## DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION.

### REPORT OF TRANSACTIONS, FEBRUARY 6 TO 12, 1905.

#### Communications Received.

From the Comptroller—Receipt for security deposits accompanying proposals for supplies for manufacturing purposes opened this day. On file.

From the Comptroller—Returning proposal of John W. Terry for supplies, for substitution of sureties. Substitutions approved.

From Corporation Counsel—Suggesting that the Commissioner of Correction confer with the Comptroller as to the best practical manner of disposing of fund received for maintenance of United States prisoners at the City Prison. The Commissioner has conferred with the Comptroller regarding deposit of this fund, and his suggestions are hereby referred to the Corporation Counsel for further advice in the matter.

From Corporation Counsel—Transmitting copies of proposed bill to be submitted to the State Legislature, to render valid contract with Nassau County for board of prisoners from that county at the Kings County Penitentiary. Copies to be forwarded to the Hon. William H. Hornidge, and he to be requested to present the same to the Legislature.

From Civil Service Commission—Stating that the action of the Commissioner in rescinding the promotion of John A. Brunjes from Orderly to Keeper has been approved by that Commission. On file.

From Civil Service Commission—Stating that request for the transfer of Mrs. Jennie Keegan from the position of Nurse to that of Matron, is denied, there being a preferred eligible list for the latter position. Copy of letter sent to Mrs. Keegan.

From Civil Service Commission—Stating that the reinstatement of Harry J. Hamill as Keeper is approved, and asking when Mr. Hamill's service begins. Reinstated on January 20, 1905. Civil Service Commission notified January 19, 1905.

From Heads of Institutions—Reporting that meats, fish, milk, bread, etc., received during week ending February 4, 1905, agreed with specifications of the contracts. On file.

From Heads of Institutions—Reports, census, labor, punishments, etc., for week ending February 4, 1905. On file.

From Steamboat Bureau—Engineer of "Minnahanonck" reports that that steamer broke down on the 3d instant. Slight repairs are needed. Referred to the Deputy Commissioner, he to have requisition made as requested.

From City Prison—Report of fines received during week ending February 4, 1905: From City Magistrates' Court, \$35. On file.

From City Prison—Reports of Department Inspector on progress of work at prison: (1) Contract of Joseph Bauer progressing satisfactorily. (2) Contract of P. J. Carlin & Co. (for yard, gates, etc.), delayed on account of weather conditions. On file.

From City Prison—Report of Department Inspector on complaint from Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of violation of law in matter of electric wire in Female Prison. Inspector reports that the wire complained of was not in use, but that it will be removed at once.

From District Prisons—Explanation of James F. Foley, Keeper at Seventh District Prison, that the discharge of his pistol on the morning of February 1, 1905, was an accident, which occurred while he was examining the weapon. After full investigation of the matter, Keeper Foley is ordered to report for duty on the morning of February 11, 1905, and he is hereby transferred for duty to the Workhouse, Blackwell's Island.

From District Prisons—Report of fines received during week ending February 4, 1905: From City Magistrates' Courts, \$365. On file.

From District Prisons—Report of District Prisons for month of January, 1905. On file.

From Penitentiary, Blackwell's Island—Prisoners received during week ending February 4, 1905: Men, 15. On file.

From Workhouse, Blackwell's Island—Reporting that fines received at Workhouse during week ending February 4, 1905, amounted to \$178. Also that \$4 was received for violation of Sanitary Code, which will be forwarded to the Department of Health. On file.

From Workhouse, Blackwell's Island—Warden reports that row boat dock has been injured by ice in river. Commissioner of Docks and Ferries asked to have repairs made to this dock.

From Branch Workhouse, Hart's Island—Deaths at Branch Workhouse, Hart's Island, on February 5, 1905: Michael Fritz, aged 41 years; friends notified. On February 7, 1905: Delia Tise, aged 60 years; friends unknown. On file.

From Kings County Penitentiary—Warden reports rejection of bed frame castings delivered by A. J. Cavanagh as not being like sample—shields on sample being of brass while on beds delivered they are iron. Resolved, That section 108 of the Sanitary Code of the Department of Health of The City of New York be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 108. It shall be the duty of every owner, tenant, lessee, occupant or person in charge of any and every building or place of business in the generally built-up portions of The City of New York, forthwith to provide or cause to be provided, and at all times thereafter to keep and cause to be kept and provided, within such building or place of business, and for the exclusive use of such building or place of business, separate receptacles for receiving and holding, without leakage, all the ashes, garbage and liquid substances that may accumulate during thirty-six hours, from said building or place of business, or the portion thereof of which such person may be the owner, tenant, lessee, occupant, or in charge, and every such receptacle designed and used to hold ashes shall be made of or lined with some suitable metal.

"And it shall be the duty of every owner, lessee or agent of any such building or place of business to cause to be separated and put into their respective receptacles, all such materials and substances, and such receptacles shall not be filled to within four inches of the top thereof. And such receptacles, as well as any light refuse or rubbish to be removed, shall be kept within the premises until the proper time for removal and shall then be placed in the area, or within the stoop-line only and shall there remain until such materials or substances are removed by the Department of Street Cleaning, but in no case shall such receptacles be placed where they shall be or become a nuisance. All light refuse or rubbish, likely to be scattered or blown about, shall, before being placed outside of any building or premises for removal, be properly bundled, packed or otherwise secured."

##### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits, thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
