit of the work of the Topographical Bureau, but not without the consent of the owners of the building; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter."

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the President of the Borough of The Bronx relative to a renewal of the lease of premises on the westerly side of Macombs Dam road, near Jerome avenue, Borough of The Bronx.

This matter was on the calendar of the last meeting and referred back to the Comptroller for the purpose of arranging if possible that the rent be made payable quarterly instead of monthly (see page 186).

DEAR SIR—In reply to your letter of the 14th inst., in the matter of lease of premises on the westerly side of Macombs Dam road, near Jerome avenue, Borough of The Bronx, it is reported to me by the Property Clerk of this office as follows:

"DEAR SIR—With reference to the subject matter of annexed communication from Hon. H. A. Metz, Comptroller, and in reply thereto, I beg to state that I have communicated with Mr. Edward P. Wood; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to a renewal of the lease of premises No. 212 East Twenty-sixth street, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals:

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held July 14, 1905, adopted a resolution, at the request of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, authorizing a lease of the premises No. 212 East Twenty-sixth street, Borough of Manhattan, for a period of three years from the date of occupation, at an annual rental of \$1,600, payable monthly, said lease containing a clause giving the City a privilege of a three years' renewal; also that the City was to make interior repairs and furnish water, light and heat.

Under date of March 12, 1908, the Secretary of the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals states that the hospital would like a one-year renewal only and not three years, for the reason that the Trustees expect to have a new Nurses' Home completed at the expiration of this one-year lease.

The rent being the same as heretofore paid, I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the request of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, and authorize the renewal of the lease of the premises No. 212 East Twenty-sixth street, Borough of Manhattan, used as the home for the women Nurses (probationers), for a period of one year from July 31, 1908, at an annual rental of \$1,600, payable quarterly, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. Lessor, John Augustus Delany, No. 377 Second avenue, Manhattan.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—Hon. John T. Dooling, President of the Board of Elections, in a communication to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under date of February 11, 1908, requests that a lease of the basement room in the North Side Storage Warehouse, Nos. 521 to 525 Bergen street, Borough of The Bronx, which expired September 1, 1907, be renewed for one year from that date, at a rental of \$300 per annum, payable quarterly, on the first days of February, May, August and November. After an examination I have to report as follows:

The rent paid up to September 1, 1907, was at the rate of \$240 a year. The rent now named is therefore an increase of \$60 a year or 25 per cent.

The room occupied by the Board of Elections in this building is about 16 by 40 feet in size, located in the basement, and is used for the storing of the ballot boxes and ballots used in the mayoralty election of 1905. The room is sheathed with sheet iron and the door is kept locked and sealed, but when Mr. Jackson, the present Attorney General of the State, came into office in January, 1906, he placed six watchmen to guard this room, as I am informed by the owner of the building, John Nimphius.

After a few months, this force of watchmen was reduced to three, and later to two men, and now only a night watchman is employed. This man is on duty all night, and spends most of his time in the office of the warehouse company, where he burns gas and where heat must be provided, for which Mr. Nimphius, the owner, receives no compensation from the City.

Mr. Nimphius states that the rent of \$20 a month was only half of what he expected to get for the room, as the fitting up of it for the City's use cost him nearly \$200, so that practically he received little or no rent for the first year, and he says that the added expense of heat and light because of the night watchman warrants his request for the increase of \$5 a month. Under the circumstances I am of the opinion that the rental now asked, \$300 a year, is fair and reasonable, and I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize a renewal of the lease of the premises consisting of the basement room in the North Side Storage Warehouse, Nos. 521 to 525 Bergen street, Borough of The Bronx, for a period of one year from September 1, 1907, at an annual rental of \$300, payable quarterly, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. Lessor, John Nimphius.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—The Department of Finance is occupying rooms on the various floors of the Stewart Building, for which the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held September 20, 1907, authorized the payment of an annual rental of \$136,292, which amount was the rent for the use of the following premises from May 1, 1907, to May 1, 1908.

