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BOARD OF REVISION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision of Assessments was held in the Comptroller's office on Thursday, June 16, 1904, at 11.13 o'clock A. M.

Present—N. Taylor Phillips, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; George L. Sterling, Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel.

The reading of the minutes of the previous meetings, not yet approved, was dispensed with.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging, laying crosswalks and paving with granite blocks Meserole street, between Waterbury street and Morgan avenue, and Waterbury street, between Meserole street and Stagg street, together with a list of awards for damages caused by a change of grade, with objections, referred back to the Board of Assessors, at meeting of November 13, 1903, for further consideration, and to confer with the Corporation Counsel in regard to the questions raised in the objections filed against the assessment, was presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been returned by said Board, under date of June 9, 1904, together with communication from the Corporation Counsel, dated January 14, 1904, and objections of Mary S. Baker et al., filed by S. M. & D. E. Meeker, attorneys.

The notice of appearance of Moore, Ashley & Linton, attorneys in behalf of Charles Schaefer and other property owners, to whom the awards for damages were made in said matter, was also presented, having been filed with the Chief Clerk of the Board on June 13, 1904.

No one appearing in opposition to the assessment after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel the objections received were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing and recurbings, and laying cement sidewalks in New York avenue, between Avenue C and Newkirk avenue, and objections of Albert Kuelling, received from the Board of Assessors under date of June 14, 1904.

No one appearing in opposition after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in Hughes avenue, from Crescent avenue to the lands of St. John's College, and objections of Henry Beukers, and others, filed by Shipman & Lambias, attorneys; Patrick S. Tracey, filed by Joseph A. Flannery, attorney; Mary A. Ford and others, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors, under date of June 14, 1904.

Mr. Andrews, attorney, as representative of Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, was heard in opposition to the excessive cost and expenses of the work, and also to the apportionment of the assessment, and claimed that the lands of St. John's College should be included in the area of the property assessed.

No others appearing in opposition, after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the several objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in Freeman street, between Bryant street and Vyse street, and objections of Richard Ehlers and others, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors, under date of June 14, 1904.

Mr. Andrews, attorney, representing Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, was heard in opposition to the excessive cost of the work and the expenses connected therewith.

On motion of Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for constructing receiving-basins on East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, as follows: Southwest

corner Union avenue and One Hundred and Forty-ninth street; northeast corner of Wales avenue and One Hundred and Forty-ninth street; northeast corner of Concord avenue and One Hundred and Forty-ninth street; northwest corner of Trinity avenue and One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, and objections of F. A. McManus and others, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, received from the Board of Assessors, under date of June 14, 1904.

Mr. Andrews, attorney, representing Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, was heard in opposition to the excessive cost of the work and the expenses connected therewith.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in East One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street, between Prospect avenue and Crotona avenue, and objections of Herman G. Eilers and others, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, and of Patrick F. Byrns, filed by Truman H. Baldwin, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of June 9, 1904.

Mr. Andrews, attorney, representing Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, was heard in opposition to the excessive cost of the work and the expenses connected therewith.

No others appearing in opposition after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in East One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street, between Clinton avenue and Crotona avenue, and objections of George Heuser, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, and of A. R. Smith and others, filed by Thomas W. Burke, attorney, received from the Board of Assessors under date of June 14, 1904.

The Assessors reported that, in view of the large expense for engineering and inspecting, they had reduced the assessment by 15 per cent. of the contract price, or by about 10.27 per cent. of the entire cost as certified.

Mr. Burke, attorney, was heard in opposition to the assessment on the ground that only one of the eight owners of the property assessed had petitioned for the sewer, and that the others had protested against it being built, as the property at the time was amply drained by a private sewer; that the Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment had reported against the work being done; also that the expenses for engineering and inspection are exorbitant.

Mr. Andrews, attorney, representing Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, was heard, and objected to the excessive charges for engineering and inspection, and also requested that a special reduction be made in the amount charged against lot Map No. 5, in view of its being a corner lot.

On motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors with instructions to make a pro rata reduction of 30 per cent. in the amount of the present assessment of \$1,936.96, as reduced by the Board of Assessors, and that the assessment as so reduced be confirmed by the Board of Assessors, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for receiving-basin and appurtenances on the southwest corner of Stebbins avenue and East One Hundred and Sixty-second street, and objections of Louis Wirth and others, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of June 14, 1904.

Mr. Andrews, attorney, representing Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, was heard in opposition to the excessive cost of the work and the expenses connected therewith.

On motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

At 11:35 o'clock A. M., on motion, the Board adjourned.

The supplementary application of Britt, Loeffler & Co., which was laid on the table at the last meeting, was then discussed at some length, but it was not considered advisable to take any formal action in the absence of the Chairman.

The Commission then took up Part 8 of the regulations (matches), and after some discussion Commissioner McKenna offered a resolution, which was seconded by Commissioner Sherry, as follows:

Resolved, That the Inspector of Combustibles be requested to favor this Board with information as to the workings of this Bureau under the match regulations for the past 11 months, and to advise them as to what changes, if any, in his opinion, should be made in said regulations.

Regular meeting of the Municipal Explosives Commission.

Present—Commissioners Montgomery, Sherry, Piser and McKenna.

In the absence of the Chairman, the Secretary called the meeting to order. Upon motion, duly made and seconded, Commissioner Montgomery was elected Chairman pro tem.

Minutes of the meeting held April 7, 1904 were read and approved.

In reply to the resolution of April 7, 1904, requesting information from the Inspector of Combustibles, the Secretary read the annual report of the Bureau, which was submitted to the Fire Commissioner on the 12th day of April, 1904.

The supplementary application made April 12, 1904, by Matz & Cohen for a permit to carry certain chemicals and articles considered dangerous and not included in Schedule A of the drug regulations, was taken up for consideration, and after some discussion the following resolution, presented by Commissioner McKenna and seconded by Commissioner Sherry, was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That in accordance with the provisions of Section 13, Chapter 2, Part 6 of the Municipal Explosives Commission's Regulations, the Fire Commissioner is hereby authorized to grant a supplementary permit to Matz & Cohen, wholesale druggists, thereby authorizing the said firm to carry in their premises, at No. 184 Bowery, all of the articles named in their supplementary application, dated April 12, 1904, in the quantities therein stated.

The supplementary application of Britt, Loeffler & Weil was taken from the table, and, after discussion, the Secretary was directed to transmit all papers in connection with the matter to the office of the Fire Commissioner for information and recommendation, if any, before final action is taken by this Board.

By Commissioner McKenna, seconded by Commissioner Sherry:

Resolved, That Commissioners Montgomery and Piser be appointed a committee of two to report what amendment, if any, should be made in the match regulations in accordance with the annual report of the Inspector of Combustibles.

Carried.

By Commissioner Sherry, seconded by Commissioner Piser:

Resolved, That Section 49, Part 5, Municipal Explosives Commission's Regulations, be amended to read as follows:

Part 5, section 49. A special permit may be granted for the sale of paper caps and toy torpedoes upon payment of a fee of \$2.

That part of Section 46, Part 7, of the regulations requiring a survey of premises prior to the issuing of a kerosene license was taken up and discussed, and further consideration was made a special order for the next meeting.

Meeting then adjourned.

Regular meeting of the Municipal Explosives Commission.

Present—Commissioners Sherry, Piser and Montgomery.

In the absence of the Chairman, Commissioner Montgomery was elected Chairman pro tem.

Minutes of the regular meeting held April 14, 1904, were read and approved.

The Secretary read reports of inspection of fireworks factories in the Borough of Kings and Queens made by Deputy Inspectors Foley and Wolf of the Bureau of Combustibles.

The supplementary application of Britt, Loeffler & Weil was taken from the table and discussed, but no action was taken.

Commissioners Montgomery and Piser, committee appointed at the meeting April 14 to report what amendment, if any, should be made in the match regulations, reported amendments as follows:

Resolved, That Sections 6 and 8 of Part 8 of the Municipal Explosives Commission's Regulations be and are hereby repealed; and be it further

Resolved, That Sections 5 and 9 be amended to read as follows:

Section 5. No permit shall be required for the keeping of fifty (50) matchman's gross, or less, of licensed matches for retail sale to consumers.

