Resolutions.

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section to the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code.

Section 187. That every person who omits or refuses to comply with, or who resists any of the provisions of the Sanitary Code, or any of the rules, orders, sanitary regulations, or ordinances established or declared by this Board, under or pursuant to any of the provisions of the seventy-fourth chapter of the Laws of 1866; or of chapter six hundred and eighty-six of the Laws of 1866; or of chapter nine hundred and fifty-six of the Laws of 1867; or of chapter three hundred and thirty-five of the Laws of 1873; or of chapter seven hundred and fifty-seven of the Laws of 1873; or of chapter six hundred and thirty-six of the Laws of 1874; or refuses or neglects to comply with any of the provisions of the said laws, in so far as the same are now in force, and applicable to the City of New York; or omits or refuses, or neglects the execution of any order or special regulation of this Department, will be liable to the arrest, suit, penalty, fine, and punishment in said laws provided and declared; all of which notice must be taken.

Resolved, That a copy of the report of Assistant Sanitary Inspector Parsons upon the dangerous condition of railroad crossing at Kingsbridge be forwarded to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Crossing for the necessary action.

Resolved, That Order 1739 on No. 126 Ludlow street be and is hereby rescinded.

Resolved, That upon the report of the Assistant Sanitary Superintendent to the effect that Charles Froman & Son have supplied themselves with a suitable apparatus, this Board respectfully recommends to his Honor the Mayor, that a license as scavenger be granted to the said Charles Froman & Son for one year.

Resolved, That suit against premises 64 Crosby street be and is hereby discontinued.

Whereas, The Small-pox Reception Hospital was destroyed by fire on the 8th of June; and

Whereas, Such building is necessary to this Department in the proper cure of small-pox patients; heretore

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested to transfer from the unexpended balance of the Small-pox Fund, Health Department, 1876, to the same fund or 1877, the sum of \$5,000 for the rebuilding of said hospital.

Resolved, That the Attorney and Counsel of this Department be and is hereby directed to appeal in the Pinkney case to the Court of Appeals, if necessary.

Sanitary Bureau.

SANITARY BUREAU, June 11, 1877.

The following is a record of the labor performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 9, 1877:

The number of inspections made was 1,586, as follows: 2 public buildings, 688 tenement houses, 158 private dwellings, 46 other dwellings, 26 manufactories and workshops, 17 streets and warehouses, 44 stables, 50 slaughter-houses, 1 market, 9 fat-rendering establishments, 1 swamp, 1 roadway, 27 sunken and vacant lots, 51 yards, courts, and areas, 61 cellars and basements, 130 waste-pipes and drains, 179 privies and water-closets, 74 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 2 dangerous stairways, 3 dangerous chimneys, 6 other nuisances, 6 visits to contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary Inspectors was 584.

159 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspector for investigation and report.

111 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers received from the Health Officer of the Port.

186 permits were granted scavengers.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 31 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 30 houses, 30 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc., and have disinfected 2,925 privies and water-closets, 236 cellars, 584 yards, courts, and areas, 390 garbage-boxes, and 108 1/2 miles of street gutters.

3 persons sick with small-pox were removed to Riverside Hospital.

During the week ending June 9, 1877, there were issued from this Bureau 430 burial permits for city deaths, 18 for bodies in transitu, and 46 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 430 deaths, 141 marriages, 440 births, 46 still-births, 18 applications for transit permits, and 54 returns from coroners. There were 32 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 6 transcripts of birth record, 2 of marriage, and 24 of death were issued from this Bureau.

SIR—During the week ending Saturday, June 9, 1877, there were 430 deaths reported in this city, which is the same number that was reported during the preceding week, and 30 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1876. The actual mortality during the week ending June 2, was 444, which is 63.6 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.45 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,076,014.

There was a decrease, compared with the preceding week, of 11 deaths from diphtheria, 5 from membranous croup, 5 from whooping cough, 2 from erysipelas, 6 from typhoid fever, 1 from cerebro-spinal fever, 4 from phthisis pulmonalis, 1 from bronchitis, 20 from pneumonia, 8 from cirrhosis of liver and hepatitis, 5 from gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis; and an increase of 1 from small-pox, 5 from measles, 2 from scarlatina, 6 from malarial fevers, 3 from puerperal diseases, 7 from diarrhoeal diseases, 4 from inanition, want of breast milk, etc., 2 from rheumatism and gout, 2 from diseases of the heart, 2 from aneurism, 1 from marasmus and scrofula, 5 from hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 9 from diseases of the brain and nervous system, 4 from Bright's disease and nephritis, 2 from premature and preterm births, and 3 from drowning.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 89 were in institutions, 217 in tenement houses, 108 in houses containing 3 families and less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 8 in rivers, boats, streets, etc. 2 were on the basement floor, 77 on the first, 118 on the second, 72 on the third, 44 on the fourth, and 12 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth, and 2 on the top. 424 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 6 non-residents. 56 were stated as single, 99 married, and 36 widowed, and the condition of 239 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age. 97 deaths were of children under 1 year, 135 under 2 years, 175 under 5 years, and 22 were persons 70 years old and over.

The disposition of 436 deaths and still-births, or 91.59 per cent. of the total number reported, were in the following 14 cemeteries, which are in the vicinity of this city, viz.: Bayside (Jewish) 8, Calvary (Roman Catholic) 175, City (pauper burial ground, undenominational) 70, Greenwood (undenominational) 39, Lutheran (undenominational) 66, Cypress Hills (undenominational) 10, Evergreen (undenominational) 24, Woodlawn (undenominational) 7, St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal) 11, Union (Methodist Protestant) 7, Holy Cross (Roman Catholic) 8, Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish) 5, St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic) 1, Washington (undenominational) 5.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 9, was 63.2 degrees Fahr., the mean humidity was 77, saturation being 100, the mean reading of the barometer was 29.775 inches, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 765, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.71 inch, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The distribution of the deaths for the week ending June 2, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 5; Second, 1; Third, 3; Fourth, 12; Fifth, 8; Sixth, 10; Seventh, 15; Eighth, 18; Ninth, 13; Tenth, 15; Eleventh, 28; Twelfth, 33; Thirteenth, 10; Fourteenth, 15; Fifteenth, 11; Sixteenth, 14; Seventeenth, 28; Eighteenth, 20; Nineteenth, 71; Twentieth, 24; Twenty-first, 33; Twenty-second, 37; Twenty-third, 12, and Twenty-fourth, 8.