D, E, F, G, H, I, J, K, L and R, on street floor.

DD, in basement.

O, P, OO, II, PP, in basement.

All of first floor except Room 32.

Including TT and XX, in basement.

51, 52, 53, 54, 55, 82 and 84, on second floor.

63, 65, 67 and 69, on second floor.

81, 83, 85, 87, 89, 90, 91 and 92, on second floor.

79 and 80, on second floor.

86 and 88, on second floor.

110 and 233.

139 and 141, on third floor.

142, on third floor.

114, 115, 119 and 121, on third floor.

171, 173, 175, 177 and 179, on fourth floor.

181, 183, 185, 186, 187 and 189, on fourth floor.

155, 157 and 159, on fourth floor.

221, 225, 226 and 227, on the fifth floor.

The owners of the property, in a communication dated February 14, 1908, state that they will have to raise the rent for the year to come, from May 1, 1908, to May 1, 1909, to the sum of \$143,750, making an increase of \$7,458, and that the City is to take a lease for a period of two years from May 1, 1908. This would make an increase in the rental rate per square foot from \$1.67, heretofore paid, to \$1.78, a matter of 11 cents per square foot.

The reason for the increase is two-fold:

First—Rental value has increased in the vicinity in all kinds of property.

Second—Owing to a large increase in the assessed valuation, due to an increase in value of property.

In the year 1899, the assessed valuation of the building for the purpose of taxation was \$2,135,000. In 1906, it had been advanced to \$3,170,000, and in 1908, it was advanced to \$3,475,000, or an increase since 1906 of \$300,000.

In addition to the rooms above enumerated, and which have heretofore been under lease, it was found necessary, owing to an increase in the working force, to acquire additional room and transfer the Bureaus from three of the rooms to three other additional rooms as follows:

It was found necessary to hire Room 133, containing 714 square feet, the annual rent of which is \$1,100, for the use of the Comptroller's Committee on Revision of Accounts and Methods. It was found necessary to transfer the Bureau of Real Estate from Rooms 155, 157 and 159 to Rooms 101, 103 and 105, containing 2,047 square feet, the annual rental of which is \$4,050. The Auditor of Receipts is to occupy Rooms 157 and 159. The Commissioner of Accounts having agreed to turn over to the Department of Finance the laboratory now occupying leased rooms in Franklin street, it will be necessary for the City to find quarters for the Engineers of the Commissioners of Accounts in the Stewart Building. It is therefore the purpose to hire Room 107 in the Stewart Building, containing 769 square feet, the annual rental of which is \$1,500.

It will be impossible, however, to obtain the use of Rooms 107 and 101 until May 1, 1908.

The rent being reasonable and just, I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing the execution of a lease from Horace Russell and Edward D. Harris, as Executors, etc., of the following rooms in the Stewart Building, No. 280 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, for a period of two years from May 1, 1908, at an annual rental of \$151,200:

Street Floor—Rooms D, E, F, G, H, I, J, K, L and DD, in the basement, occupied by the Bureau of Arrears.

II, OO, PP, in the basement, O, P and R, on the street floor, for the Receiver of Taxes.

Entire first floor, except Room 32, and also TT and XX in the basement, Executive Department, Bookkeeping and Auditing Division.

Rooms 51, 52, 54, 55, 79, 80, 82 and 84, on the second floor, for the Engineers.

Rooms 63, 65, 67 and 69, on the second floor, City Chamberlain.

Rooms 81, 83, 85, 87, 89, 90, 91 and 92-N, on the second floor, for the Stock and Bond Division.

Rooms 86 and 88, on the second floor, for the Contract Division.

Rooms 110 and 233, store-rooms for records.

Rooms 139 and 141, on the third floor, for the Collector of City Revenue.

Room 142, on the third floor, Comptroller's bookbindery.

Rooms 101, 103 and 105, on the third floor, for the Bureau of Real Estate.

Rooms 107, 114, 115, 117, 119 and 121, on the third floor, for the Commissioners of Accounts.