Sec. 9. Retail stores may carry not more than fifty matchman's gross of matches, which must be kept in some readily accessible open space in said stores. Cases shall not be placed under the counters or shelving, nor shall they be covered with any inflammable or combustible material. All goods other than in original packages must be kept in a closed case.

On motion of Commissioner McKenna, seconded by Commissioner Sherry, the report was adopted and the committee discharged.

On motion of Commissioner Piser, seconded by Commissioner Sherry, the resolution was adopted as reported by the Committee.

A supplementary application of Schieffelin & Co. for keeping chemicals in excess of Schedule E at their chemical factory, Nos 840 to 848 Southern Boulevard, was presented.

Application of Von Longerke & Detmold for a license to carry smokeless powder at No. 318 Broadway in excess of the quantity allowed by the regulations was presented.

Commissioner McKenna presented and Commissioner Sherry seconded the following:

Resolved, That a committee of the Commission be appointed by the Chair to investigate the subject of the safety or danger in permitting retail dealers in gunpowder to store more than the present allowable quantity of smokeless powder, so called.

Which resolution was duly adopted.

Commissioners Piser and Sherry were appointed as said committee.

Upon motion, duly made and seconded, the Commission then adjourned to meet at 4 P. M. Friday, April 22, 1904, at No. 221 Pearl street.

The Commission then took a recess and inspected the premises of Von Longerke & Detmold, No. 318 Broadway.

Commission then adjourned.

Minutes of the regular meeting held April 21, and of the special meeting held April 22, 1904, were read and approved.

The application of Britt, Loeffler & Weil was taken from the table and discussed.

The application of Schieffelin & Co. was taken up, and, on motion of Commissioner McKenna, seconded by Commissioner Piser, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of Section 13, Chapter 2, Part 6, of the Municipal Explosives Commission's Regulations, the Fire Commissioner is hereby authorized to grant a supplementary permit to Schieffelin & Co. for the premises Nos. 840 to 848 Southern Boulevard, St. Ann's avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-second street, Borough of The Bronx, thereby authorizing them to carry all articles named in the supplementary application, except the 120 barrels of kerosene oil, in the quantities therein stated, and no kerosene oil be authorized to be kept in excess of 90 barrels.

The subject of the manufacture of toy caps and torpedoes was brought up and on motion of Commissioner McKenna, seconded by Commissioner Piser, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Fire Commissioner be requested to supply this Board with information as to the number of licensed factories of toy caps and torpedoes in the City, together with a history of the explosions, if any, on licensed premises.

The question of conditions prevailing in Long Island Fire Works factories was discussed and no action taken.

The application of Von Longerke & Detmold for excess of smokeless powder under Section 69, Part 2 was taken up and considered, but no action was taken by this Board.

Motion offered by Commissioner Sherry, seconded by Commissioner McKenna.

Resolved, That subdivision (j) Section 62, Part 5 of the Municipal Explosives Commission's Regulations be amended so as to reduce the size of bombs from 4 inches to 3½ inches and to read as follows:

Section 62 (j). All bombs of any description larger than three and one-quarter inches in diameter.

Adopted unanimously.

Upon motion, the Secretary was directed to notify the applicants for permits for fireworks displays and manufacturers that such amendment had been adopted by the Commission and transmitted to his Honor the Mayor for approval.

Motion offered by Commissioner Sherry, seconded by Commissioner Piser.

A new section to be known as Section 13 "a" be added to Part 5 of the Municipal Explosives Commission's Regulations was adopted to read as follows:

Section 13 "a." Roman candles must be packed with the stems all pointing in one direction and the label must be affixed to package on the end opposite the stems.

Adopted unanimously.

Meeting then adjourned.

Mr. Jacob Weil, of the firm of Britt, Loeffler & Weil, wholesale druggists, No. 37 Bowery, appeared before the Commission and asked relief from the provisions of Section 15, Part 6 of the Regulations, prohibiting the issuing of a permit to a wholesale drug store located in a lodging house.

