Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Samtary Bureau for the week ending May 30, 1885 :

May 30, 1885 : The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 5,747. The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 762. During the past week 514 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 75 permits. There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds) 9 permits. There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks, 243 permits. At premises where contagious diseases were reported 36 visits were made, and 29 disinfections, and 11 fumigations were performed. The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 4. The number of vaccinations performed was 1,684, of which 776 were primary and 908 re-vacci-nations.

There were seized and condemned 8,870 pounds of meat, and 6,400 pounds of fish. The number of specimens of milk examined was 119; the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 5; the number of arrests made was 2.

The certificates of 423 births, 47 still births, 204 marriages, and 658 deaths, reported to have raken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, May 30, 1885. This shows a decrease of 114 births, 12 still-births, and 9 marriages, and an increase of 4 deaths when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when com-pared with the corresponding week of the year 1884, there was a decrease of 158 births, 21 still-births, and 32 marriages, and an increase of 55 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 9; whooping cough, 4; typhoid fever, 1; malarial fevers, 2; cancer, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 19; bronchitis, 20; pneumonia, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 4; apoplexy, 1; premature and preternatural births, 3; while the deaths from diphtheria increased 7; croup, 10; diarrhoeal diseases, 2; inanition, 6; alcoholism, 1; heart diseases, 9; aneurism, 2; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 5; convulsions, 5; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 7; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 8; gastrius, enteritis and peritonitis, 9; Bright's disease and nephritis, 11; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; surgical operations, 4; sucide, 1, and drowning, 2. The number of deaths from measles, erysipelas, cerebro-spinal fever, puerperal diseases, and rheumatism and gout was the same m the two successive weeks. in the two successive weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 165 were in institutions, 341 in tenement-houses, 125 in houses containing three families or less, 9 in hotels and boarding-houses, 16 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 10 were on the basement floor, 101 on the first, 179 on the second, 90 on the third, 63 on the fourth, 21 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth ; 658 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 0 non-residents; 80 were stated to be single, 189 married, 68 widowed, and the condition of 321 was not stated; these were children who had not attaned a marriageable age.