Rooms 123, 125, 127, 128 and 129, on the third floor, for the Commissioner of Jurors.

Room 133, on the third floor, for the Comptroller's Committee on Revision of Accounts and Methods.

Rooms 155, 157 and 159, on the fourth floor, for the Auditor of Receipts and such other occupation as the Comptroller may designate.

Rooms 171, 173, 175, 177, 178 and 179, on the fourth floor, for the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics.

Rooms 181, 183, 185, 187 and 189, on the fourth floor, for the Bureau of Law and Adjustment.

Lewis, Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in a communication dated February 24, 1908, states that the lease of rooms in the Franklin Building, No. 186 Remsen street, Borough of Brooklyn, occupied by the force engaged for the triangulation of The City of New York, will expire on May 1, next; that the rental for the past year has been \$500; that the agents of the building advise him that the rental for next year will be \$780. This is an increase of \$280. He admits that this is a large increase of rent, and that if the work would be continued for some years longer, he would be disposed to try and find accommodations where the rental would be less, but in view of the fact that the work will be completed within the year following May 1, he does not believe that it will be wise to make a change, and would, therefore, recommend to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that the same rooms, formerly designated as Nos. 24 and 25, now known as Nos. 302 and 303, be taken for one year from May 1, 1908, at an annual rental of \$780.

I agree with the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, who is in charge of the work. The building in which these rooms are situated, some time since, took fire and was damaged to a great extent, but has been thoroughly renovated and is now in good condition. Rents in all the good office buildings in this vicinity have increased in value, but not to the extent which they have charged for the two rooms in question.

I have examined several office buildings, looking for rooms suitable for the force engaged in the triangulation of The City of New York, but have been unable to find rooms as suitable for the price named. The City is now paying \$1.25 a square foot in the Mechanics' Bank Building; \$1.50 a square foot in the Temple Bar Building. The rooms in question contain 578 square feet, which, at \$780 a year would be at the rate of \$1.35 a square foot. In addition to this, it would cost the City money to move the office from one place to another. I am of the opinion, under the circumstances, that the rent charged, while full value, is not excessive, and I would therefore respectfully recommend that the request of the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be approved, and that a lease be authorized from May 1, 1908, of rooms formerly Nos. 24 and 25, now known as Nos. 302 and 303, in the Franklin Building, No. 186 Remsen street, Borough of Brooklyn, for a period of one year, at an annual rental of \$780, payable quarterly; the owners to furnish heat, light, elevator and janitor service. Lessor, David G. Leggett.

9. Are the premises recommended the most reasonable that can be secured in the neighborhood for the purposes desired? Yes.
10. Is the appropriation from which the rental is to be paid sufficient to cover it? Rental to be paid from appropriation made to the Finance Department for rents.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—Honorable Theodore A. Bingham, Commissioner of the Police Department, in a communication addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund under date of March 4, 1908, requests that a lease be authorized of the third floor loft, 23 by 75

feet, in the building No. 17 Allen street, northwest corner of Canal street, Borough of Manhattan, for use as a branch office of the Detective Bureau, for a term of two years from April 1, 1908, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year upon the same terms and conditions; the owner to furnish steam heat, water and hall janitor service; the Police Department to make all necessary alterations and install light fixtures; at a rental of \$900 a year, payable quarterly. Lessor, Isaac Schreiber, No. 73 Canal street.

After an examination it appears that this loft is only 18 by 62 feet 8 inches, with an alcove 7 by 6 feet, and has a total floor space of 1,128 square feet. The figures given in the Commissioner's letter are for the full size of the building. The room has thirteen windows, steam heat, two toilets and sink, and has electric wiring and gas, but no fixtures.