After Mr. Weil's withdrawal the Commission decided that:

The application of Britt, Loeffler & Weil shows that they are conducting a store containing a wholesale drug stock in a building licensed for three hundred and eighty-nine lodgers, and so occupied, and that the issuing of such permit would be contrary to Section 15, Part 6 of the Municipal Explosives Commission's Regulations.

The Secretary was directed to write the Supervisor of the City Record, giving the names and addresses of the Commissioners and request that a copy of the CITY RECORD be sent to each.

Meeting then adjourned.

MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

The minutes of the meeting held May 5 were read and approved.

Upon motion made by Mr. Piser and seconded by Mr. Sherry, it was

Resolved, That Section 17, Part 5, of the Municipal Explosives Commission's Regulations be amended so as to establish an annual fee for manufacturers of fireworks, of paper caps and toy torpedoes, and of signals, to read as follows:

"Section 17. The license fee for the manufacture of fireworks shall be one hundred dollars.

"The license fee for the manufacture of paper caps and toy torpedoes shall be twenty dollars; and the license fee for the manufacture of signals shall be twenty dollars."

Carried.

Commissioners Montgomery, Piser and Sherry voting in the affirmative.

Commissioner McKenna recorded in the negative.

Upon motion made by Mr. Sherry and seconded by Mr. Piser, it was resolved that a new section to be known as Section 31a be added to Part 5 of the Municipal Explosives Commission's Regulations requiring a weekly report from licensees whose place of business is outside of the city, and to read as follows:

"Section 31a. Every licensed wholesale dealer in fireworks, in signals, in paper caps or in torpedoes whose place of business is located without the city, and every manufacturer of caps and torpedoes within the city shall render to the Fire Commissioner each week a statement, verified as to its correctness by an affidavit, covering sale and delivery of fireworks, signals, paper caps and torpedoes, for the preceding week within the city, and in detail as follows:

"(a) Date of delivery.

"(b) Name of buyer.

"(c) Where delivered.

"(d) Quantity and kind of fireworks, signals, paper caps or torpedoes delivered."

Carried.

Commissioners Montgomery, Piser and Sherry voting in the affirmative.

Commissioner McKenna recorded in the negative.

Dr. McKenna arrived and requested to be recorded in the negative on the two above resolutions.

Moved by Commissioner McKenna, seconded by Commissioner Piser:

Resolved, That the fireworks manufacturers and wholesale dealers be notified of the amendments passed at this meeting, and that they be accorded a hearing on the proposed amendments at a special meeting of the Board to be held Tuesday, May 17, at 2 P. M., at the Headquarters of the Fire Department.

Carried.

The Secretary was directed to notify the trade and to inform the Fire Commissioner of the proposed hearing.

Upshaw, an Examiner in the office of the Commission, transmitting a physician's certificate, and stating that owing to illness it would be impossible for Miss Upshaw to come to the office for at least two weeks, and requesting that a leave of absence for that length of time be extended to her.

The Secretary presented a report of Examiner Byrne upon the communication addressed to this Commission by George McFadden, No. 968 Boston road, Borough of The Bronx, alleging that persons are improperly employed by the Law Department to serve legal papers. The report showed that there are nine Process Servers employed by the Corporation Counsel from the civil service lists, whose names appear on the civil roster. These men are generally employed in serving notices of violations of City ordinances and notices to delinquent jurors, while the men against whose employment Mr. McFadden protests are engaged temporarily under contract, whenever the personal tax arrears notices and other work of an intermittent character demand the employment of additional men. There is no record of the exact number of men who are engaged from time to time on work of this character. The payment for the work is based upon the number of notices actually served. If all these notices were required to be served by a limited number of regularly salaried employees, engaged during regular business hours, great delay in the service of the notices would invariably result; while, on the other hand, if a sufficient number of men were appointed to meet the needs of the office at times when there are a large number of notices to be served, the men so employed would have little or nothing to do at other times, and the regular payment of salaries to so large a number of men would be a useless expense.

On motion, minutes approved as read.

Appeal 61—96 N. B. of 1904, premises West Eighth street, Thirty-first Ward, Coney Island, referred to Chief Croker and Mr. C. G. Smith for report. Mr. C. H. Nicholls appeared before the Board.