Deeming the rent asked fair and reasonable, I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize a lease of the third floor loft in the building No. 17 Allen street, northwest corner of Canal street, Borough of Manhattan, for use as a branch office of the Police Detective Bureau, for a period of two years from April 1, 1908, with the privilege of renewal for one additional year upon the same terms and conditions, at a rental of \$900 a year, payable quarterly; the owner to furnish heat, water and hall janitor service. Lessor, Isaac Schreiber.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City, from Isaac Schreiber, of the third floor loft in the building No. 17 Allen street, northwest corner of Canal street, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the Police Department, for a period of two years from April 1, 1908, with the privilege of renewal for one additional year upon the same terms and conditions, at a rental of nine hundred dollars (\$900) per annum, payable quarterly; the lessor to furnish heat, water and hall janitor service; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to plans and specifications for a new station house to be erected for the Second Precinct Station on Greenwich and Washington streets, between Liberty and Cortlandt streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval:

March 13, 1908.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—In a letter dated February 18, 1908, the Hon. Theo. A. Bingham, Police Commissioner, asks the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to approve certain plans and specifications which he has caused to be prepared for a new station house to be erected for the Second Precinct Police Station on Greenwich and Washington streets, between Liberty and Cortlandt streets, Borough of Manhattan.

The original plans for this work were submitted for approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on September 16, 1907, and were reported upon by me under date of October 8, 1907.

An examination of the plans and specifications shows that my suggestion and criticism led to certain modifications and revision in the way of eliminating some expensive and over elaborate materials and equipment, but other points of my criticism have been disregarded, but even by eliminating all these it is not possible to bring the cost down to the amount estimated.

Commissioner Bingham's original estimate in asking for the appropriation for the new station houses was \$150,000 each, which was increased in this Department to \$200,000.

The Commissioner has allotted for this building \$231,400, and my estimate of the cost according to the plans and specifications submitted is \$300,000.

The revised plans call for an expenditure of not less than \$300,000, which is 50 per cent. more than the cost of the new Nineteenth Precinct Station House. Part of this excess is due to extravagance in material and equipment, and part to the plan itself.

You will recall that a new site for the Nineteenth Precinct Station was secured after one set of plans were fully prepared, on the ground that 75 feet frontage was too little for a proper police station. Later a complete set of plans for the 100 foot lot was thrown away because of the desire to erect a typical building which should serve as a model for all other stations to be erected. Three sets of plans were thus made and paid for in order to secure a typical building on a proper plot.

As you know the City is committed to the renewal of all the older police stations which will mean the erection of some eighty buildings before the work is completed.

The above facts are noted to call your attention to the advisability of suggesting to the Police Commissioner the necessity of fixing upon some definite method of erecting station houses; the type of building should first be fixed, then the size and best dimension of the lot can then be determined upon. At present each new station house seems to be an experiment, one station house is built upon a lot 100 feet by 100 feet, the next on a plot 50 feet by 200 feet, the same area, but a different type of building.

In my opinion the entire question should be thoroughly studied, having in view the best arrangement of the building, the construction to be of the simplest, but durable, having all the necessary accommodations, but nothing elaborate.

A similar problem was before the Board of Education, and to-day they have reduced the cost to a minimum, cutting out all elaborations, and I see no reason why a police station house should be a better building than a school house, neither as to exterior or interior finish.

Although I do not favor a long narrow site, nor fully approve of the plans as presented, since the City has purchased this site for a station house, I think it is too late for a criticism of the site.

Therefore, I suggest that for the best interest of the City, you advise the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, that it may properly approve the plans for the new station house for the Second Precinct to be erected on the west side of Greenwich street, known as Nos. 156 and 158, running through to and including Nos. 163 and 165 Washington street, for the Police Department of The City of New York, as requested by the Police Commissioner in communication under date of February 18, 1908.

Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of chapter 350 of the Laws of 1892, as amended by chapter 495 of the Laws of 1895, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the plans submitted by the Police Commissioner under date of February 18, 1908, for the construction of a new station house for the Second Precinct, to be erected on the west side of Greenwich street, known as Nos. 156 and 158, running through to and including Nos. 163 and 165 Washington street, in the Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the Police Department of The City of New York.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report of the Appraiser of Real Estate of the Department of Finance relative to the acquisition by condemnation proceedings of

a site at the foot of East One Hundred and Twentieth street, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the Police Department:

March 19, 1908.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—The Commissioner of the Department of Police in a communication dated January 25, 1908, states that the waters of The City of New York are comprised in the precinct which is known as the Forty-second Precinct; that regular posts have been laid down for patrol by the boats belonging to the Police Department, the said boats consisting of one large one and seven launches; that the large boat is in good condition; that five of the launches are absolutely useless and two are by continual repairs kept at work a considerable portion of the time; that two new police launches are just on the point of being delivered for service, and the condition of the other launches requires two additional ones, which are now being advertised for; that at the present time there are two stations for the police boats—one Pier "A" and the other One Hundred and Twenty-second street and the Harlem River. Starting from these two points it is possible to reach any portion of the waters around New York in a reasonable time, and in order to do so, it is necessary that boats should be kept at about these two localities.

At Pier "A" the Police Department has by law the use of one side of a dock, and the launches kept at this point are moored in a basin. The other launches are kept at One Hundred and Twenty-second street, but the accommodations there are simply the public street, out of which empties a sewer, which makes the conditions at that point unsanitary. The Department has rented there a small frame house which is in miserable repair, where the men suffer from the heat in the summer and from the cold in winter, in spite of the large coal bills; that considerable property is recovered and brought ashore, consisting of row boats, rope and junk of various kinds, all of which has to be stored. He states that it is incomprehensible that such conditions as exist at One Hundred and Twenty-second street and Harlem River should have been permitted for so many years in the Police Department, and it is one of the most urgent needs of the Police Department that the One Hundred and Twenty-second street station, which is at present called the Forty-second Sub-Precinct, should be remedied, and suggests a way whereby the situation can be remedied. One, by acquiring a piece of property on East One Hundred and Twentieth street, upon which there are buildings already erected, and which could immediately be made available for his purpose, and the other, having the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund assign for his use other City property along the water-front, upon which in the near future he would have to erect a station house and precinct for the harbor police. It was suggested to him that in order to have the property made immediately available, it would be advisable to select the One Hundred and Twentieth street site, as in the end it would be much cheaper than the second proposition, and therefore in a communication dated March 17, the Commissioner withdraws his communication of January 25, and states that he has personally and carefully looked over and studied the whole situation and respectfully asks that the necessary steps be taken through the Real Estate Bureau to acquire the property on the north side of One Hundred and Twentieth street, abutting on the Harlem River, for the purpose of a Police Precinct Sub-station for the Harbor Police. He states that if this property should be acquired, it would put the sub-station of the Police Department in good working order at once, with all the necessary facilities; that the house which was formerly leased by the City and heretofore known as the Harlem Emergency Hospital, is in good order; its plumbing in proper condition, and that a thousand or two dollars would clear the whole thing up, and this branch of the Police service would be properly housed.

This office has examined into the matter of the acquisition of this property at the price named by the owner originally, \$300,000, reduced now to \$285,000, which is, in my opinion, so excessive that the only way of acquiring the same would be by condemnation proceedings, the resolution to contain a clause that title shall vest in The City of New York to the property not owned by The City of New York, included within the area of the plot laid out, on the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners in the condemnation proceedings. The property in question, in accordance with a description as submitted by the owner of the property, is bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the northerly side of One Hundred and Twentieth street, distant 291 feet 8½ inches easterly from the northeasterly corner of One Hundred and Twentieth street and Avenue A; running thence easterly along One Hundred and Twentieth street 357 feet 1 inch, more or less, to the Harbor Commissioner's exterior bulkhead line of the Harlem River; thence northerly along said bulkhead line 112 feet 7 inches to a point where the centre line of the block between One Hundred and Twentieth and One Hundred and Twenty-first streets would, if continued, intersect said bulkhead line; thence westerly along said centre line 307 feet 2¼ inches, more or less, to a point thereon distant 291 feet 8½ inches easterly from Avenue A; thence south parallel with Avenue A 100 feet 11 inches to the northerly side of One Hundred and Twentieth street, the point or place of beginning.