On motion, appeal laid over pending report of Committee.

Appeal 75—368, N. B. of 1904, premises Nos. 114 to 118 West Thirty-ninth street, Manhattan. Messrs Schickel & Ditmars, appellants.

No. 2. "Pent-house is unlawful, unless regarded as an additional story.

No. 8. "Pent-house walls are of unlawful construction.

"The mode, manner of construction and materials proposed to be followed or used in the erection of the pent-house are lawful.

"Should not the pent-house be regarded as a pent-house, not as an additional story?

"Should not the construction of the pent-house walls be accepted as lawful?

"The pent-house is not a thirteenth story, but a pent-house, covering less than 33 per cent. of the roof area, and is to contain no offices but only plumbing and elevator machinery. The building does not exceed 150 feet in height.

"1st. All walls surrounding the pent-house will be carried up to their proper height.

"2d. Floor will be made of cement.

"3d. Wire-glass will be used wherever glass is necessary.

"4th. All woodwork of the window frames, sash, doors, trim and base of the pent-house will be thoroughly fireproof.

"5th. Proper skylights will be provided.

"6th. The floor of the pent-house will be less than 150 feet above the curb.

"7th. All woodwork entering into the construction of the pent-house will be fireproofed by the process which is fully approved by the Bureau of Buildings.

"8th. The entire pent-house will be constructed fireproof.

"9th. A stand-pipe with hose connection and outlet in the hall of pent-house will be provided.

"10th. The pent-house will cover less than 33 per cent. of the roof area. No wood flooring will be used except in the two stores of the first story."

Mr. Holland C. Anthony appeared before the Board.

On motion, approved on condition that the construction as shown be found of adequate strength by the Bureau of Buildings.

Appeal 76—237, alteration of 1904, premises No. 657 East One Hundred and Fifty-first street, The Bronx, Anthony F. A. Schmitt, appellant.

"Proposed extension is unlawful (section 142 of Code).

"The law allows frame extensions to frame buildings within the fire limits, two stories and basement in height.

"The building to be extended is a frame building and is three stories in height and is located within the fire limits. Being that the law allows two stories and basement extension within the fire limits to frame houses, it is respectfully requested to have the law modified so as to allow frame extension within the fire limits three stories in height to a three-story frame building.

"Being that the main building is frame the extension ought to be of frame also. The Tenement House Department allows an extension to the house of 70 square feet, but no more. So, if the extension would have to be built of brick, there would not be enough room left on the inside to comply with the inside measurements for bath-rooms as per Tenement House Laws and Rules, and, as mentioned before, it is impossible to extend the walls on the outside on account of the 70 square feet allowed only by the Tenement House Department. Then, almost all the houses on the whole square block are of frame."

Mr. A. F. A. Schmitt appeared before the Board.

On motion, approved as amended, that the spaces between studs of frame work (outside walls) of the new extension will be filled with brick two inches in thickness.

Appeal 77—909, alteration of 1904, premises Nos. 2041 to 2045 Seventh avenue, Manhattan, appellant Samuel Weingart.

"I. The building should be made fireproof (section 105 of the Code).

"The law does not strictly apply in this case. That the entire building will be occupied for school purposes.

"Whether the conversion of the lower stories of this building into a school will make it necessary to fireproof the entire building.

"That only the lower portion of one of the three buildings will be used for school purposes.

"That the number of pupils will not exceed fifty at the most.

"Besides the stairs which now exit in the building, there is a means of escape to the adjoining building.

"That an outside stairs at the rear of the building will be provided as an additional means of escape."

Mr. Samuel Weingart appeared before the Board.

On motion, denied.

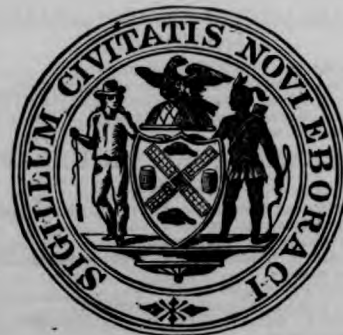

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