I do not agree with the owner of the property, Margaret Mulhall, as to the description of the property owned by her.

This office, in a communication dated November 22, 1907, transmitted to the Corporation Counsel a report made by me relative to a strip of land owned by the City at the foot of East One Hundred and Twentieth street, Borough of Manhattan, in which communication I stated that the report was presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held November 13, 1907, and referred to the Corporation Counsel by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for an opinion as to the proper method of procedure, as in said report recommended. The report was based upon a grant made by The City of New York to one Jacob Weidenfeld, which grant was recorded in Liber I. of Grants, page 419, on November 2, 1867, in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York.

The Corporation Counsel in a communication dated December 21, 1907, goes into the matter in detail, but inasmuch as he has to consider the matter in condemnation proceedings, it is not necessary to take up that subject to-day.

The Corporation Counsel in a communication under date of March 8, 1905, in relation to the acquisition of property for the use of the Police Department stated that in view of chapter 350 of the Laws of 1892, he was of the opinion that the method of procedure for the acquisition of property for said Department should be taken in the manner prescribed by chapter 21 of the amended Greater New York Charter. In order to comply with the provisions of section 320 of said amended Greater New York Charter, he thought that before any steps be taken to acquire real estate for the use of the Police Department it would be necessary for the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to adopt a resolution authorizing the acquisition of the same.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that pursuant to section 320 of the amended Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution approving of the request of the Commissioner of the Department of Police, authorizing the acquisition of property described in the resolution hereto annexed, by condemnation proceedings, and authorize the Corporation Counsel to make application to the Supreme Court for the appointment of the Commissioners, and that when such resolution has been adopted, that it be transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for their concurrence and approval.

"Beginning at a point on the northerly side of One Hundred and Twentieth street, distant 291 feet 8½ inches easterly from the northeasterly corner of One Hundred and Twentieth street and Avenue A; running thence easterly along One Hundred and Twentieth street 357 feet 1 inch, more or less, to the Harbor Commissioner's exterior bulkhead line of the Harlem River; thence northerly along said bulkhead line 112 feet 7 inches to a point where the centre line of the block between One Hundred and Twentieth and One Hundred and Twenty-first streets, would, if continued, intersect said bulkhead line; thence westerly along said centre line 307 feet 2¼ inches, more or less, to a point thereon distant 291 feet 8½ inches easterly from Avenue A; thence south parallel with Avenue A 100 feet 11 inches to the northerly side of One Hundred and Twentieth street, the point or place of beginning."

And also all the rights of wharfage, incorporeal hereditaments, terms, easements, privileges or other appurtenances of any kind whatsoever appurtenant to the said bulkhead or bulkhead line; except such parts and portions of the above described premises as are now owned by The City of New York.

—as a site for a substation for the Harbor Police of The City of New York, and do hereby designate said site when acquired as a place where the Police Commissioner shall establish, provide and furnish a station house or substation for said Harbor Police, and the Corporation Counsel be and he hereby is authorized to make application to the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners, and to take the necessary proceedings in the name of The City of New York to acquire title to the above described property; and be it further

Resolved, That this Board, deeming it for the public interest that the title to the lands and premises and all interest therein described should be acquired by The City of New York at a fixed or specified time, does hereby direct that title to said property and all interest therein, shall vest in The City of New York five days after the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners in said proceedings; and be it further

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board be directed to transmit to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a certified copy of this resolution for their action thereon, in accordance with chapter 21 of the Greater New York Charter.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Department of Street Cleaning, relative to a renewal of the lease of premises at No. 502 West One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, Borough of Manhattan:

Foster Crowell, Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, in a communication addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund under date of March 18, 1908, requests that a lease be authorized of the two small stores on the first or ground floor of premises No. 19 Albany street, Borough of Manhattan, for use as a section station, for a term of three years from May 1, 1908, at an annual rental of \$1,400, payable quarterly; the lease to provide that the lessor may at any time terminate the same upon a written notice of three calendar months, in the event that the said property is sold by the present owner, and that the present owner is not to be responsible to the City for any damages caused by tearing down

the adjoining property, and otherwise upon the same terms and conditions contained in the existing lease from Lyman Denison of the first floor or store of No. 19 Albany street, this new lease being a renewal of the present lease of the westerly of the two stores, with the addition of the adjacent store not included under the present lease. These two stores occupy the ground floor in a five-story brick business building 26 feet 1 inch by 68 feet, on the north side of Albany street, between West and Washington streets. The City has occupied one of the stores for three years at a rental of \$600 a year, the lessor furnishing water. SIR—On March 10, 1908, replying to requests of the President of the Borough of Richmond and the Commissioner, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, asking for a portion of the machinery, etc., not being used at the City lighting plant under the Williamsburg Bridge, I made the following suggestions of the disposition of the plant in question:

To the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity shall be assigned two (2) Sterling water tube boilers; one direct connected seventy-five (75) horse-power engine with a 50-kilowatt generator, together with the feed water heater boiler, feed pump fittings and all other small equipment of the plant.

To the Borough of Richmond, two (2) direct connected 150 horse-power steam engines, with 100-kilowatt generator.

Since making said recommendation, I have consulted with these Departments, and would now make the following recommendations, which are satisfactory to all parties interested:

To the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity should be assigned two (2) Sterling water tube boilers; one (1) direct connected seventy-five (75) horse-power engine with a 50-kilowatt generator; one direct connected 150 horse-power steam engine, with a 100-kilowatt generator, together with the feed water heater boiler, feed pump fittings and all other small equipment of the plant.

To the President of the Borough of Richmond, one direct connected 150 horse-power steam engine with a 100-kilowatt generator.

I therefore suggest that the resolutions adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, March 11, 1908, be rescinded, and new resolutions adopted to conform with the new disposition of the machinery, etc.

G., N. I would report: The main floor now consists of a drill hall about 92 feet by 100 feet, a portion of one side of which is taken up by a wooden "scaling wall," behind which are lockers for the men, and two rooms about 30 feet by 15 feet, one used for a library, the other for a shop. On the gallery floor there are three rooms, the largest used for a locker room, with one shower bath and toilet partitioned off, the others for officers' quarters. The cellar is used partly for shop work and contains a gas engine, lathe, etc.

The floor of the drill hall is sound, but is not comb grained, and contains many loose slivers, etc., which makes it dangerous. The arrangement of the officers' quarters on the gallery floor is cramped and inconvenient, the single shower and toilet room is inadequate for the 79 men at present in the company, the lockers of some of the men being situated on the floor below and at the opposite end of the drill hall. The full strength allowed the company is 115 men, but on account of the small number of lockers and other insufficient accommodation there are only 79 men at present in the company.

It is proposed to close the two side entrances to the building, replacing them with windows, and to open the main entrance, which is not used at present; to remove the side stairways, using the space now occupied by the shop and library for locker rooms; all of the present lockers can then be moved into the new locker rooms and sufficient additional locker room will also be provided to accommodate the company at its full strength. The basement is to be fitted up with toilet, showers and drying rooms, connected with the locker room by private stairways. The gallery floor is to be altered to a much more convenient arrangement providing a commodious library and reception room for ladies, with toilet and separate dressing rooms for officers, etc. A new floor is to be laid over the old floor in the drill room. There are also some small repairs to the outside of the building.

The work proposed, which is plain and substantial, not elaborate, is, in my opinion, essential for the proper accommodation of the company, and \$10,000 is not too much to appropriate for the necessary alterations and additions.

The work being necessary, I think the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may properly concur in the resolution of the Armory Board and authorize the Comptroller to issue bonds to the amount of \$10,000 for repairing, enlarging and reconstructing the interior of the armory of the Second Company Signal Corps, N. G., N. Y., Borough of Brooklyn.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
